# Creek Cleanup Continues

Volunteer workers spent over 526 man-hours last weekend cleaning Spring Branch Creek, and although the project is far from complete, the accomplishments are easily visible anywhere along the creek.

In addition to the volunteer workers there were approximately ten trucks, four loaders, four backhoes, and two winch trucks which were also donated for the project.

A total of 43 persons braved the cold weather and high winds Saturday and 57 persons were on hand Sunday

afternoon.

The project is coordinated by the Haskell County Jaycees and co-chairmen Bo Owens and Charles Andress express their sincere thanks to all who worked or donated equipment this past weekend. They also added that the project is far from being completed and many workers and equipment will be needed to finish the cleanup.

The work will continue this weekend with activities beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday and 1 p.m. Sunday.

The Jaycees agreed to undertake the

project when it was determined that a contractor was not available to do the work for the amount of disaster funds that were available.

The local Jaycees agreed to do the project and donate all funds received to a special fund of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department to build a new fire station in Haskell.

The Jaycees must document both man hours and equipment used in the project to receive the disaster funds and all workers are urged to register at the Fire Station prior to beginning work on

Saturday or Sunday.

It is the hope of project chairmen that the major portion of work in removing flood debris can be completed during the next two weekends.

All workers are asked to furnish rubber boots with high tops due to the water and mud near the creek bottom.

Jaycees and firemen had worked for about two weeks cutting ditches in an attempt to drain the creek. Most standing water was gone until last Friday afternoon when about one-half inch of rain fell in Haskell and created a general mess of the drainage work.

Project leaders also caution workers

to watch closely for boards with nails, broken bottles, and other potential hazards. Most of the creek bottom is covered with several inches of silt and mud and many objects are buried under this material. The mud is soft enough that someone walking can still be injured by objects several inches deep.

Following the removal of all flood debris, local dirt contractors will be asked to donate work to completely reshape the creek banks making changes as necessary so that adequate amounts of water will be moved through town during periods of heavy rains

thereby reducing chances of future floods. Following the reshaping, grasses will be seeded to prevent erosion. The reshaping and seeding will be completed in a manner that property owners and the City of Haskell can mow and maintain the creek.

The beautification of the creek has been considered as a project of many groups and organizations during the past years. The work is currently underway and much help is needed to make the project a success.

Project leaders ask that you mark next Saturday and Sunday on your calendars to help in this project.

