Attlee To Visit United States For Atomic Bomb Conference

WASHINGTON (AP)—Three-power discussions over the future of atomic energy will begin here about November 11 between President Truman, Prime Minister Attlee of Britain and Canada's MacKenzie King.

The announcement of the forthcoming talks, released in Washington and London simultaneously Tuesday, made no mention of Russian participation. The conference is in line with President Truman's previous statements that the three-power parley would come ahead of any meeting with other Allies on atomic energy.

Canada, Great Britain and the United States share the secret of the development of the atomic bomb, but United States plants alone have produced it.

Attended Security Conference

Prime Minister Attlee will visit the President in Washington early next month to discuss with him and Prime Minister MacKenzie King of Canada problems to which the discovery of atomic energy has given rise, the White House said.

"The Prime Minister is expected to arrive in Washington so that the discussions can begin about November 11."

Attlee was in the United States last April as a member of the British

delegation to the United Nations Postwar Security Conference at San Francisco.

He and President Truman also got together at the last "Big Three" meeting in Potsdam.

President Truman recently told

Congress he would soon initiate discussions looking to the renunciation of the atomic bomb. At the same time he called upon Congress to create a commission to control the domestic use and development of atomic energy.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States Tuesday recognized the revolutionary government of Venezuela after consultations with other American governments.


The State Department issued this statement:

"The secretary of state, James F. Byrnes, announced Tuesday afternoon that the government of the United States has extended full recognition to the government of Venezuela which is now organized under Senator Romulo Betancourt.

"The American ambassador in Caracas is informing the new minister for foreign affairs of Venezuela of this action.

"Before making its decision to recognize the new government of Venezuela the government of the United States of America has exchanged views and consulted with the governments of the other American republics."

Truman May Ask For 48 Hours Pay

WASHINGTON (AP)—Authoritative persons said President Truman will propose Tuesday night that industry pay 48 hours wages for 40 hours work without raising prices.

They said he will make this request in a broadcast at 9 p. m. (Central Standard Time) as a compromise with demands by unions that employees be paid for 52 hours while working 40.

The compromise, if accepted by industry and labor, would give workers a 20 per cent increase in pay compared with the 30 per cent the unions ask.

Exceptions to holding the line on prices would be made in cases which would work a hardship on the employer, persons informed of the plan said.

Price rise requests would be handled through the Office of Price Administration and the Office of Economic Stabilization.

If the subject comes before the labor-management conference opening Monday some enforcement machinery conceivably could be adopted. But industry agreement might be difficult to obtain.

To Talk With Delegates

The President will discuss wages and prices with as many of the 18 management and 18 labor delegates as he can meet before the conference.

What the unions have wanted is to get the same pay as in wartime in changing back from the 48-hour to the regular 40-hour week. Under Truman's reported proposal they would get a little less pay than in wartime but work eight hours less.

Army Forces Vargas To Resign But Free Election To Be Held

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—The chief justice of the supreme court assumed the presidency of Brazil Tuesday under an army mandate to direct the country until the December 2 elections after Getulio Vargas resigned in the midst of a tense political situation.

Chief Justice Jose Linhares was inducted officially at a pre-dawn ceremony at the War Ministry. War Minister Pedro Aurelio Goes Monteiro announced he had invited Linhares to serve until the elections were realized.

Although the army appeared to be in complete charge of the situation, Goes Monteiro said there had been no military coup as such. He said the army would guarantee the holding of the elections, which he said the Vargas government no longer was capable of realizing.

The news came with shocking suddenness to the people, in the wake of a swift succession of events which began with the appointment

China Communists Say U.S. Meddling In Internal Affairs

CHUNGKING (AP)—Charges that the United States is meddling in Chinese internal affairs Tuesday increased the tension in the Chinese capital, where political observers already tensely are watching for the possible outbreak of declared civil war between Nationalist and Communist troops.

