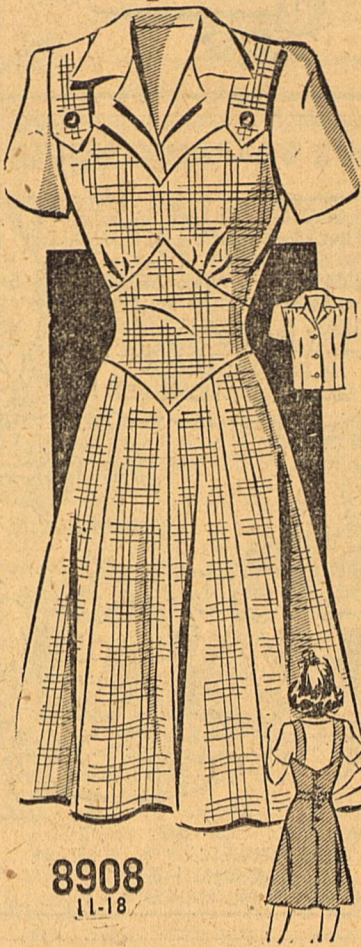
Morning Coffee Honors Members Of Twentieth Century Study Club
