He might be proud to know that his approach is embodied in an unusual partnership between the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration, better known as OSHA, and the Texas Department of Health Resources.

In this partnership, state occupational safety and health engineers are the ones who speak softly, and the federal OSHA inspectors carry the big stick. Under federal law, every private employer in the United States is required to comply with a massive set of OSHA regulations, designed to protect the health and safety of workers. The rules cover almost every conceivable aspect of the physical facilities and the environment of the workplace.

To ensure compliance with the regulations, OSHA personnel conduct intensive inspections of several thousand places of business each year. When inspectors find violations of the OSHA rules, the employer is assessed a citation and possible penalties if the violations are of a serious nature and given a certain period of time in which to correct the problem. At the end of that period of time, another inspection may be made. If the violations have not been corrected, the employer can be fined again—as much as \$1,000 for each day from the time of the original inspection until the correction is made to OSHA's satisfaction.

Enforcing the highly detailed and complex regulations is OSHA's only function. Under the law, federal inspectors are not permitted to provide consultation and advice to employers on ways to improve the health and safety aspects of their businesses.

That's where the Texas Department of Health Resources comes in. Through the Occupational Safety Division and the Occupational Health and Radiation Control Division, state engineers are available to provide consult-

ative assistance to all employers in Texas. The consultation program, funded under a contract between OSHA and the Department of Health Resources, allows employers to request a penalty-free inspection.

When an employer asks for an inspection, one of the state engineers—who has been trained by OSHA—visits the workplace and conducts the same kind of inspection that an OSHA inspector would perform. At the end of the inspection, the employer is given a list of any violations of OSHA regulations that the inspector has found.

But the state inspection doesn't result in penalties. Instead, the state engineer offers advice and suggestions on how to correct the problem, and points out other ways to improve the workers' safety and health. The employer is free to act on the advice or disregard it as he wishes. Except in rare cases where a substantial and immediate threat to the life or safety of

the workers might exist, the state engineers do not report their findings to the federal OSHA engineers.

Since the state consultation program began, the number of requests for consultative inspections has steadily increased. According to Walter Martin, Director of the Division of Occupational Safety, "At first, many employers were afraid that this would trigger an OSHA inspection." Later, however, Martin reported that his engineers were swamped with requests. "We'll make all of the inspections," Martin said, "but it'll take a little while."

In fact, a number of requests for inspections have come from employers that aren't even subject to OSHA regulations—such as city governments, state agencies, hospitals, and even federal military installations. Obviously, the employers know a good thing when they see it, and their concern for the health and safety of their employees is demonstrated by

their interest in the consultative inspections.

The key question, however, is whether health and safety problems are corrected following the penalty-free inspections. As evidence, Martin cites a letter from one of the state's largest county hospitals. The letter was written two months after the state inspection report, and it lists seven violations that have been corrected. It closes, "Thank you and your engineer for your help in maintaining a safe environment for our patients, their visitors and our employees."

The president of an oil drilling company wrote, "It is through inspections like this that we are able to train our people in the proper safety methods in work areas. Please convey my thanks to your engineer for his inspection and hope that sometime in the future he will be able to again pay us a visit."

The executive secretary of one of the state's largest labor unions wrote, "Our organiza-

tion supports this state program and we feel it should be continued and expanded to reach every place of employment in Texas."

The evidence shows that the Texas Department of Health Resources can, indeed, get a lot done by speaking softly—and only in part because of OSHA's "big stick."

### What's Your Beef? ... Not So ... Wheat Crop Declines.

Texas livestock producers will be studying during the next several weeks the merits or demerits of a proposed beef check-off referendum.

Purpose of the proposal is to provide funds with which to improve the image of beef, provide research funds, market development programs, and producer information.

A deduction of .3 of 1 per cent (30 cents per \$100 of sales) would be made at the producer level. This money would then go into a national fund. It would be administered by a beef board, to be made up of 68 livestock producers. About \$35 million annually could be raised.

Producers who did not want to contribute their money can get it back by making a request for it.

The Beef Board membership is made up according to the number of livestock in each state. Texas will be allowed seven members on the board. Membership on the Board from other states ranges from 1 to 3.

You will get to vote on the proposal in the near future. But in order to vote you must register at your county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office. To make the proposal effective, at least 50 per cent of those who register must vote, and of that number a two-thirds majority vote will be needed to put the plan into effect.

The program is designed to help the cattle industry by utilizing the check-off funds for research, promotion and education activities. It is a self-help program, similar to the cotton check-off program.

Recent Reports about farm prices going up do not jibe with Texas farm prices. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes that farm and livestock prices decreased less than 1 per cent during the past month.

The price of wheat continues to be an excellent example of the farm price situation as it affects producers. Wheat in Texas averaged \$2.38 as of the middle of March, a month ago it was \$2.42, a year ago it was \$3.68 per bushel.

Cotton showed a slight increase; hogs were down about \$2.40. Beef cattle were up slightly as were calf prices.

Wheat production in Texas is now projected to be eight per cent below a year ago and almost 30 per cent

and his world champion Border Collies along with his trained monkey. Wetback from San Saba, will be featured at all four performances.

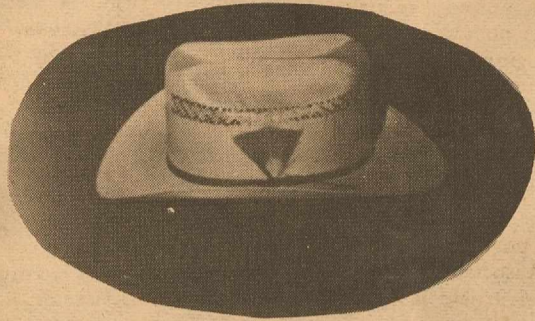
