McCauley Is Chairman

John Tower Campaigns Here

U.S. Senator John Tower told the group in Haskell last Friday that if the taxpayers in the U.S. would get together and tell the Congress to stop wasteful spending that it would stop.

Tower said that organized labor, and their special interest lobby groups yield more power than their numbers justify because they can promise block votes. He added that the people paying the bills are the ones that legislators listen to first, citing examples of recent legislation which was reversed after

public outcry. The two examples concerned seatbelts and the recent saccharin ban.

Tower also criticized government spending and liberal legislators who continually try to trim the defense budget as the first means of cutting the national debt.

Tower was in Haskell to campaign for re-election during the Memorial Day recess in Congress.

His talk with approximately 25 Haskell residents was a question and answer session.

At one point a frustrated guest asked what we could do about the problems in this

country and Tower replied, "elect more people who believe like you." He said that there is currently a shift in the U.S. population and that during the next ten years the southwest will gain approximately 15 seats in the House of Representatives from the northeast.

The Senators talk was very obviously non-partisan and at one time he said that there are good Republicans and good Democrats. The choice of the voters should not be one of party as much as the individual who will best represent them.

Second Primary Set Saturday

The second Democratic Primary will be held this Saturday June 3, with voters deciding four races.

The four races to be decided will be: U.S. Congressman 17th District; candidates are A.L. Dusty Rhodes and Charles Stenholm, 11th Court of Civil Appeals, J. Neil Daniel and Bob Dickenson, Rail Road Commissioner, John Poerner and Jerry Saddler, and Haskell County Treasurer, Peggy Darden and Willie Faye Tidrow.

Tuesday afternoon was the last day for absentee voting and approximately 100 ballots had been cast.

The money was raised by operation of the concession stand during football games and by holding salad luncheons. This project would not have been possible without the help and support of the people in our community. By their continued support, it is

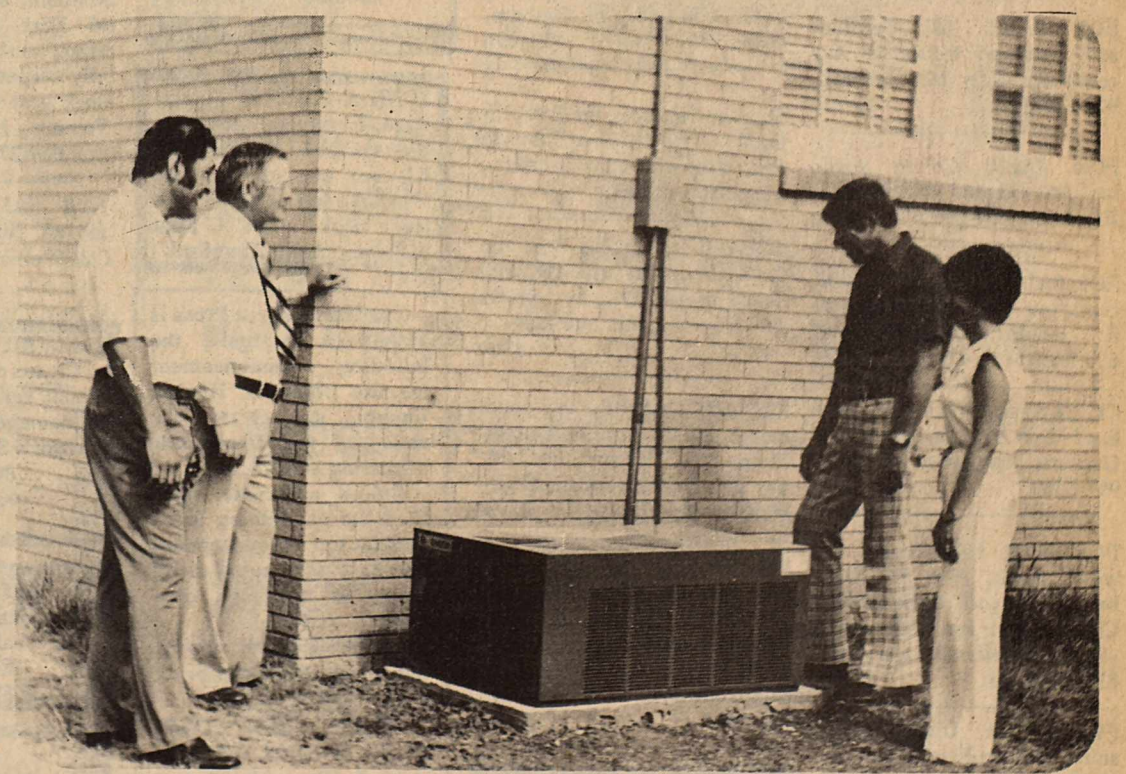
evident that they too are proud of our bands.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—THE FOREIGN POLICY OF THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION is seeming one of making enemies of our friends by trying to make friends of our enemies.

