Station Exterior Complete, Work Underway Inside

Exterior construction on the Haskell Fire Station is almost complete and members of the Department have started work on the interior of the building.

Electrical and plumbing work began this week on the interior and the wiring should be completed soon.

Building on the meeting room and office will begin the last part of this week.

Donations to the building fund continue to be received and donations of about \$9,500 are needed to complete the project.

School Activities Beginning

Haskell Schools will open on August 27th at 8:15 for the 1979-80 school year. The teachers and educational staff will have 4 days of inservice and workdays prior to the school opening.

High School registration has been set

for Friday, August 24th in the High School Library.

Seniors will register at 9:00, Juniors at 10:30, Sophomores at 1:00 and Freshmen at 2:30. All new students should come by the High School office on Thursday, August 16th. Office hours are from 8 to 4 daily.

Junior High registration will be on August 24th in the auditorium. The 8th graders will register at 1:00. The 7th graders will register at 2:00.

Elementary students will register on Friday, August 24th from 9:00 until 12:00. Kindergarten and first grade students will need birth certificates and shot records.

The first day of school, Monday August 27th will be a short day with classes dismissed at 2:15. Tuesday will be the normal time of 8:15 until 3:45. The first school holiday will be Labor Day, September 3rd.

As school opens for the 1979 year, area drivers have yet another chance to make a real contribution to the safety of our nation's junior citizens.

The American Automobile Association, Texas Division points out that now is one of the best times to demonstrate what Americans can do to contribute on an individual basis to the International Year of the Child.

Established by resolution of the United Nations General Assembly, the International Year of the Child officially recognizes the rights of the children and encourages special programs on all levels to focus on the problem of children.

An AAA spokesman says that one fifth of all children between the ages of 5 and 14 who die in an accident are pedestrians, and extra attention on the

part of drivers during the next month can substantially reduce that number.

In its "School's Open, Drive Carefully" campaign, the AAA club urges motorists to exercise caution while driving in school zones. Young children on their way to school for the first time are particularly apt to dart out onto the roadway.

Other school-related traffic conditions that drivers should be ready for include:

- reduced speed limits in school zones,
- crossing guards and safety patrols at intersections,
- Children on bicycles, walking in the roadway or darting between parked cars,
- Parents stopping their cars in front of schools to let children off,
- School buses stopping to load or unload pupils.

County To Participate In Appraisal District

Members of the Haskell County Commissioners Court Monday, agreed to participate in a single appraisal district in the county.

The new appraisal district is being formed as a result of legislation passed by the State Legislature this year. All taxing bodies except counties are required to join the district. Participation in the district is optional.

During the meeting, County Tax

Assessor-Collector Betty Weise agreed with the commissioners decision to participate in the single appraisal district.

Members of the court agreed that each commissioner and the County Judge would nominate one person each to serve on a board of directors for the new district. All thirteen taxing entities in the county will nominate persons to serve on the board. Members of the

board will be elected by representatives of the taxing bodies.

County Auditor Jimmy Owens informed members of the court that he had resigned his office and thanked them for their assistance and cooperation during his service as Tax Assessor-Collector and Auditor. Owens held the two positions a total of 11 years, eight months.

County Judge John Wayne McDermott expressed thanks on behalf of the County to Owens for his service.

District Judge Joe Williams told the County Judge and Commissioners that he had appointed Alene Collins as County Auditor effective Sept. 1.

In other court action, Commissioners approved the delinquent tax roll and agreed to pay \$500.00 into the Ambulance fund.

Discussion of the proposed budget for 1979-80 was the major topic of Tuesday's City Council meeting.

