Zhukov Says Hitler Wed Sweetheart

BERLIN—(AP)—Adolf Hitler married his sweetheart, Eva Braun, two days before Berlin's fall and the lovers might have escaped from the German capital by plane, Marshal Gregory K. Zhukov, Russian conqueror of the city said Saturday.

"We have found no corpse which could be Hitler's," Zhukov said in the first authoritative report on the Hitler mystery.

Zhukov said the German Fuehrer and his bride had good opportunities to get away from Berlin.

"He could have taken off at the very last moment, for there was an airfield at his disposal," said the head of the Red Army's occupation forces in Germany.

Body Not Found
The Soviet Commandant of Berlin, Col. Gen. Nikolai E. Bezarin, also said that Russian soldiers had not yet found Hitler's body.

"My personal opinion is that he has disappeared somewhere into Europe," Bezarin said. "Perhaps he is in Spain with Franco."

Bezarin said the Russians had found several bodies in Hitler's Reich Chancellery with the fuhrer's name on their clothes.

Eva Braun—the only woman whom Hitler is said to have loved, besides his mother—was said in the capital to have flown to Berlin in the last days of the battle to be by Hitler's side.

Zhukov said: "It is well known that two days before Berlin fell Hitler married Eva Braun." He added that the Russians had found references to the marriage in the diaries of Hitler's personal adjutants.

Many Series E War Bond Sales

"The employees have purchased \$5,006.25 worth of extra War Bonds in this campaign. These purchases were over and above what they are buying regularly."

Among some of the larger purchases and allocations made last week are the Stanolind Oil Purchasing Company, \$15,000; Devonian Oil Company, \$5,000; Pure Oil Company, \$20,000; Midland Production Credit Association, \$1,000; Davidson Drilling Company, \$10,000; Texas-New Mexico Pipe Line Company, \$50,000.

The campaign will continue three more weeks.

Gen. Davis Says MAAF Is Bomb Training Capital

Midland Army Air Field has been redesignated the Army Air Force Central School for Bombing and is now the established hub of AAF bombing training and research, Brig. Gen. M. F. Davis, commanding general of the Central Flying Training Command, Randolph Field, announced Saturday.

Already a well established bombing center, MAAF has been doing outstanding work in aerial bombing for some time. Under its new title, the entire field will be devoted to AAF bombing and will be staffed with the Army Air Forces' top men in bombing training and research.

As the central bombing school, Midland will continue to prepare curricula, lectures, problems and related material for standard use in the AAF bombing schools. Some of the nation's leading instructors in engineering, geology and mathematics are on duty at Midland. Experiments Continue

Bombing experiment will continue, as well as development and evaluation of bombing procedures and devices. The Midland research department has been doing outstanding work in aiding the improvement of bombing training and suggesting improvements in bombing instruments.

Many of the combat bombardiers returned to the United States will be sent to Midland for a bombing course. Studies will be made of the returned bombardier's combat experiences to aid in the future preparation of bombing training and development.

The purpose of the "post-graduate" course in bombing is to instruct the returnee-bombardier in the newest methods and techniques of aerial bombing. Graduates of this course will be qualified bombing instructors and will be assigned to one of the AAF bombing schools.

LANDING BOAT CONSTRUCTION SLOWED

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Navy disclosed Saturday it had started a general "slowdown" in the production of landing boats.

All producers of landing boats, the department said, are slowing down their rate of monthly production so that it will require "some months" longer to complete outstanding contracts.

War Buletifins

PARIS—(AP)—Former French Premier Edouard Daladier Saturday accused Vichy Chief of State Marshal Henri Philippe Petain of having sabotaged French national defense since 1934 and said "the order to cease fire against the Germans was given prematurely by Petain."

LONDON—(AP)—A great store of Italy's art treasures was kept in the Vatican throughout the war, the Vatican radio said Saturday night.

PARIS—(AP)—The U. S. Ninth Army will end its assignment in the European theater June 15, it was disclosed Saturday by the 12th Army Group.

MANILA—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Headquarters announced Sunday the hanging of six Japanese and one Filipino convicted of espionage.

Allies Nail Down Victory In Europe

The Allies Saturday began the task of nailing down their victory in Europe, announcing plans to prevent Germany from making war again.

First, a reparations program to strip Germany of its war plants was outlined by Edwin Pauley, President Truman's personal representative on the Allied Reparations Commission.

Second, Supreme Headquarters in Paris announced that United States armies, which held 2,852,000 German prisoners in Europe when victory came, would keep 600,000 of them as laborers.

Another 200,000 to 225,000 German troops in American hands are going to be turned over to the French for labor in France.

The problem of one European trouble-spot was solved—possibly at least until a peace conference can settle it permanently—when an Anglo-American and Yugoslav agreement was reached on disputed Trieste on the Adriatic Sea.

Marshal Tito's Yugoslav forces will withdraw eastward, leaving Anglo-American forces on control of railroads and roads to Austria.

In the Middle East, the Paris radio reported "new tension between French and British authorities" in Syria, while French authorities disclosed that France had sought to retain command of Syrian and Lebanese conscripts until Japan's fall.

About 100 Iwo Island-based Mustangs escorted the bomber flights, hitting three targets in the Tokyo area.

United Nations Conference Moves Near Showdown

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Australian Foreign Minister Herbert V. Evatt declared Saturday "the fight is on" and the United Nations Conference moved toward a showdown on a Big Five interpretation of their veto-voting authority.

The great nations were trying to convince all small countries that they must have supreme veto-voting rights in the Security Council of a new world organization. Evatt's four-word pronouncement underlined the difficulties but they were confident of winning out after some speech-making.

Australian Opposes Plan
The Australian has been leading small-nation opposition to broad veto powers. Russia, China, Britain, France and the United States insist that the veto must apply at all levels when the Security Council acts to erase threats to peace or prevent aggression.

A subcommittee considered their interpretation Saturday and passed it up to its parent committee, minus recommendations for approval or disapproval, for more study and debate.

