Armored Infantrymen Risk Sudden Death To Secure Bridge

By HOWARD COWAN ACROSS THE RHINE- (A) -A daring band of armored infantrymen, utterly ignoring the fact that the 1,200-foot steel road and rail bridge might blow up in their faces, raced across the Rhine at Remagen and saved the Allies the costly price of an amphibious in-

vasion of Inner Germany. In a matter of seconds after a company of infantry, paced by Lt. Emmet J. Burrows, had seized the bridge-in the midst of explosions which caused slight damage-elements of the Ninth Armored Division fanned out on the east bank and carried the bridgehead.

ROME-(AP)-U. S. Fifth Army troops closing in on the German Rober highway stronghold of Vergato, 17 1/2 miles southwest of Bolongna, have occupied Carviano, about a mile east of their objective, Allied headquarters announced Friday.

The push, although slowed somewhat by the enemy in the last 2 hours, warned the closest approa yet to Vergato, which has held against Allied attacks for months.

PARIS-(A)-The American First Army steadily reinforced and built up its Rhine bridgehead Friday at a point south of Cologne which the Germans said was Remagen, 276 miles southwest of Berlin.

The Germans said the Americans had captured a bridge intact at Remagen. The Ludendorff span there is a double track railroad bridge capable of bearing tanks, trucks and foot traps. A Berlin military spokesman said the First Army troops found the bridge which "by chance" was not destroyed.

Retreat From Isolation

Comdr. Harold Stassen recently said that, in his opinion, this country has "definitely left isolation behind, and that applies to both parties." The same evening that the former Minnesota governor made that statement, Senator Burton K. Wheeler delivered a speech that may have added some slight weight to Stassen's hopeful words.

Wheeler tore the Yalta conference apart. He has done much the same thing with the administration's whole wartime foreign policy, right down the line. He didn't pull

The Democratic senator from Montana never does. If any American does not know that Wheeler was one of the most powerful and voluble of prewar isolationists, it isn't Wheeler's fault. Yet it has seemed recently that when Wheeler has mounted the rostrum to discuss our foreign policy, that rostrum has been moved an inch or so from its previous moorings.

It still doesn't stand very close to the position of Stassen and millions of like-minded Americans. But it can't be overlooked that in this latest speech the senator did

say a kind word for the Atlantic Charter. We must throw our full weight behind the principles of the Atlantic Charter," he warned, "if we do not wish to see our American ways dragged down in the muck and mire of Old World evils and hatreds.'

The second half of that statement has an old, familiar Wolfcamp exploration, in East Lea ring. But the senator does prescribe the Atlantic Charter as a means of dodging the perils that he pictures. And the Atlantic Charter is scarcely an instrument of isolation.

If Wheeler is moving his rostrum ever so slightly away from isolationism, he is undoubtedly taking his audience with him. Wheeler has always commanded a considerable following. It is doubtful, however, that this following will go beyond him and demand a more international stand from him when the Senate debate on international organization finally begins.

The senator has a plan of his own for international organization. It calls for a "United Nations political council" (without access to the use of force in maintaining peace) which would lead into a "United States of Europe" (in which the United States of America apparently would out are not confirmed. Informed

This reveals Senator Wheeler doing business at the same old stand. It seems to refute Stassen's opinion and our footnote of faint encouragement. Yet there is enough change in Wheeler's attitude to lend hope that so influential a senator is not wholly irreconcilable.

We believe that Stassen's estimate of public sentiment can is about 90 per cent right. Whether that sentiment can formation any time.

Limitations On Mineral Rights

AUSTIN—(P)—The flow of constitutional amendments to the floor o fthe 49th legislature continued unabated Friday.

A proposition that there shall be no severance of minerals from surface ownership of Texas land for a longer period of 15 years, and so lon gthereafter as there is production of such minerals without interruption of more than one year. Staunchly Opposed

The first proposed constitutional amendment has been staunchly opposed by University of Texas interests. At Thursday night's committee meeting, a motion that the resolution proposing the amendment be sent back to the House with a recommendation that it not pass, prevailed by an 8 to 7 vote, when chairman Donald Markle of Galveston broke a tie.

The University permanent fund, in which only Texas A. and M. College now shares, totals close to \$50,-000,000. Under the amendment, each of the other state-owned colleges and universities would share according to their enrollment. The resolution calling for submission of the question to the electroate was by Rep. Preston E. Smith of Lubbock. Rep. Sam Hanna of Dallas served notice of the minority report. Mineral Interests

The other proposed amendment that will be brought out on minority report was designed to put a future, limitation upon severance of mineral interests, with no attempt to void past transacions. Rep. Durwood Manford of Smiley, its author, told the committee that the majority of royalty conveyances now provide for their expiration at the end of 15 years unless there is development upon the part of those who have purchased mineral rights.

The amendment was opposed by McDonald Meacham of the Houston Oil Company of Texas, who characterized it as the "most drastic measure pending before the present legislature." He said that it abridged the right of contract and was therefore unconstitutional.

A motion that the proposal be sent to the House with a recommendation that it not pass carried by an 8 to 6 vote, but Manford served notice that he would bring it upin a minority preport.