IN LATIN AMERICA, OUR TREATMENT OF CERTAIN NATIONS, which in the past and present proved our strongest allies, is either being criticized or ignored at the same time we are giving away the Panama Canal. Although the effort to "normalize" our relations with Cuba has been the mode in the last

year, that idea is somewhat cooling off because of Castro's venture in revolution in Africa.

BOTH CUBA AND PANAMA ARE IN THE MARXIST CAMP AND antagonistic to the United States, but our policy has been to favor them. Chili, Argentina, Brazil, and Nicaragua are anti-communist and pro-American in their posture. They have been targets of heavy criticism from our Country.

NICARAGUS COMES AS THE MOST RECENT AND CLEAR EXAMPLE. Trujillo of

Panama and Castro of Cuba are not elected but Nicaragua is held up as a violator of human rights under a President who was elected by the people. In the case of Rhodesia, we and the British agreed to support the proposition of majority rule worked out between Prime Minister Ian Smith and two prominent black leaders to hold open elections on a one-man-one-vote procedure.

THIS IS THE SAME DEMAND MADE BY THE GUERRILLA TRIBAL leaders in Angola and Mozambique, but who turned down the offer, and continue to head the band of marauders across the Rhodesian border. Joshua Nkomo and Robert Mugabe were invited back to Rhodesia to cooperate under the new agreement but have refused to do so. Now it seems that they are highly regarded by the State Department and our United Nations Ambassador Andrew Young.

THESE GUERRILLA FIGHTERS AGAINST RHODESIA AND THEIR FOLLOWERS have been invited to return to Rhodesia and take part in the elections. They have been promised total amnesty with no reprisals but, the offer has been turned down. The transition government with Prime Minister Smith as Chairman, Bishop Abel Muzorewa, Jeremiah Chirau and Reverend Sithole, joined in the invitation to the dissidents to return. The invitation was refused. All the

things they have been saying they wanted and have been fighting for have now been settled, yet, they want no part in forming a new government.

THE MAJORITY RULE IS ASSURED, OF COURSE, SINCE THESE THREE in Rhodesia's transition government represent at least 85 percent of the black voters of the country.

THIS, HOWEVER, IS NOT WHAT THE GUERRILLAS in neighboring countries just outside Rhodesia will agree to. Since they are supported by Russia, it is obvious that what they want is a government of their own making which means to establish a Marxist dictatorship under their command.

IT IS INCONCEIVABLE THAT WE SHOULD TAKE THE SIDE-OF these revolutionaries instead of being consistent in carrying out what was originally recommended and to which we gave our support along with the British.

AS WEAK AS WE ARE IN OUR INFLUENCE IN AFRICA AND THE Middle East, it seems we choose to shop around in poor speculation for highly doubtful friends while criticizing those who have proved to be our friends.

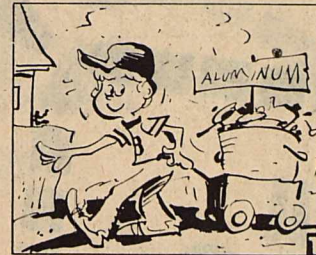

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Screwworm Cases Increase

The president of Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association today called on Texas livestock owners to do all in their power to aid the Screwworm Eradication Program.

