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

#### Experts Deny Atomic Bomb Radio-Activity Staved At Hiroshima

SAN FRANCISCO -(P)- American experts returning from atomic-Hiroshima reported "much greater" than they had expected, but that there was no dangerous radioactivity lingering in the area, radio dispatches said.

American broadcasters quoted-Col. Stafford Warren, chief medical officer of the atomic-bomb phojec 70,000 to 100,000 Japanese casualties at Hiroshima would be "the best guess." Most, he added, were from blast, missiles and fire; and the casualties from radioactivity resulted from exposure at the instant of the explosion-rather than

Is Blast Weapon He said the American investiga-tors had tested the area but found oothing to support Japanese claims that radioactive matter remained

in the area. The bomb was designed as a blast weapon and radioactivity was confined to the point of detonation, and Loraine Streets by W. F. Hejl. he added. He also denied Japanese reports that gases had been released by the bomb.

## Tojo May Survive To **Face Trial**

TOKYO -(A)- American occupation authorities Wednesday night pressed the roundup of 47 Japanese war leaders and renegade Occidentals as a gift of olood from a Pennsylvania sergeant probably saved the life of Hideki Tojo, principal architect of the Pearl Harbor assault.

General MacArthur, extending his list of "wanted" men to include seven of the notorious Black Dragor Society's top terrorists, ordered dissolution of that jingoistic secret organization, which the Japanese claimed had disbanded more than

While the roundup bag increased one of the most badly wanted, Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma, who sanctioned the murderous Death March of Bataan, fled to his islet home off the northwest coast.

One of those caught, however, was Heinrich Georg Stahmer, Ger-man ambassador held chiefly responsible for bringing Japan into the Rome-Berlin Axis.

Senator Murray of Montana, author of the Full Employment Bill, has explained in a letter to the New York Times that this piece of legislation is essentially an affirmation of faith in private enterprise. It leaves private enterprise "completely free", says the senator, "to exercise its own ingenuity and initiative, which are the qualities that have made this country prosperous'

But earlier in the same letter Senator Murray has this to say: "Well, private enterprise has been left to its own devices from 1870 to 1930 and the record shows a succession of depressions with resulting unemployment."

It might have been well if he had explained the difference between private enterprise's "own devices" and its "own initiative and ingenuity". He apparently discerns the distinction, but he doesn't sav how he is going to curb the depression-causing "devices" while leaving the prosperity-producing "ingenuity and initiative" untouched.

The senator says that his bill "contains no provisions for regimenting or managing private enterprise". Yet one of its purposes is to stimulate increased employment opportunities by private enterprise through promotion of non-federal investments and expenditures. This would be the last step before the bill's proposed public spending program, and it would be interesting to know how the stimulation could be applied without any pressure on private management.

It would also be interesting to know how accurately the government could translate the general term, "full employment", into an arbitrary number of persons to be employed, and how accurately it could make long-range forecasts of future unemployment—an estimate on which, apparently, Murray's whole program rests.

It would be not only interesting, but necessary, to know how this whole proposition can be made to work efficiently without a return to the whoppingly expensive philosophy of deficit spending, without a commitment to permanent inflation, and without opening the door to an expanded government control of business.

Murray's rich if somewhat contradictory praise of private enterprise doesn't plug all the possible loopholes in his bill through which an administration with a mind to do so could introduce a form of state socialism without the country's direct sanction. One doesn't need to be an altruist to share Senator Murray's desire for full employment. The eventual prosperity of all of us, rich or poor, requires it. For that very reason this bill which seeks to attain it should be a clear understanding of further legislation required to put it into practice before the government or the people even think of committing themselves to its program.

Picked up by the Japs, he received no medical attention for 10 days. He was questioned day and night. He was beaten on the back and legs with a baseball bat or punched on the jaw 300 times. He lost 65 pounds on the Japs' starvation rations.

But they couldn't kill "Pappy" Boyington. They couldn't kill a lot of men like him, or the spirit which they typified. No wonder the Japs gave up.
