Safety Program Set By DPS

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced a special program to involve every Texan in an effort to reduce traffic accidents and fatalities during the Christmas and New Year holiday periods.

In the program, which is called "Light the Way for a Safe Holiday," motorists will be urged to drive with their low-beam headlights turned on in the daytime as well as night during the Christmas and New Year weekends.

"It is our belief that most motorists do not intentionally violate the law and need only to be reminded that holiday periods are more dangerous.

"We feel the 'Light the Way' program, particularly with widespread participation on the part of drivers, will serve as a very meaningful reminder to others to drive safely," Speir said.

A similar effort called "Drive Lighted and Live" was conducted in Texas about 15 years ago with the active support of the state's newspaper and broadcast industry.

Speir said DPS Troopers

will burn the headlights on their patrol cars during the period from 6 p.m. Friday, December 23, through midnight Monday, December 26, and again from 6 p.m. Friday, December 30, through midnight Monday, January 2.

"I urge every Texan to join us and help 'Light the Way for a Safe Holiday' in Texas," the DPS director added.

Commissioners Hold Meeting

The Commissioners Court of Haskell County met in a special meeting Monday at 9 a.m. in the courtroom with all members present.

Members of the court signed a five year lease agreement with Bill Perry, owner of Perry's Gulf Station, as caretaker of Scott Memorial Park. The agreement also contained a five year option as caretaker at the park. Perry has purchased facilities at the park from Roy Payne and has already began operation of the Anchor.

The Perrys will move to the lake as soon as possible and hope to have the facility in top shape by next spring.

In other court action, it was noted that the state constitution stipulates that county officials cannot announce for an office other than the one now held if more than one year from end of their term. To announce earlier, automatically constitutes the resignation of the official.

County Treasurer John Wayne McDermott announced his candidacy for County Judge on November 14, and was in violation of this article.

Legal counsel for the court stated that McDermott was still the qualified County Treasurer and because of several points of the law which were unclear, he recommended that the court request the County Attorney or the District Attorney to seek a written opinion from the Attorney's General's Office concerning the matter.

Members of the court agreed to request the opinion and postpone any further action on the matter until the opinion is received.

Speaker will be Jerry Heare. He is the Director of Community Development Department of Texas Industrial Commerce in Austin.

