



Rubber Decoys Used To Fool Enemy On D-Day





One of the most facinating stories of World War II was disclosed by the Goodyear Tire & Pubber Co. upon the lifting of the strictest Army and Navy censorship, which prevailed for the last four years. It is the story of the production and use of ballon fabric, inflatable replicas of Army and Navy war material, employed to deceive the enemy. Instead of the use of camouflage in wartime for concealment, the Army and Navy made use of artifices produced by Goodyear at Arkon, Ohio, to deliberately entice the enemy into observing, and sometimes bombing and strafing comparatively inexpensive rubber and fabric objects, while our real armor and fighting craft, unscathed, were preparing to attack from another, unexpected angle. Fabric boats, barges, folded up and shipped to the scene of action with the loss of practically no cargo space, were inflated to full scale so that from the air they resembled origi.nals. Tanks, tank destroyers, heavy artillery, landing craft of all sorts, PT boats and many other units were similarly made up to provide the required deception. In the above photo, U. S. What Makes The Japs Tick

The bulk of the 5000 Japanese prisoners of war brought to the United States will be shipped back home within the next six weeks, but two groups of volunteers are to be kept in an ex-German Prisoner of War camp at Huntsville, Texas, for a unique psychological research experiment.

The big idea is to find out how the Japanese people are going to react to democratic ideas, says Maj. Gen. Archer L. Lerch, provost marshal general. Whatever is learned at Huntsville is to be used in Jap language newspapers, books, pamphlets and films. These materials also will be made available to occupation forces charged with re-orienting the Japanese along democratic lines.

If it strikes you that this experiment is getting under way a bit late, the answer is that before V-J Day it was no use trying to indoctrinate the Japs with anything. Now that they know they've lost the war, they're more willing to listen to reason. All the Jap prisoners going to Huntsville are volunteers who have expressed a desire to learn a little more about American democratic ways.

The first class at Huntsville is made up of 15 or 20 well-educated Japs, scholars and university men from the ice Act, the board of managers of upper levels of the Jap social scale. To them is given the the National Congress of Parents preliminary research on how democratic institutions can best be made to work in Japan, or how democratic principles should be modified to make them understandable to the Japanese people.

When the scholars have finished their work, results are passed on to the lower class. In this group are some 200 less-educated men, representatives of the common people, farmers, fishermen and factory workers.

Before this can be done, however, the classical language of the scholars must be recast into the Japanese vernacular so the common people can understand it. In this lower class speech, the articles will be printed in Japanese newspapers and pamphlets. Also they will be passed on by the spoken word in informal lectures and discussions.

Secret Weapon

Storms Increase Difficulties By 5 November the American orces had reached the vicinity of Limon at the northern end of the valley road leading to Ormoc, the principal Japanese installation on he island. Bitter fighting for Leyte was now in progress, rendered the more difficult by typhoons which inaugurated the rainy season.

On 9 November ten destroyers and two heavy large troop transports. Kenney's planes attacked and sank two transports, one destroyer, and six freighters. On 11 November another convoy started into Ormoc Bay. Carrier planes, now reinforced after the great naval battle, attacked. Two transports were sunk. Four destroyers were also sent to the bottom and the fifth was badly damaged. One destroyer escort was sunk. On 7 December an entire convoy of six transports, four destroyers and three destroyer escorts were sunk in San Isidra Bay by United States planes. On 11 December three transports and three destroyers vere sunk off Palompam, and the following day another destroyer was sunk and one destroyer escort



To Midland Farmers

Emergency crop loans, generally known as the "seed loans" now are available to Midland County farmers and ranchers, w'() need financing of Fall truck crops, cover crops and feed crops.

By William Ferguson Seed Loan Available

Applications for the loans in this county are being taken at the county courtroom in the courthouse here. Field Supervisor J. J. Medlin is at Midland every Thurs-

day from 8:30 a. m. to 3 p. m.

An early installment of the loan may be advanced at this time for the purchase of feed or fuel oil in Few Cities Celebrate preparing the land as well as seed, fertilizer and supplies. Growers who expect to plant fall crops followed by other crops in the spring may apply for their total 1946 requirements at this time and the remainder of the funds will be disbursed when needed.

Security for the loans is a first mortgage on the crops to be financed. The maximum loan to an individual is \$400.

In addition to the general crop production loan, Farm Credit Administration also makes straight vegetable loans, citrus loans and loans to purchase and produce feed for livestock, according to the field supervisor. The straight feed loans are secured by a first lien on the livestock to be fed. Applicants who can secure loans from banks or other sources are not eligible for the seed loans."
