Station Exterior Complete, Work Underway Inside

Exterior construction on the Haskell Hre Station is almost complete and members of the Department have started work on the interior of the building.

Electrical and plumbing work began this week on the interior and the wiring Building on the meeting room and

office will begin the last part of this week.

Donations to the building fund continue to be received and donations of about \$9,500 are needed to complete the project.

County To Participate In Appraisal District

Members of the Haskell County Commissioners Court Monday, agreed to participate in a single appraisal district in the county.

The new appraisal district is being formed as a result of legislation passed by the State Legislature this year. All taxing bodies except counties are required to join the district. Participation in the district is optional.

During the meeting, County Tax

Assessor-Collector Betty Weise agreed with the commissioners decision to participate in the single appraisal district.

Members of the court agreed that each commissioner and the County Judge would nominate one person each to serve on a board of directors for the new district. All thirteen taxing entities in the county will nominate persons to serve on the board. Members of the

board will be elected by representatives of the taxing bodies.

County Auditor Jimmy Owens informed members of the court that he had resigned his office and thanked them for their assistance and cooperation during his service as Tax Assessor-Collector and Auditor. Owens held the two positions a total of 11 years, eight months.

County Judge John Wayne McDermett expressed thanks on behalf of the County to Owens for his service. District Judge Joe Williams told the County Judge and Commissioners that he had appointed Alene Collins as County Auditor effective Sept. 1.

In other court action, Commissioners approved the delinquent tax roll and agreed to pay \$500.00 into the Ambulance fund.

City Council Discusses 79-80 Budget

Discussion of the proposed budget for 1979-80 was the major topic of Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Council members reviewed the proposed budget and set a budget hearing for the Sept. 11 council meeting. Council members heard L. C. Johnson request city aid to stop flooding in the N. 14th Ave. A neighborhood. Council members agreed to ask J. C. Yeary for assistance in solving the problem.

Mayor pro-tem Franciene Johnson presided at the meeting and reported that the room occupancy tax for the past quarter had been received in the amount of \$784.53 and that a sales tax check in the amount of \$5,818.18 had been received.

City Secretary Desmond Dulaney gave a financial report.

The American Junior Rodeo Association held its National Finals Rodeo this past week in Snyder. The 1979 World Championships were awarded at the National Finals. The American Junior Rodeo Association is an organization of young cowboys and cowgirls and is patterned after the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. There are over 800 members in the A.J.R.A and they participate in some 30-40 rodeos each vear. The World Champion titles are awarded to those with the most money won in their age group.

Shawn Chambers, a Haskell cowboy, is the 1979 A.J.R.A. World Champion All Around Cowboy for boys 12 and under. He also is the World Champion Optional Racer in the 12 and under age group. In addition to these two achievements he won the National Finals Rodeo all around title and finished third in the standings for the roping title.


Shawn received two Billy Cook Roper saddles for the World Champion awards and 2 trophy buckles. He also received a trophy saddle for winning the National Finals Rodeo and an A.J.R.A. Champion jacket.

Year and has been rodeoing since he was six years old.


Shawn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Chambers of Haskell and the grandson of Mildred Chambers, Rule,