Reports from Tientsin said the American marine garrison there had been alerted after reports spread through North China that the clash between the two armies was impending.

Presence of the estimated 60,000 Marines in North China, and the transfer of Chinese Nationalist troops into that area by the American Air Forces, were the basis of the protest against American actions which was issued by a Communist spokesman. He charged the United States with "intervening in China's internal politics."

Non-Communist quarters said they feared that the Communists might deliberately provoke a clash with the Marines with the intention of embarrassing the United States and central governments and arousing agitation in the United States for immediate withdrawal of American forces from China.

China Communists Say U.S. Meddling In Internal Affairs

Getulio Vargas, who resigned as president of Brazil Monday night in response to an army ultimatum, was under military guard at Guanabara palace Tuesday while the new president, Jose Linhares, deliberated on what to do with him.

Vargas' brother, Benjamin, as chief of the federal police. He was regarded as a leader of a movement to keep Vargas in power despite the forthcoming elections.

Goes Monteiro, an advocate of state, congressional and presidential elections, resigned as war minister but reconsidered at the request of the army and called for Joao Lins de Barros to resume his office as chief of the federal police.

An ultimatum was served upon Getulio Vargas to resign.

Tanks were assembled in the streets about the presidential palace. The president's wife and another brother, Viriato Vargas, left the grounds in a presidential car. Troops already occupied key points in the city as a precautionary measure.

The cabinet was assembled at the presidential palace when first word came Monday night that Vargas had resigned. Confirmation came shortly after midnight.

In the early morning hours a band of about 1,000 men roamed the streets in the center of the capital, ripping down posters of the Querequemas party, which had been demanding that Vargas cancel the scheduled elections and remain at the helm of the government he headed since 1930.

Yoakum Wildcat Encounters Some Stain, Porosity

King, Warren and Dye No. 1 Stewart, Northwest Yoakum County wildcat, in northwest quarter of section 332, block D, John H. Gibson survey, was coring from 5,260 feet, in a soft section in the San Andres-Permian.

A drilling break was encountered at 5,255 feet and samples from there to 5,260 feet showed some oil stain and some porosity. The break came at about the point the operators were expecting it.

The prospector is about three and one-half miles northwest of the Ownby field, nearest producing area.

More Shows

Skelly Oil Company No. 1-Y University, South Andrews County exploration, one-half mile east of initial producer in the Clabber Hill field, cored at 5,481-93 feet and recovered gray, crystalline fractured dolomite, with some porosity and signs of oil, and was taking another drillstem test.

A previous test had shown some oil and gas cut drilling mud with a steady blow of air. The project is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 33, block 9, University survey and the section showing possibilities of production is the Holt, middle Permian.

Colden Cores

Skelly No. 1 Colden, in east corner of north half of section 80, block 10, H&GN survey, in North Pecos County, was coring from 5,165 feet in the Simpson. No top on the section has been reported by operator.

Continental Oil Company No. 1-B-22 Skaggs, 660 feet from north and east lines of section 22-20s-37c, and one-half mile northwest of closest well in the Skaggs deep pool, in East Lea County, New Mexico, had progressed past 8,120 feet in line and chert, and was continuing.

Missed the Pay

This prospect apparently missed the pay section from which Conoco has developed two producers in the last year from a section originally thought to be the Wolfcamp, basal Permian, but now said to be the Strawn section of the Pennsylvania.

No. 1-B-22 Skaggs had a slight show for production above 7,957 feet, but operator was not able to make it show very much. It has been carried ahead to test the lower sections and may drill to the Devonian, and possibly deeper.

Cole, Gruber and Coburn No. 1 Superior-Starnes, Southwest Upton County shallow wildcat, in section 1, block W, GC&SF survey, had a hole full of sulphur water at 1,870 feet, and was shutdown for orders. There is a possibility that the test will be carried deeper.

