# Government Program To Open In Bovina

A Community Action Program for Parmer County, sponsored and directed by the federal government, is scheduled to begin by the middle of next month. It will be headquartered in Bovina.

The program provides financial support for local anti-

poverty campaigns in urban and rural areas. Two workers will be hired to direct the program on the local level. These include a program chief and an outreach worker. Applications for the positions are now being accepted by Mayor Bedford Caldwell at City Hall in Bo-

Plans for the local Community Action Program were discussed at a meeting last week of a policy-making committee here and Frank Latimer of Dimmitt, who is presently executive secretary of Castro County CAP committee. Latimer's duties will be expanded to include direction of the program in Bovina.

The program includes instruction and-or classes on food purchasing, food preparation, food canning, clothing selection and sewing, health, sanitation, citizenship and other

Volunteer members of the local policy-making committee include Caldwell, Mrs. Rita Mast, S. L. Sledge, Raymond Delgado and Rev. Claver Giblin.

According to a report from the organizational meeting of the program here, qualifications for the program chief should be a woman of mature years, bilingual, good character, friendly, some education, a desire to solve human problems and dependable work habits.

Qualifications for the outreach worker should be a mature, young girl, bilingual, personable, with ability to meet people and write interview and submit accurate reports.

Letters of recommendations are required for applicants of both positions.

Tentative arrangements have been made to headquarter the program in office space in The Blade Building on Third Street, Classes of instruction will be held in public buildings, churches or schools.

Leaders of the project hope and expect to get it into operation by June 15. It will continue for one year on a trial basis ----longer if it proves to be successful here.

The agency here will be called a Multi-Purpose Service

Bovina is one of four locations in the 18th Congressional District which has qualified for such an operation. Others are Tulia, Hart and Hereford.

The program is a part of the work of the Southwest Region of the Office of Economic Opportunity and, in a manner of speaking, is comparable to the Head Start program for pre-school age children which has been conducted here for the past three summers except that it deals with adults.

A total of 90 per cent of the cost is paid by the federal government. The remainder is paid locally in-kind, Building space can and will be used to "pay" the local 10 per cent of the cost of the program.

The primary aim of the program is skilled employment paid a decent wage. Other aims include better health, better housing, basic education, pre-vocational training, vocational training, on-the-job training, according to Rev. Giblin, who has been a leader in making the program available here.

Plans now call for the two paid workers to be hired in the next few days and the program to be underway in the next couple of weeks.

Total federal funds available for the years program here are in excess of \$9,000.





Cricket B. Taylor, extension home demonstration agent, says shoulder width and slant, shape of armholes and necklines and slant of the underarm may vary, along with ease allowed for body movement and comfort.

Because of these variations. some brands will fit you better than others. While bust, waist, hip and back waist length measurements are a guide, you may need to try different brands of patterns to find the best possible fit, she explains.

When selecting the size, compare your measurements with the chart and select the size which most closely corresponds to them. When you select the correct figure type and pattern size, alteration and fitting problems are kept to a minimum, says the Extension

Take snug, but not tight measurements. Use a tape measure that is in good condition, Mrs. Taylor advises.

Jesus told the Apostles to go into all the world and preach the Gosepl to every creature, with the promise that all who believe and are baptized should be saved; further, saying that these signs would follow them that believe. The last verse of Mark tells why these great things were done -- to confirm or prove that the new message preached by the Apostles was from God.