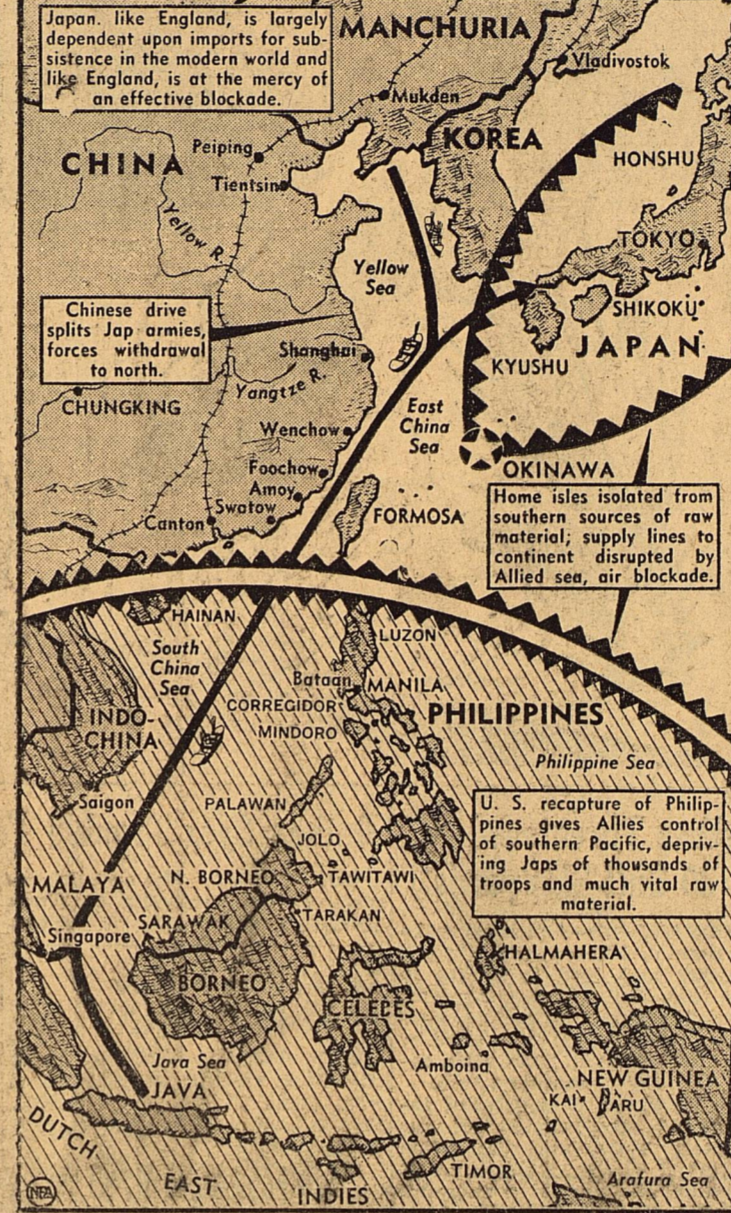
Complaints rang out in the subcommittee, delegates reported, that more clarification is needed of the veto formula and that the Big Five had failed to answer specifically a number of questions put to them by little countries on how it would work.

Evatt spoke several times. So did America's delegate, Senator Tom Connally (D-Texas) in rebuttal.

Seven Japanese interceptors sought unsuccessfully to halt the attack. One was damaged, the others driven off. Mustang pilots said they destroyed five Japanese planes on the ground and damaged 10.

Three Mustangs were shot down. One pilot was rescued. Tokyo radio, reporting on raids, said that one of every 15 Japanese in the home islands now is homeless as a result of air raids.

Hirohito Orders War Cabinet To Rule Japan As Invasion Nears

Emperor Hirohito directed the Japanese Diet Saturday to hand over virtually all its powers to the war cabinet, which will rule by decree in an effort to cope with what Premier Kantaro Suzuki called "the most critical situation in the history of our nation."

Opening of the two-day emergency Diet session in bomb-ravaged Tokyo with a prediction that the unprecedented war powers would be granted quickly was reported by the Domei agency in a series of broadcasts recorded by the Federal Communications Commission.

Addressing both houses, Premier Suzuki forecast an American invasion of Japan and warned of new shortages of food, munitions and transport, but rejected unconditional surrender and declared Japan's only choice was "to fight to the last."

In brief imperial rescript, which was read before Suzuki spoke, Hirohito called on the people to "fulfill the purpose of the Holy War" and ordered the Diet to "do your duty of deliberating and supporting the war emergency measures in accordance with our imperial will."

Domei said there were six measures which would empower the cabinet to "issue orders or take steps without parliamentary approval" in the fields of transportation, communications, food, munitions, taxes, rehabilitation "and other items related to the nation's war effort."

Order Is Vague
Domei reported that after the opening ceremonies, Matsataka Ota, chairman of the House war relief measures committee, in a formal inquiry on government policy, said "there is considerable vagueness as to who is primarily responsible for the conduct of the war" and that while the army and navy were cooperating closely with each other, "the premier is merely a participant in discussions at imperial headquarters."

Under the Japanese system, the army and navy are responsible only to the emperor, not to civil government but, Ota said, "the nation believes the premier should be responsible for the war direction at this critical stage."

The Domei accounts intimated that Suzuki's aim in the present Diet session might indeed be to bring the army and navy directly under his authority.

Texas Is Lagging In E Bond Purchases

Total E Bond sales through June 8th amount to \$94,540,002, or 56.2 per cent of quota, Adams said.

IN GERMANY—(AP)—Field Marshal Montgomery has given up caravan headquarters and the rugged life for the first time since the Tunisian campaign, and now is living in a 300-year old castle in a hamlet 25 miles southeast of Osnabruck.

Bitter Fighting Slows Yanks On Okinawa Island

GUAM—(AP)—Fierce last-stand Japanese resistance on the southern tip of Okinawa Saturday temporarily stalemated the drive of the Marines and soldiers to finish the 71-day-old campaign, the Navy announced Saturday. Japanese casualties through Friday totaled 67,703 killed.

"The enemy on Oroku Peninsula and in the Yaeju-Dake escarpment in Southern Okinawa gave strong resistance to the attack of the Tenth Army on June 9," Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz reported.

"No substantial changes were made in the line."

Japanese Report Allied Invasion Of Labuan Island

MANILA—(AP)—The Japanese reported Saturday an Allied invasion of Labuan Island off the northwest coast of oil-rich Borneo.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur did not confirm the enemy radio report, but his communique Sunday announced heavy air raids for the eighth consecutive day on Labuan and the Brunet Bay area in which Labuan is situated.

Allied light naval forces also shelled the northeast coast of Borneo, MacArthur announced. Bombardment Continues

The U. S. Army 13th Air Force, Royal Australian Air Force and U. S. Seventh Fleet, heavy, medium and fighter-bombers dealt the Borneo blows as the air war in the East Indies reached a crescendo.

Liberators of the 13th Air Force cascaded a heavy tonnage of bombs on Labuan and on a nearby airfield, while delayed reports showed the RAAF smashed the nearby mainland town of Brunai in a succession of raids, destroying many Japanese buildings. These strikes were followed by another 13th Air Force raid on the same area.

"The airdromes of Ranau, Jesselton, Sandakan, Kudat, and Kenningau all were hit and cratered, while the railroad bridge, over Pados River near Brunai was damaged in the heaviest series of strikes yet made by planes based in the Philippines and the East Indies."

Tokyo said that Allied invaders went ashore on Labuan after Japanese positions on the Isle were battered by battleships, cruisers, destroyers and 50 smaller warships.

Thousands of West Texans enjoyed the Saturday night program of the 1945 Midland Rodeo. It was the third performance of the outstanding western show.

Soon after the thrills started, Louis Brooks, world's champion cowboy, was spilled from the back of a bronc near the gate when the surcingle broke.

Lefty Wilken of Sierra Blanca had the best time, 16.2 seconds, in the calf roping contest Saturday night. Soon after he roped, a high wind came up, and six of the 15 ropers in the contest got "no time."

In an address to the crowd, Mayor A. N. Hendrickson praised the cooperation of the Midland Army Air Field for sending its band to the performance to boost the sales of War Bonds.

Long before time for the performance the crowd of Midland citizens and West Texans began gathering at the rodeo grounds. Sheriff Ed Darnell, city police, highway patrolmen and members of the sheriff's posse were busy for an hour or more before start of the show directing traffic.

The gala Saturday night crowd of rodeo-minded West Texans greeted every event of the show with rousing applause. The Cowgirl Spencers were anxious for their appearance to be over and done with as they wanted to get to the Crystal Ballroom of the Scharbauer Hotel where a dance honored them. It was sponsored by the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce. Fortunately, their appearance was early on the program, which permitted them to get away early.

Soda-pop Disappears
Only one thing prevented spectators from enjoying a perfect evening. The soda-pops ran out before the show ended. W. C. King, in charge of concessions, explained a certain shortage of sugar prevented him from getting as many sodas as he would like.

