After The Battle

Now that the withering fire of Maj. Gen. Patrick Hurley's verbal barrage has subsided, it may be safe to go forward and count the casualties. Fortunately they are few. A lot of career diplomats in the line of fire managed to escape unharmed. But the battlefield is a scene of confusion and disorder.

Not all of it was of General Hurley's making. He may have created some, but the rest appears to have existed for some time and to have been revealed to the pub-

General Hurley complained of the long lapse of time during which there was no public statement on our policy toward China from Presidents Roosevelt and Truman or Secretaries Hull, Stettinius and Byrnes. Yet he also spoke warmly of the support that these five men had given him while he was ambassadon to China. while he was ambassador to China.

It may be that we misunderstand the functions of an ambassador, but we have been led to believe that normally such a representative of our government in a foreign capital would receive guidance and instructions, as well as support, from the President and secretary of state.

As the local embodiment of his government, as observer and liaison man, he would know his government's fundamental policy. He would know of any alternations in it to meet changing conditions because, through his position, he would be the logical man to report on those conditions and to advise the best means of dealing with

But the inference from General Hurley's statements is that he was more than liaison man and adviser. He seems to have been making our foreign policy in China tians and the Philippines. by himself, improvising as best he could without a "public overseas service has earned him statement" on our Chinese policy to guide him.

There is the further inference from his charges that, when he was absent from Chungking, the next in command took up the job of policy-making as part of his interim duties. At least General Hurley charges George FELLOW GOT CLIPPED Acheson with sabotaging American policies, although the recommendations that Acheson made seem to have had little effect in Washington.

It may not be surprising that such a situation as General Hurley disclosed was allowed to develop. It is known that President Roosevelt was personally responsible for much of his foreign policy, and that this was only a part of his many war duties. There were a couple of quick changes in heads of the State Department. Both President Truman and Secretary Byrnes came to their present jobs with little diplomatic background. Undoubtedly the military has had more of a hand in foreign policy than it would have had in normal times.

But the fact that this mixup can be explained does not alter the conclusion that tightening up of State Department operation is urgently needed.

Big Five Rule

It is possible that the Big Three conference of foreign ministers in Moscow to discuss control of atomic energy may not be the last of such gatherings, in spite of the President's statement that the time had come to abandon big power meetings and let the United Nations Organization take over. In fact, it is quite possible that further conferences of Big Three and Big Five foreign ministers and even heads of state will be desirable and necessary.

Theoretically, of course, the President is right. But unfortunately the United Nations Organization, as it is now constituted, never will be able to function effectively until the Big Five are in agreement.

The remedy, so easy to prescribe and so hard to administer, is of course the repeal of the veto provision in the UNO Charter. It is cynical, unfair and undemocratic, and always has been. And so long as it exists, the United Nations Organization will be a Big Five meeting in essence anyway, with world affairs settled not by the majority will of the world's nations, but by the interests of the five strongest powers. And that in itself isn't conducive to peace or contentment.

Realistic Proposal

The first reports that Russia had asked the United States and Great Britain to submit the Arab-Jewish problem to a Big Five conference apparently caused some consternation in diplomatic circles. There was talk that the Soviet government was trying to muscle in on the Middle East; that its request was a rebuke to American and British proposals that the Big Three withdraw from Iran; that it would embarrass the recently-projected Anglo-American inquiry into the Jewish and Palestine situations, and so on.

Perhaps all this is so. It seems typical of the diplomatic suspicion that seems to know no nationality or boundary. But, leaving suspicion aside, why would the Russian proposal not be a sensible solution?

As the United Nations Organization is set up now, the Big Five will be running the world anyway. So why should they not begin now to try to settle the world's difficulties among themselves, if that's how it is going to be? "Well, Boys, What Do You Want Me To Bring You?"

ADVANCE WESTWARD

FROM the Gilberts, Admiral Nimitz turned to operation FLINTLOCK—the seizure of several atolls in the Marshall Islands. On 31 January 1944, after two days of intense air and naval bombardment, the 7th Division, veteran of Attu, landed on the islands of Kwajalein Atoll, while the 4th Marine Division attacked the northern tip at Namur and Roi. These divisions were part of the V Marine Am phibious Corps, commanded by Maj. Gen. Holland M. Smith. By 8 February all resistance had ceased. General Richardson wrote me after a flight to the Marshalls

"As a result of the air, naval, and artillery bombardment, the scene at Kwajalein was one of great devastation. The destruction was complete. Upon approaching it from the lagoon side, it gave the appearance of no-man's land in World War I and was even. greater, I think, than that of Betio on Tarawa. With the exception of the rubble left by concrete structures, there were no buildings standing. All those which had been made of any other ma-terial except concrete had been completely burned or destroyed. The result was that there were practically no stores left except a few packages of rice and a little here and there."
