Swink Convicted Of Murder

A seven-woman, five-man jury deliberated one hour and forty-four minutes last Saturday before finding Roy Glenn Swink, 17, of Aspermont, guilty of murder in connection with the shotgun slaying of his 14 year old brother, Royce.

The jury deliberated one hour before setting punishment at 45 years in the Texas Department of Correc-

The trial was held in Haskell on change of venue and began Monday morning with hearings. Jury selection began Monday afternoon and the jury was selected early Monday evening.

Swink was indicted by a Stonewall County Grand Jury with the deaths of his father, H.W. Swink, 38, his step-mother, Ilene Swink, 27, and his brother, Royce.

The Grand Jury returned three separate indictments. Swink was tried only on the charge of shooting Royce

District Judge William P. Ratliff granted the request of Swink's Attorney's Clifford and Mike Brown to postpone official sentencing for ten

days. Official sentencing will be held Dec. 28, at 11 a.m.

District Attorney Joseph Thigpen, stated following the trial that he would make a decision as to the other two indictments by the time of official sentencing.

The trial, the longest in recent history in Haskell, began Monday afternoon and concluded Saturday afternoon when the District Judge expressed his thanks to the jurors and dismissed them.

During the four days of testimony which began Tuesday morning and ended Friday afternoon, the State presented a total of sixteen witnesses. and rested their case Friday morning shortly before lunch.

The defense called twenty character witnesses during a two hour span Friday afternoon before resting their case. Each of the character witnesses testified that Swink's reputation in Aspermont was good.

Called to testify by the State were: Troy Swink, Larry Beauchamp, Marshall Brown, Marvin Crawford, Randy Jones, Dr. Jarrett Williams, Allan Jones, Sally Williams, Wayne

Swink, Marlene Swink, Dr. Lesley Serrano, Betty Patton, Kim Schuchart, Church Simpson, Clarice Server and Royce Stanaland.

Character witnesses called by the defense were: Doyle Rash, Marvin Vahlenkamp, Cecil Lewis, Mrs. Pat Cumby, Brenda Hawkins, Brad Dubert, Opal Smith, Margie B. Lot, Al Fincher, Cecil Robinson, Truette Hennig, Phil Petty, Larry LeFevre, W.C. Robinson, Pat Mitchell, Wayne Thigpen, Clyde Cook, Ralph Riddle, Mrs. M.D. Pittcock, and Steve Cochran.

The State's case was based on circumstantial evidence. During the trial, the State introduced approximately 80 pieces of evidence. The evidence consisted of photographs, reports, diagrams, a window screen, pair of gloves, blood samples, shot pellets and wadding, a shotgun, a pair of tennis shoes, fired shot shells, and live shot shells, a gas tank and various other articles related to the case.

Photographs containing the bodies of H.W. and Ilene Swink were not received into evidence after the defendants attorneys argued that the photographs had nothing to do with the case which dealt only with the death of Royce.

The bulk of testimony in the case came during the questioning of Wayne Swink, uncle of the defendant, Larry Beauchamp, Investigator for the District Attorney's office, and Texas Ranger Marshall Brown.

Swink testified that the defendant arrived at his residence about 4:30 or 4:45 on the morning of Jan. 24, 1978, banging on the door. He said that when young Swink entered the house he was shouting, "somebody was in

the house, somebody was shooting.' Swink told his uncle, and later told officers, that he had heard a gun shot, got out of bed and put his pants on, looked into the bedroom across the hall, (the bedroom of his father and step-mother) saw Ilene sitting up in bed, heard Royce say, "I'll call an ambulance," and that he than heard another shot. At that time he said he went back into his room where he turned on the light, put on his shoes and socks, knocked out a bedroom window with his right hand and climbed out the window. He then said

uncle's house.

Both Ranger Brown and Investigator Beauchamp testified that the investigation centered on the defendant on the morning of January 27, when they received a telephone call from the Institute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas. The caller related that the seven fired shells had been chambered in a shotgun found in the defendant's closet.

Allan Jones, firearms examiner and Sally Williams, Forensic Serologist, with the Institute both testified as expert witnesses.

Dr. Jarrett Williams performed the autopsies on the three bodies and testified that H.W. had four wounds, Ilene had two and Royce had one.