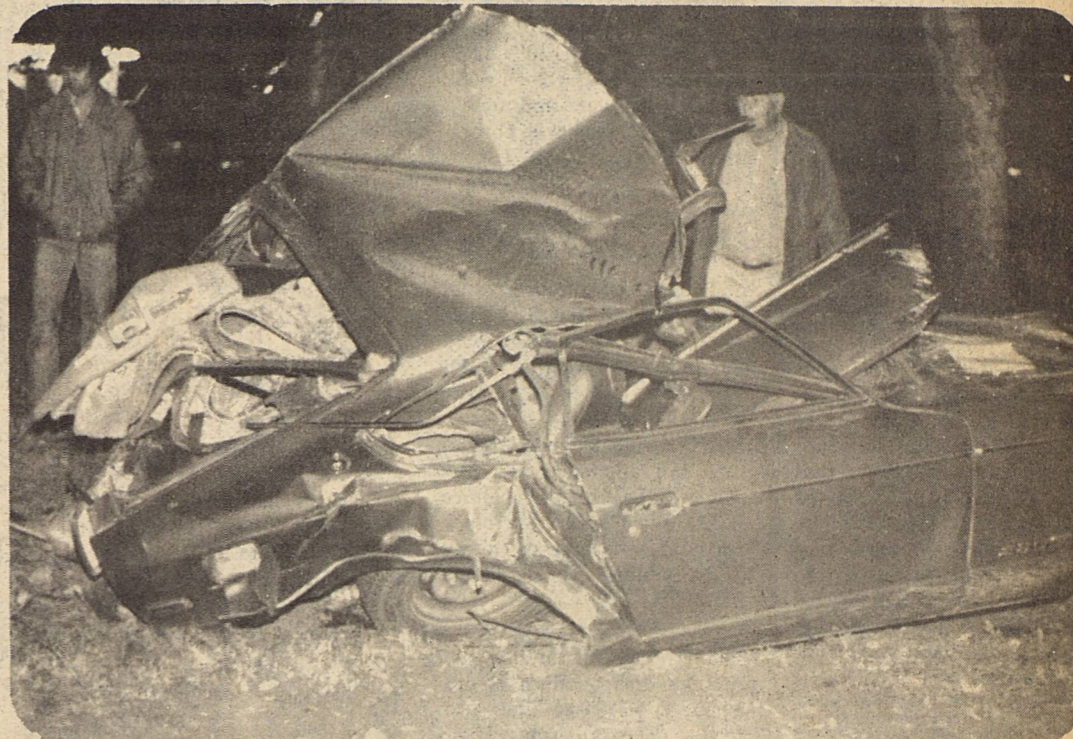

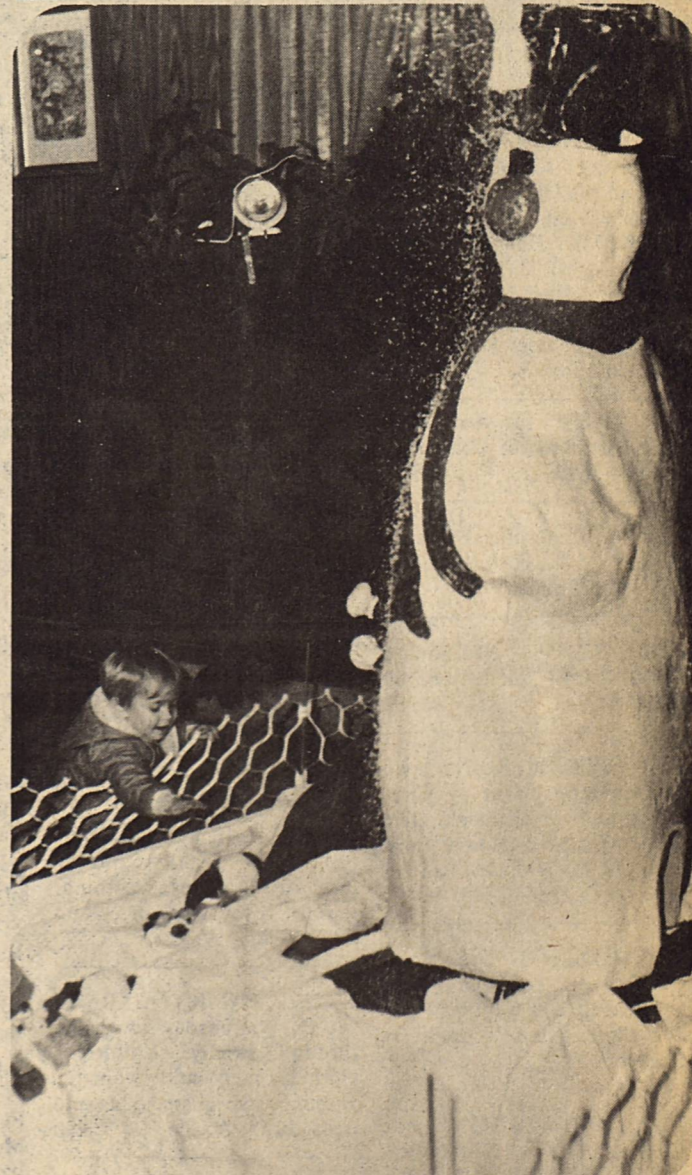

Tolbert, author and veteran Dallas News columnist who has been wandering around the Trans-Pecos since childhood, calls it "an absolutely unique region" of Texas approximately the physical size of Florida but with less than half a million persons, most of them crowded in El Paso.

Other articles in this featured section include "The Big Bend of Texas," by Mrs. Lee G. Bennett, Marfa teacher; "The Guadalupe Mountains" and "The Davis Mountains, a Land of Contrast," by Dr. Barton H. Warnock, chairman of the Biology Department of Sul Ross State University at Alpine.

The articles are generously illustrated with full color photographs. El Capitan, the dramatic peak in Guadalupe Mountains National Park, is featured on the cover of the Texas Almanac.