Farewell To The Cabin

Having a log cabin for a birthplace used to be considered quite a political asset to any American office-seeker. Those who first viewed the world from such humble surroundings usually mentioned the fact in the course of their campaigning. But the implied praise was for the office-seeker, of course, and not for the log cabin.

The point was that anyone who started life in a cabin strated from several yards behind scratch. His advancement was shining proof of the opportunities which American democracy offered. But though the campaigning politician may have recalled the scenes of his childhood with tear-choked emotion, he didn't go so far as to recommend the log dwelling as an ideal, year-round residence.

The present generation of politicians has few log cabins in the background. But the cabins are still with us, along with one-room farm shacks that are as bad or worse. And the reason that we don't recruit our Presidents and legislators and other leaders from these surroundings any more is that the odds today are just too great.

"Rural slums" is what housing experts call such farm dwellings. And though it may seem odd to think of Abraham Lincoln as having come from the slums, that's just what they are today.

Congress is soon to be asked to do something about them. A plan, framed by congressmen and housing authorities, would allow the Department of Agriculture to buy up submarginal farm dwellings, replace them with modern houses and lease them at low rents to tenants and share-croppers anxious and apparently able to be their own bosses.

There's more to the plan, of course, but that is the essential idea. It is a good and necessary plan, and we hope that it won't be balked by big-city congressmen who might believe, along with their constituents, that only big cities have slums and that the country life is necessarily the healthy life.

Fresh air is wonderful, but not when it sweeps in wintry blasts through the chinks in walls and under cellar-less floors. Fresh milk and garden vegetables in abundance are wonderful, but thousands of farm families don't have them.

The log cabin has ceased to be a symbol of equal opportunity and has become an economic anachronism and a drag on the American standard of living. It's time we bade it a dry-eyed farewell.

Strikes Threatened At 30 Gulf Shipyards

HOUSTON—(AP)—Action taken by the Houston Metal Trades Council Saturday may lead to strikes in more than 30 Gulf Coast shipyards unless they quit using acetylene gas and oxygen produced or handled by the Air Reduction Sales Corporation, Jeff Davis, secretary, said.

Leo Carter of New Orleans, international representative of the teamsters' union, said the action will affect about 30 shipyards. It will work like this: if a shipyard, for instance, uses Magnolia Airco gas or oxygen products, the unions there will tell the shipyard those products are on the unfair list and must not be used. If the products are still used, the men, members of unions affiliated with the Metal Trades Council, will go on strike.

"Our main trouble, of course, is with the Brown Shipbuilding Company and the main trouble there has now developed with the Navy," Carter said. "The Navy has taken its trucks, put armed guards on them, and sent them to the Magnolia Company to get gas and oxygen and deliver it to the Brown yards. I'm charging that the Navy is a strike-breaking agency in this case."

CHICAGO—(AP)—The ousted president of the University of Texas declared Saturday night "the forces

of reactionism are strong" and universities face a difficult time "to maintain their freedom."

Lt. Anderson Now In South Pacific

Lt. Paul D. Anderson, a navigator on a B-29, recently was transferred from India to the South Pacific. He has been overseas since the first of the year.

He now is serving with the 20th Air Force and has completed eight missions over the main Japanese Islands, according to word received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Anderson, 1209 West Texas.

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Troubled Trieste Situation Eased By Agreement

WASHINGTON—(AP)—An Anglo-American and Yugoslav agreement Saturday put a lid on the troubled Trieste situation, at least, officials hoped, until a peace conference can settle it permanent.

An agreement was reached whereby the Yugoslav forces of Marshal Tito are to withdraw eastward, leaving the Anglo-American forces in control of the railways and roads to Austria which they consider vital.

No mention is made in the agreement of the Austrian province of Carinthia, which Tito also claims for Yugoslavia, but from which he has withdrawn his forces after Allied pressure.

A temporary military administration is provided for the disputed Venezia Giulia area, which includes the Italian city of Trieste in a territory largely inhabited by Yugoslavs.

Tito's occupation of the area after the collapse of Nazi resistance brought Allied demands that he withdraw and let a peace conference settle the question of Yugoslav-Italian boundaries which have been in dispute since World War I.

An Allied military government under Field Marshal Sir Harold Alexander, the supreme Allied commander, will administer the area west of a line which gives him the authority over the Italian ports of Pola and Trieste, and the communications towns of Gorizia, Caporetto, and Tarvisio leading up to Austria.

More exact location of the line is awaited from the military authorities who are now working it out. The Yugoslavs control territory east of the line. The arrangement is regarded as temporary.

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Texas Army Camps To Be Busy

DALLAS—(AP)—Posts and camps of the Eighth Service Command are going to have a busy summer. The headquarters here said Saturday that redeployment training will bring thousands of troops into camps in the Southwest, activities will be stepped up at replacement training centers, and the flow of men being discharged under adjusted service rating scores will impose a load upon the command's three separation centers.

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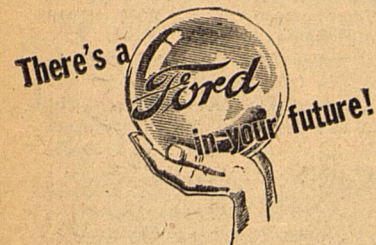
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Chinese Troops Reach Indo-China Frontier In New Offensive

By SPENCER MOOSA CHUNGKING — (P) Chinese troops, clearing Japanese forces from South China, have reached the Indo-China frontier and Saturday were pursuing enemy units into isolated Southeast Asia along an 85-mile front, the Chinese High Command said.

Veteran troops under Gen. Chang Fah-Kwei captured the border town of Chungchingfu, 19 miles northeast of the Indo-Chinese highway junction of Caochang, Wednesday.

Eighty-five miles southeast of Chungchingfu, Chinese assault forces also won the town of Szelo, on the highway to Indo-China and 23 miles from the frontier, and were pressing toward the town of Mingkian.

Between Chungchingfu and Szelo—capture of which widened to 175 miles the breach in Japan's land bridge—Chinese troops and local military also attacked the big highway junction of Lungchow, 110 miles northeast of Hanoi.

LOS ANGELES — (P) — Generals George S. Patton Jr. and James H. Doolittle were welcomed home to their native California Saturday from their victories in Europe.

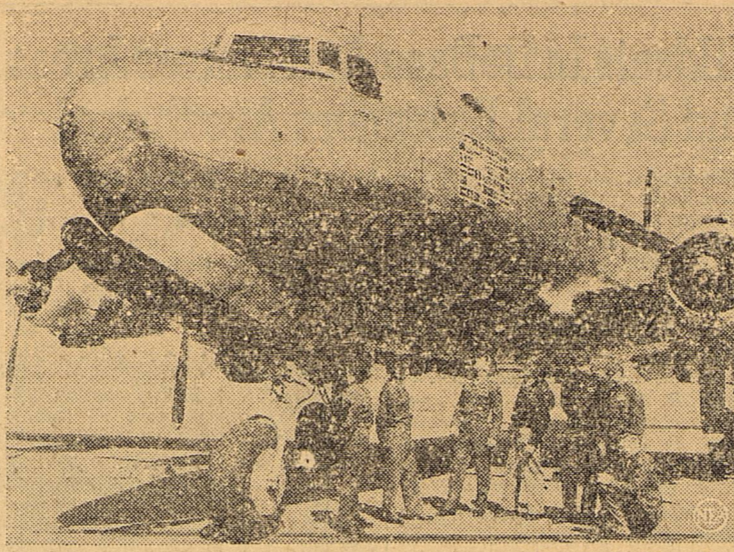
They arrived at the Los Angeles municipal airport Saturday afternoon from Denver in huge transport planes, accompanied by 47 officers and men of their commands, also returning home.

