# Regents Oust Rainey As U. T. President British Establish

# Governor Will Attempt To End Big Controversy

AUSTIN—(AP)—Discharge of Dr. Homer P. Rainey as president of the University of Texas and wholesale resignations from the board of regents Thursday dumped into the lap of Gov. Coke R. Stevenson the unprecedented responsibility for the future of the State University. The Governor agreed to confer with ex-students and faculty representatives in an attempt to iron out the situation.

The regents, in discharging Rainey, said it was their opinion he had "failed and refused to conform and be guided by the rules, regulations and policies of the board, and to properly and efficiently discharge \* \* many of the terms and conditions of the trust committed to him by the board."

Effective Immediately His discharge was made effecive Nov. 1, and Dr. T. S. Painter, professor of zoology, was named acting president. The board thus by-passed Dr. J. Alton Burdine, vice president under Rainey, who has figured prominently in the split between

administration and regents. Governor Stevenson received the resignations of Board Members John H. Bickett, chairman, of Dallas: H. H. Weinert of Seguin; and Dan J. Harrison of Houston, but had not acted on them.

He said he had not heard from Regents Orville Bullington of Wi-chita Falls, D. F. Strickland of Mission and W. Scott Schreiner Kerrville, who were reported in Houston to be planning resigna-

If all these resignations take place, Governor Stevenson on Jan. Meet Demands will have the unique task of naming an entire new nine-member board of regents because the terms of three members expire on that date. Under Texas law, regents are appointed by the governor, subject confirmation of the State Senatc. The regents have broad powers, constitutionally and by statute to direct policies of the university.

Investigation Started. The clash between Rainey and the board has already precipitated investigations by the American Association of University Professors and the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Discharge of Rainey also preci-

# **Nelson Directed** To Return To China By FDR

WASHINGTON -(AP)- President Roosevelt Thursday directed Donald M. Nelson to return to China at "the earliest possible date" to or-

ganize a Chinese war production

Following a long conference be-tween Nelson and the President, the White House issued a statement

which said: "As the President's personal representatives, Mr. Nelson will con-tinue his work with the Generalissimo (Chiang Kai-Shek) on measures aimed at strengthening the Chinese war effort, and notably in organizing a war production board

to increase the output of China's war industries." The announcement said Nelson's return to China had been urged by

the Generalissimo. Thursday's White House visit was Nelson's first since Mr. Roosevelt announced the recall of General Joseph W. Stilwell because of what resignation of Amebassador Clar-

# What Policy Toward Spain?

There is an uneasy feeling of "this is where we came in" about the news from Spain these days. The news has been soft-pedaled by censorship and by some leaders of both factions. Nevertheless it appears that long-threaten-

ing trouble may flare again into full-scale civil war.

The situation is cloudy, with each side claiming early successes. But at least it seems certain that Spanish Republican troops, which escaped to France after the Civil War and have fought with the maquis against the Germans, have recrossed the border and clashed with Franco's forces, and that an underground Madrid paper has called on regular Spanish Army officers to take up arms against

There are also rumors which, if true, are significant. One is that 40,000 German troops escaped from France into Spain and have been regrouped to fight for Franco. The other is that French Maquis were ordered to withdraw from the border and leave their Spanish comrades

This would be a repetition of history. Germany, of course, was at Franco's side in the conflict of 1936-39. So was Italy, and the two conducted a dress rehearsal of history's greatest and bloodiest war. France maintained a hands-off attitude. 

Conference Opposes Idea

The conference opposes compulsory liability insurance for auto drivers. One of the reasons: That it forces safe drivers to take out insurance because there are bad drivers Prior to its meeting this month

the committee had proposed: That a driver-convicted of a ma jor traffic offense or against whom a court judgment had been rendered for an accident—would suffer suspension of his license until he had paid the judgment or made pro-vision against future libality by taking out insurance.

More than 40 states had adopted this code in one form or another. You see what this means: A driver didn't have to prove financial responsibility until he had a bad traf-

fic record or lost a court suit. But now the committee wants to change that a bit. What the committee says now is this:

Not only a driver who causes damage-but the person whose car is damaged-must show financial responsibility after an accident.

An Example For instance: Suppose you left your car outside your house. A drunken driver smashes into it. Would the drunken driver be allowed to wait until he was found guilty or ordered to pay damages to prove himself able to pay the damages?

No. You-the innocent victimand the driver right after the accident would suffer suspension of iicense if you couldn't prove financial responsibility.

You can argue: Doesn't this arrangement put an unfailr burden on the safe driver?

For instance: You make \$10,000 a year. You're a safe driver. You've never had insurance. But if you had an accident, you could pay whatever damages were found