Persons interested in traveling to other sections of Texas may be guided by reports on places to visit in Texas West, Texas Heartlands, Texas Woodlands, Texas Gulf Coast and Metropolitan Texas.

Another section of the state is described in a report on "The Texas Blackland Prairies," written by S.H. Whitehurst, superintendent of the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center at Dallas. This area reaches more than 300 miles from the Texas-Oklahoma border to the vicinity of San Antonio.

The history of the Texas Election Bureau, which has been assembling, tabulating and distributing unofficial results of Texas statewide elections immediately after voting for more than half a century, is told by Robert L. Johnson, manager of the bureau for 40 years.

Other features of the 1978-'79 edition of the Texas Almanac include The Constitution of Texas, a section which has been a valuable document for use in schoolrooms and courtrooms for many years; and "Gardening in Texas," a guide for home gardeners throughout the state.

In addition, there is the usual enormous assemblage of data pertaining to nearly all aspects of living and working in Texas.

Concrete bridges lead 'double' lives

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — A process has been developed by University of Texas engineers that could double the life of concrete bridges.

The process impregnates concrete with a polymer (a plastic-like material similar to Plexiglas) that seals the surface without changing its appearance. The treated concrete is stronger, skid resistant, highly resistant to acid and water adsorption, and able to withstand up to 15 times the average freeze-thaw stress of non-treated surfaces.

The first commercial application of the sealant process was made recently on a railroad overpass in Big Spring.

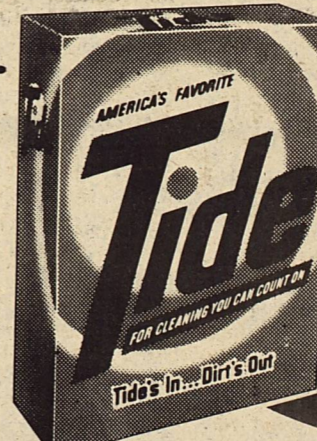

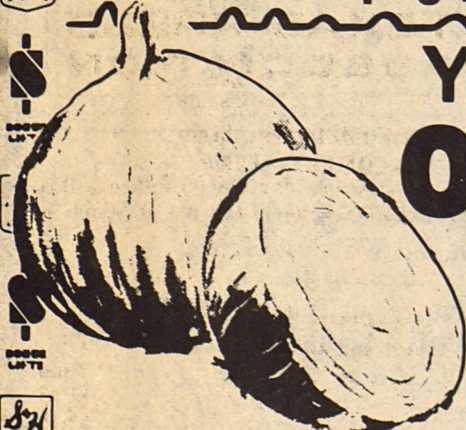

Cotton Classing

Cotton prices were steady to slightly higher last week, according to Sidney Ferrell, in charge of the Munday Classing Office. Prices paid ranged from 42.25 to 43.80 cents per pound for mixed lots of grade 42 and higher.

Grade 32 continued as the predominant grade accounting for 58 percent of the cotton classed. Grade 42 accounted for 28 percent and grade 41 was 10 percent. The predominant staple length was staple 32 with 66 percent. Staple 31 accounted for 18 percent and staple 33 accounted for 14 percent. Pressley strength readings averaged 85,000 pounds per square inch. Micronaire readings in the desirable range accounted for 96 percent of the cotton tested.

About 13,000 samples were classed during the week ending December 2. The season total is now 111,400 samples as compared to only 27,800 at the same time last year.

Controlled traffic farming is a concept getting a lot of attention lately... and probably even more in the future. Idea of the operation is to keep tractors moving only on surfaces not used for crops. Basically that seems quite unreasonable since the crops are in the field and it is usually necessary to get the tractor out there to do any good. None of that has changed. With controlled traffic farming the tractor would be driven on paths between the rows. Paths used only for the machinery. In most concepts of this type operation the paths would be the only points of compaction in the field. Therein lies the reason for concern. If compaction can be reduced, root systems can be more completely developed and higher yields would result. At Auburn University in Alabama a controlled traffic farm experiment resulted in a yield 43 percent higher than crops grown with conventional tillage.