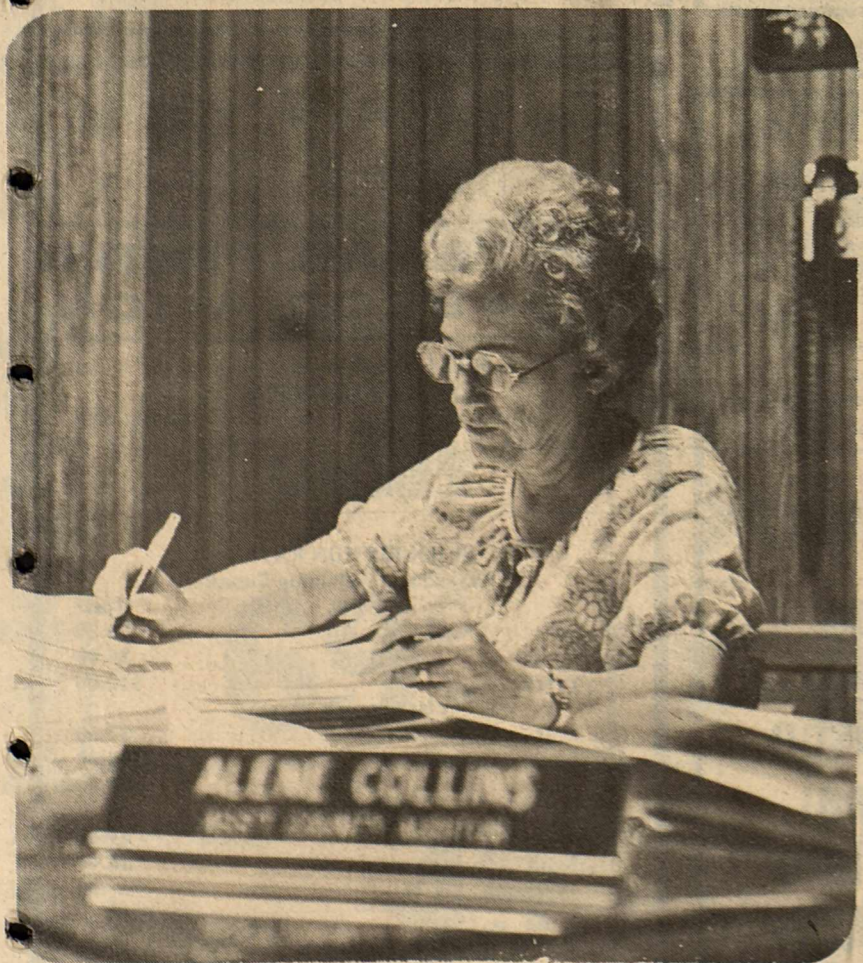
Council members reviewed the proposed budget and set a budget hearing for the Sept. 11 council meeting.

