Sign Up Now For Boll Weevil Spray Program

Haskell County cotton producers have the opportunity to help themselves with matching funds available from the Texas Department of Agriculture to increase cotton production by signing up for the fall Cotton Boll Weevil Diapause Program.

The fall Diapause Spray Program is designed to kill boll weevils before they leave the cotton fields in the fall and thus keep them from going into overwintering quarters. The program calls for six aerial applications beginning September 6th and ending the first week in November. The material to be used is sixteen ounces of low volume Guthion per acre.

Farmers are asked to check with the Boll Weevil office in Rule at the Rule Co-Op Gin and sign up their acres on the map. If there are any questions concerning the program please call 817/997-

This program is of great importance to producers, landlords, and to the over-all economy of Haskell County.

Sen. Farabee In Lower 25% In Spending



being distributed by one of the research organizations of Texas A&M. Dr. Robert Branson, director of the Texas Agricultural Market Research and Development Center, recently summarized the report by specifying three actions which could improve cotton contracting. Since one of the major shortcomings of crop contracting has been the refusal to honor some contracts, Dr. Branson suggested formation of a central reporting agency . . . one which would provide financial information on buyers and delivery information on producers. Other suggestions called for a crop disaster clause in every contract and development of low-cost Government crop contracting insurance. 

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

Mrs. B. Kupatt is visiting Men Charged With Water Hyacinth Sale

BROWNWOOD-Two men have been arrested and charged with selling water hyacinths, classified under state law as potentially harmful noxious aquatic vegetation.

The pair, listing San Antonio home addresses, was arrested in Comanche by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens. According to an ongoing investigation, the men allegedly sold what they termed 'Spanish hyacinth' to retail firms in North Central Texas. An Angelo State University professor, however, identified the plants as Eichhornia azurea, or water hyacinths, native to Brazil.

According to law, it is unlawful to sell, import, transfer or release these plants without a permit, says Lou Guerra, P&WD noxious vegetation control program director.

At the time of their arrest, some 180 plants were confiscated from the men by law officers. Retail outlets in Comanche, Eastland, Brownwood, Abilene, Haskell and San Angelo so far have been traced as having bought plants from the suspects.

There were indications that similar sales of suspected water hyacinths were made to retailers in Midland, Lubbock, Fort Worth and San Antonio.

Refunds of premiums already paid are usually limited to one year prior to the



PEANUT FUDGE CAKE

2 squares unsweetened chocolate 2/3 cup butter 1-1/2 cups sugar

1/2 tsp. baking soda ½ tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla

3 egg yolks 2 cups cake flour 34 tsp. baking powder 1 cup Texas peanuts 2/3 cup buttermilk

Melt chocolate over hot, but not boiling, water. Set aside to cool. Combine butter, sugar, baking soda, salt and vanilla and beat until fluffy. Add egg yolks and melted chocolate. Blend well. Sift together flour and baking powder. Use 1/4 cup of the flour mixture to coat the peanuts. To the creamed mixture, add 1-34 cups flour alternately with buttermilk. Stir in floured peanuts. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into chocolate batter. Pour into two greased and floured 8-inch cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes. Let layers cool 10 minutes. Remove from pans and allow to cool. Frost with Peanutty Fudge Icing. Yield: 28-inch round layers.

PEANUTTY FUDGE ICING

2 squares unsweetened chocolate 6 Tbsp. butter

3 cups sifted confectioners sugar 1/2 cup chopped Texas peanuts

Melt chocolate over hot, but not boiling, water. Allow to cool. Cream butter, Add confectioners sugar gradually, with electric beater at low speed. Beat in melted chocolate at high speed, mixing until icing is fluffy. Stir in peanuts. Frost Peanut Fudge Cake. Can garnish top of cake with additional Texas peanuts.

Real leather, suede and their fabulous fakes are continuing as one of the most popular outerwear categories for everyone this fall. Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Extension Agent, reports.

Current styles feature more detailing and fashionable design variations. Popular colors include buttery tans and earth tones of rust, mocha and brown shades.

She pointed out that real leathers and suedes are more expensive than a year ago.

Costs from cowhides have risen almost 50 per cent, while sheep, lamb and pig skin coats have remained stable. Sharply soaring costs of real fur-five to 100 per cent higher-and lamb shearling trims will limit their availability except in the more expensive price ranges.

Realistic-looking, and more affordable, fake fur trims will be seen in the popular price ranges. Real and fake fur trimmed styles will be more popular than a year ago-as much as one-third of the market.

Since outerwear garments are a major investment, the agent suggested that consumers should shop carefully.

Real leather and suede garments should be well-matched in color and texture. They should be supple enough to conform comfortable to the body during wear. If possible, lift the lining and examine the wrong side of the leather or suede. If it is a different color on the wrong side, any surface scuffs will be visible.

Garments should fit comfortable since alterations are difficult. Stitching cannot be let out without showing. Restitching in the same place further perforates and weakens it.

Care instructions should be followed exactly. Often special procedures or cleaning specialists are recommended. Some fakes are only washable or dry cleanable, not both, or may be neither.

Also, it is wise to save all hang tags and the sales slip in case the garment does not perform satisfactorily after following the recommended care instructions and needs to be returned to the store, she





Reports Still **Being Received**

The County Extension Office continues to receive lab reports of water wells containing bacteria and other growth in the County says County Extension Agents Max Stapleton and Barbara Elliott.