A former girlfriend testified that she had been visited in the hospital in Stamford on the night prior to the incident. She said that she advised Swink that she was pregnant and they discussed plans for marriage.

She testified that Swink had told her that if anything happened to his father, that he and Royce would get everything and that with insurance,

everything would be paid for.

When Clifford Brown questioned her as to whether or not Roy and his father fought, she related a story concerning an incident which occured on January 6. She said that Roy had told her that his father beat him with bailing wire. When Brown asked her if he hit his father she testified that he said he could never hit his father.

District Attorney Thigpen then ask her if Roy said anything else about the beating and she answered, "He just said, I'll get him."

Character witnesses testified that Roy was well thought of in the community prior to the incident and that both boys and their family were well liked and respected.

Assisting the District Attorney in prosecuting the case were Stonewall County Attorney Travis Hartgraves and Royce Adkins as special prosecu-

D. P. S. Urges Safe Drivina **During Holidays**

Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. said today, "Operation Motorcide will be in effect for two periods: The Christmas period will begin at 6:00 p.m. Friday, December 22, and end at 11:59 Monday, December 25, 1978; the New Year's period will begin at 6:00 p.m. Friday, December 28, 1978 and will end at 11:59 p.m. Monday,

January 1, 1979." It has been predicted by the Texas Department of Public Safety that 44 persons will lose their lives during the Christmas period of Operation Motorcide. Thirty-five persons are expected to lose their lives in the New Year's Operation Motorcide.

Every available trooper from the DPS will be on duty throughout the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Drivers License, Motor Vehicle Inspection and License and Weight will assist the Texas Highway Patrol in an all-out effort to enforce the traffic laws and aid the motorists in Texas.

These troopers will be on full alert on all highways in the area to control traffic, lower speeds and get the drinking driver off the Texas roads.

With this highly concentrated effort on the part of the Texas Department of Public Safety, it is anticipated that traffic violations will be greatly deterred throughout the state.

Excessive speed and the lack of control of speed will be great factors in traffic deaths. In repeated accidents, it has been proven that any speed above 55 will take a large toll in human lives. Fifty-five miles per hour is the maximum speed allowed by law.
This Law we can live with!
In past few holidays, it is

indicative that there is an increase of motorcyclist deaths on the highway. Motorcyclists are not wearing protective headgear and the loss of life is overwhelming when the helmet is not used.



Food Poisoning Can Be Prevented

The following information is brought to you by the Texas Department of Health:

QUESTION: What is food poisoning?

ANSWER: Food poisoning is a general term, not in itself, but often used to designate any type of disease or illness caused by taking into the body contaminated or adulterated food and drink. It often is referred to mistakenly as ptomaine poisoning.

QUESTION: What causes food poisoning? ANSWER: There are three general causes.

First, there are poisonous foods such as some varieties of mushrooms and certain shellfish. Secondly, there are poisonous

be accidentally introduced into food: for example, rodent and poisonous spray residues on fruits and vegetables. But the most common type of food poisoning is that caused by bacteria which grow and multiply in food. For example, staphylococcus and botulinus organisms, salmonella germs.

QUESTION: Where are the bacteria found that cause food poisoning and how are they transmitted?

ANSWER: Major reservoirs, or places where bacteria such as salmonella germs live, are in the intestines of humans, birds and animals-

substances which may including rats, mice, dogs and cats-and are sometimes "carried" by a healthy perinsect poisons or son. Bacteria are hitchhikers. They ride on flies and insects; on utensils and in water, food and milk; on dust particles; on man and rodents and in their bodily discharges such as saliva and body wastes.

QUESTION: What can be done to prevent food poisoning?

ANSWER: Complete fly, rodent and roach control are deterrents. Soap and hot water also are enemies of bacteria. All utensils used in cooking should be washed carefully. and washing your hands thoroughly after visiting the toilet will help. Sufficiently high temperatures kill germs, and sufficiently low ones retard or stop their growth altogether. Bacteria thrive at temperatures ranging from 45 to 140 degrees Fahrenheitfrom cool to warm. So keeping food just barely cool or warm doesn't help. Keep it below 45 degrees or above 140 degrees.

QUESTION: Do you have any specific tips for good safety around the kitchen?