Ships And Barges Play Important Roles In Pacific

By JAMES J. STREIBIG Associated Press Aviation Editor WITH THE ARMED FORCES IN THE PACIFIC — (P) — Supply, Fortune, Can Do, Plentiful, Sho Nuff, Have Got and Abundant tell the story of Naval aviation supply. They are ships and barges.

Perhaps the story will be completed by changing the name of the barge Have Got to Did Get. A gunner on that steel box, which depends on a tow line for power, did get one Jap fighter plane in Leyte Gulf last November.

The incident sent morale soaring throughout the supply fleet. It brought on a new program of training in gunnery for men doing out nuts and bolts and thumbing through report and requisition forms.

If the air supply story is not a best seller, it will not be because of lack of ingenuity, daring, planning and sweat involved in the plot. Ships and barges such as the Provider, Wilco and a few with names like Chourre, Grammium and Pontotoc — have made possible the ceaseless battering of Japan by Navy and Marine aircraft, from both carrier and land bases.

The Army Air Forces also use a floating supply and maintenance system for advance operations.

The Army uses a touch distinctly its own, however. Parts are flown ashore in helicopters instead of by small boat.

Newly established land bases no longer have to depend upon the uncertainties of unloading, worry about the weather or dig through stores heaped on the beach. They have complete stores for plane and crew in neat and numbered bins aboard a ship or barge. The equivalent of a telephone call will get quick delivery.

The supply fleet is in three general categories:

1. Large ships, which are complete air depots, have possibly 8,000 different items ready to issue.

2. Barges, which are floating depots, have ready-to-issue stores and are towed into newly-acquired areas.

3. Small cargo vessels, which travel between bases, keep stocks equalized according to fleet needs. These last do not have ready-to-issue stocks. They serve as warehouses.

The member, Senator Hatch (D-NM), said further that Clark had expressed himself as perfectly willing to appear if the committee called him.

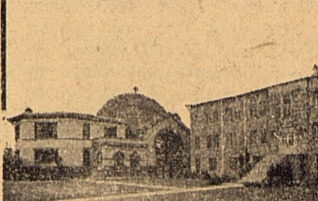
The report, which Hatch noted was comprehensive and dealt with a number of other subjects and persons besides Clark, touched on the nominee's financial affairs.

Locations Reported For Wildcats In Andrews, Reeves And Cochran; Pecos Shallow Project To Test Ellenburger

Locations for wildcats in North Andrews, Southeast Reeves and Central-South Cochran counties were reported Saturday.

A dry shallow wildcat, in Central-North Pecos County, is to be drilled ahead from current bottom of 1,655 feet to around 4,500 feet, to test Ellenburger.

Another To Devonian
Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Lillian Stevens, 660 feet from south and east lines of section 10, block A-48, psl survey, in North-West Andrews County, is to be drilled to 8,800 feet to test through the Fullerton lower Permian and the Devonian.

It is on southwest side of the regular Fullerton producing area and is about two miles due west of nearest Devonian well on the south side of the Fullerton area.

Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Mrs. Dora Roberts, 1,980 feet from south and east lines of section 294, block 13, H&GN survey, is to be a 5,500-foot exploration to the Delaware in Southeast Reeves County, about 25 miles south of Pecos. It will drill with cable and rotary tools starting by June 20.

Texas Gulf Producing Company has filed application to drill its first wildcat in West Texas since that company entered the play in the area several months ago.

In C-S Cochran
The exploration will be No. 1 Allie Slaughter, et al, and is to be drilled to 5,300 feet to test for and in the Slaughter-San Andres-Permian zone in Central-South Cochran County.

Location is 7,387 feet from east and 7,600 feet from south lines of league 113, Potter County School Land survey. The lease is 444 acres out of east-half of the league. The prospector is three miles west of the closest production in the Dean sector of the west side of the Slaughter field; about 10 miles northeast of Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Edwards discovery for San Andres production in extreme Southwest Cochran, and nine miles south of Lehman.

Magnolia Petroleum Company, Tide Water Associated Oil Company, Texas-Canadian Oil Company, Skelly Oil Company, and Cascade Petroleum Corporation have close in acreage and are contributing to the exploration.

Beyce McCandless, San Angelo, filed supplemental application with the Railroad Commission of Texas to continue drilling No. 1-111 Atlantic Refining Company fee, now bottomed at 1,655 feet in dry lime, to around 4,500 feet to test for Ellenburger.

This exploration, located in section 111, block 3, H&GN survey, is a short distance northwest of Owego, in Central-North Pecos County, and had only slight shows of oil and gas. A rotary is due to be moved in to do the additional digging.

*This prospector is in an area where several projects have had indications of oil in the Ellenburger around 4,000 feet to 4,500 feet, but so far none of them have been developed for commercial production.

Continental Oil Company No. 1-B-17 Kioh, 1,980 feet from north

and west lines of section 17, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, is to be an 8,400-foot development for Devonian production on east side of the TXL field, in West Eddy County.

It is one location east of Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation No. 1 TXL, completed a few weeks ago as a good producer from the Devonian.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 McDev, North Glascock County wildcat in section 31, block 34, TP survey, T-2-S, had reached 9,591 feet in lime of a yet unidentified formation, and was taking a core.

Sinclair Prairie Oil Company No. 1 Williamson, Northwest Eddy County wildcat, in section 40, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, was preparing to drill ahead from 7,940 feet in Devonian lime, after taking a drill-stem test at 7,955-7,940 feet.

Recovered O&G Cut Mud
The tool was open one hour and 45 minutes. There was a steady flow of air throughout. Gas flowed at the surface in 10 minutes, but it was too small to measure.

Recovery was 480 feet of oil and gas cut during mud. This project is three miles north of the Devonian discovery in the TXL field, and about two miles north of the initial Ellenburger producer in the same area.

Top of Devonian was said to be around 7,883 feet, which put it only four feet low to the discovery, according to some correlations.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-B TXL, in northwest quarter of section 19, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, and on southeast corner of proven area for Devonian production in the TXL, ran a 74-minute drillstem test at 8,082-8,112 feet. Oil started flowing in 11 1/2 minutes and in first 30 minutes of flowing produced 42 barrels, and in next 30 minutes made 27 barrels.

Cities Service and Shell No. 1-C TXL, in southeast corner of south half of north half of section 7, block 46, TP survey, T-1-S, and furthest west exploration in the TXL area, was bottomed at 8,261 feet in Devonian chert, and was to take a Schlumberger.

In a drillstem test at 8,207-59 feet, for 60 minutes, recovery was 780 feet of slightly gas cut drilling mud, and considerable muddy, salty water, with no shows of oil indicated.

After the Schlumberger operator will decide on taking the hole deeper. It had been low in the Devonian.

More Slight Shows
Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1-B Humble fee-Eubank, Southwest Gaines County wildcat in section 6, block AX, C. H. Eubank survey, northwest of nearest production from the Clear Fork-Permian, in the Doss-Eubank field, was coming from 6,178 feet in lime, and at 7,180-78 feet, had slight oil stain and slight odor of oil and gas in the material that was recovered.

