## 34 Bales Donated To Rehab Center

Due to the number involved, the Rehab Center is bringing the plaques to Hale Farm Supply for local distribution.

Mr. Hale regrets taking as long as he has in getting the plaques to donors, but during the time it took to get everything together, the price of cotton went down so he held on till the price went back up.

The cotton was finally sold to Moore Cotton Buyers at Vernon through Ms. Amelia Perry. The buyers paid a bonus for the cotton since it was for the Rehab Center.

The total amount received in Haskell County was \$10,927.64 for 34 bales.

## ASCS Is Accepting Applications

The Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) is currently accepting applications for Federal assistance in the control of mesquite by aerial spraying. Several spraying practices have been approved for Haskell County, subject to the approval of the local County Committee. Producers who wish to participate in this program are reminded to file their requests early, as no applications can be accepted after April 22, 1977. All applications must be processed for needs determinations and eligibility and spraying must be completed on or before a final spraying date which is set by the County Committee. This final date is set to prevent chemical damage to cotton in its early growing stages. Chemical control of mesquite may not be approved if there has not been sufficient time from the date the first leaves appear in the spring, or if moisture has not been sufficient to promote normal growth for not less than 30 days prior to application.

Owners and operators of land subject to mesquite infestation are urged to stop by the Haskell County ASCS Office for further information.

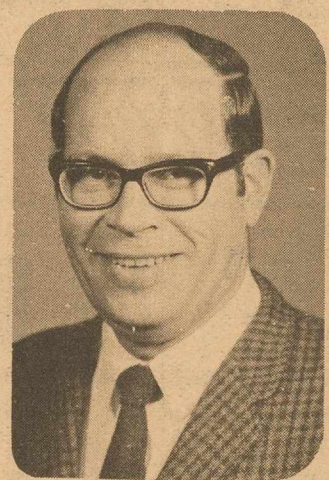

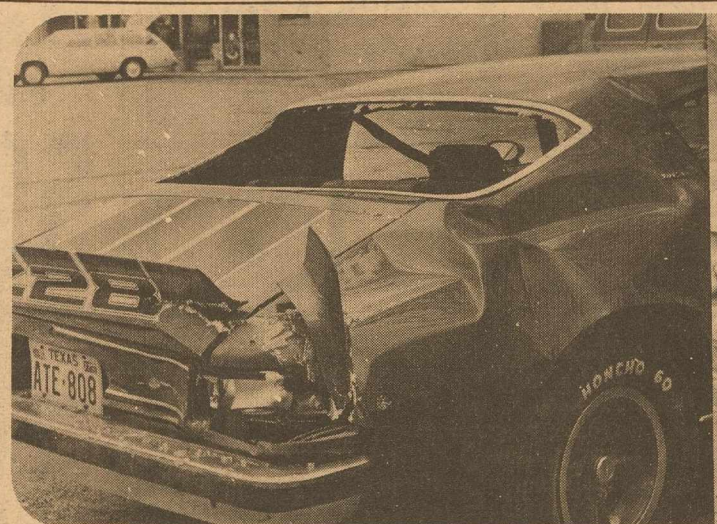

## Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service  
Assisting  
California Creek and Wichita-Brazos  
Soil and Water Conservation Districts

Our two local soil and water conservation districts, the California Creek and the Wichita-Brazos are affiliated with the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) which maintains a staff in Washington to act on behalf of its nearly 3000 member districts. Each landowner and operator in Haskell County, and adjoining counties, that have conservation agreements on their lands, are indirectly connected with NACD through their local conservation district.

During NACD's 31st Annual Convention February 6-10 in Atlanta, Ga., the NACD Council considered 60 resolutions originating in local conservation districts and state associations of conservation districts.

The council took the following actions on key issues:

-Adopted a new Declaration of District Principles.

-Urged Congress to amend Public Law 92-500 to limit federal jurisdiction and exempt normal farming, forestry, and ranching activities from the Section 404 permit system.

-Called for incorporating conservation measures in any new farm program aimed at production adjustment.

-Proposed steps to make the Great Plains Conservation Program permanent.

-Urged that Congress extend the Rural Community Fire Protection Program.

-Stated that "the improvement of our nation's water quality...is an important part of the work of every conservation district."

-Reaffirmed NACD's strong support of the Land and Water Resources Conservation Act of

1977.

The Council also adopted recommendations for appropriations in Fiscal Year 1978 for key conservation programs of the Department of Agriculture and Interior.

