Dr. Spencer meeting place in the Rule City Hall until May 31, 1977 for Receives Awards

Dr. Frank C. Spencer was presented two different citations of achievement and honor during the month of April. Both recognitions relate to Dr. Spencer's work as a cardiologist and instructor of cardiac surgery at New York University Medical Center of New York City.

On April 10th the University acclaimed Dr. Spencer recipient of their "Great Teacher" Award. Normally, this award is given at the Parent University, not the Medical School, and in the past its recipients have been faculty members who have had tenure of 20 to 30 years. It was the second time the award has gone to a medical school member since 1945.

In acknowledgement of the "Great Teacher" Award, Dr. Spencer spoke of his deep and abiding love and pleasure in teaching, related a few of his theories to the art of the teaching responsibility, and 17-19c emphasized the pleasure and satisfaction he has received through his years of association and interrelation with young students. Dr. Spencer called attention to a personal policy which he has always practiced as a teacher. Simply, he memorizes the name and face of each of his students to such a degree that he will know each student by name any time he meets him or her. Also, he encourages students to approach him for questions

> and discussion. A second award came in Toronto, Canada on April 17th. At a dinner meeting held while the American Thoracic Society was in session. Former students of Dr. Spencer surprised him by announcing the formation of a "Spencer Surgical Society." The group of former cardiac resident physicians will meet annually. nong those ex-students of Dr. Spencer is one Texas, Dr. Thomas Parker of Lubbock. from Haskell High School in 1940; he received his undergraduate degree from North Texas State University, his Medical Degree from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn., and interned at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland. During the Korean War, Dr. Spencer served in Korea and received the Legion of Merit for his outstanding surgical work with injured service personnel. In July 1953 he returned to Johns Hopkins where he became Assistant Resident Surgeon. Later, he moved to the Medical School of Lexington. "Next decide your aims for the future-the next five years, for example-then list your goals for the coming year. Be as specific as possible. For the five year period, goals might be buying a car, making a down payment on a home, and buying a washer and dryer.

"Goals for this year might be reducing debts, starting a reserve fund, and buying a vacuum cleaner.'

Lucile F. Mork, author of the booklet advises readers to keep in mind that goals

The principal ideas to keep in mind are to--Estimate your family in-

come, including such figures as wages, salaries, social security benefits.

-List anticipated income, including interest from savings accounts. -Make two estimates if your

income fluctuates sharply. -Estimate expenses and be realistic. -Compare total expenses

with estimated income. If your income exceeds your expenses-you are in luck.

If expenses exceed income, trim expenses. Take a harder look at day-to-day expenses. If you can't balance the budget by cutting expenses,

you may have to try to increase your family income. Many families find it necessary for both spouses to work. A note of warning: There are added costs of working-clothing, lunches, transportation, child care.





credit discrimination may also choose to sue the creditor for actual and punitive damages up to \$10,000, with the aid of a private attorney. The intent of the law is to see that women applying for credit will be judged, as male applicants are, on the basis of whether they have steady incomes and can qualify in other respects as good credit risks.

Here are some of the specific provisions of the law:

-You cannot be denied a separate credit account because of your sex or marital status, if you are otherwise creditworthy.

-A creditor can ask you questions about your spouse only when your spouse will be using or will be liable for the account, or when you are relying on your spouse's income or property to obtain the credit.

-Child support or separate maintenance payments must be considered as income to the extent that these payments are reliable. However, if you are not using such payments to help you qualify for credit, you don't have to list them as

-If you are applying for credit with your husband, your regular income, whether full-time or part-time, must be

-A creditor cannot ask you about birth control practices or childbearing plans, or assume that because of your age you may leave your job to have a baby, causing your income to change.

-A creditor may not use unfavorable information about an account you shared with a spouse or former spouse if you can show that the unfavorable history does not accurately reflect your willingness or ability to repay.


-If you ask for it in writing within 30 days after denial of credit, the creditor must tell you the name of the credit bureau or other source which provided information used in evaluating your credit application.

You then have the right to review your credit bureau file and have any inaccurate information corrected, or to add your version of a disputed credit history.