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Preparing For New Profession



BOBBY SIMPSON

The worlds of vocational education and banking/financing may sound far apart. But a student on the Rolling Plains Campus of Texas State Technical Institute (TSTI) is bridging those worlds as he prepares for a new career.

Not long ago, Bobby Simpson of Haskell gave up a fulltime career in financial consulting to enter a different and unfamiliar career world—electronics. "Unfamiliar," because he had had no experience. To attain his goal of becoming a radio-television serviceman, he enrolled in TSTI's Radio/TV Servicing program.

"I retired, in a manner of speaking," Simpson said. "I've never actually retired. I quit one line of business and entered into another one, and then decided to go into another one."

The business he quit was banking. It was a 22-year career he left behind, with banking experience in Haskell, Munday, Levelland, Dallas and Arizona. After selling his interest in an Arizona bank, Simpson became involved in financial consulting work. Travel, including some overseas, was a part of that career.

The desire to be with his family back home in Haskell has brought Simpson to the threshold of yet another career and the experience of being a fulltime student all over again (he attended Abilene Christian University after World War II Marine Corps service but did not graduate).

Simpson not only attends

classes fulltime at TSTI, he also lives in the dormitory. His goal is to eventually open his own shop in his hometown.

"I enjoy doing everything," Simpson said in explaining his decision to switch careers at age 53. "Never in my life have I found something I couldn't go if I applied myself."

But he is also realistic about the difficulties involved in that decision.

"This is the hardest thing I have ever taken," he said, admitting he didn't know even how to read a schematic diagram when he enrolled at TSTI.

The program is no 12-week miracle course designed to produce electronics "experts" on an assembly line basis. It is a challenging, year-long program of basic and advanced work leading to a certificate for those who complete their work successfully. Already, Simpson has built two simple radios, a vacuum tube voltmeter and a radio frequency generator. He has yet to touch a television set.

Simpson said he has had no trouble adjusting to the role of a student.

"It doesn't bother me at all to sit in a class with instructors over it, because I came here to learn something," Simpson said. "I believe I'm treated just as a student by the instructors."

Simpson said he has had excellent rapport with the other students at TSTI, all of whom in the radio/television class are younger than he. He has attempted to shun a role as class leader.

"I felt that I have had my day in that," Simpson explained. "The Students need to be up and leading. They know that I will do anything I can to help them. They're all real friendly, and I respect them for that and I know that they respect me. It's a nice situation."

Adjusting to life in a dormitory has been something of a problem, Simpson admitted. The loud music preferred by some dorm residents tends to interfere with those who want to study and sleep. But that problem is beginning to diminish now, Simpson added.

The toughest adjustment has been living away from home, Simpson said. Actually, he spends only Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights on-campus. That means a 74-mile drive four times a week. Weekends are spent in Haskell.

What has Simpson learned about himself so far?

"I've learned that I can do something I wasn't sure I could do. When I came, I didn't know whether I could do it or not. But I decided I was going to do it, even if it took me two years for the one-year course. I'm not going to quit. I'd defeat my whole purpose in coming," he said.

Simpson said he feels no loss in giving up the "prestige" of a banking/financing career in favor of electronics servicing.

"Just an ordinary person who loves what he's doing has it over people in high prestige positions who are not happy. You can have all the money in the world and high positions. All you've got is multiplied problems."

"If you're working in a community and you're respected in that community and you love the people there and they love you—that's everything in the world anybody would want."

Talking animals!

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — "Quiet, please. Animals communicating."

That could be the slogan of a University of Texas scientist who has documented that gerbils communicate with each other through ultrasonic calls (unheard by humans) and olfactory cues.

Dr. Delbert Thiessen says gerbils emit an ultrasonic sound by compressing their lungs through sudden body movements to pass air over their larynxes. Gerbils also use glandular secretions as cues for grooming and marking territory.

The sounds and scents, communicating subtle messages as to sex and well-being, are important in helping gerbils choose genetically fit mates, says Dr. Thiessen.

