Controlled traffic farming is a concept getting a lot of attention lately . . . and probably even more in the future. Idea of the operation is to keep tractors moving only on necessary to get the tractor out there to do any good. None of that has changed. With controlled traffic farming the tractor would be driven on paths between the rows. Paths used only for the machinery. In most concepts of this type operation the paths would be the only points of compaction in the field. Therein lies the reason for concern. If compaction can be reduced, root systems can be more completely developed and higher yields would result. At Auburn University in Alabama a controlled traffic farm experiment resulted in a yield 43 percent higher than crops grown with conventional tillage.

Now home to Mr. and Mrs. Pat Henry and their three children, Harry, Patricia, and Cynthia, this house was built on "Brick Street" in 1905 by the Kester family.

Mrs. Kester, an accomplished artist, decided to move her studio and home to Dallas so the house was purchased in 1912 by the Courtney Hunt

The Hunts lived there five years and sold it to Mrs. Annie Belle Smith.

Sometime after 1930 the Gay family bought the house and lived in it for 25 to 30 years. It then remained vacant for a number of years.

In 1973 the house was sold to Bill and Clydene Comedy who spent several months renovating the inside of the house.

In May, 1974 it was purchased by the Henry's.

Though "modernized" the house retains much of its charm and style, with its 12 foot ceilings, wood facings with detailed trim, and original oval metal door knobs with beaded edged plates.