"If we don't," warns John Armstrong, "there are indications Texas ranchers will be battling a severe screwworm population in the Lone Star State within a few weeks."

"Screwworms have been detected in widely separated parts of the state, outside the sterile fly release area," says Armstrong. Indirect evidence shows that many unknown cases exist in the areas in between. "The nine known are probably only the tip of the iceberg," warns the head of Texas' oldest and best known livestock producer's association.

In late April, screwworms were found in a wound in a horse in Hudspeth county, about 50 miles east of El Paso. In early May screwworms were taken from the navel of a calf near Marfa, in Presidio County.

The third week of May brought lab identification of screwworms from two widely separated cattle in Coleman County; another in Stonewall county, one in Mitchell county two in Liveoak county, and one in Hidalgo county. None were first generation cases. This proves screwworms exist in unknown numbers over at least a third of Texas.

Each unknown and untreated case, says Armstrong, can lead to 100 or more within just three weeks, a generation for the screwworm fly. The only practical protection we have, explains a south Texas rancher, is to cooperate with the Screwworm Eradication Program in every possible way.

This means to see our animals as often as possible, treat all wounds, detect all infestations and send samples of worms found in every infested wound to the lab for identification.

With the limited facilities at its disposal the Screwworm Eradication Program has to know where wild screwworm flies exist if it is to do an effective job. Lab identification of worm samples is the

only scientifically proven way to do this.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) and USDA livestock inspectors are finding many disturbing facts as they investigate the known screwworm cases. These investigations are made in order to determine the best way to stamp out known screwworm populations.

Thousands of livestock have been shipped into Texas from the severely screwworm infested areas of Arizona and California. Some are coming to Texas for slaughter, some for shows, some for breeding purposes and some for further feeding before slaughter.

Armstrong says inspectors are learning there have been cases that were not reported (no samples sent to the lab.) "Some people with known screwworm cases in their livestock are continuing to castrate with reckless disregard, without taking precautions against screwworm infestation.

"If apathy on the part of livestock owners continues—man-made wounds, non-treatment of existing wounds, non-reporting of cases—we're in for a bad time," says the Kleberg county rancher.

"Sterile flies cannot win the battle alone, especially if they aren't put on the battleground.

Help may be on the way for lowering the costs of feeding cattle. Initial research on a new compound called monensin has had positive results at several agricultural colleges and test stations. Classified as an antibiotic, the chemical has produced an increase in feed efficiency as high as 13 percent. Average improvement in tests at the University of Nebraska was 11 percent. On that basis a dollars and cents evaluation means a savings of about twenty dollars a head in the average feeding cost for feedlot beef. Food and Drug Administration officials are expected to react more favorably toward the new compound than toward the still controversial DES since monensin acts only in the rumen of the animal and reportedly leaves no residues in tissue. Researchers say the compound enhances gain efficiency when used in amounts small enough to be comparable to adding one pint to 5,000 gallons of water.

