Plans for the Haskell City-County Bicentennial week-long celebration for June 28 through July 4 are taking shape, Jane McAdoo, chairman, has announced.

The events will begin with a parade to be held downtown around the square at 5 p.m. Monday, June 28. The parade committee is Bettye McBroom, chairman. John Wayne McDermett, and C. O. Holt. Entries in the parade will reflect the Bicentennial theme.

Slated for 8:45 p.m. on two nights, June 28 and 29, is the historical pageant at Rice Springs Park. Responsible for the planning of the pageant are Nancy Toliver, Bebe Middleton and David Hill.

Two days, July 2 and 3, will be devoted to an Arts and Crafts show and sale in the Haskell County corral building. A committee composed of Eunice Helweg, Paula Everett, and Alice Yates will plan this event.

Saturday, July 3, an old-fashioned evening of family entertainment is planned to be held in Rice Springs Park. There will be a picnic supper and games for every person, young and old, who wishes to participate.

The climax for the observance will be Sunday, July 4, at 8:45 p.m. when a gigantic religious and patriotic service, with music presented by combined church and school choirs from throughout the county, will be held in the park. A patriotic fireworks display will close the celebration.

However, both teams made a good account of themselves and also got to play in the gym in which the Regional Tournament will be held. The regional will be held April 8, 9, and 10.

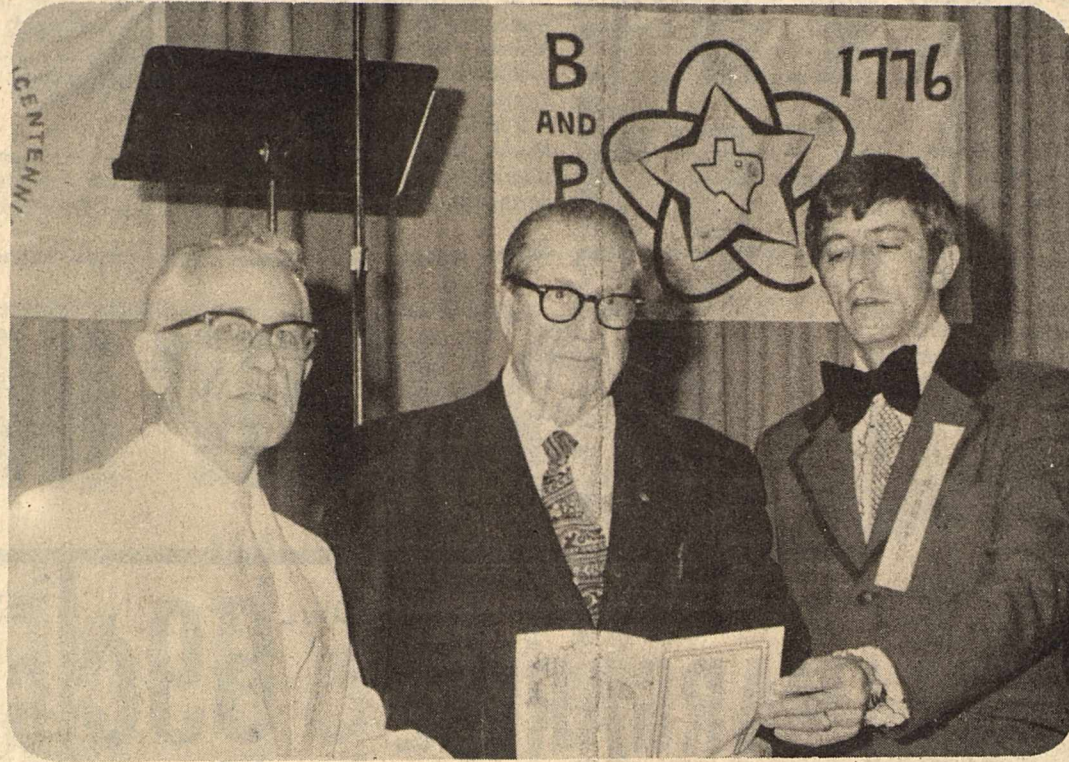

Haskell Orders Two Ambulances

A joint meeting of the City council, Commissioners Court, and the Hospital Board met Tuesday morning at 9 a.m. at the City Hall. The meeting was to discuss and secure an ambulance service for Haskell.

Holden-McCauley Funeral Home discontinued their ambulance service March 31.

Mayor Belton Duncan opened the meeting and turned it over to Don Comedy, coordin-

ator for Concerted Services. Comedy presented several proposals for the groups to look over.

