R-PEP meeting: Held in the Abilene Civic Center, the 10th meeting attracted members from all 29 counties in R-PEP, one of seven area economic development programs operative

in Texas. Among speckers at the Center was Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which helped the 29 county program building committees sponsor the meeting.

Gross income from Rolling Plains agriculture has been increased two-fold (to \$400 million annually) in 10 years, and this Pfannstiel said he attributed to activities generated by R-PEP, and not very much to inflation. He also assured his audience that the county Extension staff would remain the basic educational unit of a Texas Agricultural Extension Service devoted to helping people identify and solve their own problems in agriculture family living.

Dr. Pfannstiel said the Extension Service would continue getting to the right people at the right time the knowledge gained through research by scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and he added that the future of Texas agriculture appeared bright to

Entomologist Emory P. Boring III told the R-PEP audience that the Extension Service will begin Oct. 15 training persons—especially farmers and ranchers-who want to be certified by the Texas Department of Agriculture to use, as private applicators, restricted pesti-

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

#### NUMBER ONE -ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

Borlaug, now associated with the Rockefeller Foundation in Mexico City, said the public does not understand the necessity of the profit motive to increase production. The Houston management quoted the scientist as saying, "If a farmer can't improve his standard of living, he will not adopt the new technologies". He said the hope of feeding a growing world depends on technological advances. Point-ing to last year's uproar over foreign grain sales, Borlaug said the public talked about "our grain" as though it was public property. This in effect was making a decision which affected the income of the producer without consulting the

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



#### Things Have Happened In Haskell

(Editors Note: The following is an article taken from the September issue of the Education Service Center, Region 14 Newscene).

On the wall of the spacious board room in Haskell's ISD's new administration building hangs a dream. It is an architects conception of what the school system might become one day. Just because it is "pie in the sky" hasn't discouraged Kenneth Sams. Superintendent. He is plugging along, adding to and mproving what the school already has.

One who didn't know would never guess that the administration building, used to be a hamburger "joint". It was a lucky break for Haskell that the owner of the drive-in restaurant didn't like kids, and they were his main business since the building is located directly across the street from the school. Haskell ISD bought and remodeled the building for a song. It houses the superintendent's office, a board room and the tax office.

In an agricultural community such as Haskell an active agricultural program is important to the continual growth of the community. To accomplish this goal Haskell ISD has built a vocational agricultural building which will be used for instructional classes where the students can learn a wide variety of things: animal science, soil science, plant science and ag mech-

The boys work on small gasoline engines such as are found in tractors and lawn mowers: they weld; they learn to operate power equipments; and they work with metal and wood. All of this is labeled general agriculture machinery a practical application which can be used in everyday farm

Two classrooms are separated by a folding partition. When the partition is open, the classrooms become a large meeting room which is used by the Haskell County Chapter of the Young Farmers of

The tool room would delight any mechanic-a place for everything and everything in its place. Now the overhead storage isn't that neat; but it is big, and there's room to put

all kinds of things out of sight. Sams, being on his toes and fully aware of the ramifications of Title IX, had dressing rooms for both boys and girls included in the new Ag Building. The administration feels sure that this fall some girls will enter the program for the first time.

Perhaps the most impressive aspect of the new building is that is was built with available funds and no bond election was needed.

There is nothing wrong with Haskell's gym except that the floor has never been refinished since the gym was built in 1956. When school opens this fall, the whole building will be

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
