Get your clock ready.  
That crazy, ridiculous Daylight Savings Time goes into effect Sunday.

The idea of moving the clocks forward an hour does, we guess, accomplish its primary purpose -- saving daylight hours.

But we need the benefit of the ruling in this area about like a hog needs a side saddle. It turns out to be a hardship for folks here who have a tendency to go to work in the morning by the clock and quit at night by the sun.

The law was obviously designed for people who work a regular eight hour day. Under normal time they work from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. After the change, they are, in effect, working from 7 a.m. until 4 p.m. -- thus "gaining" an extra hour at the end of the day for playing golf or some other waste of potentially productive time.

We're all for these people to have that "extra" hour each day if that's what they want. They should have the right to determine which eight-hour period of the day they'll work, everything else being equal.

But why should they bother and burden the rest of us so they can be inconvenienced?

Why can't they just work from 7 a.m. until 4 p.m. and leave the clocks operating on a more normal schedule?

We wish we had the opportunity to vote on this clock-changing idea on the primary election ballot May 4. We would mark our ballot FOR... leaving the time just as it is now. You will lose an hour's sleep, so to speak, the night the clock is rolled up. And you'll have to do without the 3600 seconds of shut-eye until next fall when the clocks are rolled the opposite way and things return to normal again.

We heard some discussion one time about attempting to get Parmer County to stay on regular time instead of DST. Evidently the idea never did get off the ground and maybe it's just as well since the entire area is changing and maybe our changing, too, will help make the best of a sorry situation.

# Late Freeze Brings Wheat Damage Threat

Temperatures plunged to an unseasonable 27 degrees here Monday night, but the cold front failed to bring a predicted snow. Speculation among farmers Tuesday morning was that the wheat crop might be damaged to some extent, and that cotton already planted would be slowed up. No damage was expected for sugar beets or grain sorghum already planted.

It was about this time last year that a late freeze damaged wheat that was in the dough stage especially in fields planted in low spots.

Fear Tuesday morning was that the same situation might exist this year, except that wheat is probably a little further along this year and might be a little sturdier.

Several farmers during the past two weeks have been planting cotton, but little damage is expected since the crop is not up. However, the cold ground will slow up germination. Sugar beets, already up, are

not expected to be damaged since they naturally resist such late freezes.

Fruit crops probably receive

ed damage also since trees are in the blooming stage. Some were damaged in March during a snowfall.

# Clocks Move Up Saturday

For the second year, Texas and Bovina will go on Daylight Saving Time at midnight Saturday, April 27. At that hour clocks will be moved ahead one hour, or to 1 a.m.

Beginning Sunday morning, schedules will change, with Sunday School and church services beginning an hour earlier than usual.

On Monday morning, classes in Bovina Schools will also get underway an hour earlier, but will likewise be released an hour earlier.

Daylight Savings Time will be in effect until sometime in October.

# Beef Packers 'Pack 'Em In'

Friona held the attention of the Panhandle Saturday and Sunday as thousands attended the dedication services and open house for Missouri Beef Packers' new \$3.5 million packing plant.

The operation is said to be the largest in the world, having a capacity to butcher in the vicinity of 2,000 head of cattle per day.

The beef packers will begin operations with a staff of 220 employees, which may be increased as high as 400 if such is the demand.

Dignitaries from over the na-

tion attended the event, including over 150 from Missouri, the Junior High School Band and the Stage Band.

The concert is being presented in conjunction with Texas Music Education Week May 5-12, which will be designated by Governor John Connally.

In addition to the concert, rehearsals and class sessions of all musical groups in the school will be open to the public during the special week, Andrews said.

# Med Clinic Completion Expected This Week

Bovina Medical Clinic is expected to be completed sometime this week, according to J. E. Sherrill, contractor.

However, a Sears-Roebuck Foundation representative will be here about May 1 to give the final "okay", Sherrill said. The building committee for the clinic is expected to make its inspection sometime this week.

The clinic has been built at a cost of about \$45,000. Sherrill Lumber Co. was awarded the contract on a bid of about \$26,000. However, interior fixtures, cabinets, etc. have been provided through Sears Foundation at a cost in addition to that of actual construction.