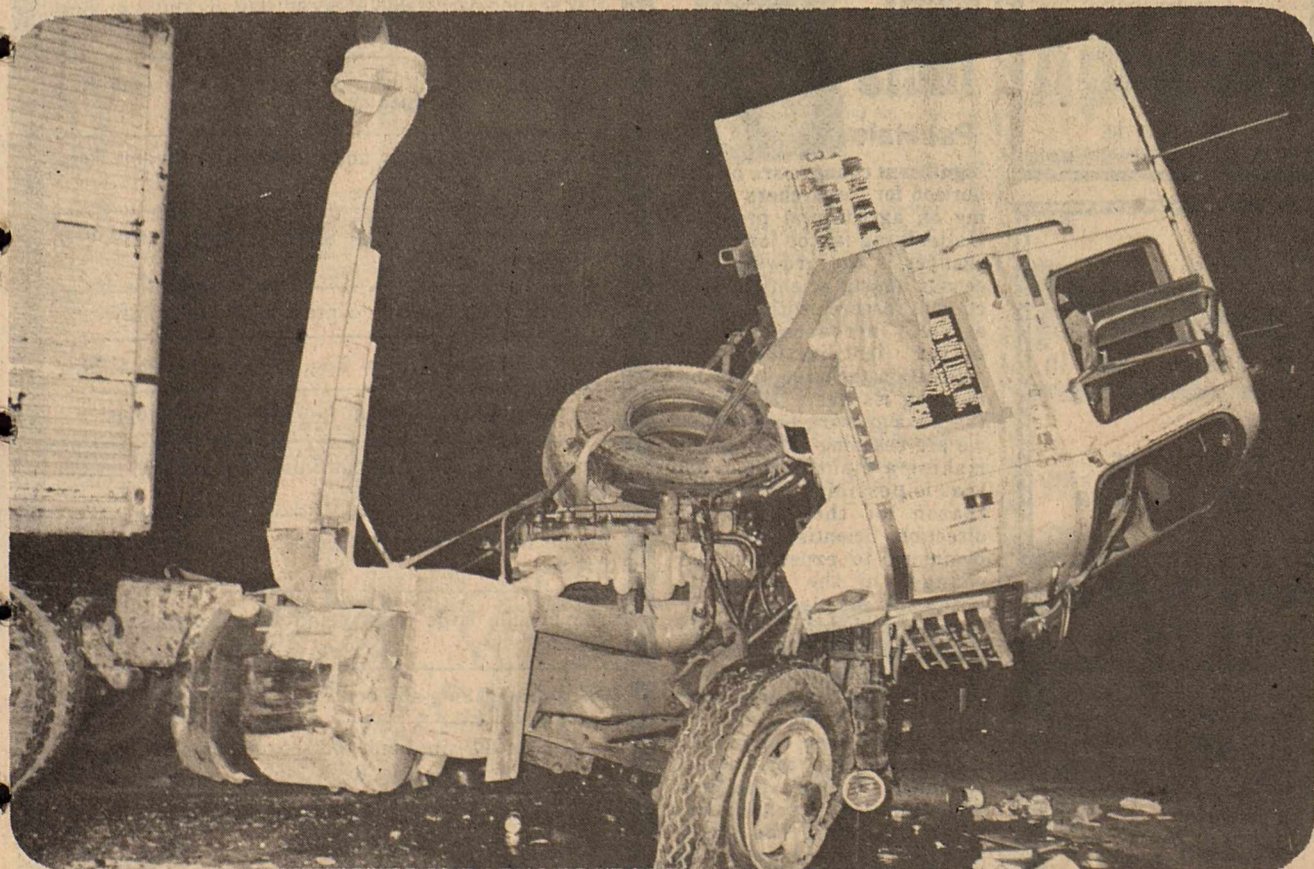

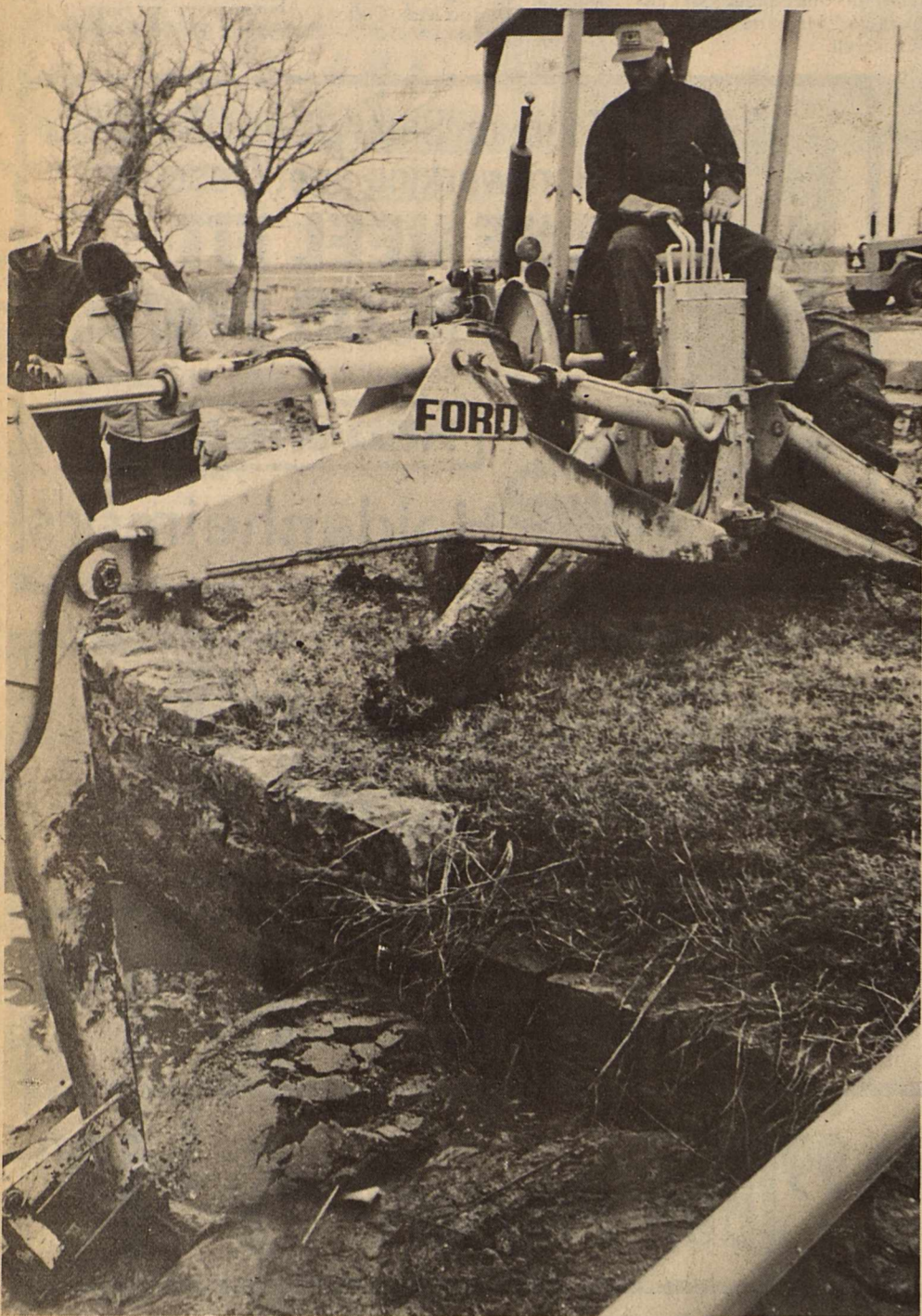

# Cotton Prices Fall To Seasonal Low

B. B. Manly reported that 24,000 cotton samples were classed at the U.S.D.A. Cotton Marketing Services Office in Abilene during the week ending Friday, March 2nd. About 13,000 samples were classed from bales produced in the Abilene territory, and the remaining 11,000 were from the Munday territory. This brought the seasonal total to 420,000 samples classed at Munday.

Local cotton prices declined daily last week. Prices fell to seasonal low levels. Some prices were down by 2 1/2 cents per pound during the week. Bid prices ranged from 6 1/2 to 9 cents per pound over CCC loan rates. Most mixed quality lots of cotton sold at 50 to 52 cents per pound. Demand was light to moderate, and trading

was mostly slow.

