WTU Expects No Power Shortage

West Texas Utilities Co. customers are using record amounts of electricity this summer, but generation engineers say the system is capable of supplying any demands.

Three new record peaks have been set and daily consumption is running above average. But in response to questions prompted by the recent New York blackout, WTU officials said that even though usage likely will continue increasing if the weather stays hot, the projected peak will be within the system's generation and transmission capacity.

Carl Yancy, WTU systems operation manager, said it is "highly unlikely" that a blackout similar to the one in New York could occur here.

"Of course no one can be absolutely certain, but there is no doubt in my mind that our system is reliable," Yancy said.

He explained that WTU's eight major power stations are strategically located near the load centers and that the transmission network is designed to eliminate too much dependence on one plant.

Total generating capacity is 1,055,500 kilowatts, Yancy said, and the all-time consumption peak so far was 747,000 kilowatts, which was recorded at 5 p.m. on Monday, July 11. Last year's record peak was 725,000 kilowatts on Aug. 11.

WTU officials have forecast a summer peak of 785,000 kilowatts, which is 270,000 kilowatts below the company's

generating capacity. This reserve of about 26 per cent is considered good by national standards.

And the reserve would more than make up for the loss of the company's largest generating facility, which is the new 200,000 kilowatt unit at the Fort Phantom Power Plant near Abilene.

The system also could receive back-up power from neighboring companies, Yancy pointed out.

Heavy consumption occurring this summer in spite of customer efforts at conservation, company officials said. They attribute the increase to the hot weather and to the fact that WTU is serving about

3,000 more residential customers now than at the same time last year.

Though the system is geared up for any emergency, company spokesmen acknowledge there is no sure guarantee against an electrical outage, particularly those caused by acts of nature.

Yancy said the last system-wide blackout occurred in April, 1961, when a phone wire broke and fell into the Paint Creek substation. The outage spread throughout the system, although all services was restored completely within 40 minutes.

Since then, automatic oil circuit breakers have been installed to prevent a recurrence.

Saffel Resigns From Police Force

City Policeman Gerald Saffel resigned from his duties this week effective July 30.

Officer Saffel listed salary as the major reason for leaving Haskell. He said the local salary is not high enough to earn a living. At the present time there are no benefits, no insurance, no retirement.

During the year that officer Saffel has worked in Haskell he stated that there had not been a cost of living salary increase.

He also stated that Haskell makes no allowance for the long hours worked by Policemen or gives allowances for

weekends or holiday work. According to Saffel, no personnel time off is offered and when an officer must be away for a few days because of illness in the family, etc, the time can be counted against his vacation time.

Officer Saffel said that the majority of the people in Haskell were law abiding, Christian people, but many of these people do not take an active part in their city Government. He stated, "It would be encouraging if the citizens of this good town would support verbally as well as silently the City Police Department."

Farm Safety Week

Accident data being received from individual states provide national estimates indicating that 5,400 farm residents were killed and 500,000 disabled in work, home, recreation and traffic accidents during the past year, points out Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The occupationally related portion of these totals indicates that work related accidents claimed the lives of nearly 1,900 persons (200 in Texas) and about 180,000 suffered disabling injuries, of which 1,300 and 130,000, respectively, were farm residents as opposed to employees.

President Carter has accepted the challenge to help reduce farm and ranch accidents by declaring July 25-31 as National Farm Safety Week. The theme for the week is "Safety Is a Good Investment," notes Nelson. This theme emphasizes that in addition to personal injury, accidents result in costly equipment damage, medical expense, loss of valued talent

and skill of agricultural producers and workers, and production loss due to time delays and the unavailability of injured workers and damaged equipment.

National Farm Safety Week is co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Both sponsors emphasize the wisdom of making a personal and financial investment in accident prevention to help cut the human and economic costs of accidents.

Farm and ranch families can achieve much by investing a small amount of time in adopting low risk work procedures, contends Nelson. Extra protection can be obtained with a modest financial investment in personal protective equipment, tractor overturn protection, smoke detectors and other accident prevention devices. He further emphasizes that an investment in prompt repair or replacement of faulty or worn equipment and in seeking good quality products designed with accident prevention in mind can pay additional potential benefits.