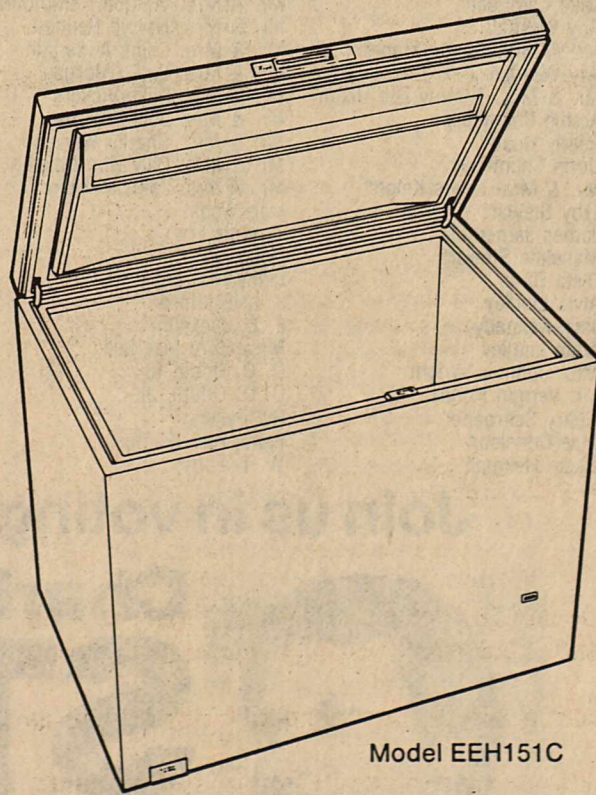

New Rules For Duplicate SS Cards

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to show a new name must now present evidence of identity before the new card can be issued, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said today.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. This can no longer be done, Hammons said.

In addition to submitting evidence of identity, the person's application will be checked against the records at social security headquarters. If all the information checks out, a new card will be issued.

The new rules are intended to help protect the person's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number.

Evidence of identity should show the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information. All documents are subject to verification with the agency which issued them. Since it takes 3 to 6 weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted, it is a good idea to apply for the duplicate card as soon as possible.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a social security number," lists the kinds of evidence that can be used to establish a person's identity. Copies can be obtained at the Abilene social security office, located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Our Consumer Protection Division has received several complaints over the past few months concerning tactics used by unscrupulous moving companies.

Some of these complaints come from consumers who have had difficulty getting compensation for goods damaged during a move. Other complaints concern the practice of "lo-balling," in which, for example, a mover says he will move you from San Antonio to Houston for \$400, but ends up billing you for \$600.

Since this is the time of the year when many Texans relocate, our attorneys urge careful consideration in the selection of a moving company.

Most reputable moving companies are licensed by the Texas Railroad Commission. They are bonded, carry insurance and pay a licensing fee and transportation taxes.

Consumers should be aware that there are three kinds of moving companies: (1) unregulated ones that can move goods from their home base to another city; (2) companies licensed by the Texas Railroad Commission to move goods anywhere in Texas; and (3) companies licensed by the Interstate Commerce Commission to

move goods to other states. The lawyers in our Consumer Protection Division suggest several guidelines for consumers before selecting a mover:

Get at least three estimates from reputable movers. Check with the Railroad Commission to determine if the mover is certified. Choosing a mover at random from the yellow pages of the telephone directory can be risky.

See that the company inventories your goods and make sure you receive a copy of the inventory.

Be wary of unusually low estimates that may signal "lo-balling." Remember that a mover does not have to stick with his estimate. An estimate is only an idea as to how much the move will cost. The actual cost is determined by the weight of the shipment, the distance to be traveled, and the fixed tariff rate for the two.

Make sure the company carries insurance to cover damage to goods, but plan to buy some additional insurance if you want full protection.

American Ag News

The following is a research paper done by Randy Butters of Michigan, using facts and figures from the United States International Trade Commission, and his own studies.

In 1964, the Import Act of 1964 was passed, setting import quotas at 7% of our annual production. Imports could go beyond quota by 10% before triggering import restrictions.

However, authority was given the President to increase decrease quotas depending on prices and supplies of deoestically produced meat. Also, the president has the power to completely lift all import quota restrictions.

Unfortunately, since 1964, the quota of 7% has been exceeded 12 times. Nine of the 12 times, it was suspended by the President. Each time prices were rising, imports were increased to drive down consumer prices, or import quotas were lifted to continue depressing domestic markets.

Here are examples: 1964-1969, no import quotas imposed; 1970-1971, quotas imposed but later was suspended.; 1972, no import quotas imposed; 1973-1974, quotas were imposed but later suspended.; 1975, no import quotas imposed; 1976, quotas were imposed but later suspended; 1977, no import quotas imposed.

This record speaks for itself. We can see years when there was profit in beef production, and what was done to half of it.

Why does our government oppose profit for the farmer? Our government doesn't ask Australia and other countries to sell below their production cost and they shouldn't expect us to.

Also, live cattle imports were allowed at all-time high prices during 1972, 73. Our prices were on the rise and all-time record numbers were imported to compete with us.

When price controls were put on beef, prices began to drop. So what did our government do? They cut numbers of live cattle imports so they could say 'We are trying to protect our farmers.'