WASHINGTON "As It Looks From Here"

WASHINGTON, D.C.— IN ONE FORM OR ANOTHER, DOOM HAS ALWAYS BEEN A best seller and, in many instances, profitable. The production and distribution of doom have sales outlets to be admired by Sears, Wards and General Motors.

THE DOOM IDEAS CROP UP in religious, political and economic versions. For decades, it has appeared in population projections, I.Q. studies and weather. Universal doomsday-the end of the world-at a specific time has been sold to thousands on innumerable occasions. No one's money was ever refunded when the time came and went uneventfully. We would assume that there have been many customers satisfied with the mere foreboding.

WHY DOOM IS POPULAR evidently remains a trade secret-like the flavoring of Coca Cola or the batter used on Colonel Sanders' fried chicken.

THE PROPHETS OF DOOM HAVE BEEN MAINTAINED by constantly updating classic models. When science became sort of a

religion, doom began to appear in graphs, equations and computer printouts. The trick of sounding specific while being vague has taken on statistical dimensions. For instance, we may be told that 40 million Americans are gored to death by bulls each year and another indefinite number pulverized by pile drivers or otherwise subjected to death, disease and pestilence. Some of these can be found in "movements" and social agencies and in Government.

FACTS MIGHT BE CALLED A RIVAL PRODUCT but are more often defeated in attempts to compete with the doomsayers. Population explosions have, since the 18th century, been a favorite in the doom industry and continue to be in many parts of the world. IN THE 1930'S, AN UNDERPOPULATION MODEL WAS MARKETED with equal success. Doom was promised on the basis of declining growth which would reduce demand and bring on massive unemployment throughout the western world. This idea was endorsed by the economist, John Keynes, and

by a representative of the American Economic Association.

WITHIN A LITTLE MORE THAN TWO DECADES, overpopulation staged a comeback under the same argument advanced by Mathus in the 18th century.

PROMOTERS OF DOOM usually have only to produce the theories but prove nothing. Some are like the temperature having risen 15 degrees since early morning and, should it continue at that same rate, we would all be burned to a crisp before the week is out.

SOME LEGISLATION IN THE CONGRESS often will have some form of doom atmosphere in its support. At present, an example is the energy bill. The exhaustion of our natural resources, and particularly oil and gas, was assumed until some analyst fed more realistic assumptions into the computer and out came the result that we had several centuries supply of petroleum and natural gas.

SOME POLITICIANS ARE PRETTY GOOD AT SELLING a package of "leadership." Sometimes, it goes like this, "You are almost doomed but I can save you." Some political philosophers will tell us that our salvation requires us to surrender our money and our misused freedom to our "leader" who can make good use of both.

The 1976 figures reflect an increase of 13 percent in travel receipts over 1975 when Haskell County's travel business accounted for \$1,674,000. In addition to gross receipts the study found that Haskell County in 1976 had 70 of the state's 227,258 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$369,100.

It also estimated \$75,200 in state and \$16,200 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1976.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's

Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model came from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which estimated that in 1975 Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's

travel industry. The 1976 figures, however, show Texas back in fourth place behind California, Florida, and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."

VA News

Veterans' education assistance checks due December 1 will include the new higher rate for November plus an extra amount for October, the Veterans Administration announced today.

A 6.6 per cent increase in VA payments to veteran students was part of the "GI Bill Improvement Act of 1977" signed into law November 23 by President Carter.

The legislation made the increase effective October 1, so the extra amount for October will be paid in the next check along with the full new rate for November, VA said. The one exception is the case of students in vocational rehabilitation. These students will receive two checks in December - one for November at the new rate and another for the amount of the retroactive increase for October.

Single veterans who are full time students will receive a December check of \$330-\$38 more than the November 1 check which was at the old

rate of \$292. January and subsequent checks will be \$311 for single, full time students.

Monthly payments for veterans with one dependent were increased from \$347 to \$370, and for veterans with two dependents, from \$396 to \$422 monthly. For each additional dependent, the extra allowance rose from \$24 to \$26.

The "GI Bill Improvement Act of 1977" also increased VA tutorial assistance payments, the hourly rate for VA work-study payments and the maximum amount of a VA education loan.

