A bridge tournament will begin at 2 p.m. and a bathing beauty contest for girls 10 and under will also be held at 2.



The Red River Red Cross Regional Bloodmobile will be in Haskell Thursday, July 5, from 1 to 6 p.m. in the Community Building of the Haskell

Goal for this visit of the Bloodmobile is 80 units and blood is needed urgently at this time according to Red Cross officials in Wichita Falls.

During the July 4, holiday week, only two bloodmobiles were scheduled. The Haskell mobile and a mobile in Hobart

Increased travel during the holiday will cause a decrease in donors and an increase in demand for accident victims.

Members of the Haskell County Home Demonstration Council are sponsoring the drive and all prospective donors who would like to make appointments are urged to contact Mrs. Hazel Thomas, chairman.

A donor may give blood every 56 days. Donors must be between the ages of 18 and 65 and weigh at least 110 pounds. 17 year-old donors can give blood with written parental consent.

mobile is distributed to 40 regional hospitals surrounding the Wichita Falls area. Regular deliveries are made to these hospitals, and in addition, special deliveries are made when the need

Because blood can only be stored for 21 days, donors are always needed to replace the supply.

The actual process of giving blood only takes from seven to ten minutes but with time for registration, the medical history and refreshments, the donor should expect to spend about an hour at the bloodmobile. A brief medical examination including blood pressure, temperature, pulse and a hemoglobin blood test is given to every potential donor. These are some of the factors that determine if it is safe for the indvidual to be a blood donor and if the blood being donated is safe for a patient to receive.

In America, 3% of the people give 100% of all the blood that's freely donated.

Which means that if only 1% more people maybe you—became donors, it would add over thirty percent more blood to America's voluntary bloodstream. Think of it!



What can you do to help your survival during a tornado?

Although you can't plan where a funnel will strike, you can plan what to do should one touch down near you. These questions and answers may help your chances in the event of disasters such as the ones which struck Wichita Falls and Vernon recently.

OUESTION: When are

ANSWER: They may occur anytime, but usually occur with greatest frequency during the late spring or early summer. In the 25-year period from 1951 through 1975, nearly three-fifths of all Texas tornadoes occurred within the three-month period of April, May and June.

QUESTION: How many tornadoes touched down in Texas last year and how many tornadoes does the state average each vear?

ANSWER: Last year, 127 tornadoes were confirmed in the state. Luckily, however, only one death resulted. An average of 105 tornadoes strike Texas soil each year. The annual total varies considerably, and certain areas are struck more often than others. For example, tornadoes occur with greatest frequency in the Red River

QUESTION: When did the greatest outbreak of tornadoes occur in

ANSWER: The greatest outbreak of tornadoes on record in Texas was associated with Hurricane Beulah in September 1967. Within a five-day period, September 19-23, 115 tornadoes were reported. Sixty-seven occurred on September 20, a Texas record for a single day. Because of Hurricane Beulah, September 1967 had 124 tornadoes, a Texas record for a single month.

QUESTION: Is there anything you can do to protect yourself in times of bad weather against

tornadoes? ANSWER: Yes. You should become familiar with the warnings given by the National Weather Service over radio and television. "Tornado watch" indicates the possibility of a tornado.

'Tornado warning' means that a tornado has been reported in the general area. "Tornado alert" means to act fastthat a tornado is known to be in the vicinity.

LANGTRY-It's simply amazing what you find along the highways and by-

ways of the Lone Star State Here in the small Texas town on the Rio Grande you find a museum dedicated to a saloon keeper and reprobate who became a justice of the peace and famed as "The Law West of the Pe-

There isn't much more to see in this town of 50 residents, some 60 miles from the desert town of Del Rio, an oasis of sorts because of the San Felipe Springs.

Langtry has no hotel, and unless you have a special interest in the eccentric Judge Roy Bean, you probably will go speeding past if you happen to be traveling in this part of Southwest Texas.

A recent New York Times article has revived interest in Bean, who came here in 1882 and set up a saloon in a tent. He was rough and ready, and a bit unscrupulous, and he prospered from the drinking habits of construction workers.

The Texas Rangers set him up as a judge, and he opened the Jersey Lilly Sa-loon, which served both as a bar and a courtroom. He named it for the English actress, Lillie Langtry, "The Jersey Lily.'

Bean's famous decisions included the fine he levied on a corpse. In conducting the inquest, he found \$10 and a pistol, so he promptly find the body \$40 for concealing the weapon!

Bean invited the promoters of the Bob Fitzsimmons-Pete Maher prizefight here in 1896 after the Texas governor had banned the fight in El Paso.