Moore's Test Sounded

John I. and P. D. Moore No. 1 Southland Royalty Company-Waddell, South Crane County exploration, in section 19, block 2, H&T survey, took a three-hour and 55-minute test at 6,390-98 feet, through perforations.

There was a fair flow of air throughout the period and recovery was 1,500 feet of salt water. The section was middle Devonian. Operators set a bridging plug at (Continued on Page Two)

House Group May Limit UNRRA Aid To China In 1947

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee tied legislative strings Tuesday to a recommended new \$550,000,000 fund for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA).

But it turned down, after hearing State Department opposition, a proposed "free press" amendment which would have required nations receiving UNRRA aid to give United States newsmen free access to UNRRA news abroad.

The committee wrote these restrictions into the legislation:

1. No new relief supplies shall be shipped to any country except China after December 31, 1946, and none to China after March 31, 1947.
2. As much as possible, surplus agricultural commodities must be used in filling UNRRA's needs.
3. None of the money shall be used after December 31, 1945, unless UNRRA certifies that recipient countries have agreed to make available to UNRRA all information on trade and barter agreements and satisfactory information on exports.

Chest Campaign Ends With County Not Making Quota

Midland County obtained \$20,003.55 of its \$23,077 Victory Chest quota Monday, with some reports still to be heard from R. L. Dickey, campaign chairman, announced.

"While most of us are keenly disappointed that the county failed to meet its quota for the first time, some consolation remains in that Midland County obtained a higher per cent of its quota than most of the counties in this district," Dickey said.

Of the \$20,003.55 obtained in the campaign \$13,077 will go to the National Victory Chest and the remainder will be used to carry on Boy Scout and Girl Scout activities in the county.

"I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the efforts made by the workers in the campaign," Dickey said. "These busy citizens took time off from their work to perform a patriotic job."

Victory Bond Campaign Gets Underway Here

A total of \$22,575 in Victory Bonds was sold during the opening day of Midland County's Victory Bond campaign, John P. Butler, director of the campaign in the county, announced Tuesday.

Of the total \$7,725 was in Series E Bonds. The county has a quota of \$985,000 with \$335,000 being in Series E Bonds.

"A very gratifying start," Butler commented when he announced the total of the opening day's sales.

Butler again called attention to the new Victory Bond bearing the picture of former President Roosevelt which sells for \$150 and pays the owner \$200 in 10 years.

With five Victory Bond issuing agencies in Midland, citizens find it very convenient to purchase Victory Bonds here, Butler pointed out.

Victory Bond issuing agencies here are the Postoffice, the National Bank, the Midland National Bank, the Midland Production Credit Association and the Midland Federal Savings and Loan Association.

"Let us successfully complete the campaign as quickly as possible," Butler suggested.

Raids On Germany Cost 79,265 American Lives

WASHINGTON (AP)—Twelve millions declared Tuesday Allied air power was the decisive factor in the conquest of Germany.

"Victory in the air cost the United States 79,265 flying men and 19,000 planes, the British 73,281 fliers and 22,000 aircraft, the committee said in a report to the War Department.

But their air power killed some 300,000 Germans—more than the total of U. S. armed services in all theaters—destroyed or heavily damaged 3,000,000 dwellings, made rubble of principal German cities and kept 5,000,000 persons busy repairing bomb damage.

"Hindsight inevitably suggests that it might have been employed differently or better in some respects," the committee said in an officially titled "U. S. Strategic Bombing Survey."

"Nevertheless, it was decisive. In the air, its victory was complete."

House Committee Urges Repeal Of Strike Vote Act

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Military Committee Tuesday voted to repeal the war-extended law under which organized labor has been conducting government-supervised strike ballots.

The strike vote provision is in the Smith-Connally War Labor Disputes Act, a portion of which the committee recommended be repealed.

The Labor Department had requested repeal of that section but had urged that another section making it illegal to strike against a government-operated plant be retained. The committee took no action on the section dealing with government-operated plants.