In announcing the above actions of the NACD Council, local district director, R. V. Earles, Paint Creek, said that NACD and its many facets of activities was always working for the best interests of the local districts and local landowners. He stated that this is why it is most important for all landowners and operators to be members of their local conservation districts.

## Washington "As It Looks"

From Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C.—NOTHING SEEMS QUITE AS PERMANENT as a temporary Government program. Year by year the Congress continues to extend supplemental unemployment benefits beyond the 39 weeks available under the regular Federal-State payments. The unemployment program has been in effect for many years, paid for by employers. The additional 26 weeks of benefits are paid from general revenues which means the cost come from all taxpayers of the Nation.

JOBLESS BENEFITS CAN NOW REACH the maximum of 65 weeks in States with a rate of 6% or more unemployment. This drops to 52 weeks when the rate is between 5 and 6%. The sum of 500 million dollars is budgeted for the payments between now and October 1. The various States administer the program with Federal "guidelines". Some States are more "liberal" in determining payments than others. California and New York are the big beneficiaries under this program. The bulk of all payments will go to a few States which provide high benefits. Texas has one of the best administered programs in the Nation and, because of our

comparatively low unemployment rate and because it is well run, we just about draw a goose-egg in this extended benefits program but we help pay for it.

THIS PAST WEEK THE "TEMPORARY" ADDITIONAL COMPENSATION PROGRAM was passed by the House of Representatives. The Senate had approved the legislation a few days before to which was attached an amendment requiring future pay raises for the Legislative, certain Executive and Judicial officials, to be voted on by recorded vote. This had an appeal since the recent increase in salary for Members of Congress, Cabinet and other Executive officials and Federal Judges, came under such heavy criticism. Some Members, but certainly not all, voted for the increase in unemployment compensation, hoping to "get off the hook" for their previous support of the pay raise. It had a real wholesome sound (as if another raise was about to occur, the fact being there definitely is not going to be, any for years in the future and just maybe never.)

THE SENATE WAS ON RECORD AND VOTED FAVORABLY on the recent pay raise but the House, under parliamentary procedures, avoided it. Unlike the House of Representatives the Senate can put an amendment on a bill which has no relevance to the measure but the House, under its rules, cannot do so. The House has the rule of "germaneness" which requires any amendment to relate to the subject of the legislation. This more nearly accounts for this amendment. As a matter of fact, there is already legislation avoiding automatic pay increases. An amendment recently adopted in the Budget Committee prohibits increases which otherwise would occur in October.

THERE WERE ONLY TWO VOTES against the measure on extending benefits for unemployment compensation; this Member being one of those two. The vote was cast on the judgement that, first, there is a big question as to the rate of unemployment; the fact that our State is on the short end of any benefits; the further fact that every dime of this money has to be borrowed, adding to the Federal deficit and; the further fact that unemployment is dropping as the economy improves. The States with the high payments are a drain on those who try to hold a reasonable line on these costly payments but reap the greatest benefit. These payments and other available benefits which make it more attractive not to work than to work simply cannot be justified.

### USDA Requesting Comments

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today asked for public views and recommendations concerning the need for marketing quotas for the 1978 crop of wheat. The comments must be received by the Department no later than April 15.

Under the provisions of basic legislation (The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended), the Secretary is required to determine whether or not marketing quotas should be in effect for the 1978 crop of wheat. If the Secretary

determines that marketing quotas are needed, then he must announce the national marketing quota and acreage allotment by April 15. If the Secretary proclaims quotas, a referendum of wheat producers must be held not later than Aug. 1. Two-thirds of producers voting in the referendum must approve of quotas for the program to take effect.

The Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 suspended the provisions of basic legislation for the duration of the Act. However, this legislation expires with the 1977 crop of wheat. New farm legislation will be considered this year which, if enacted, could meet any decision on wheat marketing quotas. In 1973, a similar situation arose: A national wheat marketing quota was proclaimed on April 13, 1973, and a referendum announced. A special Congressional resolution stayed the referendum and a new farm bill was enacted Aug. 10, 1973.

Prior to making a final decision on marketing quotas

and acreage allotments for 1978, USDA will give consideration to views and recommendations received from the public. These comments must be made in writing and submitted to the Director, Grains, Oilseeds & Cotton Division, USDA, ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. All written submissions will be available for public inspection during normal business hours in the Office of the Director, Room 3741 of USDA's South Building.