ANSWER: Yes. Your home cutting board could be a source of sickness unless you wash it properly with hot water after cutting up raw meat and poultry. Germs can build up in the cracks and even contaminate the meat after it is cooked and placed back on the board. Other foods also can be

A few of the highlights of this publication include weatherstripping of windows and door joints to prevent air leaks. Install storm windows or insulating glass thereby cutting heat loss. It is understood by your local conservationist that there is a tax credit available for this item. Add insulation. There should be at least six inches over the ceiling and exterior walls should have three to four inches.

If the attic space is not accessible for insulating or otherwise, the installation of roof exhaust fans controlled by a thermostat set for 110 degrees will draw off accumulated hot air under the roof, reducing summer needs for air conditioning. Have a professional check your heating and cooling systems for more efficient opeation in the use of energy fuels. Clean air filtes of air conditioning units at least once every month, more often if necessary.

Turn off lights and electric appliances when not in use. Keep faucets packed to prevent leaks, especially in the hot water lines. Make sure refrigerator and freezer door seals are air tight and that condensing coils are clean.

Defer heavy use of the cooking range and self cleaning feature of oven to periods when the air conditioning system load is lightest-late evenings or early mornings. Schedule use of washer, dryer and iron for low-demand periods.

Turn on window air cooling units only when needed. Turn them off when the room they cool is unoccupied. When using a central air conditioning system, close doors to unused

rooms. It is generally best to leave the system's vents open to keep the entire system in proper working balance. Start your air conditioning unit early in the day or run it on the thermostat. During periods of peak engery demand move the thermostat to a higher setting. Most utility companies recommend a thermostat setting of 68 degrees for winter and 78 degrees for summer, with adjustments for night-time

Headstone Reimbursement Available From VA

The Veterans Administration is now permitted to reimburse a veteran's survivors for part of the money they spend for an eligible veteran's headstone or marker in any private cemetery.

This is one of the provisions of the Veterans' Housing Benefits Act of 1978 recently passed by Congress and signed into law by President Carter.

Survivors now have a choice of getting a VA-supplied headstone or marker or one they choose from a commercial supplier. The VA reimbursement, however, cannot exceed the average amount VA pays for the headstones or markers it supplies. Currently this amount is estimated at about \$43, far below the average cost of headstones or markers on the open market.

For those who choose to have a headstone or marker provided by VA, the agency now has the flexibility to provide headstones or markers of any material (marble, granite, bronze, slate or other) aesthetically compatible with the cemetery in which it is to e located.

Assistance in filing applications for reimbursement or for headstones or markers can be obtained at any VA office. Applications for reimbursement must be forwarded to the

nearest regional office. Applications for headstones or markers must be forwarded to Director, Headstones Service, National Cemetery System, Veterans Administration, Washington, D.C. 20420.

Jack Coker, Waco VA Regional Office Director, reminds survivors that VA may reimburse them also for part of the burial expense for an eligible veteran. The new amounts are \$1,100 if the death is service-connected and \$300 if it is not. These amounts are in addition to \$150 plot allowance if the veteran is not buried in a national cemetery.

Best values in Texas grocery markets this week include fryer chickens, grapefruit and deep-yellow vegetables, according to Gwendolyne

Also, stock up on frozen orange juice concentrate if it's a favorite--prices will go up soon, she advises.

Mrs. Clyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Price-quality trends this week are the following:

POULTRY--Poultry still remains the "economy" meat with fryer chickens "on special" in some markets. Whole birds are the budget buy. Egg prices are rising, and that trend will continue until after the holiday baking demand is over.

FRESH FRUITS--Grapefruit is plentiful, economical and in the peak of quality. Now is the season to buy, although it is available almost all year. Thin-skinned fruits have more juice. Avoid thick-skinned fruits or those with a pointed end. Also avoid fruit with soft or discolored areas.

Other fruits to consider include cranberries, bananas, oranges, grapes, pears, tangerines, and tangelos, along with a record supply of apples.

FRESH VEGETABLES--Economy items are sweet potatoes, rutabagas, hard-shell squash and carrots. Other budget buys are cabbage, potatoes and onions.

More salad items are worth price checks for good buys: head lettuce, escarole and endive, cucumbers and peppers. The last two will see price hikes soon.

Also, compare prices on cooking greens and broccoli.

