A. D. May Is Cotton Board Alternate

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has just received notification from the Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland that Mr. A. D. May, Sr. of Rule has been re-appointed as one of 6 alternates to the 20 member Cotton Board.

The Cotton Board administers a national research and promotion program to strengthen the competitive position of cotton and expand its uses. Members and alternates of the Cotton Board serve staggered three year terms.

They are selected from nominations made by certified cotton producer organizations in cotton producing states.

Two other Texans Mr. Dan W. Davis of Lubbock and Mr. Michael Burkholder of Pecos were also re-appointed to serve another term.

Mr. Marion Bowers, Seminole, was appointed as a new alternate to the Cotton Board. The members and alternates will serve three year terms ending December 31, 1981.

Community development and leadership training.

Prior to Jaycee Week here, the U.S. Jaycees recognized Americas Ten Outstanding Young Men of 1979 in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Two local Jaycees, Bo Owens and Charles Thornhill attended this three day Seminar and presentation.

The week celebrates the founding of the Jaycees in 1915 when Henry Giesenberg saw a need for a young men's civic group and organized the first chapter in St. Louis. The movement spread so fast that in 1920, the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce was formed with 24 cities represented. The Haskell County Jaycees were formed, as successors to the Haskell Jaycees, in 1974, with 64 members. The Haskell Jaycees were first formed in 1955, but ceased to function in 1973.

The name of the national organization was changed from the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce to the U.S. Jaycees in 1965 at the national convention of the young men's civic group.

Jaycee Week celebrates the founding of the Jaycee movement in St. Louis in 1915. From a small nucleus, it has expanded into today's organization with 375,000 members in 8,800 communities throughout the country.

The Haskell County Jaycees meet each Thursday night at the City Hall in Haskell, and all young men of the county are invited to attend the meetings and become a member of the greatest young mens organization in the world. Meeting time is 8:00 p.m.

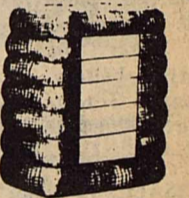

Public Notice

HJR 1 provides a mandatory residence homestead exemption from school taxes for all persons of all ages.

Texas law defines a residence homestead as the residence of the person claiming the exemption, or the former residence of the person claiming it and who intends to return to it and who does not claim another homestead elsewhere.

A rural homestead consists of up to 200 acres of land for a married couple and 100 acres for a single person. An urban homestead consists of a lot not exceeding \$10,000 in value.

One must look at the use of the land to determine whether a homestead is rural or urban. A person can claim a rural homestead if, as an agricultural producer, he resides on the land, and if he uses the land to conduct his agricultural enterprise.

Land claimed as a rural homestead may consist of several tracts not necessarily close to each other. The owner must, however, use all tracts for agricultural production and may claim up to 200 acres.

Any homestead not used for agricultural enterprises is considered an urban homestead. The only person who can claim a homestead is the one who has a taxable interest in it. Examples of taxable interest include undivided interests, life estates, tenancies in common, or rented premises if the tenant is liable for the taxes.

There is only one homestead per family per piece of property. Each person may receive only one. A single person may claim one homestead.

Temporary renting of a homestead will not affect its character as long as no other homestead has been acquired, and it is the intention of the homesteader to return.

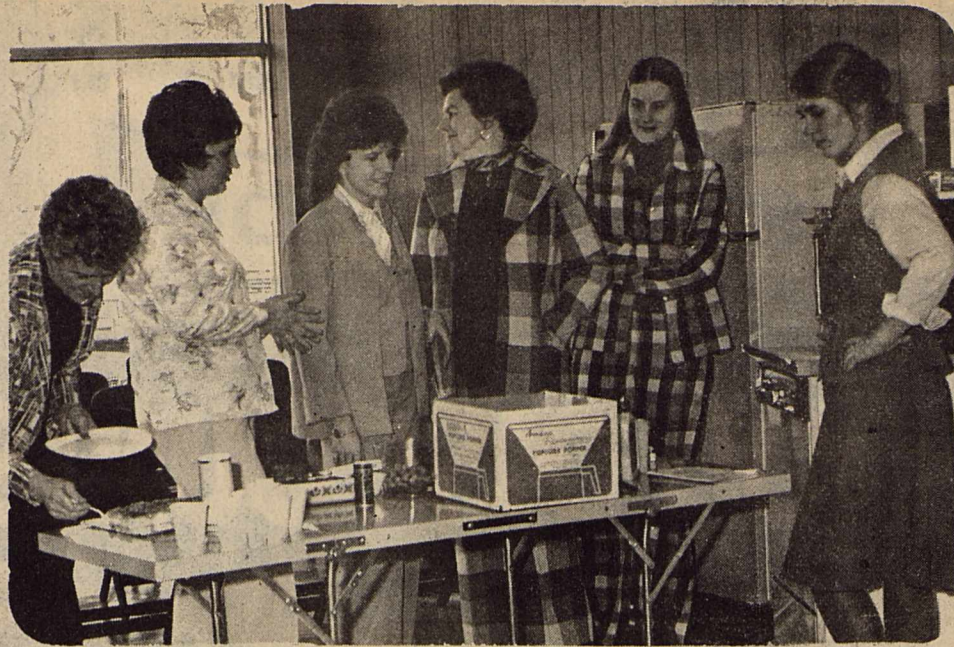

VA News

Many veterans are not receiving the full amount of disability compensation benefits to which they are entitled. According to C.H. Herren Service Officer for Haskell County, these veterans have failed to prove to the Veterans Administration that they have legal dependents. Under VA laws, it is the responsibility of the veteran to furnish the information and documentary evidence to establish his dependents. When this has been done, the VA can, in certain cases, pay additional amounts for dependents, thus increasing the monthly payment to the veteran.