Bean built a rickety pon-toon bridge across the Rio Grande and the bout took place on the Mexican side. Fitzsimmons won by a second round knockout, and the in the river with nothing more or card to Dept. GW, TEXto do than drink at Bean's AS, Box 5064, Austin, TX saloon until the train left.

Bean tried to get Miss Langtry to visit the town. She finally came in 1904, a year after Bean's death.

A number of Bean mementoes are on display in the Visitors Center, open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., with no charge. The Jersey Lilly Saloon is now preserved by the state.

Del Rio has a museum, open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. It has relics of early Texas and a replica of the Jersey Lilly. There also are several motels in the town.

Big attraction nearby (12 miles away) is the Amistad Recreation Area. A dam on the Rio Grande forms a lake of some 50,000 acres famed for its fishing, water skiing and swimming. In Seminole Canyon a few miles away are Indian pictographs dating back 10,000 years and now carefully preserved.







According to the American Cancer Society, there is proportionately more skin cancer in the southern and southwestern states than elsewhere. Fortunately, if treated in time, skin cancer is very curable.

Perhaps the best protection against the sun is proper clothing. Cool, loose-fitting beach robes, long sleeved shirts and wide-brimmed hats effectively cut down on exposure to the sun's rays.

The best chemical cover-up is any one of the popular brand sunscreens that contain PABA (para-aminobenzoic acid). These preparations absorb ultraviolet rays and allow gradual tanning. They should be applied about 45 minutes before exposure, and reapplied after swimming or per-Be sure to check the

labels for PABA before buying sun lotions. Manufacturers of commercial sunscreens will probably soon be required to specify the Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of their products on the label, and some already provide this information. The techniques used to measure the SPF have not been fully standardized. so the SPF values for a given sunscreen may vary from one laboratory to another. The SPF usually ranges from two for minimal protection to

15 for super protection.

Another type of chemical protection, the sunblock, allows no tanning at all. It deflects the ultraviolet rays totally. and is most useful in shielding lips, nose and other extra-sensitive areas. A well-known sun blocking agent is zinc oxide, an opaque white ointment often used by lifeguards and others whose jobs require constant ex-

posure to the sun. Besides using chemicals and clothes, you can help yourself by knowing all you can about sunning. Here are some tir

Sun before 10 a.m after 3 p.m., when violet rays are weakest. If you can't avoid these hours, try limiting your exposure to a maximum of 15 minutes during the danger hours.

Avoid sun reflectors. They expose the most delicate facial areas, under the chin, eyelids, ear-

You're better off bicycling or playing golf than lying immobile on a surfboard or on the river-

Don't kid yourself into believing you're protected in the shade of a beach umbrella. Ultraviolet rays are only partially deflected by the umbrella and they are also bouncing toward you from all directions off sand, water, and patio floor. For the same reason, wearing a hat only offers partial protection for the face.

Don't figure on being safe on a cloudy day or even under water. A wet T-shirt can also deceive you. Water droplets funnel at least half the ultraviolet power to your

Altitude plays a role. There is less atmosphere on mountain tops to filter out ultraviolet rays.

Backpackers and skiers should know that snow can reflect as much as 85 percent of the sun's says.

Neither true sunscreens nor "suntan lotions" promote tanning. Sunscreens protect against sunburn, while mineral oils and baby oils lubricate and even change the optical properties of the skin, but don't protect from sunburn or promote suntan.

Farmer's stock tanks currently under study

COLLEGE STATION -People don't normally expect to find Ph.D.s out digging postholes and stock tanks.

But that's exactly what Texas A&M University biologist Norman Dronen has done, and it's all part of an unusual study of lifeforms. Dronen is conducting what is

probably the most detailed examination ever of the small aquatic universe most ranchers and farmers in Texas have come to depend on — the stock tank. In time, the information gained may help producers, even shrimp and fish farmers, manage their herds and watering holes more efficiently.

No one knows how many additional people are storing gasoline in glass and plastic iugs or other containers considered unsuitable for volatile liquids.

The National Safety Council points out that one gallon of gasoline has the explosive force of 14 sticks of dynamite, which means that those who carry fuel home from the service station are endangering themselves and the lives of others.

Combined Insurance safety experts say that extra fuel for cars should be transported only in emergencies. When it is carried, it should be placed in containers made for the purpose, and those containers should be removed from the vehicle as soon as possible after reaching home. Once a container is empty, leave the cap off to let the fumes evaporate and see that it is well aired

-- Never use a metal container that has any rust on

-- Keep gas cans away from any source of heat or flame as the liquid expands in volume with higher temperatures and could seep out of even the best of containers.