The legislation may not reach the House floor for a vote for several weeks.

Return Of Repatriates To Japan To Begin Soon

NEWELL, CALIF. (AP)—Return to Japan of voluntary and involuntary Japanese repatriates will begin at an early date, possibly by November 15, officials of the immigration service announced Tuesday.

Ivan Williams, officer in charge and speaking for the commissioner of immigration and naturalization service, said a detail of men from the Department of Justice Monday began a survey of the Japanese detained at the War Relocation Authority Tulelake center here.

This survey, Williams said, will include persons whose applications for renunciation of their United States citizenship have been approved by the attorney general, together with members of their families, whether citizens or aliens, who may desire to accompany them, alien residents who are segregated in paroled under alien enemy proceedings, and alien residents who are under orders of deportation under the immigration laws.

The survey is expected to be completed within two weeks.

Army Discloses Japs Bombed Oregon Forest And Set Small Fire

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Possible Japanese knowledge of United States lack of radar along Southern Oregon coast enabled submarine-launched planes to bomb forests in that area in September, 1942, Fourth AAF headquarters disclosed Tuesday.

An unidentified plane dropped an incendiary bomb Sept. 10, 1942, which started a small forest fire near Brookings, Ore., about 50 miles north of the California-Oregon border.

The Brookings area was the only one on the Pacific Coast not covered by radar.

The Fourth AAF war history states a plane launched from a submarine 20 days later dropped several incendiaries in the forest near Cape Blanco, north of Brookings. The bombs were ineffective because of the dampness of the undergrowth.

The first plane had been seen by a forest ranger but the second, although heard, was not sighted.

MANILA —(AP)—Mai. Gen. Basilio J. Valdes, Philippine chief of staff, Tuesday told a military commission trying Japanese Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita on war crime charges that he found the half-cremated bodies of his older brother and a nephew in a pit filled with decomposing flesh.

Memorial To 36th May Be Erected At Salerno To Honor Texas Heroes

DALLAS (AP)—A \$50,000 memorial to the Texas 36th Division on the site of its bloody landing in Italy has been proposed to the division's former commander, Maj. Gen. Fred L. Walker. He led the division from Camp Bowie, Texas, through the hard fought Italian campaign until it reached a point north of Rome.

Red Beach, where most of the assault troops landed near Salerno, is the proposed site of the memorial structure to the first division to land on European soil in World War II.

In a telegram from Washington to the Dallas News, General Walker said:

First To Defeat Germans

"The men of the 36th Division have the honor of being the first Americans to decisively defeat hostile German troops on hostile beaches. They were the first Americans to establish a beachhead on the mainland of Europe.

"By their courage, their gallantry and their sacrifices, they led the invasion of Italy and set an example for other troops to emulate. A suitable memorial should be constructed on those same beaches as an ever reminder of their magnificent achievements and supreme sacrifices to future American and European generations."

Col. Clayton P. Kerr of Dallas, General Walker's chief of staff, is now in Italy conducting negotiations with the Italian government for a tract of land for the memorial shaft. The Red Beach site is at the foot of Mount Soprano overlooking the military cemetery where scores of 36th veterans are buried.

Dog Saved Doughboy Master But He Had To Leave It On Pier

NEW YORK (AP)—The plight of a dog who saved the life of his American doughboy master, and then was left shivering on a pier as the soldier returned to the United States, moved a Navy skipper Tuesday to try to aid other men overseas who are devoted to their pets.

The skipper was Capt. Logan C. Ramsey of the aircraft carrier Lake Champlain which arrived from Southampton with some 3,700 servicemen.

The dog was a wire-haired terrier named Schnapps and his owner Sgt. Andrew L. Freese of Bangor, Me.

Freese, who had to leave Schnapps on Southampton pier, when he sailed aboard the carrier, wrote the skipper how the dog had saved his life, and how devoted he had become to the animal.

