

Republican candidates gathered most of their votes in the absentee box and in the rural boxes of the county.

Charles Stenholm of Stamford was elected U.S. Representative in the 17th Congressional District. Stenholm carried the district with a margin of over 2 to 1 and carried Haskell County, 1962 to 854. That total represents about the same margin with which Stenholm defeated Dusty Rhodes in the second Democratic Primary.

State-wide, all races had been decided with the exception of the Governor's and U.S. Senator with the lead switching back and forth several times during the night. Wednesday morning tabulations showed Tower with a slight margin over Krueger and Republican Bill Clements leading Democrat John Hill.



so long they, too, have developed the sense to come in out of the heat. Extreme weather, heat or cold, will send rats as well as mice scampering for the nearest shelter. That may be your home or business.

If you don't have rats now, don't give them a chance to start. Keep all garbage in tightly covered metal trash cans and all cereal should be kept in and off the floors or ground. By following these suggestions, you deny rodents the three things they need to survive--food, water, and shel-

If you have seen rats or mice in or around your home, or have found droppings, tracks, runs, gnawings or greasy smears along walls where the rodents travel, the first step is to eliminate them. This can be accomplished by using either traps or rodenticides. The most readily available type of trap is the wood snap trap which can be purchased at small cost from food, hardware and variety stores. An enlarged trigger can be made for traps by slipping a piece of corrugated cardboard cut to half the size of the trap and pushed down over the trigger. This increases the size of the trigger so that it will be sprung more easily by the rodent stepping on it. Always put them along walls in out of the way places where the rodents prefer to run. Place them so that the trigger faces where the rodents prefer to run. Place them so that the trigger faces the wall. Bait, contrary to popular belief, does not have to be cheese. Nearly any food will do such as bread, oatmeal, bacon, peanut butter, or nuts. Use plenty of traps and keep then set. Dispose of all dead rodents as soon as caught. Do not handle

them with bare hands. Rodenticides may also be used in rodent control. There are a number of these on the market, but the anticoagulant types are recommended for the homeowner. These are not only effective, but are the least hazardous to use around the home with the proper caution. Anticoagulants keep cause death by internal hemorrhaging. Ready mixed baits containing the proper amount of anticoagulant mixed in corn meal or similar grains are available and are readily acceptable to both rats and mice.

These rodenticides are placed where the rodents run and feed. They should be placed in a bait box or under some type of cover to prevent children or animals other than rodents from getting to the bait. Cover will also protect the bait from the weather, as well as offering the seclusion desired by rodents when feeding. Water baits (anticoagulants dissolved in water) placed nearby will help repeated feedings to be effective. The bait stations should be maintained and replenished when necessary for at least 15 days. The amount of bait and number of bait stations will depend upon the degree of infestation, but it is better to use to much than

After most or all of the rodents have been eliminated, a few bait stations can be maintained permanently to help prevent reinfestation. Buildings should be ratproofed as much as possible, with all the holes larger than 1/4 of an inch being filled or covered with metal or hardware cloth.





Please read over the following Constitution and By-Laws, make notes of any changes you wish to make, and bring them with you when you come to the meeting. The meeting is open to all interested persons.

Mr. Mike Moeller, a lobbist for the Texans for Equitable Taxation, will be the speaker for the meeting.

CONSTITUTION

Article I 1. The HASKELL COUNTY TAX PAYERS ASSOCIATION of Haskell County (hereinafter called the T.P.A.) is hereby formed to provide an organization and forum for persons interested in orderly public school and government opera-

2. Membership shall be open to all persons who are owners of taxable property in Haskell County (hereinafter called the District).

3. T.P.A. shall be operated as a non-profit organization with its offices and principal place of business in Haskell County, Texas.

Article II 1. Objectives of T.P.A. shall be:

a. To insist on effective and conservative public school and government operations.

b. To encourage increased participation of citizens in policy making and planning for public schools and governments.

c. To closely monitor financial matters of public schools and governments including tax assessment, tax

2. T.P.A. members shall have a mutual, joint, and common interest in matters involving taxation, public services, education, utilities, communications, conservation, wildlife, law and order and such other matters as may be agreed upon.

