LEGAL NOTICE

The City of Weinert has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department's 'Drinking Water Standards'' which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act"; Public Law 93-523 (U.S.).

The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water we supply was reported to be 10.7 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water, such as bottled water, for their infants under 6 months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation

The City of Weinert has applied to the Texas Department of Health for an exemption from the Nitrate requirement while we search for alternate sources of supply and investigate available treatment techniques which would lower the Nitrate to an acceptable level.