Presidio Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Conring, in section 102, block 4, H&TC survey, Presidio County wildcat, was bottomed at 3,975 feet in black shale and lime, and was reaching to run pipe to about 3,600 feet to drill ahead to scheduled destination of around 4,500 feet.

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company No. 1 Murr, Northwest Kimble County exploration, in section 28, block E, GH&SA survey, was plugging to abandon on total depth of 4,473 feet in dry, white, Ellenburger limestone. No shows of petroleum was developed.

Parrot Swabs Again
Humble No. 1 Parrot, East-Central Upton County lower Permian possible pool discovery, in section 3, EL survey, was swabbing, with no recovery reported.

The well had been shut in, while rotary rig and derrick were moved off. When opened it would not flow. The section under investigation is at 9,410-9,800 feet, through casing perforations. The well has flowed some oil by spurts during last month.

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 1-X Durgin, in section 15, block 34, H&TC survey, in South Ward County, had reached 9,985 feet, in Mississippian lime and chert.

Slated total depth is at 10,000 feet, unless arrangements are made to carry it deeper, and according to informed sources no such deals had been effected Saturday.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Buchanan, in Baldrige survey No. 32-692, ten miles southeast of Midland, in East Midland County, had penetrated to 11,732 feet in chert.

Deep Ones In Andrews
Shell and The Texas Company No. 1 Rattiff & Bedford, Southwest Andrews County prospector in section 4, block 73, psl survey, had progressed below 10,707 feet in shale, which is possibly the Simpson, middle Ordovician.

Humble No. 88-X Means, North Andrews County wildcat, in section 9, block A-55, psl survey, had reached 11,295 feet in lime.

Famed Texas Rangers Become Statisticians

AUSTIN—(AP)—The Texas Rangers, best known for their ability to handle desperadoes and riots, emerged Saturday with new laurels. Their boss praised them as statisticians.

In the old days, the Rangers made few reports. About 50 years ago they were prevailed upon to make written reports, and Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety is authority for the story that one of the first on a murder case read like this:

"Disposition: mean as the devil; had to shoot him."

Record Activities
Last January, however, Garrison decided the scope of Ranger activities should be more completely recorded and orders were given that the headquarters detachment, under Capt. Fred Olson, should start using a somewhat complicated form.

A tabulation on what this form showed Saturday gave the record of what the captain and seven Rangers did in four months:

Made 581 investigations, completing 178 cases; made 137 arrests and obtained 48 convictions; assisted other officers on 569 occasions; apprehended 44 fugitives; confiscated property valued at \$5,966; recovered property valued at \$9,098; recorded \$2,960 in fines.

Wildcats In DeBaca And Chaves Areas And Several Extenders Are Staked

HOBBS, N. M. — Locations for wildcat tests in Central DeBaca and in South Chaves counties, and for extension projects in the Drinkard area in Southeast Lea, the South Maljamar field in West-Central Lea and the Russell field in North-Central Eddy were reported Saturday.

Stanfield and Francisco No. 1 Walter R. Brown, 2,310 feet from north and west lines of section 7-3n-36e, is to be a 1,700-foot exploration in the vicinity of Fort Sumner in DeBaca County.

Continental Oil Company No. 1 Federal unit, in southeast corner of southwest quarter of section 21-15e-29e, is to be a 5,200-foot wildcat in South-Central Chaves County. It is about 20 miles northeast of Artesia and a short distance north of the Eddy County line.

Another In Southeast Lea
Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 Evelyn Lineberry, 1,980 feet from south and west lines of section 29-22s-38e, is to be a 6,500-foot exploration for pay in the Clear Fork-Permian, on southwest side of the Drinkard area of Southeast Lea. It is north of The Texas Company No. 2 Blinberry, and one location west of Gulf No. 1 Higgins, both nearing expected pay in the Clear Fork.

E. J. McCurdy No. 1-A State, 660 feet from south and east lines of section 16-18s-32e, is to be a 4,700-foot development in West-Central Lea County, and in an undeveloped section south of closest production in the South Maljamar field.

Jamison & Pollard No. 3 Crosby, 2,310 feet from north and 330 feet from west lines of section 11-20s-28e, is to be drilled to around 1,500 feet to look for pay in an undrilled district a short distance northwest of the proven limits of the Russell field in North-Central Eddy County. It will start soon.

Gulf Completed Extension
Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 Andrews-State, wildcat discovery for a low Permian pay in Southeast Lea, one and one-half miles southeast of the same company's No. 1 Drinkard, initial producer from the Clear Fork-Permian, in that area, has been officially completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 487 barrels of oil flowing through a 17/64th-inch choke.

Production was through perforations between 6,930-7,320 feet, after considerable acid. Gravity of the oil was 36.6 egrees and gas-oil ratio was 1.271-1.

Had Gas Signs
The Texas Company No. 2 Blinberry, in southwest quarter of section 29-22s-38e, a diagonal northwest outcrop to Gulf No. 1 Andrews-State, and one and one-quarter miles southeast of the Clear Fork discovery in the Drinkard pool, ran a drillstem test at 4,350-6,494 feet, for one hour and 45 minutes. Recovery was 1,500 feet of gas cut drilling mud. Operator was preparing to make new hole.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 4 Leamex, in section 17-17s-33e, deepest oil test ever drilled in New Mexico, had reached 12,582 feet in

lime and shale, and was going ahead.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Jones, in section 19-19s-39e, seven miles southeast of Hobbs in East Lea, had progressed below 9,859 feet in lime and chert of the Silurian, and was continuing toward 10,000 feet, or a possible Ellenburger.

Texasco No. 1 Eaves, section 26-16s-38e, 14 miles north of Hobbs, had drilled below 8,494 feet in lime.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 2 Federal-Leonard, semi-wildcat to the lower Ordovician, in Southeast Lea, and in section 13-26s-37e, was bottomed at 9,041 feet in lime, fishing for junk.

McElvain Bros. No. 1 Seale, in section 30-18s-34e, wildcat about five and one-half miles southwest of the Vacuum field in Central Lea, was shutdown for orders, after making two pumping tests, and pumping dry both times, after recovering only small amounts of oil from pay section above plugged back total depth of 4,833 feet, where a 700-quart nitro shot had been used.

Stanolind No. 1 Southeast Vacuum unit, in section 17-18s-37e, prospector between the Vacuum and the Hobbs fields in East-Central Lea County, was shutdown for orders on total depth of 5,522 feet.

In an 85-minute drillstem test at 5,391-5,522 feet, recovery was 1,000 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil or gas.

Still Testing
Texasco No. 1 Blinberry, in southeast quarter of section 19-22s-38e, Drinkard area development which has discovered a new pay section in streaks between 5,880 feet and 5,625 feet, is continuing to test.

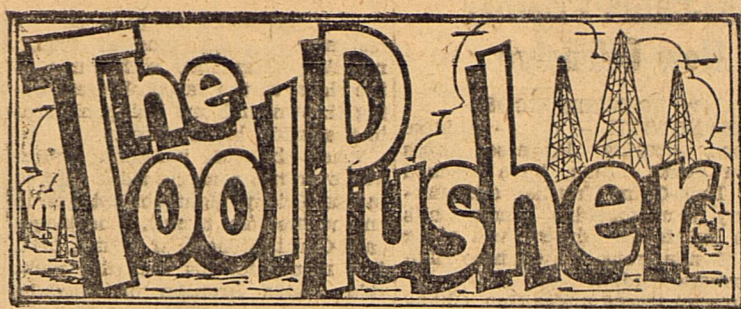
The zone at 5,610-25 feet flowed 11 barrels of oil in 12 hours, with some gas on latest test reported, after acid. The section at 5,680-95 feet had tested for about 5.5 barrels per hour flowing.