PROCLAMATION BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF HASKELL COUNTY

To All To Whom These Presents Shall Come: I, B. O. Roberson, County Judge of Haskell County, do hereby declare the week of July 25-31, 1977 as FARM AND SAFETY WEEK in Haskell County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the citizens of Haskell County are proud of our farm and ranch families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well being of this segment of our populations; and

WHEREAS, our farmers and ranchers have become increasingly concerned with a new phase of agricultural safety through regulatory requirements for their hired labor and the added cost of new equipment (Roll-Over Protective Structures for Agricultural Tractors) as a result of these regulatory requirements; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a renewed emphasis on rural accident prevention education is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas and Haskell County Agricultural Extension Service, Texas 4-H Clubs, Community Improvement Associations, Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Haskell County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Planning Prevents Accidents"; and

WHEREAS, planning for accident prevention includes a combination of proper attitudes, combined with practical, common sense precautions. The planning should include employee operating instructions for agricultural tractors and equipment; compliance of other agricultural safety standards; use tractors with roll-over protection, Slow Moving Vehicle Emblems, fire extinguishers, legal lighting equipment and rear-view mirrors; and

WHEREAS, the farmer and rancher can develop a check list for himself, members of his family and employees which would include the following: enroll in the (NSC) Defensive Driving Course; (NRA)-Hunter & Home Firearm Safety Courses; (ARC) Basic First Aid Course; and Basic Learn to Swim Course; and include SAFETY in the Program of Work and Program Calendar for schools, clubs, churches and other group meetings.

DPS Investigates 6 Accidents In June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of June, 1977 according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1977 shows a total of 16 accidents resulting in no persons killed and seven persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June, 1977 shows a total of 558 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 355 persons

injured as compared to June, 1976, with 560 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 338 persons injured. This was two less accidents, five more killed, and 17 more injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

The 15 traffic deaths for the month of June, 1977 occurred in the following counties: Six each in Wise; One each in Bailey, Hale, Lubbock, Parker, Young, Collingsworth, Foard, Gray, and Wilbarger.

County Agent Offers Fabric Suggestions

In choosing a fabric, quality need not mean expense, according to Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Extension Agent.

She suggests that consumers check a fabric this way:

—Rub the fabric against itself several times. Watch for flaking, which means the fabric is heavily sized and may lose body after laundering.

—Stretch the fabric—then release it. It should spring back. If not, areas of strain will bag later.

—Wad a corner to check for wrinkling, but remember that some crinkle cloth and puckered fabrics are suppose to wrinkle.

—Check for vivid, clear colors. Dull colors signal dyes that may not wash well.

—Make sure fabric designs are printed on the "STRAIGHT" OF THE GRAIN. Noticeable off-grain designs are difficult to match in sewing.

—Rub the fabric against another fabric to detect crocking.

Crocking means the color rubs off. When a brightly colored fabric crocks, it is almost impossible to set the dyes at home, the agent cautioned.

Look for the term colorfast on bolt ends or hang tags to insure that the fabric will not fade.



Conservation Viewpoints

Section 302, Title III of the Rural Development Act of 1972, Public Law 92-419, directed the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out a land inventory and monitoring (LIM) program.

The actual field work will start this week in Haskell County under the direction of the Soil Conservation Service, with the assistance of the Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, The County Extension Service, and the Farmers Home Administration. J.C. Yeary, SCS District Conservationist will chair the joint efforts required for completion of the program in Haskell County.

The objective of LIM is to provide data on (1) the kinds, amounts, and geographical extent of soil, water, and related resources; (2) the potential and limitations of these resources for various uses; and (3) the changes and trends in the extent and condition of those resources.

We will be surveying twenty, 160-acre random selected sample areas in the county, approximately 2% of the land area. On each of these twenty sample units, three random selected points will be studied. The following data on each point will be recorded: soils, land use, flood prone areas, wetlands, urban development, irrigation, conservation practices on the land, treatment needs, potential crop data, soil loss, and data for wind erosion.

Jim Hudson and I will be doing the actual field data collection, and we are urgently requesting the cooperation of the landowners and landusers involved to furnish the needed resource data. It is estimated that about four hours plus travel time will be required to gather all needed data on each of the 160-acre sample areas. All work on this phase of the program must be completed by September 10.



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
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

Cardboard chewing cattle may become more common during the next few years. Researchers say cellulose in cardboard provides a much better diet for cattle than newsprint materials which were experimented with for several years. Giving the new product the title, "Rumose", promoters are pushing for acceptance of treated corrugated boxes as a viable feed supplement in the feedlot for commercial feeders. Developers advocate grinding or pelleting of the boxes, then mixing with whey (waste material from cheese making) or other materials to make the boxes more palatable. One of the key researchers for this project is Dr. John Campbell of the University of Missouri. Dr. Campbell says the process of manufacturing the boxes may increase their digestibility which "approaches or even exceeds the digestibility of common forages". For cattle, "box" lunch may take on a whole new meaning.



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
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
