

Floodwaters Rip Haskell

Probably the most severe natural disaster in the history of Haskell occurred last Thursday night and Friday morning when measured rainfall totaled up to 18 inches in various parts of the City. Sam Herren, official weather observer in Haskell, recorded 15.65 inches but said that more fell in other areas.

The rain caused flooding to some extent in almost all parts of the City and high winds added to the total damages.

Current damage estimates are at \$3,000,000.00, but it will be some time before a complete and accurate estimate will be available.

The most concentrated flooding occurred along Spring Branch Creek, but homes in low areas throughout the city received damaged from the rising waters.

Local law enforcement officers began evacuating residences near the creek at about 1 a.m. Friday. Members of the Haskell Fire Department were called in at about 2 a.m. to assist in the evacuation. By 4 a.m. most residents had been evacuated from the area where the most severe flooding was expected.

The creek reached flood stage shortly after midnight and for a short time most flooding consisted of slowly rising water. By 3 a.m. the creek was a raging monster that began tearing walls from homes and literally washing cars and pick-ups downstream. When waters began to recede, there were about 10 vehicles in the creek bottom which had been completely covered by high water. One of the vehicles, a pick-up belonging to Estle Gilleland, was carried from his home at 401 S. Ave. F, to a point across U.S. 277 about midway through the City Park. The estimated distance of travel was about 300 yards along the creek bed.

The most severe structural damage to a home occurred to the residence of Beulah McFadin and Eula Arend, sisters who live at 304 S. Ave F. The home was washed from

its foundation approximately sixty feet. About one half of one wall and all of another wall was completely torn from the structure.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Owens, Gilbert Ammons, Mr. and Mrs. Jake Dusak and Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Tidrow also received major structural damage.

There were many more homes with water damage and minor structural damage.

At least two mobile homes were washed from their foundations by high water during the storm. The mobile homes belonged to Mr. and Mrs. Mike Dulaney and Mr. and Mrs. George Featherstone.

The flood waters began receding by 8 a.m. Friday and almost immediately, local residents began helping neighbors with clean-up chores.

The city was completely divided from about 3:30 a.m. to 8 a.m. by high water along the creek. Both U.S. 277 and U.S. 380 were impassable where the creek crosses. Water was over the top of guard rails on both of the highway bridges. Members of the Haskell Fire Department transported Dr. Joe Thigpen from N. 5th and Ave. I, where his vehicle had stalled, to the Hospital and were later called to transport Dr. R.E. Colbert from the City Hall to the Hospital but, by that time water was too high for the Fire Truck to make the crossing.

Throughout the early morning hours, tractor-trailer rigs continued to cross the creek on U.S. 277 and by about 7 a.m. trucks from the State Highway

Dept. were transporting people across the creek. As the waters began to recede, there were several Highway Dept. trucks, and trucks and tractors belonging to private individuals, which were towing cars through the high water.

Prisoners at the Haskell County Jail were evacuated as waters began to rise into the jail. The prisoners were ferried across the creek by the Highway Dept. in a front-end loader and met by officials of the Jones County Sheriff's office who transferred them to Jail in Anson.

Almost all public services were affected to various extents during the storm.

Electrical service was off in various parts of town at two different times during the storm. The first interruption came when a tree shorted-out two power lines. High winds whipped another line and finally caused the line to separate which caused an interruption for a short time.

Gas service was disrupted in isolated places when debris washing down the creek caused several leaks.

Telephone services were also interrupted at several residences.

Some damage occurred at the new sewer plant from flooding but sewer service was not interrupted. City water service was not affected by the storm other than high water preventing the pumper from getting to several wells which caused a low water level in the towers for a short time.

As a safety precaution, representatives of the State Health Department were requested to test the water system. The test was conducted Monday at each City well and Health Dept. officials reported that all wells were safe.

By Saturday afternoon representatives of the Red Cross were in town providing immediate relief to families affected by the flooding. In addition to the disaster aid, the Red Cross provided a mobile refreshment center which was manned by members of the Haskell County Jaycees and Jaycee-ettes. Refreshments were taken

throughout the city to persons working on flooded homes and later was taken to all areas at Lake Stamford.

Several persons have inquired about making cash donations to the Red Cross. Local Red Cross representa-

tives will accept the donations but would rather they be mailed to a special flood fund which has been started in San

Miller Creek Full

Residents of Haskell, Monday, Knox City and Goree can expect to begin drinking water from Miller Creek Lake in about three weeks unless some unforeseen problem occurs according to Pete Beecher. Beecher is the supervisor of the North Central Texas Municipal

Water Authority. Beecher told the Free Press Tuesday morning that water appeared to be about three feet deep at the service spillway. At service spillway depth, the lake will contain 25,520 acre feet of water. Engineers have said that when full, the lake will supply the four member towns with water through the longest drought ever experienced.

The longest drought on record was in the early 1950's and lasted for almost seven years and the engineers are confident that the lake will supply water in a like situation.

Beecher is currently flushing lines and draining tanks in order to prepare the system for operation. All lines and tanks will be completely purged and cleaned before

operation is begun. There are approximately 54 miles of pipeline in the system.