He told how the dog, who learned to bark at German soldiers and civilians, detected a Nazi who had slipped past the guard and into an American camp near Heidelberg, Germany, with a club and a wire garrote.

Schnapps, wrote Freese, set off the alarm with growls and barks, then flushed the German, who was killed by a sentry.

As a result Capt. Ramsey suggested to newsmen establishment of an organization to ship pets home.

New Automobiles Not To Be Rationed

WASHINGTON (AP)—New automobiles now on sale will not be rationed, the government announced Monday.

The OPA and the War Production Board, in a joint statement, said that with nearly 24,000,000 cars now on the road, and new production under way, "there is no longer danger of a general breakdown of the automotive transportation system."

Laine Returns After Four Years In AAF

Capt. Tanner Laine, former sports editor of The Reporter-Telegram, has returned to Midland after four years' service with the Army Air Forces and will resume his staff position with the newspaper.

Laine, to be discharged under the point system, is on terminal leave from the AAF.

He enlisted in January 1942 and was stationed at Midland Army Air Field for several months as an enlisted man. He was graduated from officer's school at Miami Beach, Fla., in December 1942 and served in several states before going overseas to the European Theater in 1943.

Serving with the high-scoring 357th Mustang Fighter Group in the ETO, Laine was public relations officer. His unit was an Eighth Air Force fighter outfit.

Laine wears six battle stars to the ETO ribbon and a Distinguished Unit Citation with cluster.

Texas Oil Production Climbs 10,000 Barrels

TULSA, OKLA.—Increases in almost all sections pushed daily average crude oil production up 42,150 barrels to 4,970,000 in the week ending October 27. The Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

The week's biggest increase was in California, where output rose 28,000 barrels to 845,750, but Texas climbed 10,000 to 1,711,700 and Illinois gained 6,800 to 212,350.

The Eastern area inched up 50 barrels to 62,400, while Oklahoma climbed 6,250 to 367,500 and Kansas slid downward 9,000 to 264,950. Louisiana slumped 3,400 barrels to 253,000.

The Rocky Mountain area of Colorado, Montana and Wyoming increased 650 barrels to 134,350.

Mississippi's production was 52,450 barrels compared with 52,000 the previous week.

Making Acetylene Of Natural Gas On Large Scale To Start Soon

AUSTIN —(P)— Manufacture of pure acetylene from natural gas on a scale sufficient to determine the commercial cost is the project of Dr. E. P. Schoch and his co-worker at the University of Texas hope to start by Dec. 1.

Acetylene is the all-important factor in the production of rubber, plastics and chemicals, and now that laboratory procedure is complete, Dr. Schoch is ready for experiments on manufacturing the product on a commercial scale.

An all-steel structure, 28x28, on the west side of the Chemical Engineering Building is being constructed to house the apparatus. In Purer Forms Conditions will be exactly as found in competitive petroleum refineries in which various oils or liquids are used to extract constituents from mixtures of gas and to turn the product loose in purer forms, Dr. Schoch explained.

"The project at the university is concerned only with gas instead of the oil vapors." "This research was started in 1929 and has been carried on continuously. When the new building is ready for operation, pure acetylene gas will be made on a commercial scale and its exact cost estimated. The final product will be placed in large gas tanks from where it will be distributed into commercial containers for testing by individual users," Dr. Schoch said.

In 1929, Dr. Schoch undertook to use electric discharges through gases for adding the energy required to couple up hydro-carbon radicals from methane, the main ingredient of gas. To date this effort has resulted in a process of making acetylene from natural gas.

AU AUDIENCE RIOTS

I WILL never forget the first performance at Poirer's Ambassadeurs—I was so tired I could hardly move after the strenuous band rehearsal and a night without sufficient sleep. Fortunately, the show was good, and Poirer, who had gone to all sorts of trouble to have the lights properly adjusted for the staircase, was very happy and sent a telegram to Baud about it.

