The pecan weevil, one of the most damaging pecan pests, will soon begin to lay eggs in developing pecans in Haskell County. To prevent pecan weevil damage the adult female weevils must be controlled before they deposit eggs in the developing pecan. Once the eggs have been deposited control measures will not be effective.

pecan weevil adults emerge from the soil and move into pecan trees to mate and deposit their eggs. After an egg has been deposited the larva will develop inside the pecan, cut a hole in the shell about 1/8 inch in diameter and emerge from the pecan as a fully grown larva in late October or November. Larvae will tunnel into the soil 4 to 12 inches. Much of the pecan weevil's 2 to 3 year life cycle is spent as a larva in the soil. Larvae that enter the soil this fall will emerge in August of 1978 with the exception of about 10% of these larvae which will emerge as adults during August of 1979.

When pecan weevil infestations are severe this pest can destroy a large portion of the pecan crop. Feeding of adults weevils causes the nuts in the water stage to drop. After the kernel begins to harden the nut is susceptible to egg laying. Adult weevil populations in the orchard will vary greatly from year to year but in heavily infested orchards pecan weevil populations will probably be present in most years.

Insecticide applications should be applied to pecans as the pecans reach the gel stage, the transition from the water to the soft dough stage. This can be determined by cutting through the developing pecan kernel to determine if it contains water or gel. Two or three applications of Sevin (R) may be needed to effectively control pecan weevil infestation. Reapply the insecticide if rain occurs soon after the application. There should be an interval of 10-14 days between applications. When using any pesticide read and follow the directions given on the pesticide label carefully and use the insecti-

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



Branding with confetti is making things rougher for grain thieves. Grain pro-ducers are picking up the old practice of marking small slips of paper with identifying numbers and mixing the **Fashioned** numbers and mixing the confetti with their stored grain crop. According to producers who have been using the confetti method for some time, it takes only about seven pounds of the paper to adequately mark and identify 50,000 bushels of grain. Although the small slips of paper are virtually impossible for thieves to separate from the grain, mill operators report they have no problem in removing the confetti during their washing process. Agricultural authorities in areas where the grain identification program is used extensively report a re-markable decline in the number of grain thefts.

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that field audits and desk examinations by his Field Operations Division during the month of July revealed an all-time one-month high of \$18.3 million in additional revenue owed the state.

Field audits alone totaled \$15 million for the month as compared to \$18.6 million for the entire calendar year 1974. "Investing in a sound,

aggressive audit program is were read and amended to better than hitting it lucky on the stock market," said Bullock.

The Comptroller said field audits and enforcement officer desk examinations have turned up \$88.6 million during fiscal 1976 so far, exclusive of field collections.

Checks totaling \$14.5 million were mailed out to 659 cities and towns as their August rebate of the one-cent

city sales tax they collect.

The August remittance check for Haskell was reported by the Comptroller to be in the amount of \$4693.22. This amount was \$3004.02 more than last month.





CONSERVATION VIEWPOINTS **USDA Soil Conservation Service**

Assisting

California Creek and Wichita-Brazos

Soil and Water Conservation Districts

James D. "Jim" Hudson, allocation are limited to Soil Conservationist on the Haskell Field Office staff, Soil Conservation Service, has been promoted to the General Service grade 9. Jim will continue his duties at Haskell.

In addition to Hudson's regular duties of assisting farmers and ranchers of Haskell County plan and apply conservation measures, he has been assigned the responsibility of administering the Great Plains Conservation Program in Haskell County.

Hudson will also assist in the coordination of activities with the Boards of Directors of the California Creek and the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and the Haskell County Agricultural Conservation Program.

Farmers in the 460 Great Plains counties will be eligible for added wind erosion control cost-sharing. The USDA has announced that \$15 million has been added to the 1976 ACP for this purpose. The funds will be available only in counties which now participate in the Great Plains Conservation Program and will provide for 50 to 90 percent of the cost of installing wind erosion control mea-

sures. The Haskell County ASCS Committee is taking this additional program under advisement, and will announce their proposed program

later in August. Cost-sharing with the supplemental funds will be limited to three practices: establishing field wind breaks, permanent vegetative cover, and strip cropping systems. Special practices to solve unique local problems may also be approved.

Only annual conservation agreements will be available. The USDA also points out that payments to a farmer under the 1976 ACP, including both regular payments and payments under this special

\$2,500.

ASCS committees have been allocated \$10 million in the 10 GPCP states. The additional \$5 million will be held for GPCP states which justify additional needs.

The supplemental funds were initially appropriated by Congress for immediate relief of drought-caused wind erosion problems. Because the drought has broken, the money is to be used for permanent conservation practices that will help prevent recurrence of the soil-blowing

Any farmer or rancher interested in any one or all three of the aforementioned wind erosion control measures is urged to let your ASCS County Committeeman know of your interests prior to the next regular meeting of the ASCS County Committee on August 23. By so registering your interest, we will know what measures to include in the program.

Back To School **Shot Time**

The A/New Jersey (swine) flu immunization program may make parents overlook other immunizations their children need before they can enter Texas schools.

State law requires children have adequate polio, DPT (diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus), measles and rubella vaccinations before they can attend school, the Texas Medical Association says. Some school districts have additional requirements such as a smallpox vaccination or a tuberculosis tine test. In addition to these required procedures, a physician may feel additional inoculations would help a particular person. A doctor also can give advice on whether or not an individual can medically tolerate certain vaccinations

About 5 percent of Texas

school children and an estimated 10-20 percent of the preschool population do not have complete immunizations. a Texas Department of Health Resources (TDHR) spokesman

Even this relatively high Texas immunization level is only a small margin of protection for the public. About 35 percent of the national preschool population has incomplete immunizations and as a result there has been a recent nationwide outbreak of measles, says John Witte, M.D., the U.S. Center for Disease Control's immunization director. The outbreak. centered mainly in the Midwest, probably can be traced to cutbacks in massive immunization programs two years ago, Dr. Witte says. A similar effect was noted in

Texas immunization standards before a child can enter school include three doses of polio vaccine with at least one dose given after the fourth birthday. By the time many children are one year old, they have had three doses of polio vaccine and three DPT vaccinations. Texas does not require polio vaccinations for students over age 19. Three doses of DPT vaccine with at least one dose given after the fourth birthday also are necessary. DPT vaccine helps protect against diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough) and tetanus.

The state also requires on measles vaccination and one rubella (German measles) vaccination. Children should be a least one year old before receiving these vaccines. If a child is 12 or older the state waives the requirements for measles and rubella vaccin-

Parents wondering about their child's immunization records should check their own records if they know they are updated. If there is any doubt contact the physician or health department that gave the last injection. Physicians, local health departments or TDHR also can give general information on necessary injections. 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