Getting Close
Gulf No. 1 Pike, in northeast quarter of section 6-13s-36e, wildcat two miles south of the discovery well of the Drinkard field, had reached 6,265 feet in lime, and was going ahead.

Gulf No. 1 Higgins, in southeast quarter of section 29-22s-38e, between the Gulf No. 1 Drinkard and the same company's No. 1 Statz-Andrews, had progressed under 6,301 feet in lime.

Stanolind No. 1 Picacho unit, Lincoln County wildcat in section 10-12n-18e, was cementing a shot hole in a fractured section above 2,835 feet in granite wash, and was scheduled to drill ahead as soon as cement cured.

TIDE WATER OFFICIAL ANSWERS A QUESTION

—A very interesting article, titled, "Who Runs The Petroleum Industry," appeared recently in The New York Journal of Commerce. It was written by B. I. Graves, vice-president Tide Water Associated Oil Company.

—Graves pointed out that aggregate investment of over sixteen billion dollars in the American petroleum industry, was divided among 1,500,000 stockholders.

—Average dividend paid those stockholders is 3.2 cents on each one dollar investment. He revealed that Tide Water Associated alone has about 35,000 stockholders, and said an average investment of over \$30,000 is required to provide the average job in the petroleum industry.

—It was mentioned also that there are more than 20,000 oil producers in the United States. The big end of that group are small, independent operators.

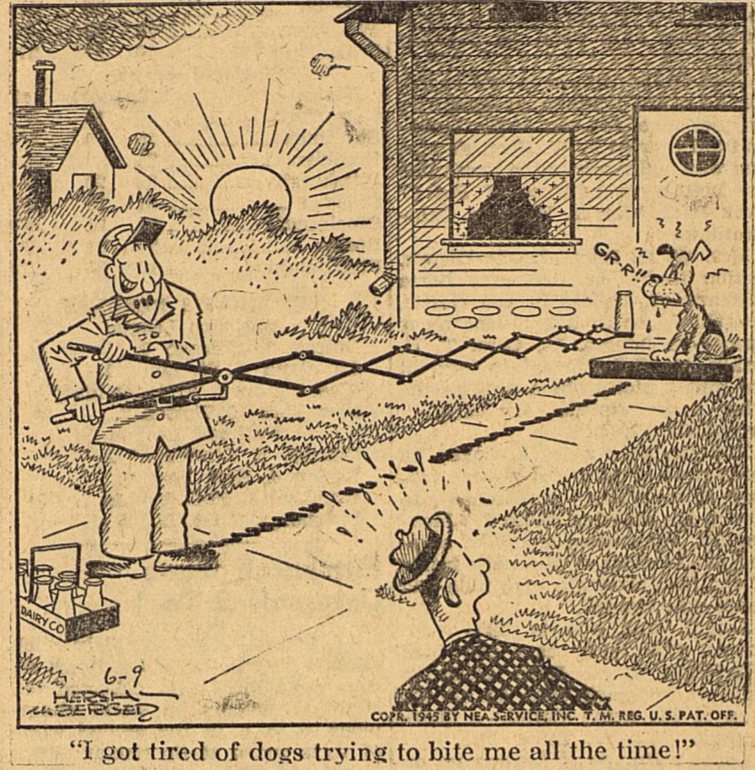

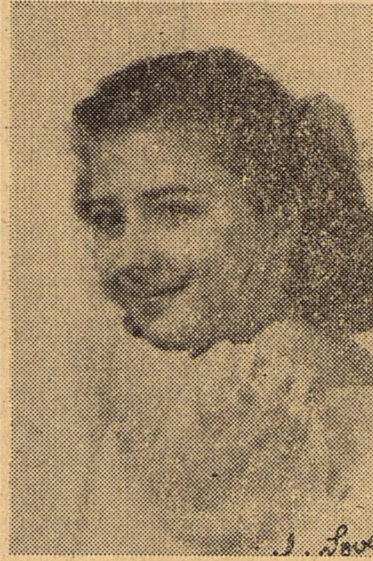

Midland Red Cross Executive Secretary Devotes Time To Aiding War Veterans

She isn't in uniform—she doesn't even look business-like, until she starts managing a case, and then things really begin to happen. And through it all, she fairly bristles with courtesy, cheerfulness, tact—and information! Mrs. Lillian M. Corbett is executive secretary of the Midland County Chapter of the Red Cross, with full responsibility for home service. She sits behind a neat little desk just to the left as you enter the City Hall, dressed in an informal street dress. The rest of the office atmosphere is informal, too. The Stars and Stripes and the Red Cross banner hang together at one side. Back of Mrs. Corbett is a map of the prisoner of war camps where Midland boys are and have been interned. She just got back from St. Louis last week, where she trained for her post of executive secretary. The most important phase of Red Cross at the present time, now that so many of the boys are returning to civilian life, is the program of assisting with veteran's problems. "It is our hope that servicemen and their families will feel free to visit the office and discuss problems encountered by the changing conditions," Mrs. Corbett says. "The Red Cross has been with your boy all through the war, and when he comes home, we are still here to help him," she continued. Every returned serviceman should file a claim, Mrs. Corbett explains. Then, even if he isn't entitled to a pension now, all the particulars will be recorded in case he ever needs assistance. If power of attorney is given by the veteran to the Red Cross in the matter of disability claims and pensions, the file director, who keeps in constant contact with the Veteran's Administration, will safeguard his interests even so far as to watch and take advantage of any new laws which might be passed for the man's benefit. Other services to veterans besides the filing of claims and benefits, is assistance in furnishing him with latest information in regard to vocational training and the rehabilitation program. Information may also be obtained at the local chapter for benefits described in the G. I. Bill of Rights. All this will be taken care of by the woman behind the Red Cross desk, just for the asking; for as our boys well know, the sign of the Red Cross means mercy, all over the earth.

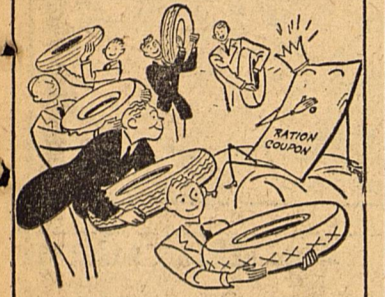

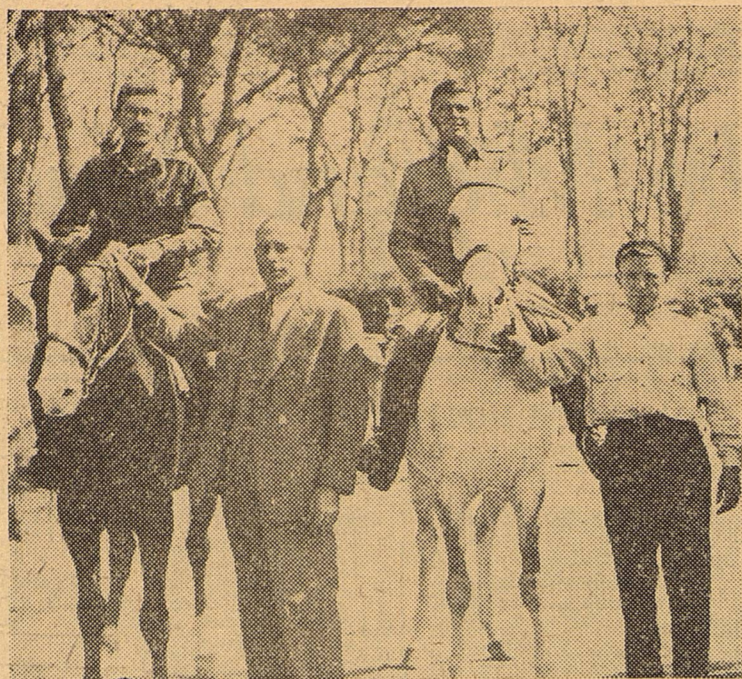

War Chart Reveals Rescue Tactics Of Fifth Air Force

LUZON—(AP)—In a little office at this base, quiet, serious men maintained an unusual war chart. It totals life, not death.

