

Haskell Falls To Stamford

The Haskell Indians suffered their first defeat at the • hands of the Stamford Bulldogs last Friday night 28 to 20. The Indians were on the lip of the goal when the game was over but were not successful in getting the possible tying touchdown over the goal line. The Indians were hampered all night with fumbles and untimely penalties. Also, the Bulldogs were successful in moving the ball with dives and counterplays. Stamford had very quick backs who several times simply darted by the Haskell defense.

The Indians open their quest for a district championship against the Paducah Dragons at Haskell at 7:30 Friday. Paducah is rebuilding this year. However, they do have good speed in their backfield. Paducah has a new head coach, Judd Parker, former asst. coach at Stamford. The conference race is shaping up as a horse race between 3 and possibly 4 teams. The Indians are expected to be right in the thick of the fight, but need all the encouragement and fan support they can get. Hopefully everyone can turn out for the game Friday night and the pep rally at 3:00 Friday afternoon.

Last Friday night the Indians received the kickoff but fumbled it away to Stamford starting the trend of the evening. However, the Haskell defense stiffened and held on downs. The Indians then took the ball and ripped for 3 1st downs before being forced to punt. This drive was stopped by a fumble. However, the Indians again played tough on defense, stopped the Bulldogs and forced a punt. Then on the first play of the next series Kelvin Marshall swept leftend behind a wave of excellent blocks, outran the Stamford secondary for a 55 yd. touchdown. Gary Mc Adams kicked the extra point which made the score 7 to 0 at the quarter.

The Bulldogs then took the ball and marched over 80 yards to score and tie the score. On the 1st play after the kick-off, Kelvin Marshall swept right end for 55 yds. and another touchdown. 

In an effort to increase donor participation, civic clubs and organizations, churches, and businesses are being asked to recruit donors. As donors are registered they will be asked what organization they represent.


This Blood Program makes it possible for your blood needs to be covered, as well as saving the lives of others. If you need blood in a hospital outside this county please:

After the horse is out, it is too late to repair the fence, the old adage says. So it is with wind erosion control. Once the soil starts blowing from lack of proper cover, it is so often too ate to stop the blowing.

I certify that the statements made by me

Soil Conservation Service field reports from 352 counties in the 10-state area of the Great Plains showed 6.2 million acres damaged from November 1975 to May 1976, compared to 3.8 million acres during the same period a year ago. More than 90 percent of

the damage was to cropland. Haskell Field Office of SCS covers the entirety of Haskell County in this reporting. Our 1975-1976 damage was 20,500 acres, and was only 1500 acres

for the same period a year States reflecting the highest percentage of damage increase were Kansas, Oklahoma, and Nebraska. But Texas reported the most land damaged, nearly 1.6 million acres, but that figure is less than the 2 million acres damaged in Texas the year

before. SCS considers land damaged if enough soil has been removed or deposited to subject the land to further erosion hazard, to materially lower yields, or to impair its

capacity to produce. Crops or cover, preferably, growing crops, is still our best source of control. However, weather conditions so often limit the heavy growth of cover crops in the early fall months, that their effectiveness is not measureable in

controlling wind erosion. Dead litter, provided by maize residues, left standing in the field, cotton burs applied to the land in amounts of three to five tons per acre, or old hav spread over the land and tucked into the top of the soil are considered very good wind erosion control measur-

Maize harvesting is well underway, and many have started some type of plowing of this residue. For the sake of the land, if you must plow, plow with sweeps, shallow, leaving most or all of the residues on the soil surface to protect the soil from blowing. Many producers feel that the maize residues must be "turned under" for it to properly decay prior to next year's crop. This isn't always true. In periods of drought, residues completely turned under are often found the next

spring in the same condition

or state that they were in when

turned under. Residues left on the surface will often deteriorate must faster due to the action of the elements, such as freezing and thawing, snow or other forms of moisture aiding in the decomposition of the organic material.

Haskell County has approx-

imately 140,000 acres of land that is considered to be of high or moderately high wind erosion susceptibility. Over 95 percent of this total acreage is situated in the northwestern 1/3 of the county, or from a line drawn from Rule to Munday (Knox Co.) This is the area that is considered the sandy lands of Haskell Coun-

Let me urge you to maintain your residues on the soil surface, get your winter cover crops in as early as possible to allow for sufficient growth prior to the start of the windy season in November. Help yourselves and help me, in not having so great an acreage damaged this coming blow season as we did last year.



Haskell National Bank's Drive-In Teller is Faye (Mrs. Jimmy) Bledsoe. She is one of HNB's "Old Faithful" employees, and really occupies the "hot corner" of activity. All the many customers who regularly transact their business at the Drive-In window, can testify to the long line of cars headed in her direction, daily. When HNB moved to the present location in 1959, the first Drive-In Window was installed. Management figured that it would be used sparingly, if at all, so the original window was situated in a line with the present inside teller's windows in the main lobby. Thus, the Drive-In Teller could operate the window, and also help customers on the inside. To say that the drive-in facility "caught on" fast, would be a decided under statement. It was soon apparent that the Drive-In Teller could not handle both "inside" and "outside" customers--so a new facility was installed in a separate area, near the back of the bank building. HNB believes that this arrangement has greatly improved the service, since the teller can devote her full time to drive-in customers. This facility is operated on the same schedule as the rest of the bank-plus-it is open from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday's, for the purpose of cashing checks, and making change. (No deposits are taken on Saturdays.) HNB provided this extra service to help the merchants with their week-end cash needs, and for customers who were unable to get checks cashed the

previous week. Faye keeps the traffic flowing smoothly-most of the time-despite a myriad of unique situations that develop almost daily. HNB, and Faye, would encourage customers to have their deposits made out, their checks properly endorsed, and currency ready for accurate counting-in order to speed the transaction, and avoid a

long line of cars. Faye is the daughter of Mrs. T. C. Bevel, and the late Mr. Bevel. She was graduated from Rochester High School, and attended Baylor University. She first worked for HNB as a bookkeeper from 1951-1954. She married Jimmy Bledsoe, and they moved to Amarillo, where she was employed by First National Bank there. 'How To Provide For Their Future" Diagnostic Evaluation-

The Base For Planning A thorough diagnostic evaluation to determine accurately the condition, degree of retardation and capability for self-management is as important in planning for the future as it is for guiding the course of his present life. It will enable you to clarify his present and future potential under the laws of the state in which you reside or own real

property. There are substantial variations in the laws of different states pertaining to the procedure and showing to establish mental competence. A legal carries severe civil disabilities for the individual so classified. However, such a step may be indicated where the degree of retardation is severe, and medical and psychological evaluations support the need.

sel-Planning should be done only after consultation with a competent attorney. He will be able to help you arrange proper legal safeguards and suggest alternative plans for the future care and management of your retarded child. However, since the type of plan he proposes may depend on the degree to which the declaration of incompetence child can care for his own needs, it is important that he be given medical and psychological information on the degree of mental retardation of your child. 