A veteran whose service-connected disabilities are rated 30% or more is entitled to additional compensation for his legal dependents. A copy of the marriage license is normally sufficient to estab-

lish a dependent wife. The VA requires copies of birth certificates to establish dependent children, which may include permanently disabled children over 18 years of age, and children between the ages of 18 and 23 who are enrolled in an approved course of education. Medical evidence that the conditions causing permanent and total disability of a child must be furnished, indicating that such conditions existed prior to age 18. An unmarried child over 18 and under age 23 must furnish evidence of school enrollment to be classified as a dependent.

Veterans who think they may be entitled to additional amounts of VA benefits because of having dependents, should contact their local Veterans Service Officer for assistance.

They thought it to be more convenient for the Federal Reserve Banks to be allowed to steal it through the camouflage of debt credit. Thus, your Bill of Rights being abrogated, you are merely a public servant performing a deed or performance. Perform, Perform, Perform. Slave, Slave, Slave, for the special privileged. They love that performance and interest. So now, public servants are merely issued Green Stamps (so called money) to trade for daily necessities. A lot of people criticize "Lord Carter," but I like to give him credit where credit is due. I will admit he is not too bright when it comes to economics, but he is a good Zookeeper. He has a peanut warehouse and does feed the monkeys.

The question is: Are we people going to continue acting like monkeys, begging for more peanuts, or are we going to come out of the cage before the door is slammed shut and act like sovereign citizens of the United States of America?

Cotton Classing

Cotton prices continued to decline, according to Sidney Ferrell in charge of the Munday Marketing Services Office. Prices being offered ranged from 800 to 875 points above CCC loan levels. Trading was light.

Grade 42 continued as the predominant quality classed this week with 41 percent. Grade 52 accounted for 20 percent and grade 41 was 18 percent. Eleven percent was grade 51. About 34 percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade because of bark or grass. The predominant fiber length was staple 32 with 78 percent. Micronaire readings in the base range of 35 to 49 dropped from 69 percent last week to 66 percent this week. Twenty-five percent tested in the 30 to 34 range and 9 percent was below 30.

About 6100 samples were classed during the week ending January 19, bringing our season total to 54,100.

Winter Isn't 'Over Yet!

As winter's cold forms a layer of ice on ponds and lakes, children are filled with visions of their northern and western neighbors enjoying winter sports. The novelty of ice, however, lures many youngsters to their death.

Ponds around here seldom freeze thick enough to support the weight of even small children. The most dangerous ponds are those that freeze fairly thick in areas around the edges.

Usually the down-wind edge of the pond will freeze first, and the ice may support a large person for several feet from the edge in that area. But, over deeper water and on the up-wind side of the pond, the ice is usually very thin.

There is no really safe ice thickness for skating, according to the National Safety Council, because ice conditions are always changing. For

example, four inches of new ice can support more weight than four inches of "old ice" that has been subjected to the effects of the sun, refreezing after thawing, wind, and changing water levels under the ice.

Realizing how hard it is to curb the natural curiosity in children, it is suggested that children be made aware of the dangers of thin ice.

Also, children should be taught rescue techniques.

Some pond owners keep a life ring or other flotation device attached to a long rope hand at the pond. A long pole can also be used to rescue victims of broken ice. If you must go onto the ice to help a drowning person, be sure to use a large board, ladder, pole, or sheet of plywood to distribute your weight. If none is available, lie prone on the ice and slide gently.

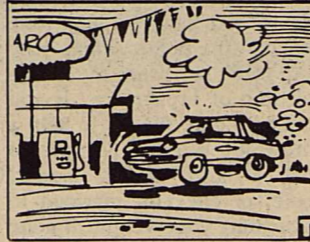

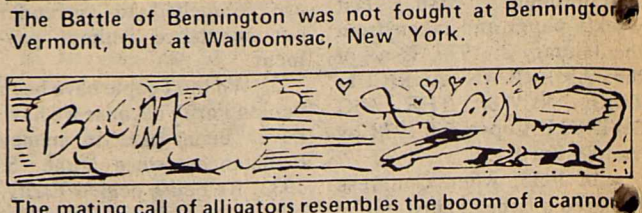

**Archer To Recommend WTC Honor Roll
Balanced Budget**

With the convening of the 96th Congress Monday, Congressman Bill Archer is adding a new dimension to his continuing effort to win passage to Constitutional Amendment requiring a balanced federal budget. When the session opens, he will present documents from the Texas Legislature requesting the Congress to call together a national Constitutional convention to propose such an amendment. Joined by 142 other Congressmen last year in his attempt to initiate House Judiciary Committee hearings, Archer is again pressing for hearings on an amendment which the Congress would send to the states for ratification, but he notes, "we cannot afford to overlook the other method of amending the Constitution which involves petitions submitted to the Congress by two-thirds of the states calling for a Constitutional convention". "The Texas Legislature

passed such a resolution on June 16th 1977, but for some reason State officials at the time failed to follow through in having the resolution officially presented to Congress," Archer pointed out. "Without such a presentation, the resolution might as well have never been adopted by the Legislature." Archer will present a certified copy of the resolution to the House Representatives at the same time he reintroduces his own Constitutional Amendment Monday calling for a balanced federal budget. "Recent polls show that 81 percent of the American people favor such a Constitutional restriction on federal spending, and certainly we owe it to them to begin the process immediately," Archer concluded. "I am very pleased to have had this opportunity to put the State of Texas officially on record as favoring such an amendment that will be a key to placing stringent restraints on excess federal spending."