According to Beecher, as soon as the lines and tanks are flushed, treated water can be pumped to the member towns. He estimates that the process will take about three weeks unless some major problem develops.

At the present time meters which will show the pump station operator the water levels in the towers in each of the member towns are not calibrated correctly. The system will react automatically and began to pump water to the towns as it is needed when the meters are calibrated correctly. Beecher said that water could be pumped manually until the meters are calibrated and the calibration would not stop the operation.

At the present time Beecher is the only male employee of the water authority. There are two full time secretaries and one part time secretary in the office. The Board of Directors met Tuesday night and discussed hiring personnel to operate the pump station.

Station operators will be required to hold a State Certificate of A, B, or C level.


Representatives of the Department of Health have been contacted and will be assisting with the complete operation of starting the system and making the various checks and tests required.

Beecher said, "I hope when we get this good water to the people, that they will realize what we have been working on for so long."

Since one of the major shortcomings of crop contracting has been the refusal to honor some contracts, Dr. Branson suggested formation of a central reporting agency... one which would provide financial information on buyers and delivery information on producers. Other suggestions called for a crop disaster clause in every contract and development of low-cost Government crop contracting insurance. Oxygen - about 1/5 of the air we breathe - is the only part of the air that sustains human life. When a fireplace, gas, oil, or coal heater burns, it also uses oxygen in the room. As the supply of oxygen becomes scarce in a tightly closed room, the burning process then produces carbon monoxide, which is a nonodorous but highly poisonous gas which can quickly cause death. The warning is clear. Rooms must be well ventilated during the heating season to supply enough oxygen both for heating units and for human breathing.

Center Open For Disaster Victims

The Federal Disaster Assistance Administration, FDAA, opened a one stop center for disaster victims in Haskell Monday at the Corral Building at the Fair Grounds.

The Center houses representatives of various state and federal government agencies and the Red Cross. The agencies began converging on Haskell shortly after President Carter officially designated Haskell County as a disaster area Saturday afternoon.

Haskell Mayor Royce Williams contacted the Governor's office Friday morning and issued his formal request that the City be designated a disaster area.

Mayor Williams and other city officials are now giving a \$3,000,000.00 figure as a very rough estimate of total dam-

ages in Haskell. Included in this figure is a \$1,000,000.00 estimate to City property including streets, alleys, parks, sewer plant, and City buildings.


Representatives of the Department of Housing and Urban Development made a partial survey of homes with water damage Monday afternoon and counted 148 homes with damage. They are now estimating that over 200 homes in Haskell received damage.

There is an additional estimate of 75 permanent residences at Lake Stamford which will be eligible for disaster assistance. Persons with cabins at the lake which are not their permanent residence are also urged to contact officials at the disaster center for information.

At noon Tuesday, a total of 166 individuals and families had requested aid or information at the center and officials said that the center would remain open as long as there was a need.

They request that all affected persons attempt to visit the center as soon as possible. When the demand for the center is no longer apparent, it will be closed and persons requesting assistance will have to contact each agency. While the center is open all agencies are in the same building and persons can make one stop and meet with all of the agencies.

FDAA has also installed a toll free number for assistance. Persons with questions about the programs or who need more information at a later date should call: 1-800-292-5120.

Council Discusses Flood

How to recover from the flood was the major item of business during the regular meeting of the Haskell City Council Tuesday night.

Mayor Royce Williams and most members of the Council attended a meeting Tuesday afternoon with other local governmental representatives from Throckmorton, Shackelford, Young and Jones Counties to learn the procedures for receiving assistance for their various cities and counties.

They learned that Public Law 93-288 would pay for repairing or replacing facilities to their condition before the disaster occurred. The local agencies become eligible for the Federal assistance only after a Presidential declaration is issued declaring a

disaster. Haskell was officially declared a disaster area by President Carter Saturday afternoon.

Council members appointed Loraine Johnson chairman of a committee to oversee the distribution of funds received in the Abilene Reporter News Emergency Fund. Haskell will receive 45% of all monies donated to the fund in Abilene. Shackelford County will also receive 45% and Throckmorton will receive 10%.

Johnson also announced that local residents who desire can make donations to the fund at the Haskell National Bank. All funds deposited locally will stay in Haskell to help flood victims.

Other members of the committee will be announced

later.

Mayor Williams expressed his personal thanks to Members of the Haskell Fire Department, City Police, and Sheriff's officers for their evacuation work during the storm, and to the State Highway Dept., Pat Hale, A.C. Richardson, and Jackie Isbell for transporting people and vehicles across high water.

An ironic action taken by the Council was to officially vote to discontinue their recent water rationing program. The reason for the vote was explained by saying that since the rationing program was recorded in the minutes, so should the stopping of the program be recorded. There were several comments about the need to ration various types of water which were seen in abundance last week-end.

Over 5,000 Attend Crusade

We also want to recognize the Haskell Jaycees who provided refreshments to the crowds at the stadium, and to say thank you to the school and school board for the gracious use of the stadium.


In the first planning meet-