Jerry Weatherly, hospital administrator, told the group that he had checked into the cost of operating an ambulance service and it would run between 16 to 20,000 dollars a year for maintenance, upkeep, salaries, etc. He also stated that a used ambulance would cost \$5,000.00 and you could lease a new one for \$325.00 per month for three years. At the end of the lease the purchase price would be approximately \$1,500.00.

After discussing all aspects and proposals, a motion was made and seconded to buy one used ambulance and to lease one new one, with the three groups dividing the cost equally.

At the present time the ambulance service will be run on a voluntary basis.

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CONSERVATION VIEWPOINTS USDA Soil Conservation Service

Assisting

California Creek and Wichita-Brazos

Soil and Water Conservation Districts

Wind erosion continues to be a serious hazard to land, crops and health in the Haskell Area.

Numerous inquires are being received by our Washington office from the Administration, Congress and the news media concerning the wind erosion conditions in the drought stricken Great Plains area.

The problem is just more than locally blowing dust and high winds. Each Soil Conservation Service office in the Great Plains area of the United States are submitting monthly reports on wind erosion conditions in our separate locales.

During the early part of March, Haskell suffered considerable damage in the north, northwest, and down into the

central part of the county. We have several check points throughout the area. Either after or during a heavy wind storm were visible dust in the air, some member of the SCS staff at Haskell makes the 75-mile roundtrip to check on conditions.

We have already suffered some 10000 acres of damaged land during March, bringing our total for the "blow season" to a total of 18,300 acres. Last Friday's blow is not include, but it is estimated to have added another five to six thousand acres to the total. Some five hundred acres of crops have been so severely damaged that no harvesting will attempted.

Emergency tillage continues to be about the only solution that we have. That is, until we get some good soaking rains, and the wind quits blowing.

Every farmer is hereby urged to take every preventive precaution at your disposal to stop the soil from blowing.

Harold Couch, member of the Texas Department of Public Safety from Mineral Wells will speak Tuesday, April 6 at 7:30 p.m. in the

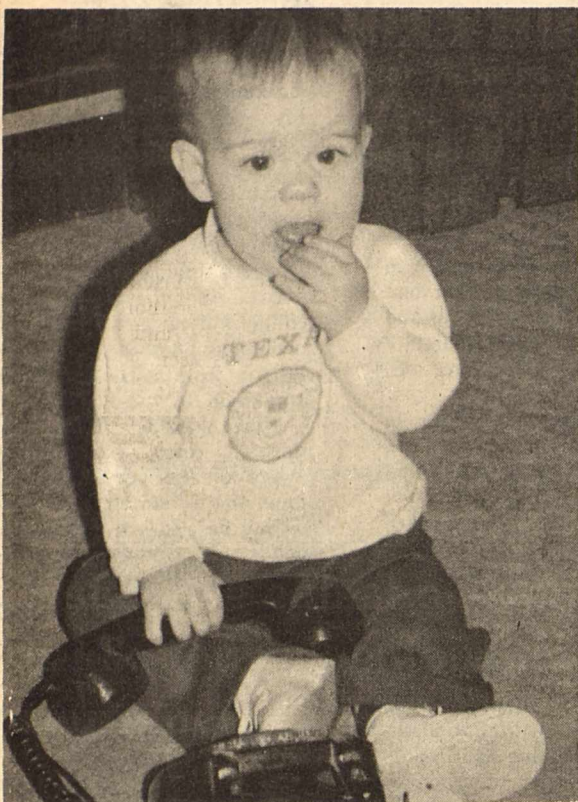

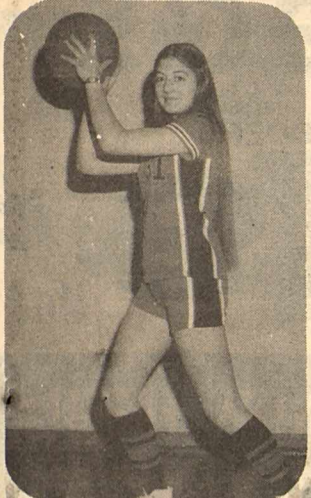

Region 14 Education Service Center is sponsoring its second regional Art Fair March 29-April 9 to provide an opportunity for elementary students in region 14 (excluding the Abilene Public schools who always have their own show) to display examples of their creative abilities for others to see. 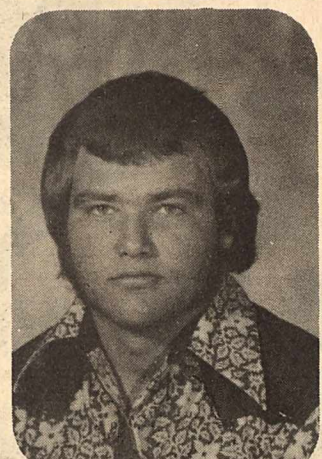