From the Ambassadeurs, we went to the Rhuil Hotel in Nice and then to a good week in Monte Carlo. After that we set out for Italy.

The managers of the Salone Margherita, the best music-hall in Rome, had gone to all sorts of expense to publicize my debut, and the impresario, Signor Cavallotti, hovered about the stage with a beaming smile all the time we were rehearsing. But the opening performance was no fun for any of us. I had my first real view of what an Italian audience could do to artists on their first night, for it was an understood thing in Italy that the audience came to the initial show of a new bill for the express purpose of raising as much hell as possible.

The star act on the bill was the charming and talented Australian vedette, Jenny Golder. She had been held over at the theater, so was an established favorite. I came second in importance on the bill; then there was a good roller-skating act of eight people from the Gaumont Palace in Paris that closed the show. Third in importance was a French singer who worked in a blacked-out set with a spot and did ultra-dramatic work. There were also three musical clowns, a comedy tramp bicycle act in the style of the great Joe Jackson, and a Risley act, all more or less featured. The

rest of the bill was like all other vaudeville programs, a mixture of this and that—some good, some bad.

AS I sat in my dressing room, Morgan restlessly paced back and forth from the side of the stage to my door, reporting the progress of the show. I could pretty well imagine what was taking place from the comments of acts who got the bird—Cavalotti simply rang down the curtain on them when he considered things were going too far. Apparently the audience was in a very ugly mood.

The applause for Jenny Golder in the middle of the bill was terrific, and she gave an encore at the close of her act. Then the trouble started. The poor clowns, who had been congratulating themselves that they could follow an artist who had put the audience in a good humor, were unfortunately sadly mistaken. Their act had barely got under way, when a roar of "Ma, che cant! Basta! Basta!" ("But what dogs' howling! Enough! Enough!") went up.

Morgan told me Cavallotti signaled to the tenor, who sang rather well, to try his song and at the same time motioned for the next act to stand by; this was the French singer. As she stood there waiting to go on, she could hear a loud chorus of that international protest, the Bronx cheer, as it greeted the first notes of the tenor. That was enough for Cavallotti; he pressed the button on which he kept his hand during the entire show, and down came the curtain on the clowns.

Morgan came flying back to me, saying Cavallotti wanted us to stand by for our act in case the French singer got the works, too.

She had courage, though, and stood the heckling for about 16 more bars of music, then walked down to the ramps and shouted, "Salauds" ("Swine") at the top of her voice. If the audience had not heard her insult, and as Cavallotti hastily brought down the curtain, walking sticks, cigar butts, and empty match-boxes came raining onto the stage.

When I walked out, there was the usual moment of silence that had greeted each act. "The silence before the storm," I thought as I went into my dance. I used a rather soft opening in those days, on the Spanish Dance of Granados, and as I whirled and pirouetted toward my rope, I could hear a confused murmur of voices—then a loud laugh. I lost my temper for a moment and stood with my hand on the rope looking straight out at the audience. For no earthly reason I got an applause—then I climbed up and started to work.

Morgan, anchoring the ropes on the stage, was trembling to such an extent that I felt the vibration under my hands as I held the rope and kept wondering just how long I could keep going before the audience got after me. I went from trick to trick, thinking each one would be the last, and decided if there was the slightest hostility from the spectators, I would slide down, walk off the stage and out of the theater. Finally the audience warmed up, and I began getting hands—good ones—so I breathed freely and started to sell the act. It ended in a frank and spontaneous applause. The situation was saved. When I went out before the curtain, I was greeted with the most outrageous and embarrassing compliments—an old Italian custom in any vaudeville house and a sign the act had been a success.





Eck Curtis, coach of Highland Park, pays strong tribute to the Wichita Falls line that outplayed his stalwart Scotties last week in that 7-7 tie. "Those two big tackles (Willie Bigham, 246, and Bob James, 208) just about wrecked us," says Curtis.