Amid the vast figures of war, the current total is small—2,300. But it gives keen satisfaction to those who have watched it grow, since the first number was entered last September. For each of those numerals, there is joy in some American home; a solemn, thankful toast drunk by sweating compatriots in some dusty airfield tent.

The chart details the 2,300 airmen who have been rescued from otherwise certain death on the lonely ocean stretches marking this aerial battlefield.

Oldest Rescue Force
It is the record of the Fifth Emergency Rescue Group, Fifth Air Force, the oldest and largest aerial rescue force in the Southwest Pacific.

Throughout the thousands of miles flown by American bombers and fighters in their blockade against Japan's southwestern empire, the rescue group is at hand. The force has assigned to it flying boats, B-17 bombers, crash boats and transport planes. Submarines and destroyers are on call.

Some months ago, the first American raid on Balikpapan, Borneo, staged from Black Island, was the longest overwater assault of its type. Hugging the fringe of islands along the route, a screen of destroyers waited at a rendezvous point. Rescue planes went in with the bombers.

Pilots Are Informed
Before departure, pilots were told where they could expect rescue if their planes were crippled too badly for the return to base.

The chosen islands were uninhabited and selected carefully from strong enemy bases scattered near them throughout this Japanese-held area.

The rescue group hovered over Ormoc Bay, Leyte, when American forces landed amid the thunder of Japanese guns. One flying boat succeeded in taking off with 60 men. A dozen is considered a full load.

One-man rescues are handled with the same thoroughness. When Lt. Hugo Canislo of the 35th Fighter Group went down south of Formosa, giant waves engulfed him. Other fighters dropped rafts, which he never saw because of the waves. A flying boat was unable to alight; a destroyer couldn't make it. Finally, he was saved by a submarine.

A Ton Of Appetite
BERMAGUI, AUSTRALIA—(AP)—A white shark weighing nearly a ton was caught near here. Inside were three-quarters of a large seal, about 20 sea birds, mutton birds and penguins and fish.

Twenty-six thousand four hundred pounds of sugar loaf pineapple are expected to arrive in Midland Monday afternoon, filling an order made co-operatively for women of Midland, Upton and Martin counties by the Midland County Home Demonstration Marketing Committee.

A truck bearing the pineapple will be at the co-operative gin, across from the cattle sales barn Monday about 3 p. m., and all persons who placed orders are asked to bring their containers any time after that hour to receive their fruit.

Orders were not limited to members of Home Demonstration Clubs, and an opportunity to place orders was given to all Midland County women. Orders from this county numbered 251.

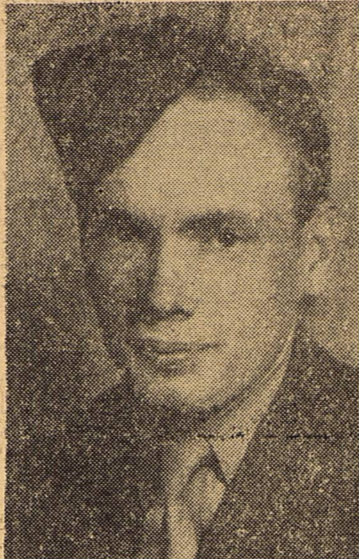

It is a curious thing that none of the discussions of marriage mention the simple fact that children play an immense part in cementing a marriage together, in providing the parents with their greatest common interest, and in building the family unit which is greater than any single individual in it.

Nor do they point out how large a percentage of wayward girls and unmarried mothers come from broken families which, by failing to solve their own problems, have left their children to suffer for their mistakes.

There was a 12-year-old boy whose parents got a divorce and placed him in a boarding school. One afternoon, the headmaster came to tell him that a table had been arranged for him because his father was coming to dinner, bringing his new wife, so that the boy could meet his stepmother. The boy was embarrassed but took the news very quietly. An hour later, the distressed headmaster once more came in search of him.

"Your mother just telephoned," he said, "that she will be here for dinner, bringing her new husband. She wants you to know your stepfather."

The child was very white. "What will the other boys think?" he burst out, and then, with a bitterness beyond his years, "Oh, hell with it!" He flushed. "I beg your pardon, sir," he said.

That night he sat between a stepfather and stepmother, neither of whom he had ever seen before, while his own parents looked on complacently, and, farther away, the curious eyes of his schoolmates watched. He was very quiet and very well-behaved. For days afterwards, he lay in the infirmary, too sick to move.

THE religious ceremony has stood as the cornerstone upon

which thousands upon thousands of marriages have been founded. Those marriages pass before my eyes like a giant kaleidoscopic picture.

A young couple came in not long ago to be married, accompanied by the groom's parents. After the wedding, the older couple came up to me.

"We have been married 25 years," the man said, "but it was a civil marriage, and my wife has always felt that it had not been truly sanctified."

"I wonder," the woman asked, blushing a little, "if you would bless our marriage?"

A young soldier whom I married was terribly anxious to have a child. He was with his wife for two months and left, at length, believing that he was not to have one. A few weeks later, his wife wrote to him, "We are going to have a baby. I know how happy you will be."

In reply there came a letter from the boy's commanding officer. The day the letter came, the boy was killed in action, but not before he had read it. They found it tucked in the little book of prayer the church had given him, and on it he had scrawled an answer to his wife.

"If I do not come back," he wrote, "do not grieve for me. You have given me the greatest happiness in life. You will have something of mine and I will be carrying on into the future."

Marriage is the rock on which our civilization is founded. Too often unsuccessful, it can be made the most magnificent and satisfying experience in life. It has flourished and gone down not on big obstacles but, for the most part, on little ones. And yet there is no one who cannot, if he will, solve the little things.

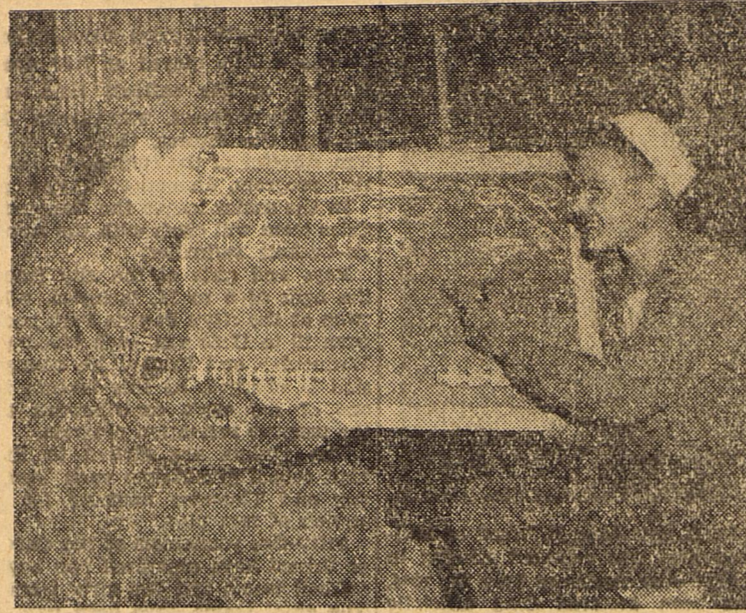
Love and romance, rich and rewarding, stand at our side, and we see them only in shadow on the movie screen, unattainable, remote, unreal.

