Nationals Propose Marshall As Arbitrator, Reds Ask Truce

By SPENCER MOOSA

CHUNGKING-(AP)-The Chinese Central Government Lt. Col. G. A. Bond countered a Communist plan for a truce Monday by proposing to bring Gen. George C. Marshall to act as arbitrator and that a mliitary inspection mission, composed of Americans, serve as impartial observers to see that any armistice was obeyed. The move to bring the President's special envoy into the peace pic-ture came as Generalissimo Chiang

Kai-Shek made an outright bid to the Communists to join a government that would unify China. Chiang also called the longawaited peace parley of the political

consultative council to meet January 10. The government proposed that it and the Communists appoint representatives to confer with Mar-shall on procedure for halting hos-

tilities and restoring railroad communications. If accepted, the government's counter proposals would give Mar-shall a direct part in attempts to

avert all-out civil war. Shortly before the announcement that a plan had been submitted to the Communists in writing, the

generalissimo went on the air. In a New Year's message to the Chinese people, he announced that the government was ready to invite leaders of other political parties "to take part in the government, either in the policy-making councils or

> WASHINGTON-(A)-Adm. Har-old R. Stark asserted Monday that Adm. Husband E. Kimmel, Pacific Fleet commander at Hawaii, was amply warned to be on guard before the Japanese struck Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941.

The 1941 chief of naval operations began his story of pre-war events when the Senate-House committee investigating the Japanese attack resumed its hearings after a week-long Christmas recess.
