

LONDON—(AP)—American Ninth Army troops drove hrough deep mud and German steel into the Roer Valley villages of Koslar and Barmen Thursday in a slow advance toward Cologne, 26 miles away on the Rhine.

The German army, long synonymous with rigid discipline, has now sanctioned mutiny in the interest of "total resistance." The Nazi Party, which clearly controls the army, advises German soldiers or home guards to shoot anyone who contemplates surrender-even if it be a soldier's superior officer.

The announcement of this surprising move was found in a captured copy of a Nazi army-circulated publication, and its text included the admission that "our will to resist is the only thing we have left against the material superiority of our enemy until the new weapons are ready


## Crewless Fortress Flys 400 Miles Before Crashing In Forest



simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Measure sugar and prepared fruit with water if necessary. Mix well and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard one minute. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just five minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot marmalade at once.







## James Mims Tells Of Soldiering In The Philippines

S/Sgt. James Mims, son of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Mims, doesn't think much of the Philippines. At least a letter received from him leaves one with that impression.

"What doesn't crawl, hops; what doesn't hop, flies; and everything bites." is the way he describes the island on which he served with the 24th Division.

"Mosquitoes are so thick you can't stir them, and chicken wire makes a good net to keep them out. I don't believe they had a square meal until we arrived," he continued. Plans On Ice Cream

'We were on the ocean just a couple of days before we landed. One good thing, we had ice cream about three times and good chow, which was a welcome change. When get home I think I'll just do nothing but eat ice cream," he

'They don't play for fun here. So far the only Japs I have seen have been dead ones and prisoners, but they wer eonly a few hundred yards away when we landed. We have had air raids and rain every night. A fox hole isn't the best place to sleep, but we are making out o. k. Snipers take pot shots at us once awhile, but rather quickly find

butter (?), corn, lima beans, bacon, eggs and other good things, but not like fried chicken.

"It is much like the other South Pacific areas here—jungles, cocoanut palms and lots of good hot sun. The natives are very glad to see us and tell, the usual stories of the Japs. They carry all kinds of odd-shaped bundles on their heads and we see water buffalo and bamboo nuts just like the pictures. Monotonous Digging

"We have a pretty good set-up, but it gets very monotous digging fox holes every time we move, but they're quite comforting when bombs come over or snipers fet ambitious. I believe I'll be heartily sick of the islands when I have dug holes all the way across them." He said it was quite interesting

coming in on A-Day, and it seemed more like watching a news reel than being in it. They had to wade a few feet, filling their shoes with water. Since they were so thirsty they cut open some green cocoanuts, which are mostly juice. "You can't imagine the confusion on the beach but very quickly all kinds of stuff starts moving up and getting into shape to function.'

## Justice Department \*Questions Jurisdiction In Humble Oil Case

FORT WORTH - (P) - Harry I. Rand, attorney for the Department of Justice, Washington, Wednesday said in the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals that Federal Judge W. H. Atwell of Dallas exceeded his au-thority when he issued an order restraining WLB and PAW officials at Washington from seizing or threatening to seize the Humble Oil and Refining Company's Ingleside plant.

Rand said the injunction, issued last Sept. 21, had no jurisdiction over Washington officials of the two agencies. He contended Humble properly should have brought its suit in Federal district court in the District of Columbia.

Conceded Lack Rex G. Baker, general counsel for the Humble Company, conceded the district court's lack of jurisdiction over national officials "as long as they remained in Washington," but said they would bring themselves within the court's jurisdiction if they or their agents came to Texas

to carry out seizure of the plant. Baker, describing Judge Atwell's order as "protection of the company's property," said they sought to prevent "illegal sanctions." The sanctions, he said, were in the form of refusal of the 8th Regional WLB at Dallas to act on the company's appplication for wage adjustment unless it complied with a maintenance of membership provision in its union contract.