BEEF--Best values are chuck roasts and steaks, liver and ground beef with soy protein. Some markets offer values on round and sirloin steaks.

PORK--Supplies increasing, but prices prob-

ably will not drop.

The "better" choices are cured hams, end chops, Boston butts, rib and loin-end roasts.

2. Particularly for nighttime fires, remember that closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allowing precious extra time for escape.

3. For escape from upper floors-use any available porch or garage roof, ladders, or for agile children especially, trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily, and that they are low and large enough to get through.

4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule "Once Out--Stay Out!"

5. Know how to call the fire department from a street box or neighbor's telephone and do this as quickly as possible once everyone is out of the burning house.

6. Periodically practice

Consider installing automatic household fire detection 'Unfortunately'', continued and alarm devices in your Emerson, "unless you have home. They can give vital done some thinking and early warning and extra planning, you may not be able escape time. Smoke and heat detectors installed in all major areas give full protection. Smoke detectors alone, installed outside bedrooms, can

gift returner, because they operate under more restrictive adjustment policies than other establishments. For that reason, our lawyers strongly recommend that shoppers check on store policy before buying gifts that may need to he returned or exchanged

There are certain instances in which a store is legally required to make adjustif a store advertised car coats with sheepskin linings, but you discover the lining is actually acrylic pile, you have the right to return the coat for an adjustment.

Or perhaps you ordered a size 12 dress but the store sent a size 14 Or you specified a green table lamp, but got a blue floor lamp. The store must correct its error or make some satisfactory adjustment

It's important to remember that if a store has advertised goods for a special sale, there may be a "no return" policy on that particular merchandise. Other items such as swim suits, undergarments, and other intimate apparel may always be sold on an "all sales final" basis for the customer's protection.

Just as most stores try to cooperate in making adjustments when possible, most consumers are careful to ask for an adjustment only if it is needed. But a few individuals may attempt to return merchandise that is worn or used, that they damaged themselves, or that they purchased months earlier. In such cases, merchants may rightfully refuse to make an

recommends the following: -Take all tags, price labels. and all sales or charge receipts with you.

-Return goods in their original containers.

-Return the goods to the department where they were purchased, or to the adjustment desk if there is

Controlled traffic farming is a concept getting a lot of attention lately . . . and probably even more in the future. Idea of the operation is to keep tractors moving only on surfaces not used for crops. Basically that seems quite unreasonable since the crops are in the field and it is usually necessary to get the tractor out there to do any good. None of that has changed. With controlled traffic farming the tractor would be driven on paths between the rows. Paths used only for the machinery. In most concepts of this type operation the paths would be the only points of compaction in the field. Therein lies the reason for concern. If compaction can be reduced, root systems can be more completely developed and higher yields would result. At Auburn University in Alabama a controlled traffic farm experiment resulted in a

yield 43 percent higher than crops grown with con-ventional tillage.

VA News

For the first time in its history, the Veterans Administration will issue personal identification cards to more than two million servicedisabled veterans to emphasize their top priority in obtaining treatment at VA centers medical outpatient clinics.

The innovative move was ordered by VA Administrator Max Cleland who said today. 'Veterans disabled in the military service are of prime concern to the VA. These identification cards will expedite the medical care they receive and will serve as a constant reminder to our employees as well as to veterans themselves that they are special people entitled to special care from their govern-

In a letter to 2,225,000 veterans receiving monthly compensation checks for service-connected disabilities, Cleland explained the priority system and enclosed an application blank which veterans are to return to obtain the cards.

The cards, with bold markings "Priority" and "Service-Connected" in a distinctive purple design, will alert staff members in VA facilities that bearers are entitled to special attention.

Veterans needing treatment for conditions not suffered in service may get VA medical care if they can't afford to go elsewhere and VA facilities are available.

Cleland said the new identification system does not remove the need to make appointments for examination or treatment at VA medical centers. "Making and keeping

appointments is still important to veterans seeking health care from the VA. Appointments assure that records are available, that staff is ready and that treatment is given.'

Eligible for the cards in addition to those Cleland wrote are another 500,000 veterans with service-con-nected disabilities for which they are not now being compensated. They will not be contacted by VA but may call the nearest VA regional office or medical center for informa-

Cleland said the only time a service-connected does not get priority attention is when there is an emergency for another patient.