Article III

1. The T.P.A. membership shall annually, in November, select, by a majority vote of the members present at the meeting designated for that purpose, a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasur-

er, and two directors from each community. Such officers and directors shall constitute the Board of Directors.

2. The Officers and Directors shall prepare By-Laws for the orderly operation of the T.P.A. in all matters consistent with this Constitution.

3. Such By-Laws shall provide for a meeting of the members of T.P.A. not less than annually and for a time, date, and place therefore. Any provision of this Constitution may be changed, altered, amended, or repealed by a majority vote of the members present at such meeting.

BY-LAWS **Article I-Preliminary** Provisions

The name, place of business, qualifications for membership and objectives of the T.P.A. shall be as stated in the Constitution and these By-Laws shall make up the rules, orders, and regulations whereby the business and operations of the T.P.A. shall be conducted and preformed.

Article II-Annual Meetings and Notices, Voting and **Provisions Therefore**

1. T.P.A. members shall convene in Annual Session in November each year in Haskell County, Texas, at a time and place to be designated by the President of T.P.A.

2. Notices to the members of such annual meetings shall be considered adequate if given by the news media and telephone.

3. Members present at such annual meeting shall constitute a quorum regardless of the number thereof, and are authorized to transact any business. Approval or rejection of any matter at such meeting shall be by majority vote of such members present and voting.

Article III-Dues & Membership

1. Dues of each member shall initially be \$1.00 per year payable in advance on or before the 30th of November for the next year ensuing and shall be receipted for in writing by T.P.A. No proration of dues shall be made for mid-year entry by a member. The amount of annual dues may be changed at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

2. A member of the T.P.A. is defined as a person owning property, taxable under the laws of this State, in the District, and who has paid dues set out and required

Article IV-Elections. Committees, Terms, Duties, Vacancies, Reports

1. The management, operations, and business affairs of T.P.A. shall be vested in a Board of Directors consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and fourteen Directors elected at the annual meeting held in November each year by a majority vote of the members present and voting.

2. An Executive Committee

consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer is granted full power and authority to conduct the management, operations, and business affairs of T.P.A. during periods between meetings of the Board.

3. A Nominating Committee of five members will be appointed each September by the President to prepare and recommend to the members in October a list of Officers and Directors to be voted on each November as heretofore speci-

4. Other committees as required may be appointed by the President at his discretion

to serve from time to time. 5. Terms of office shall be for one year for all elected positions. However, members may be elected to succeed themselves on to other posi-

6. Duties of officers and directors shall be:

a. President-Preside at annual meetings, general meetings, Board of Directors meetings, and Executive Committee meetings; Direct the affairs of T.P.A. consistent with these By-Laws and consent of the Board.

b. Vice-President-Assist the Preisdent as refor each general or annual meeting; Preside in the President's absence.

c. Secretary-Take and maintain minutes at all meetings: Maintain membership records; Provide notices of meetings as required.

d. Treasurer-Receive all dues and monies forthcoming to T.P.A.; Receipt and account for all monies received; Maintain bank accounts and financial records of all transactions; Pay promptly all obligations of T.P.A. e. Directors-Serve in an

advisory capacity for the orderly operation of T.P.A. 7. Vacancies of officers or directors positions will be

filled by majority vote of the Board of Directors to serve out the unexpired term. 8. An annual report shall be prepared by the President to be made to the members at

the annual meeting in November concerning the operations of T.P.A. for the current year. Such report shall include recommendations for activities for the coming year.

Article V-Employees,

Expenses 1. Employment of personnel to assist in the orderly functioning of T.P.A. may be made by the President upon approval of the Executive Committee. Such employees may include secretaries, clerks, advisors, consultants, attorneys, etc. The President may discontinue such employment at his discretion. The Executive Committee shall approve all compensation.

2. Expenses of officers, directors, or members incurred in an official capacity for T.P.A. will be reimbursed by the Treasurer on an actual cost basis. Itemized expense statements including receipts will be submitted for reimbursement. The Executive Committee will review and approve all reimbursements.

