New Approach To Math Now At Jr. High

Haskell Jr. High has introduced a new approach to the teaching of basic concepts of math in the 8th grade classes this year. The program is entitled "Individualized Computational Skills Program." The teacher in charge of the

program is Mr. Wayne Phemister.

The program deals entirely with basic math skills. The skills are taught in sequence starting with whole numbers. The skills taught are addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Once a student has mastered these operations with whole numbers, he moves on to fractions, where he develops mastery of the same skills. He then moves on to decimals and finally to percents. At each stage a student works until he has developed a proficiency in that skill before he moves forward. He is tested on that particular

skill before he moves to another. At the beginning of the program, the students were given a pre-test to establish what skills they needed to work on. They were then placed at the skill level they have attained. The program is completely individualized. Each student works at his or her own level and progresses at his own rate.

Tree Planting Ceremony Set For Sat.

A special tree planting ceremony will be held at the Courthouse Lawn. The program is sponsored by the Garden Club, the Bicentennial Committee, the Texas Forest Service, and the Texas Forestry Association as an official American Revolution Bicentennial project. The ceremony will take place Saturday, Jan. 31 at 10:30 a.m.

A highlight of the ceremony will be the dedication and planting of a "Liberty Tree" by Jane McAdoo, mistress of ceremonies.

The Liberty Tree is a "Tejas" variety pecan. Pecan is the state tree of Texas, and "Tejas" (the Spanish word for Texas) is a new variety which grows well throughout the state and produces abundant shade and tasty fruit.

This Bicentennial pecan is called a Liberty Tree after the famous elm in colonial Boston under which the first act of public resistance occurred in 1765-the hanging in effigy of a newly-appointed stamp tax officer. This tree was a symbol of resistance to British rule, and many towns planted or dedicated their own Liberty Trees.

Judge Ratliff Jr.'s brothers also were prominent in West Texas politics. One brother, Bill Ratliff, is 39th District Court judge in Haskell, a post held previous by another brother, Dennis P. Ratliff. A third brother, David Ratliff of Abilene, is a former state senator from Stamford.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Monday at First United Methodist Church in Spur. The Rev. Archie Echols, pastor, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Norris Taylor, pastor of First Baptist Church, and the Rev. John May, pastor of First Christian Church.

Burial was in Spur Cemetery, directed by Campbell Funeral Home.

Born Nov. 13, 1908, in Decatur, they moved to Haskell County in 1921. His mother was the late Myra Pace Ratliff, a member of a pioneer family which moved to Texas in 1838. He was raised in Haskell and latter followed his father's profession of law. He graduated from Haskell High School in 1927, and

In 1957, he was appointed judge of the 110th District Court, a post he held until his death.

He married Marie Bybee March 12, 1933, in Hollis, Okla. He had lived in Spur since July 1933. He was a member of First United Methodist Church in Spur, where he served on the board of stewards.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. David Collier of Lubbock; five brothers, Dennis, Hugh and Judge Bill Ratliff, all of Haskell, O. B. of Lubbock and David of Abilene; three sisters, Mrs. C. T. West and Mrs. Lynn Pace Jr., both of Haskell, and Mrs. Paul Pearson of Orange; and two grandchildren.

Two brothers, Roy and T. J., preceded him in death.



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

WASHINGTON, D.C.-THE FOLLOWING IS A GENERAL APPRAISAL of what the second Session of the 94th Congress, which kicked off this past week, may be like. As is always the case in

an election year, there is less time and inclination for Congress to tackle tough issues. Sure, the rhetoric grows more shrill and lines draw tighter but compromise between a Republican President and a two-to-one Democratic Congress diminishes.

THE NEW BUDGET PRO-CESS INTENDED TO RE-**CAPTURE CONGRESSIONAL** control over spending imposes tight deadlines. Coming soon is the real test of this law passed a year ago. It is now becoming fully implemented but is already being challenged. For a Committee to exceed ceilings for its spending, a special waiver has to be made and last week the first was requested. The request comes from the Subcommittee on **Unemployment Compensation** in the approximate amount of something over \$6 billion. In addition, it raises the taxable base and increases the rates on employers. The unemployment compensation provision is some 40 years old in law but is becoming more like another welfare program than insurance

BY MARCH 15, ALL MAJOR COMMITTEES OF THE CONGRESS, OF WHICH there are 14, must submit to the Budget Committee cost estimates for all legislation they expect to report this year. 



raveled many of the mysteries concerning heart ailments. In addition, dramatic advances have been made in repairing congenital and acquired cardiovascular abnormalities. Surgical techniques make possible the repair and replace ment of damaged portions of the heart and blood vessels. A great deal of research is

being done today in this field. Some studies with animals indicate that atherosclerosis may be reversed.

Atherosclerosis is a slow, prograssive diesase that sets the stage for heart attack and stroke. In this disease, which may have its beginnings early in life, the linings of the arteries become thickened and roughened by deposits of fat, fibrin (a clotting material),

cellular debris and calcium. The continuing buildup can cause a clot to form which will block the channel and deprive the heart, brain or other organs of blood.


Autopsies of children killed in accidents, or who have died of other cuases, reveal the beginnings of the atherosclerotic process. And, autopsies of servicemen killed during the Korean War revealed that, in some cases, the atherosclerotic process had already reached advanced stages by the early 20's and 30's.

Heart attack usually is thought of as sudden, but in all likelihood coronary disease has been building over the years, helped along by the patient who has ignored the risk factors and failed to heed the early warning signs.

"Prevention" is a word heard often today in medical discussion of heart attacks.



disabled to make maximum use of vocational rehabilitation services offered by state and federal governments. The agreement calls for increased coordination in medical rehab-

ilitation research, vocational rehabilitation of the handicapped, use of special facilities, job placement, and employer relationships. The VA officials said they

were pleased to update the agreement, noting progress attained since the program was started in 1971. Past cooperation between the federal agencies was emphasized by Dr. Adams who described the VA as "a vital link in the

rehabilitation of disabled Americans.