In drives here last summer and fall, Bovina area residents gave and pledged near \$43,000 for the medical clinic. The project began when a need was found during a survey conducted by Bovina Jaycees. The Bovina Woman's Study Club adopted the project and has been instrumental in its success.

The new clinic is of brick exterior with redwood trim. Interior is paneled walls and partitioned to provide maximum efficiency with a minimum of personnel.

The clinic provides space for two doctors, treatment rooms, laboratory, waiting room, and a central circular area for a combination receptionist, book-keeper and nurse.


The building has been constructed in compliance with Sears-Roebuck Foundation specifications. The Foundation approved the project following a medical survey in November showing the actual need for a doctor in Bovina.

Since that time the Foundation has provided the "know-how" and has been actively seeking a doctor for the town, along with members of the clinic executive committee.

Several doctors have inquired about the possibility of mov-

ing here, and at least one has visited Bovina.

Some of the Foundation clinics have been occupied upon completion. Others have waited longer. The longest one has remained unoccupied is three years.



**Editorial Comment -- Great Community Effort**  
Nearing completion is Bovina's medical clinic. When the last bit of construction is attended to, the modernistic, useful building will symbolize what is the greatest community effort in Bovina's history.  
Overall cost and value of the facility will be in the neighborhood of \$50,000. And that's a pretty sizeable sum to raise in a small community on a voluntary basis. By voluntary, we mean just that. In no way were taxes or any governmental agency involved in the project; not even from the standpoint of guaranteeing payment of indebtedness.  
The completion of the building is something that some people thought couldn't possibly be done on a voluntary basis. Many others, more optimistic, were highly skeptical. The success came through the cooperation of a large majority, including many of the aforementioned and the dedication and leadership of a few forward-thinking people who are interested in their community's progress and betterment.

The next step, of course, is to obtain the services of a doctor to make the overall project reach its intended goal. This, strangely enough, may be the most difficult and time-consuming part in spite of the fact that money, as such, is not involved.  
In other communities which have provided facilities such as is nearing completion in Bovina, up to three years have lapsed before a doctor came forward to begin practice.  
Certainly we hope that Bovina will be much more fortunate.  
We want to point out, though, that patience may be required and diligence will possibly have to continue over a long period of time before the "all done" signal can be given to the clinic-doctor project.  
If it turns out this way, however, the community still has great satisfaction during that waiting period of having accomplished something of great magnitude through cooperation.


**Know The Truth**

Visual Clinic Set Saturday

Final plans have been made for the second annual vision screening tests for pre-school age children of Friona and Bovina. This clinic will be held in the grade school gymnasium from 9 to 12 and from 2 to 5 Saturday, April 27, according to an announcement made by Mrs. Jimmy Maynard, chairman of the screening project.

Volunteers trained by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness will screen youngsters for signs of visual problems during these hours. The volunteer screeners are members of New Horizons Junior Study Club.

"Some childhood eye defects if not corrected before the age of six, can lead to permanent loss of vision in the affected eye," Mrs. Maynard pointed out in urging all parents to bring their youngsters to the free screening program.

Purpose of the vision screening is to detect signs of possible vision defects in children at an age when they still can be corrected with best results. Volunteer teams will check the child's visual acuity by means of a Snellen "E" chart. If the youngster's performance gives evidence of a vision difficulty, he will be "referred."

**On The Farm In Parmer County**

WATER LEVEL MEASUREMENTS

During the first two weeks in January 1968, personnel of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and the Texas Water Development Board measured the depths to water in 716 "observation" wells within the District. Sixty-one of the observation wells were located in Parmer County.

The records indicate that the average depth to water below the land surface in Parmer County in January 1967 was 224.07 feet. The minimum depth to water was 141.31 feet and the maximum depth to water was 322.60 feet.

In January 1968 the average depth to water below the land surface had increased to 229.64 feet. The 1968 records indicate that the minimum depth to water increased to 145.25 feet and the maximum depth to water decreased to 318.25 feet.

The average depth to water values were determined by adding all of the water-level measurements made in each of the observation wells in the county and dividing this sum by the number of wells measured during the given year.

The average decline per well observed in Parmer County from 1962 to 1968 has been 4.39 feet. Floyd County is the only other county having a large decline per well than Parmer.

With this dropping water table each farmer in Parmer County should be aware of and practice proper use and conservation of his water supply.