Article VI. Miscellaneous Provisions

1. At the annual meeting in November, the nominations for Officers and Directors from the Nomination Committee may be added to from the floor with the approval of the nominee. Such nominations will be for a specific office or directorship and will be so

2. No officer or director shall receive any compensation for services other than reimbursible expenses.

3. News media and telephone notice as provided in Ariticle II. Section 2, may be waived where actual notice has been given and receipt acknowledged.

4. T.P.A. will give due consideration to programs proposed and advanced where such programs may promote. assist, and advance the purposes of T.P.A.


5. T.P.A. may be incorporated under the Laws of the ate of Texas at any time it may be considered necessary and advisable by the Executive Committee. Thereupon, all terms, conditions, and provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws of T.P.A. not in conflict with the charter of such corporation shall remain in full force and effect.



In World of Wildlife, It's Courting Males Who 'Dress' to Please, Says Nature Magazine


Among humans, it is the female who is noted for primping and preening to attract a

But in the world of wildlife, the situation is often reversed, according to National Wildlife magazine. There, the current (October-November) issue of the magazine reports, it is usually the male who puts on a spectacular show during courtship.

The show may consist of anything from a display of feathers - which the peacock spreads to impress an admiring hen - to a loud noise or a change of body color. And it sometimes includes the use of weapons, such as spurs or antlers, to fight off other suitors, says the bimonthly publication of the National Wildlife Federation.

Along with the peacock, the male grouse and turkey use their feathers to catch the attention of prospective mates. The grouse raises a ruff of glossy feathers around his neck. The wild turkey, in addition to showing his feathers, sports a "beard" - a tuft of hair-like feathers that sprout from his chest.

The turkey gobbler and the male pheasant wear sharp spurs on their legs to fight off



A man might think that kind of noise is for the birds, but for those fowl it works better than man's so-called wolf whistle.

With many species, the magazine reports, mating occurs only after the male suitor instinctively performs a series of courtship rituals. Painted turtles stroke the female's cheeks with the elongated claws of their forefeet. The male fiddler crab waves an enlarged claw in the face of his chosen mate - not a subtle gesture among those crustaceans whose "fiddle" claw comprises nearly half of their body weight.

Some males must work faster than others. Since adult moths live only a few days, the male is equipped with a broad, feathery antenna that helps him zero-in on the "perfume" of a female, sometimes miles away.

Modern science has slowed the march of one destructive species, the gypsy moth, according to National Wildlife, by synthesizing the female's scent and releasing it where there are no females. This confuses the males and thwarts their efforts to mate a mean trick on the moths but a boon to mankind.







Environmental Technology Uses Wastes To Create Land Resources



Milwaukee area youngsters enjoy playing soccer on completed sanitary landfill. Less than a mile in the background, another phase of landfill development rises 50 feet above grade, well on the way to becoming a 200-foot-tall ski hill.

Kids play soccer on them. Skiers glide down them. Industrial firms set up shop on them. What are they?

They are custom-designed properties, developed through the use of environmentally

engineered sanitary landfill. Sanitary landfill offers communities around the nation a safe, efficient, and economical method of disposing of their solid wastes, while improving large tracts of land which might otherwise be of little use

Unlike the town dump of old, today's modern sanitary landfill provides safe disposal of wastes in sites engineered to protect surrounding land and water resources. Wastes are deposited in layers and sealed by thick blankets of clay or soil. This "sandwich" effect allows for the development of custom-made landforms, which may be used for a wide variety of recreational or commercial purposes following completion of the sanitary landfill.

Near Milwaukee, Waste


Management, Inc., is applying sanitary landfill technology in the construction of 325acre, regional recreational complex. A completed section of the development supports a dozen regulation-sized soccer fields. Future sections will offer ski hills, picnic grounds, and a golf course. The company is utilizing landfill technology to build similar recreational complexes in Illinois, Minnesota, and

Maryland. About 90 percent of our solid wastes are disposed of through sanitary landfill. Resource and energy recovery systems may assume a larger future role in the management of wastes as these systems become more economical and efficient. But today, sanitary landfill continues to provide safe and effective disposal of our nation's waste materials.




