SAN FRANCISCO-(AP)-With great issues of war and peace hanging on their pen strokes, delegates of 50 countries went to a flag-draped conference auditorium Tuesday to sign the new United Nations Charter, and then hear President Truman make his first major address on American foreign policy.





HOUSTON -(AP) - Almost 1,000 meat markets were closed Tuesday, as proprietors entered the second day of a shutdown in protest against over-ceiling prices and tie-in sales, Pat S. Stone, secretary of the Retail Grocers Association, announced.

Reports to the association showed that the closing of members is practically 100 per cent, he said, while of all independents throughout the city, the shutdown is 90 pe cent.

Chain stores have announced they will keep their markets open, as have some independents.

The close-down of independents will continue until the objectives of the association are achieved Stone said. **Objectives** Stated

They are: to break the black market in Houston; to eliminate tie-in sales demanded by meat wholesalers, and to assure a fair listribution of meat to all markets throughout the city, so that the small units will get their fair share of meat available, just the same as larger stores.

He said that many markets which had previously indicated they would remain open had decided to join the association and closed before the end of the day Monday.

The OPA has indicated that vholesale investigation of meat deals is pending, and the rationing board issued a statement asking that consumers report any overcharges to the board.



Superforts made their mightiest demolition raid Tuesday on invasion-conscious Japan which Premier Kantaro Suzuki said was grimly determined to repel American assaults whenever they come.

Almost 500 Superforts, guarded by fighters from Iwo Jima, rained 6,000,000 pounds of explosives on 10 war plants in the Nippon mainland. Other American planes raided Canton arsenal, Nanking oil facilities and a Formosa alcohol factory.

The U.S. Navy announced the loss of the minesweeper Salute in the Borneo area, where Tokyo said a new Allied invasion is in the making. Nine men of the Salute crew

were killed or missing. It was the 319th naval vessel lost during the war.
