Time To Buckle Down

It seems certain that Congress is about to assume a more dominant part in the operations of government than it has exercised in many years. There is evidence of this Senate experience, and in the mutual confidence and esteem that mark his association with his former colleagues.

Less personalized government and more "advice and consent of the Senate" would seem one of the safe predictions for the Truman administration. But if this is to be the case, then it behooves Congress to wake up to its responsibilities and prove that its members are ready for and equal to the role that some of them have been demanding for the past decade.

Three events which immediately preceded President Roosevelt's death gave distressing proof that Congress, and particularly the Senate, was not functioning in a way to arouse much confidence in its readiness to play a more important part with ability and authority.

First was the scolding that Majority Leader Barkley felt compelled to give the Senate for meager attendance and inattention to highly important legislation.

Then came an illustration of the consequences of inattention. Senator Homer Ferguson barely caught and stopped a bill, after the Military Affairs Committee had ton. Interesting Relics

American soldiers in Germany have come upon some interesting old relics of a bygone time, living in comfortable seclusion until disturbed by the advancing invaders. and Stalin.

One of them was the Princess Hermine, widow of Kaiser Wilhelm. "He was a poor old man with the wrong sort of children," she said of him. "He loved Germany."

Another was the ancient, massive, iron-visaged Mar-Another was the ancient, massive, iron-visaged Marshal von Mackensen, idol of two generations of Prussian Junkers and perfect symbol of German militarism. "Can't


you do something to stop the Russians from killing my chickens?" was his complaint to his American captors. There were others, too, including a few fatuous, Naziloving Hohenzollerns. But these two are enough to provide another compelling reason for unconditional surren-

der and the pursuit and punishment of war criminals. 





THE WAR TODAY

Surely there could be no more auspicious sign for the opening of the San Francisco Security Conference than the merging of the

mighty armies of the Big Three-

in accord and fellowship-on the battlefields of a broken Germany. There we have a working partnership which is symbolic of the peace which the security conference seeks. For it has come to be a truism that peace depends (certainly at the outset) on unity of the Big Three -Russia, Britain and America. So long as they stand together there will be a rainbow in the sky.

And there's another good sign in Wednesday's report from the European theater. Two hours before American heavy bombers attacked the huge Skoda armament factory at Pilsen, the Allied radio warned the workers-many of whom are slaves of the Nazis-to flee to the safety of the countryside. That message was, of course, also a tip to the German military to prepare the assault.

Different Approach What a commentary on the humane code of the Allies, at a moment when the whole world is shuddering over the awful atrocities of the Huns against not only enemy people but their own kin! That provides further useful timber for the building of a peace structure on which mankind can have confidence.

While the peace-makers gather in the Golden West, the battle in the heart of Berlin is one of the fiercest of the war. The Russians clearly marks this as one of the last great engagements of "the

The Germans have been launching continuous counterattacks, and their officers are reported to be shooting down any of their men who attompt to desert. Heaven only knows what's happening to the civilian population which has been caught in this death-net.

Marks The Dissolution This bloody battle marks the dissolution of the so-called Berlin corridor— the great defense lane running north and south on both sides of the capital. The Germans have been withdrawing troops from this corridor battle-front and send-ing them into their last-ditch redoubts to the south and to the north. Many Nazi troops who have been facing the Russians south of Berlin have been pulled back to Hitler's Alpine defenses, while those to the north of the capital are being rushed in considerable numbers towards Donmark by train Estimates of the strength of the

Maj. Gen. Rose's Death Was Felt

By HAL BOYLE

WITH THE THIRD ARMORED an American battle commander mitter. in the Southwest Pacific in a year along the Western Front has been and a half. He's production boss felt more keenly in all ranks than for the 112th Quartermaster Bakery unit here after having "baked from who welded the Third Armored" "Spearhead" Division into one of the finest American outfits.

This 45-year-old tank officer rose from the rank of private by virtue of courage, industry and military brilliance. His quick intelligence which enabled him to capitalize instantantously on enemy errors was coupled with boldness and an efficiency that Rommel himself would have admired. I never knew a man who so ruthlessly and cold bloodedly set about destroying an enemy.

Friends And Rivals They were great friends and great rivals, too, after Rose's Third Division began to rival the exploits of Harmon's "Hell on Wheels" Second in the battles of France and Germany. Rose annihilated thousands of Germans in the famous trap at Mons, Belgium, and just before he died he drove his division 101 miles in 19 hours, the longest combat gain Wright, who formerly installed ever made by an armored outfit in a single day. And he was in the

forefront every mile of the way. Rose was the ideal professional soldier. He was more than six feet tall and lean, with dark eyes and close-cropped black hair tinged with gray. Even at the end of a long day in the front lines he looked like he was on his way to an Army horse show, with no spot on his pink trousers and his high-calved boots as shiny as the brass plate on a third vice-president's desk at the First National Bank.

Rose's own verdict on the man who killed him would have been a contemptuous "he didn't know his job." Rose lived and died as a professional, a career he loved and followed since he was a boy of 17. He would be the last to regret that he had a soldier's ending. And that's the way his "Spearhead" tankmen feel about it now as they roll on through Germany in the closing weeks of the war he affected so mightily.