Curtis doesn't think Wichita Falls has a back as good as Cotton Lindloff of Waco, however, although he declared Lindy Berry was excellent. schoolboy football is attracting its largest crowds in history in Texas.

The biggest throng of the season was 17,000 that turned out at Houston to see Milby play. Dallas had around 14,000 at one game. The

night Highland Park met Marshall in Dallas 23,000 turned out for schoolboy football here—12,000 for Highland Park-Marshall and 11,000 over at Dal-Hi Field for a Dallas city race game. Fort Worth has shown about 14,000 for a game and at Wichita Falls last week 13,000 jammed into the stadium to see the Scotties play Wichita Falls. The Odessa had a full house the night it met Amarillo, probably about 11,000. Amarillo can equal this and so on. It's a far cry from the early twenties when crowds of 5,000 were a novelty. Coach Tyson of South Park (Beaumont) recalls that when he was coaching at Waco they had to go around town to raise \$70 to underwrite a game with Oak Cliff so it would be played in Waco. "We justified the confidence of the underwriters by making \$5,000 on the game," Tyson said.

A&M's Smith, TCU's Joslin Continue To Pace Offensive

By The Associated Press Preston Smith, Texas Aggie fullback, increased his lead in South-west Conference ball-carrying last week as he gained a net 59 yards against Baylor to bring his total to 502 in six games.

Smith has carried the ball 108 times—much more than any other back in the circuit, conference statistics released Tuesday by James H. Stewart, executive secretary, show.

Sammie Pierce, Baylor halfback, stayed in second place but when he gained only 21 yards against A. and M. it widened Smith's lead. Pierce has a net of 447 on 59 runs.

Big John Hoffman of Arkansas rolled up 125 yards against Mississippi to move into third place in the conference. Hoffman has carried 76 times for 325 yards.

Price Follows Joslin Leon Joslin of Texas Christian still tops the passing, having thrown 61 and completed 31 for 499 yards. Jack Price of Baylor still is second with 358 yards on 29 completions out of 52 passes. Dave Moon of Southern Methodist is third with 16 out of 48 for 300 yards.

In team statistics, Texas still is the offensive leader with 1713 yards—1039 rushing and 674 passing. Baylor is second with 1515 yards.

Defensively Baylor is No. 1. The Bears allowed only 758 yards in six games—an average of 126.3 yards per game. Texas A. and M. continues as the top defender against passing. The Aggies have allowed only 13 competitions out of 54 for 196 yards.

The individual punting race is duel between Howard Maley of Southern Methodist and Jim Plyler of Texas. Maley has an average of 39.8, Plyler 38.7. Last week Maley kicked for an average of 41.7 against Tulane while Plyler averaged 41 against Rice.

Army Paces Nation's Teams As Texas Falls From First Ten Rank

By HAROLD CLAASSEN NEW YORK—(P)—Army, Notre Dame and Navy retained the first three places among the country's top ten football teams as determined by the weekly Associated Press poll Tuesday but the remainder of the elite group underwent a thorough shake up.

Three new clubs were admitted to membership, three others grabbed new places and only unbeaten Pennsylvania kept its position.

Army, playing what the Cadet coaches said was the team's best game of the season, defeated Duke 48 to 13 Saturday and Tuesday did one of its best vote-getting jobs by snaring 91 first places on the 106 ballots cast. Ten critics placed the team second and five rated it no better than third.

Notre Dame's unbeaten string and its 55 to 0 conquest of Iowa induced six voters to place the Irish first and Navy was the choice of three.

On Top For Year The Cadets, who have been on top since a year ago this week when Notre Dame relinquished the throne, gathered 1,040 points.

Ohio State, Oklahoma A&M and Michigan are the new members of the top ten although it is a return appearance for both of the Big Ten clubs. Defeats suffered last Saturday by Purdue, Minnesota and Texas sent that trio out of the major ranking.