Also in the act were a number of changes which will affect VA's administration of the veterans' education program through state approving agencies and participating schools. Implementing instructions on these provisions are now being developed at VA Central Office in Washington.

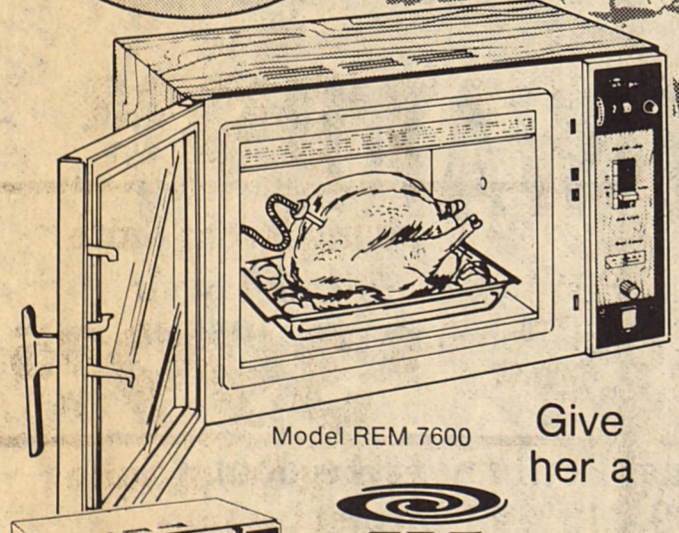
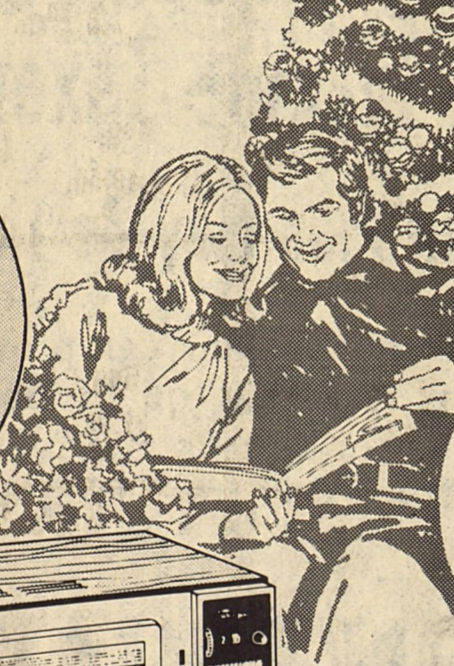

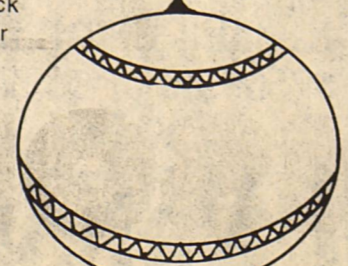

USDA Soil Conservation Service

Congratulations to the City of Rochester's Water Department, and the entire City Council. After several years of intensive study, plan development, and expenditure of funds, Rochester has finally succeeded in purifying their water supply beyond the limits set by the Texas Health Department. This is a great achievement.

Pure water is as much a goal of the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District as the

saving of our soil and water resources. Keep up the good work, Rochester.

The Fort Worth District, Corps of Engineers, has initiated Phase I, the advance planning studies on the Natural Salt Pollution Study, Brazos River Basin, Texas.

The study will include a review of the recommended project under current economic, environmental, social, and engineering conditions.

The study area will include the watershed area of the Salt Fork of the Brazos River and Croton Creek. The area of study includes parts of Crosby, Dickens, King, Garza, Kent, and Stonewall Counties.

The project, when completed, will vitally affect the runoff water entering the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River just west of Jud. The study could have far reaching benefits toward the control of salt polluting areas within the Haskell Soil & Water Conservation District, and an improvement in conditions that could lead to better water quality for Paint Creek Reservoir (Lake Stamford) and Miller Creek Reservoir, Haskell's new water supply.

To the irrigation farmers of the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District, our advice is to start early. Now is the time to prepare land for pre-plant irrigation. Don't wait until January or February. Time may not permit covering all the land that you need to pre-water. It will take considerable time to refill the soil profile due to the extended length of dry weather we have experienced.