Frozen Food Lockers May Be Investigated By Federal Agents

DALLAS—(AP)—Region Five Office of Price Administration officials disclosed Saturday that an investigation of frozen food locker plants in Texas and other parts of the six-state region would begin soon as a part of an intensive meat enforcement program. The purpose of the entire meat enforcement program is "to kill the black market and provide better distribution of the supply," a regional office spokesman said. He said that while the locker investigation was planned for the near future, plans would not be completed until enforcement officials could study results of a locker investigation now being conducted in Kansas. "Traip'd investigators will inspect meat in the lockers and notify the owners of what appear to be excessive supplies to report to their local war price and rationing boards and be prepared to surrender red points or show the reason why not," the spokesman said.

Southern Congressmen Defy Administration To Split Party Ranks

By CLAIR JOHNSON WASHINGTON — (AP) — With Democratic ranks sharply split and Southern Congressmen defying the administration, the showdown is due next week on two controversial issues—FEPC and the poll tax. Legislation against the poll tax required in seven southern states will be considered Monday in the House. The proposal to create a permanent Fair Employment Practices Committee will be voted on Tuesday in the House Rules Committee, where it has been stalled for months. Southerners in general said Saturday they will stick by their opposition to the proposals, even though it may result in a major break with President Truman. "We just can't go along with the President this time," declared Rep. Cox (D-Ga.) in a typical comment. Of several questioned, nearly all predicted to a reporter that the anti-poll tax measure will succeed temporarily—but the FEPC bill will be blocked.

Least Nazi Section Of Germany Suffered Greatest Devastation

By HAL BOYLE WITH AMERICAN TROOPS EN ROUTE BACK TO PARIS —(AP)— It is one of the war's odd quirks that the least Nazified section of Germany suffered the heaviest battle damage. This is the Rhineland and Ruhr area where the Catholic population showed less enthusiasm for Adolf Hitler's new order than perhaps any other part of the Reich. But because it was situated unfortunately from a geographic viewpoint, this zone carries the longest lasting combat scars. Driving back from the front lines you pass through peaceful village after village where practically every house stands intact and only an occasional bomb crater or shell hole mark the land. Once you get well beyond the Rhine traveling westward, however, you enter a desolate arena of ruin. The two largest wrecked cities are Juelich and Dueren. Few populated centers in the history of the world can compare in destruction to these modern Carthages. These are the ghost towns of modern Germany. It is hard to imagine how they ever can be resurrected. Their inhabitants have not returned for there is nothing to return to. They are cities in name only. They have no food, water, light or shelter. The rain falls on them and the wind blows through them and nothing stirs. Even the dogs have forsaken them. In Dueren a statue of Bismarck, Germany's great 19th Century statesman, still stands half twisted on its stone pedestal facing toward France. The statue has been put to work for the Allies. Across the bronze shoulder are strung a half-dozen strands of military field wire. As you drive through these lost cities you smell strongly the stench of scores of long dead bodies caught beneath falling debris. Their homes have become their tombs. It will be months or years before they are dug out. One Family Seen In one factory town by the Roer River where thousands found a livelihood in days of peace we saw only one German family—a man and two women—living in a half-shattered house. Crossing the border into Belgium is like entering a warmly lighted room after a long walk at night through the winter cold across a lonely landscape. Belgian families sit in chairs before the gleaming windows of small stores which still have pitifully little to sell. But the people seem happy. The return of peace has wrought a miraculous change in the traffic situation in many Belgian and French cities. You see many shiny automobiles in good condition carrying sleek, well-fed people to black market restaurants which are thriving as never before.

Army Pilot Escapes Injury In Crash

An Army officer narrowly escaped injury Friday afternoon when his P-47 fighter plane crashed near the Midland Municipal Airport. He experienced engine trouble soon after taking off at the field and the ship crashed on a farm about 200 yards west of the airport and burned. The pilot climbed from the wreckage before the plane burst into flames. The islands of Tobijima have moved 27 meters in six years, according to scientific discoveries. Only about half of Midland County's draft registrants of the ages 18 through 33 years who have been deferred as essential agricultural workers have given the Selective Service Board the information required for their deferments to be continued, board officials said Saturday. A copy of the new regulations relating to agricultural deferments and a form which must be filled out have been mailed to the registrants. Registrants who did not receive a copy of the regulations and the form can obtain them at the Selective Service office. Registrants who are in doubt as to how to complete the form can obtain help from the county agent. Unless the information is given the board immediately, it has no choice except to place the agricultural workers in Class 1-A, officials said.

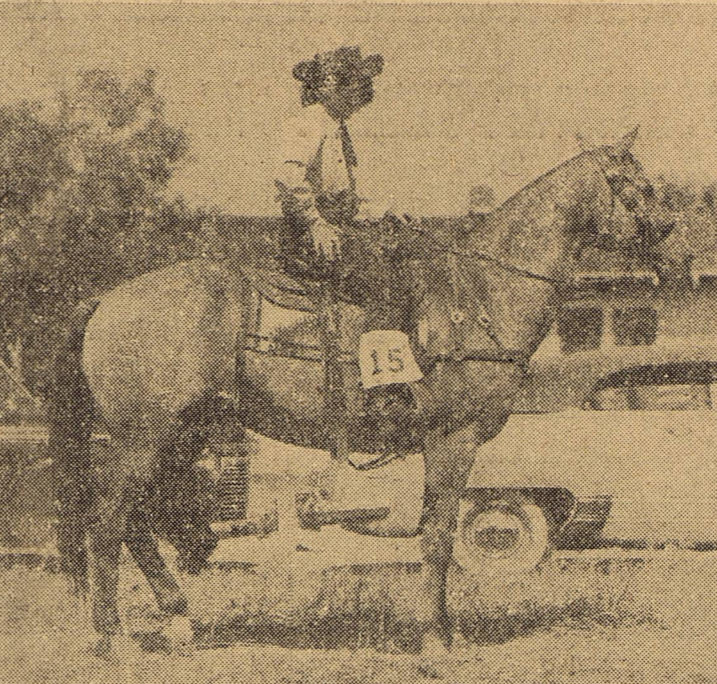
'Almost Foolproof' Plane Is Planned

LONDON—(AP)—A new light airplane, termed "almost foolproof" by its manufacturer, will be turned out in large numbers after the war to bring private flying within the scope of the businessman. Used for special purposes during the war, the "Miles Messenger" is a three or four-seater low-wing monoplane with a 140-horsepower engine. It can take off and land in 60 yards in a five-mile wind and can clear a 50-foot obstruction 138 feet from takeoff. Its top speed is 120 miles an hour and it stalls at 28 miles an hour. The plane has all-round view for the pilot.