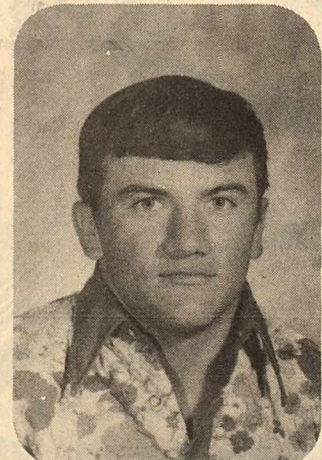

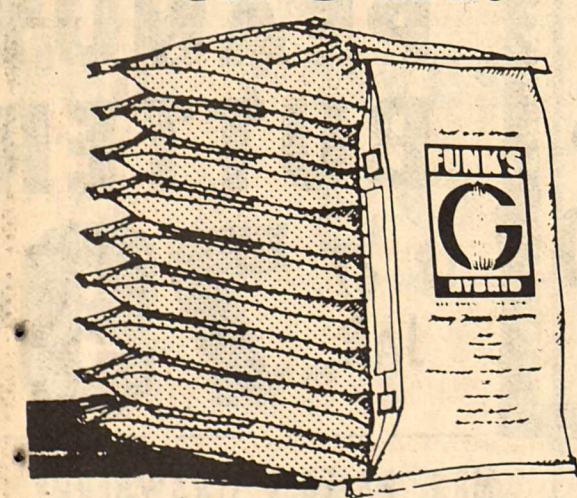

Controlled traffic farming is a concept getting a lot of attention lately . . . and probably even more in the future. Idea of the operation is to keep tractors moving only on surfaces not used for crops. Basically that seems quite unreasonable since the crops are in the field and it is usually necessary to get the tractor out there to do any good. None of that has changed. With controlled traffic farming the tractor would be driven on paths between the rows. Paths used only for the machinery. In most concepts of this type operation the paths would be the only points of compaction in the field. Therein lies the reason for concern. If compaction can be reduced, root systems can be more completely developed and higher yields would result. At Auburn University in Alabama a controlled traffic farm experiment resulted in a yield 43 percent higher than crops grown with conventional tillage.

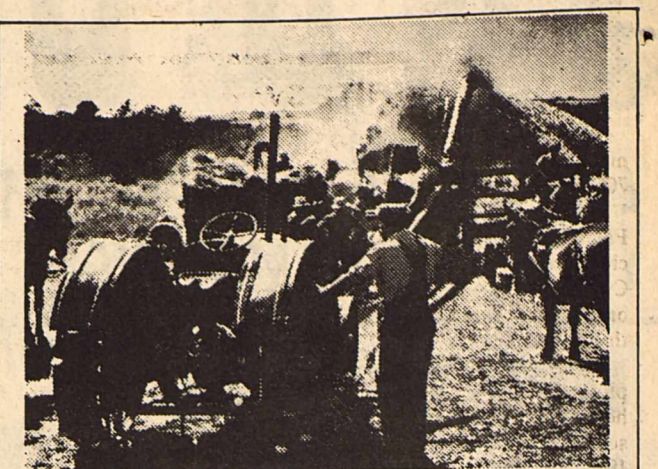

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Haskell Bicentennial Happenings

Third stop on the Bicentennial Tour of Homes will be at 701 North Avenue F.

Now home to Mr. and Mrs. Pat Henry and their three children, Harry, Patricia, and Cynthia, this house was built on "Brick Street" in 1905 by the Kester family.

Mrs. Kester, an accomplished artist, decided to move her studio and home to Dallas so the house was purchased in 1912 by the Courtney Hunt family.

The Hunts lived there five years and sold it to Mrs. Annie Belle Smith.

Sometime after 1930 the Gay family bought the house and lived in it for 25 to 30 years. It then remained vacant for a number of years.

In 1973 the house was sold to Bill and Clydene Comedy who spent several months renovating the inside of the house.

In May, 1974 it was purchased by the Henry's.

Though "modernized" the house retains much of its charm and style, with its 12 foot ceilings, wood facings with detailed trim, and original oval metal door knobs with beaded edged plates.

