## Byrnes Flies To Moscow For Talks

Secretary of State Byrnes left by plane Wednesday for Moscow where he plans to tackle half a dozen critical issues on which Big Three cooperation has been stalled.

Among these issues are atomic energy and an eventual European ace conference.

The flight schedule calls for getting Byrnes to the Russian capital n time for his first meeting Saturday with Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov and British Foreign ecretary Bevin Atomic Bomb Plans

Byrnes' top aim at the foreign ministers meeting will be to advise Molotov fully of Anglo-American-Canadian plans for turning over tomic energy problems to the United Nations in January.

### Reich as laid down by the State American Lieutenant To Bring Hirohito's White Horse To U. S.

By DUANE HENNESSY TOKYO-(AP)-The most controversial horse in Japan—White Frost, described by the Army as Emperor Hirohito's own mount—is going to

the United States as the property of an American lieutenant. The Japanese Racing Association Wednesday ceremoniously turned over the much publicized white Arabian to Lt. Dick Ryan, who discovered him five weeks ago in iso-

iated but elaborate stables. A change in Army regulations announced Wednesday will make it possible for the lieutenant to take he plans to exhibit the horse at veterans' hospitals, civic and charitable events.

If nothing goes amiss, White Frost will go aboard an American Liberty ship at Yokohama within a few days when Ryan starts home for discharge. Frost will be carried on deck. Some Japanese sources deny that

White Frost is the horse on which Hirohito was seen astride in so many pre-war pictures. Others say he was too high strung to be ridden by the emperor in review, was given to another member of the royal family and finally placed in the association stables. ### Results As Expected

At the time the Labor-Management Conference convened in Washington, the suggestion was made that no magic formula would be forthcoming and that a lot of people would be disappointed in the results. It was a good, safe prediction.

If the four weeks of mountainous labor brought forth a mouse, it was a mouse as familiar as Mr. Disney's Mickey. The recommendations which the committee were able to agree upon were admirable, but scarcely startling. Even the suggestion of an impartial chairman, umpire or board to settle disagreements, which might be called the conference's most newsworthy accomplishment, is no innovation.

Elsewhere we find such advice as this: "It is well that respect and consideration be given to proposals presented by either the employer or the union. . . . Both sides should avoid inflammatory statements which question the sincerity or good faith of either party.
"There must be an honest effort on the part of all to

effectuate the spirit as well as the letter of the agreement, a continuous demonstration by the parties of their willingness to conduct their relations on the basis of mutual fairness and respect.

## Patton Spends Good Night But Condition

By JAMES F. KING HEIDELBERG, GERMANY-(AP)-Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., whose neck was broken in an automobile accident Sunday, spent a "good night" but his condition "remains grave," an official bulletin said

Wednesday.

An earlier announcement said the colorful U. S. General was fully conscious, rational and taking nourishment, and that he showed "normally active" tendon reflexes. Nurses attending Patton described him as "one of their best patients" and said he was accepting his paralyzed condition like 'true soldier." One of the nurses Lt. Bertha Hohle of Grygla, Minn. said his "sleeping was confused but he is rational when awake."

"He doesn't swear like I have neard he does," she said. "He tells me not to worry about him and go away, but I have to be there pecause he never wants to eat or drink. He says he will not unless ne gets a shot of whiskey."

Doctors reported however, that there were no signs of improvement in the paralytic condition Wednesday.
