

Rodeo Week in Haskell officially opened Tuesday night with a giant barbecue and street dance and will continue through the final rodeo dance Saturday night.







names these days - obscene, exorbitant, and excessive. Granted, profits can be improper if they are exploitative or the result of price-fixing schemes or monopolies. But we must remember that in a capitalist economy the promise of monetary reward is a prime motivator. Without hope of a reasonable rate of return, no one would start a business, introduce a new product or service, or even continue producing an old one. And without reality of profits, no business in the long run can

keep itself alive - except by government subsidies. Also we must remember that even if profits are excessive in the short run, the market will adjust and force prices downward. Pocket calculators are a good example. Today a good calculator can be bought for as little as \$10 from a variety of companies. Just a few years ago only a limited number of firms made calculators at a price many times that of the present rate. The same will happen in our energy industry if only permitted. The profit incentive will attract new firms into the market and production of additional hydrocarbons and alternative sources of fuel will become more feasible. In the long run excess profits will disappear as competition increases and the public will benefit.

The basic principles of free market economics are understood by people everywhere whether they admit it or not. The Russian people understand free market economics. The state takes 90% of the production of collective farms in the Soviet Union, but lets workers keep what they earn by farming their backvards. Soviet state agriculture is perpetually in poor condition and a third of farm output is backyard production. The Soviet leaders have tried everything but increasing the size of backyards.



signs. Since there are no For this reason it is very "typical" cases of rabies, important that anyone suspecting rabies or receiving a bite or scratch from a domestic or wild animal suspected of being rabid, take the proper precautions to diagnose the disease and prevent it from spreading.

Public awareness of rabies prevention is especially important due to the large increase in confirmed rabies cases from many different areas of Texas during the present year. The first quarter of 1979 has produced twice the

number of cases that were reported for the same period in 1978. In the first three weeks of April, 1979, there have been 108 cases in skunks, 2 in foxes, 2 in raccoons, 1 cat, 6 dogs, 2 horses and 7 cattle already confirmed positive for rabies in Texas. Each possible exposure to

rabies infection must be individually evaluated. The following advice is given: 1. A healthy domestic dog or cat that bites a person should be confined and observed by a veterinarian for 10 days. Stray or unwanted dogs or cats that bite a person should be killed immediately and the head submitted for rabies examination by fluorescent microscopy. (Do not kill the

THAT these countries impose levies and tariffs upon U.S. grain at rates in excess of the purchase price, adding to our balance of trade deficit, which in turn increases inflation.

THAT this tax, amounting to billions of dollars annually, is a windfall to these foreign governments and is imposed by these countries in the name protecting their producers from cheap U.S. grain by the imposition of a tariff.

THAT foreign governments are using levies on low priced U.S. grain to subtly exact a tax from their citizens.

THAT the U.S. should be receiving this additional revenue, and such higher prices charged by the U.S. should not increase the cost to the consumer in foreign countries.

THAT U.S. equity is being transferred to foreign governments in the form of underpriced U.S. grain.

THAT this windfall tax received by foreign govern-ments is paid for by all U.S. citizens through indirect tax of inflation, caused by a trade deficit.

THAT this is the equivalent of a tax on the American people by foreign governmenttaxation without representation of the highest order.

BE IT FURTHER RE-SOLVED THEREFORE THAT the President and the Congress, the proper and exclusive representatives of these



United States have the authority, the obligation, and the solemn duty to correct our Nation's balance of trade deficit and halt inflation.

Countries such as Japan and West Germany are purchasing our agricultural products at below the cost of production and placing levies and tariffs on these products at rates in excess of the purchase price thereby increasing the trade deficit with Japan and West Germany at an alarming rate. The U.S. trade deficit with Japan and West Germany increased in 1978 by 3.5 billion' and 1.7 billion respectively due to the fact that the U.S. was underpaid for its grain ex-

ports. We must not allow this to happen. The United States and particularly the Carter administration has the power, the ability, and the obligation to force a change in the trade relationships between Japan and West Germany so that we will receive the returns from the products that we sell to them rather than allowing these countries to utilize our low priced agricultural products to subtly extort a tax from their citizens in the form of tariffs and levies. The Japanese public probably does not realize that they are being taxed in this manner. They know that they are paying a high price for their bread, but they look upon the U.S. producer as the culprit instead







This estimate is based on the number of veterans who will reach the 10th anniversary of their separation from military service when, by law, their GI Bill education rights end.

Veterans Administration statistics show that 65 percent of the veterans who entered military service between August 5, 1964, and May 7, 1975, have used their GI Bill education benefits in one form or another. These dates are considered the official beginning and ending dates for the Vietnam fighting.

Attorneys in our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division caution persons considering membership in such buyers clubs to use caution.

Usually, a buyers' club charges an annual membership fee, after which members receive catalogs they are led to believe will offer name brand products at significant price savings. And, at first glance, it may seem that the products pictured are being offered at low cost. What consumers may not know is that the prices to which the buyers' club prices are compared may not be accurate. The "low. low price to members" may not seem so low if consumers knew that the "suggested selling price" and "dealer's price" used in comparisons are often inflated.

In addition, what consumers may not realize until they join is that they can probably buy the same product at as low or lower a price from stores right in their own community. Then, too, the buyers' club generally adds on a "shipping and handling" charge, which means that the savings is not nearly as great as advertised. And some clubs may not have enough of the product on hand to fill orders.

Our attorneys suggest that you keep the following hints in mind if you're thinking of joining a buyers' club:

-Check local stores and compare their prices with those of the buyers' club.

-Don't join a club on a multiyear contract until you're sure you will like it and that it will provide real savings. You can always renew your membership.

-Get names of persons in your area who are members,





## **Car Crusher At Work**

# **Car Crusher Aids Recycling**

It is a veritable monster. Growling and Snorting it gobbles cars, buses and probably anything else one would care to poke into its powerful jaws. It prowls around the countryside, mashing cars at salvage yards from here to Lawton making its way back home to Haskell only twice a year.

Ervin and Harlyn Unger are the owners of this car crusher which was busily munching at the auto salvage yard this week. Cars and trucks were tossed into the air like Tonka Toys. A leader fed them into the gaping mouth of the crusher which clamped down with 2500 pounds of pressure. Metal curled, glass rained down and then the car was spit back into the waiting arms of the loader in the general shap of a cereal box.

The crusher is one of only 200 of its kind in the U.S. It is a fairly recent invention which has only been in wide use for about five years, according to Unger. And four years ago when the Ungers wagged it to West Texas from Minnesota, folks around here had never seen anything like it. Still pretty much the only one around this part of the country, the 25 ton carcruncher can't keep up with

Casually watching what was once Bill Holden's Buick being crunched and mangled, Ervin Unger explains the advantages of the machine. Crushed cars can be stacked 22 per truckload compared with an un-crushed load of six. This makes recycling a profitable business since a much greater amount of metal can be hauled to the shredder at one time. At the shredder, the cars are garbled up even more-separating the materials and collecting usable metal to send to steel mills for reprocessing. The man behind the big