The front door of heavy wood is the original with its oval beveled glass, and opens into the wide hall. An old wood box which was once placed by the fireplace is in

the hall and has on it the same carved design as that seen on facings and moldings throughout the house.

Also in the hall is a gold velvet antique chair with beautifully carved back that Charley bought in Calgary, Canada before she was married.

The focal point of the bedroom to the left of the hallway is the mantel with its carved posts and bevelled mirror. An unusual design is repeated on the panels of the mantel; it appears to be a knotted ribbon and perhaps antique buffs will know what it is. On the mantel is a Seth Thomas clock with sundial which belonged to Pat's grandfather.

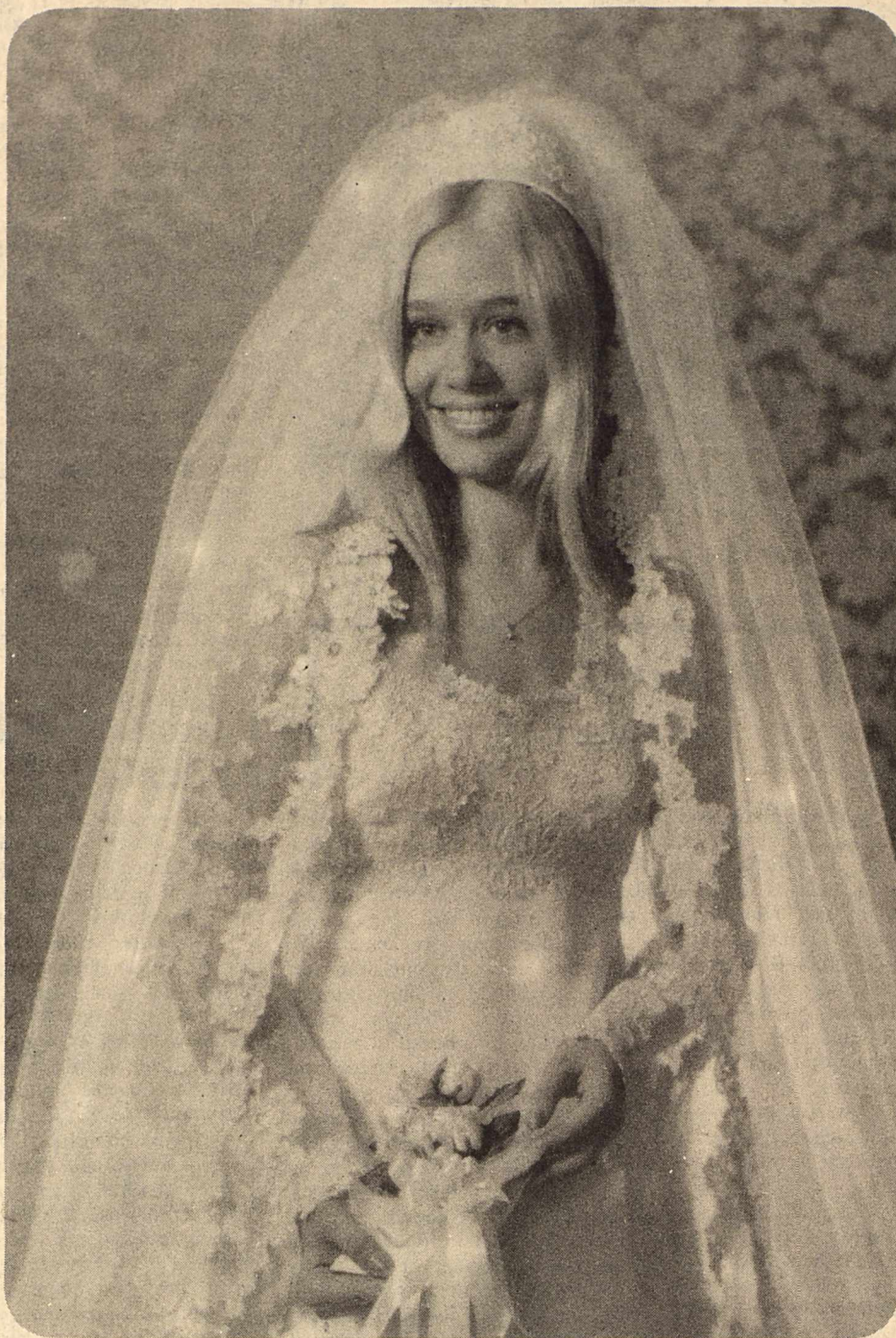