All wells should be sanitized upon completion and after each time repairs are made to the system and/or when contamination has been detected. Any cause of contamination should be found and corrected before sanitizing. The following procedure is recommended

1. Make sure there are no unsafe connections (improper submerged water outlets as in water tanks, etc.)

2. Chlorinate the well-11/2 pints of liquid chlorine (bleach may be used) mixed with 5 (five) gallons of water is sufficient to treat 100 gallons of well water. Solution should be poured into the well allowing the solution to run down the casing walls.

3. Open all outlets and allow them to run until chlorine can be smelled.

4. All needed drinking water should be stored in advance. (Treated water will not hurt livestock, except they probably will not drink it.)

5. Allow the chlorine solution to stay in the water system for 24 hours.

6. After 24 hours, open all outlets until the chlorine odor can no longer be detected. Water well should be sealed after being properly sanitized.

Army Wants Helicopter **Pilots**

Want to be a "chopper jockey", a "whirleybird pilot" or in Army lingo a "helicopter

According to the local U.S. Army recruiting office, the Army makes this opportunity available to young men and women under the Warrant Officer Flight Training (WOFT) program enlistment

The number of openings is limited and the qualifications are stringent, but individuals who complete all phases of training are appointed warrant officers in the Army.

To qualify, an applicant must be between the ages of 18 and 27 years, attain qualifying scores on the mental tests, and pass the flight physical examination. If an individual does not have a high school diploma, a GED certificate plus two years of college is required.

Nine months of WOFT at Fort Rucker, Alabama, follow completion of the Army's basic training. The flight training is divided into three phases: four weeks of preflight indoctrination; 12 weeks primary flight training including 85 hours of instructions in small helicopter, aero-dynamics, meteorolgy and other subjects; and 22 weeks of advanced flight training of 115 hours of schooling on the UH-1 (Huey) helicopter, plus related courses such as instrument and maintenance.

Then comes graduation, the awarding of the warrant officer bars and the flight wings, and an assignment as an Army helicopter pilot.

The full nine months of WOFT are physically and the state. mentally demanding, those who complete the course know that the bars and wings are well worth the time and effort spent earning them.

The Army invited young men and women interested in the Warrant Officer Flight Training Program to visit or call their local recruiting office for complete details of the program.

County Roads **Get Attention**

Highway improvement project in the Haskell County area are included in the 1976 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement, recently approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Roger Welsch of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation said work in this area includes reconditioning base and resurfacing of SH283 from Rochester to Rule for a distance of 8.3 miles.

Similar programs had been conducted annually until last year. At that time there was no such program because of the financial crunch facing the State Departments of Highways and Public Transportation. Funds remain short for highway work in Texas and most other states in the nation because of soaring inflation and diminishing growth rates of available revenues.

Department officials, however, note that such programs cannot be deferred for long without serious effects. Types of work included in the program will provide extra measurers of safety, increase traffic capacity and convenience, and rehabilitate old and obsolete sections. Programs such as this are necessary to prevent deterioration of the highway system and a resulting decline in mobility.

The program provides for improvement of a total of 3,164.8 miles of highways and FM roads with 58 per cent assigned to US and State numbered route, 39 per cent for FM routes and 3 per cent reserved for later assignment. In all, the program includes

Hold Your Nose And Bear It

Many people consider skunks to be odorous, obnoxious pests that should be avoided at all costs and even eliminated on sight. However, these animals are generally beneficial due to their preference for grubs and mice. They range throughout the U. S. and in many states are considered to be important furbearers.

They are nocturnal in habit, preferring to hunt at night for grubs, insects, small rodents. carrion, fruits and berries, unripened corn, mushrooms and other food items. They are, also fond of poultry and eggs, and when circumstances permit, will raid chicken houses and poultry yards. Although they rarely range more than half a mile from their den, these short-legged animals, may, on occasion, travel much further during a night's hunting.

Any sheltered place may be used as a den. In the urban area, spaces under homes, or unused buildings make acceptable places for dens. Active dens sometimes may be recognized by fresh droppings near the exterior. Tracks

are excellent marks of identifi-

Skunks are an important reservoir of rabies and in some states they are the primary wildlife carrier of this disease. Therefore, human contact with skunks should be avoided. If it is necessary to handle a skunk or a specimen from a skunk, impermeable gloves or rubber or plastic should be It is not desirable to destroy

skunks needlessly. In fact. when they are living or raising young under buildings, attempts to destroy them may result in the release of their noxious scent. Before attemptremoval, a tracking powder such as flour or any other similar substance should be sprinkled liberally in and around the entrances. An examination after dark will show whether the animals have left to forage for food and which openings are used as exits. Tracks may also, reveal the number of skunks involved. When the animals have left, all possible entrances should be closed with sheet metal or wire netting. Plans for closure should be made before tracking powders are

When skunks dig in lawns, they are searching for grubs and other insects. Control of the insects, resulting in loss of the skunks' food, will discourage such burrowing. Insecticides are commonly used for this purpose.

Skunk odors on pets. clothing, under buildings, etc., may be neutralized by the liberal use of a commercial

deodorant. The use of vinegar, tomato juice or a weak solution of household ammonia is also, suggested for removing the odor from clothing. Chloride of lime can be used to deodorize soil contaminated with skunk scent.




