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A New Campaign At Aachen

In about a month, if present plans are not changed, Allied Military Government will reopen the grammar schools in Aachen. And thus will begin one of the war's most important campaigns, the re-education of Germany.

The AMG officers are faced with a tremendous task. The schoolrooms of Aachen are to them what New Guinea was to General MacArthur or Oran to General Eisenhower -the first step on the long, painful and endlessly difficult road that leads to extermination of the Axis.

Aachen will be only a small beginning to test opposing strength and try the weapons of assault. Efforts are now being made to choose teachers and textbooks, and already these efforts have brought samples of the trouble that

Teachers had to join the Nazi party to hold their jobs. One difficulty in Aachen and elsewhere, will be to find redeemable teachers who became Nazis from expediency and not conviction.

Then there will be the problem of what to teach. Of course literature offers as many antidotes for Nazi poison as there are remedies in a volume of materia medica. But Roosevelt where in the free world of letters is a start to be made: And what will best assure speedy assimilation and a real start toward mental and spiritual health?

The most impressive feature of British Prime Minister Churchill's speech in Commons Tuesday, as I see it, was the convincing picture he drew of a Big Three which is sincerely determined to stand together for the purpose of compelling the world (by force if necessary) to maintain peace.

That's a new approach to the

paramount problem of the day the outlawing of war. Only three cooks this time to make the broth and that gives it a chance. As Churchill said, "it is their duty to preserve the world, not to rule it," but while he disavowed any "dictatorship of the great powers" he might have added in truth that among them they have the physical strength to make the world behave—or to stand on its head, if they want to. Let It Smack

If that seems to smack of strong-arm work, let it smack. We failed to preserve peace with an unwieldy League of Nations, and the consensus now seems to be try the new idea. It obviously will work so long as the Big Three don't quarre among themselves—and Churchill emphasized their unity.

In presenting this picture the Prime Minister declared that the United States would play "a vitally important part" in the new world security league, "which will not shirk from establishing its will against the evil doer" by force of arms.