However, no import quotas were imposed until 1976, buy they were then increased. The damage has been done.

Producer losses were at all-time highs, and cow-calf operations began sell-offs. Consequently our domestic production was on the rise and prices continued to fall. Did our government try to protect us by stopping imports or reducing quotas? No, they increased imports by suspending quotas.

With cattle coming off grass there was available land for

other uses. In 1974, grain producers were making record profits, and this looked like a good alternative to cattle production. Our government said 'Plant fence to fence.'

Grasslands that had never been planted went into row crop. This has only added to our problem of over-production of grain. This is how meat imports have hurt our grain production.

Now, back to the meat imports. 1976 continued with cow-calf sell-offs, and 1976 was almost another record year for live cattle imports. With increased meat imports, cattle prices remained depressed.

However, in 1977, cow numbers had been cut so severely that cow availability for slaughter was becoming limited. Also, with less cattle on feed, beef production was finally down and demand for good and choice cattle was growing so prices were on the rise.

What reaction did our government have? They removed import quotas to compete with us once more.

But our domestic production had been cut so low that cattle prices are continuing to rise. Price to the consumer is going up and beef feeders are beginning to profit once again.

Our president has just used his power once again by increasing beef imports. At this time when farmers are needing to realize profits, we may be in for another depressed price period.

In 1973, out of every dollar spent by the consumer on beef, our farmer was getting 66c, which was the highest figure since 1966. However, in 1977, our share of the dollar spent for beef was down to 56c.

Why has our share of the dollar spent on beef reached an all time low? Why does our government continue to import more meats that depress our markets when our share of the dollar spent for food keeps decreasing?

There is but one answer. We are being forced to operate and sell below our cost of production to fulfill the goals of one interest. This interest wishes to control agriculture and the only way it through the breaking and bankruptcy of the American Family Farm.

This interest is the Trilateral Commission headed by David Rockefeller of the Chase-Manhattan Bank. Our present administration is almost completely made up of Trilateral members.

American Agriculture is now the only organization strong enough to stop this move by the Trilateralists. Unless we get our markets back on the parity basis, there is no reason to expect any

lasting higher prices for any sector of our agricultural economy. Without profits in agriculture, we are doomed. And the economy of the U.S. is in a very serious situation.

We must stay united in American Agriculture and do what we know must be done. We must cut production to insure higher prices giving us profits that will enable us to continue producing food and fiber for this entire country and a large portion of the rest of the world. Good quality at a reasonable cost.

We need to get back to the point of getting more of the dollar that is spent on food. That is our right. We demand it.

Since 1973, our beef producer has had 10c of every dollar taken from him. It has been stolen and will continue to be stolen, only in larger portions, until we stop it.

Let's stop these imports and build a strong cattle economy which in return will build a once again strong grain economy. 100% parity by law with import restrictions is the answer for American Agriculture, and will remain our goal until we achieve it.

Remember to go to the polls this Saturday and vote for the candidate who you feel will best serve the needs of the American people.

Erosion along county roads has long been recognized as a source of pollution. But until just recently nothing was done about it on more than a single farm basis.

Under a program of Land Inventory Monitoring (LIM), the Soil Conservation Service made a rather detailed survey of twenty prime sample units in Haskell County that were selected at random by computer.

On each of these twenty sample units, SCS personnel determined the crops grown, residue management, gullies, and several other points that could be a leading factor in the high soil-loss rate that is being experienced nation-wide.

Within the next few weeks, John Adams, Agricultural Engineer, Soil Conservation

Service, of Abilene, will be working in Haskell County, making a survey of road-side erosion. This survey will be another part of the national survey started last year.

From the survey which Mr. Adams will be making, it is hoped that much valuable information will be gathered as to need, extend of existing erosion, and potential for further erosion. From this data collected, the SCS will then be in a position to furnish needed technical assistance for control of this source of pollution. Should Mr. Adams call on you for permission to enter your farm, please extend to him the same welcome that you would to me or one of the members of the Haskell SCS Field Office Staff.