Early pre-plant irrigation will put you in charge of farming operations and management rather than letting the weather or time dictate your operations. The long-range forecasts indicate a dryer than normal winter, so prepare now. Of course, the economics of irrigation has a big bearing on your plans.

Soil Conservation Service personnel will be glad to assist you with any problems that you might have regarding your irrigation system. We also invite any other of your conservation problems.

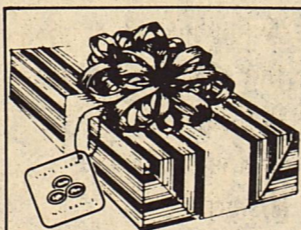

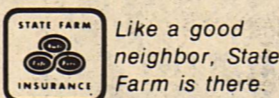

Charlie Franklin Coaching Track

Victoria High's track season is still a way off and, though it remains to be seen what kind of laurels the team will achieve, the two young men leading the squad hold enough honors on their own to impress any of the Stings' opponents.

Head coach Zoe Simpson and his assistant Charlie Franklin are a couple of gents who know what speed is all about and are enthusiastic about passing what they've learned on to their runners.

Both men played for their high school track and football teams but each dropped one to concentrate on what they did best. For Simpson it was track, while Franklin stayed with football.

Both are modestly built, 24-years old, and this is the first year for the two at Victoria. But that's pretty much where the similarity ends.

Simpson, a native of Plainview, ran four years for Rice University and another year unattached at a junior college. "I ran unattached at junior college so I'd be sure to have four years of eligibility at Rice," Simpson explains.

The other half of the coaching team, Franklin, is no second fiddle.

His quick legs ran the 100-yard dash in 9.7 seconds and pushed for 7,000 total yards in three years at Angelo State, a record that took two years to break.

A native of Haskell, Franklin now teaches Health, History and Science while assisting for the junior varsity football team and track.

Adept at tailback position throughout his football career, he achieved All-American honors his graduating year of high school ('71) and played in both the North-South All Star game and the Oil Bowl, where he was voted Most Valuable Player.

What was just the beginning, though, as his college years proved to be the peak

of his duty on the gridiron.

Franklin was twice on the All-American list with honorable mention as a sophomore and being named to the second team his senior year. He made All-Lone Star Conference and was the LSC's Freshman of the Year in '71, and was named to conference team each succeeding season.

"Don Hardeman of the Houston Oilers beat me out by one yard for the LSC rushing title as a senior with 1,355 yards. Then Walter Payton beat me out for the first team on the NAIA (National Assn of Intercollegiate Athletics) All-American team," Franklin reports.

Following his fruitful experience with the Angelo Rams, he went on to try out with the New York Giants. But his size soon got in the way.

I'm only 5-foot-7, and at 168 pounds, I was just too small to make the team. I always wanted a football career, but I've put it back into the shadows. It's just not reality for now."

Does this mean football is definitely out of the question? "I still think about getting back into it. I could send film clips from Angelo State to one of the weaker teams like Seattle or Tampa, and try out as a free agent. But I probably won't because I really like coaching and really want to get it."

Fike Godfrey Launches Campaign

"And, above all, we must maintain a strong defense for our nation--strong enough to deter aggression--or else we will find that solutions to all our other problems are meaningless," he declared.

Godfrey said that, with the help of such people as Congressman Burleson, he has learned to work with congressional and federal procedures while representing West Texas on many trips to Washington during the last seven years. He said he knows his way around the Halls of Congress and has the necessary experience, background, and knowledge of previous

Congressional actions to enable him to begin immediately making decisions that are right for the people of the district on many critical issues that the new Congress will face immediately when they convene.

Godfrey said he would be "ready, willing and able to begin providing effective representation for the district the moment I take the oath of office."

Godfrey also noted that he and his wife had spent their vacations for many years traveling to foreign countries. He said the visits they have made to 24 foreign countries

Research on the thalidomide tragedy of malformed children indicates that the drug interfered with the use of nicotinic acid (a B-complex vitamin) in the fetus.