Cotton classed in Abilene during the past week was 69 percent Light-Spotted, 21 percent White, and 9 percent Spotted grades. Grade 52

comprised 36 percent of the total classings. Grade 42 comprised 31 percent, and grade 51 comprised 16 percent. Fiber length was 55 percent staple 32, 30 percent

staple 33, and 14 percent staple 31. Micronaire readings were 57 percent within the 35 to 49 range. About 13 percent miked from 33 to 34, 17 percent miked from 30 to 32,

and 10 percent miked from 27 to 29. About 56 percent of the samples were reduced in grade because of bark content and 2 percent were reduced for grass.

The exhibits will be displayed in the Youth Building with housing related programs being conducted in the Corral Building throughout the day.

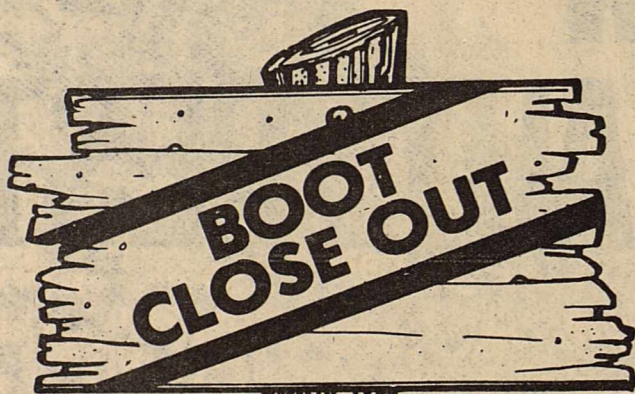

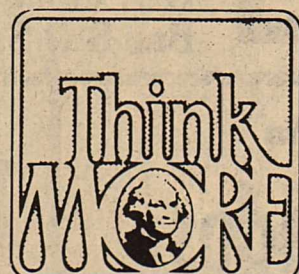
