# **Japs On Okinawa** Still Hold U.S. **Troops To No Gain**

Renewed Allied carrier raids on Sumatra and Formosa were reported by Tokyo radio Thursday as "strong formations" of fighter-escorted Superfortresses lashed at war production centers in and around the Japanese capital.

Japanese soldiers added a new hazard to American conquest of Okinawa, 325 miles south of Japan, by releasing thousands of lepers and insone. Many of the mad



## Help For Holland

To most Americans the Dutch have always seemed a quaint people with their windmills. wooden shoes, tulips, storks, wide starched caps and wider breeches. We've chuckled at them and their queer clacking language, but we have also admired them for their industry and neatness, their apple-cheeked health, and their resourceful battle against the encroaching sea.

Perhaps the average American's picture of the Netherlands has been a little distorted. The Dutch have known bitterness and unrest and bleak poverty. Yet in the main our impression of a healthy, happy people has probably been accurate. At least it was until May 10, 1940.

On that day, nearly five years ago, commenced what is doubtless the most tragic chapter of Dutch history. The Germans invaded the Low Countries to "protect" them from the Allies. Four days later, after the Dutch armies had capitulated, the Luftwaffe flew over the great city of Rotterdam unopposed, and bombed it to rubble.

From then on the night of terror grew blacker. The Nazis, early convinced that their brutality was not for- Kwantung army clique which progotten by their Dutch neighbors, resorted to cruelty. #### Washington Charges Deliberate Neglect To American Prisoners

WASHINGTON - (P) - The U.S. government Thursday charged Germany with "deliberate neglect, indifference and cruelty" in the treat-

ment of American prisoners.

The War and State departments declared in a joint statement that actions are being uncovered daily which "have shocked the entire

civilezed world.' The statement was issued by Secretary of War Stimson and Secretary of State Stettinius.

The statement declared that atrocities against American prisoners 'are documented by the pitiable condition of liberated American soldiers," adding: "We Will Not Forget"

"The American nation will not forget them. It is our relentless determination that the perpetrators of these heinous crimes against American citizens and against civilization itself will be brough to jus-

In general, the statement said, conditions under which American prisoners are held in Germany are 'deplorable." Some 70,000 American men are captives in the interior of Germany, it added, and the conditions under which many are living 'are due to a large extent to Germany's fanatical determination to continue a hopeless war, with a re-sultant disintegration under disastrous military defeat.














## Service Of Supplies Did Impossible To Beat Timetable In Enabling Yanks To Reach Rhine

PARIS - When American First Army troops smashed across the Rhine to establish a bridgehead on the eastern bank, news stories laconically reported that thousands of tons of equipment were rapidly assembled to exploit the dent in German defenses.

This Yank success, like other triumphs over the Nazis since D-Day, would have been impossible from the start but for the endless, thankless, glamcrless work done by men who never hear a shot fired the officers and GIs in the Services of Supplies, Communications Zone,

Combat troops whose brains, brawn and guts are largely respon-sible, of course, for our military successes, affectionately call the area behind the armies' rear boundaries "Com Z." They refer to the Services of Supplies centered in

It is no secret that Allied armies in the European Theater of Operations are way ahead of the planners' timetables. Despite von Rundstedt's counter-offensive we are much farther east than was dreamed possible when the first American troops landed on the Normandy beaches on June 6. Keep 'Em Rolling

This is the most mechanized of

logistically "impossible" to land and supply an army across a beach. That is axiomatic in planning. According to all planning formulae, more supplies are needed to back up any given number of combat soldiers than can be landed on the amount of beach which this number of soldiers can be expected to

Yet the impossible was accomplished. Deprived of most of Cherbourg's usefulness for two months after its capture, without another major port in our possession, SOS hauled as much as 25,000 tons of supplies a day across the two American beaches - Omaha and Utah-to deliver the muscle behind the breakthrough wallop of the First and Third U. S. Armies.


