WASHINGTON —(P)— President Truman said Tuesday he will ask Congress to enact a peacetime military training program. It will not, he added, be in the form of con-



Announcing the proclamation at a news conference, Truman remarked with a smile that after two days of national celebration he thought the prayer would be needed.

When President Truman said, at a flag-raising in Germany, that "there is not a piece of territory that we want out of the war," he apparently was making an impromptu statement. It is doubtful that he had calculated the effect his obviously sincere but unpremeditated pronouncement would have.

However, his words were inevitably examined with great care as a forecast of future policy. And among those who took a special interest in them were some members of our Armed Forces in the Pacific.

The Army, Navy, and Marines announced their demobilization plans. They expect to release around 7,500,000 troops in a year or year and a half.

In line with lifting of restrictions, President Truman announced the end of voluntary news censorship.



Pilot Falls Into Sea 50 Yards From Japan On Rescue Mission

By AL DOPKING

WITH HALSEY'S THIRD FLEET (AP)-It shouldn't happen to any aviator—but it did to a Navy Kingfisher pilot who started out to rescue another pilot. He fell into the ocean 50 yards off the Japanese island of Honshu and saw his plane

taxi away without him.

A third Navy pilot then rescued his two mates with the Japanese loing a lot of fancy shooting; but hitting nothing.

It happened this way: Lieut. (jg.) Vernon T. Coumbre, Lombard, Ill., was shot down by ack-ack Aug. 9, during an attack on an airfield near the Ominato Naval Base on Honshu. He attempted to paddle out to soa in his life raft, but he was washed ashore on the island. He hid in a clump of trees for the night.

The next morning he saw two fighter-escorted Kingfisher planes approaching. He attempted to put out in his raft, but was washed back ashore. Then, one of the Kingfishers, piloted by Lieut. Ralph Jacobs, 25, Chicago, came in for landing. As he did Japanese shoreguns opened up on him.

Jacobs taxied to the edge of the

breakerss, about 50 yards offshore. Fell Out Of Plane 'I saw Coumbre would be unable to make his way through the surf,' Jacobs said, "so I stood up and tried to toss him a line. Just then an

unusually heavy breaker shook the plane violently and threw me out of the cockpit into the water." As he fell Jacob's foot hit the throttle and the pilotless plane turned into the wind and started off across the bay with the Japanese till shooting at it. Evidently they

nadn't seen Jacobs fall into the Lieut (jg) Almon P. Oliver of Hayward, Calif., veteran of 14 months fighting in the Pacific, the second Kingfisher pilot, saw Jacobs plane taxing across the bay, and thought it was trying to take off. "When it failed," Oliver said later, "I went down to investigate

and saw the cockpit empty." Oliver went back to investigate, saw the two stranded pilots and made what he described as a "lucky landing" in exceedingly rough water with the Japanese taking pot shots at him. He taxied inshore and pulled the two pilots aboard.



And don't underestimate the value of seemingly frivolous bath aids.