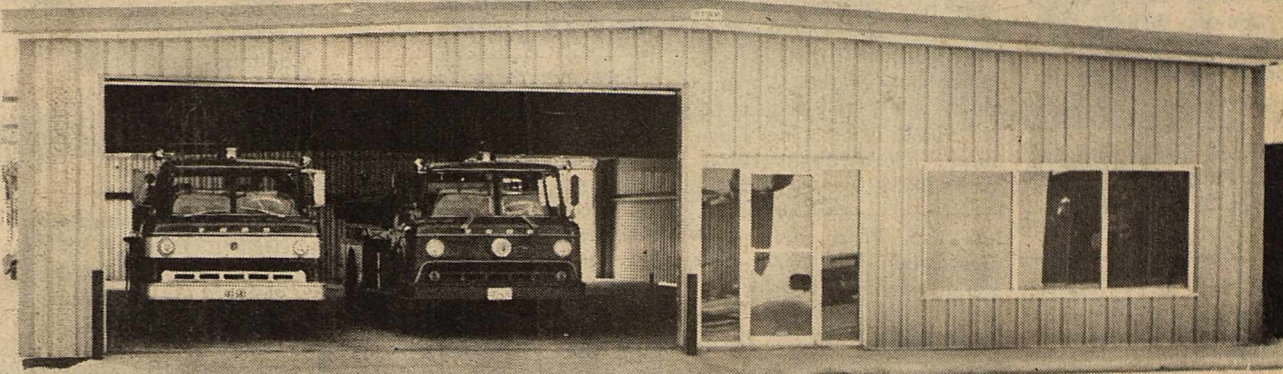

Shawn Chambers Wins World Champion Title

The American Junior Rodeo Association held its National Finals Rodeo this past week in Snyder. The 1979 World Championships were awarded at the National Finals. The American Junior Rodeo Association is an organization of young cowboys and cowgirls and is patterned after the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. There are over 800 members in the A.J.R.A. and they participate in some 30-40 rodeos each year. The World Champion titles are awarded to those with the most money won in their age group.

Shawn Chambers, a Haskell cowboy, is the 1979 A.J.R.A. World Champion All Around Cowboy for boys 12 and under. He also is the World Champion Optional Racer in the 12 and under age group. In addition to these two achievements he won the National Finals Rodeo all around title and finished third in the standings for the roping title.

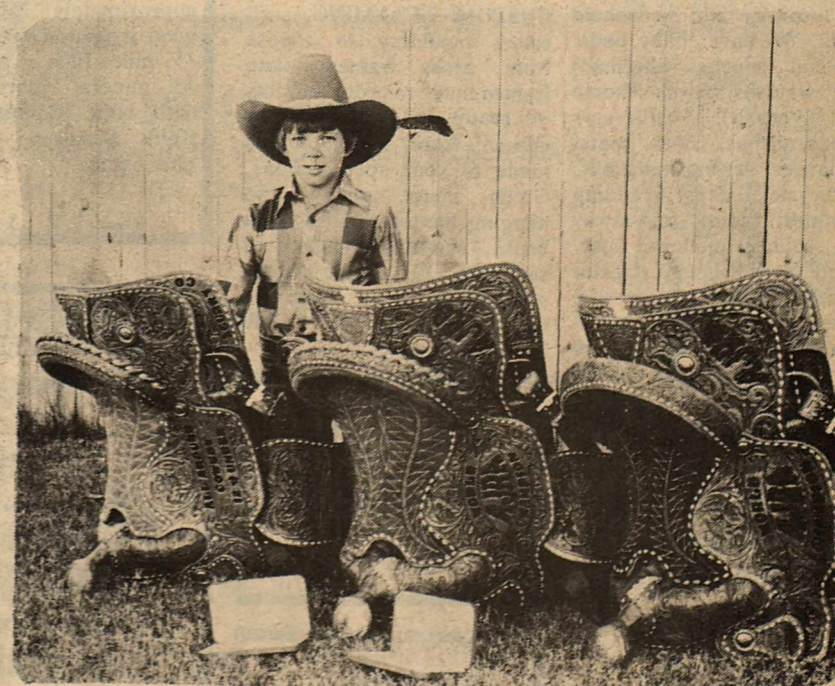
Shawn received two Billy Cook Roper saddles for the World Champion awards and 2 trophy buckles. He also received a trophy saddle for winning the National Finals Rodeo and an A.J.R.A. Champion jacket.

Shawn traveled over 15,000 miles this summer to A.J.R.A. rodeos. He participates in roping, barrel racing, pole bending, and goat tying. He won over \$2,000 in prize money in these events. He was the 1978 Rookie of the

Year and has been rodeoing since he was six years old.

WTCC Opposes Profits Tax

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce in a position statement issued July 30 went on record as strongly opposing the assessment of a so-called windfall profits tax on domestically produced oil.

Edward H. Coltharp, WTCC Executive Vice President, stated that the regional chamber had contacted all members of the West Texas delegation in Washington informing them of the chamber's position. It is the opinion of the WTCC that the domestic oil and gas industry must be depended upon to help produce the country out of the current energy crisis.

In view of this, Coltharp stated that the WTCC stands opposed to the windfall profits tax which will serve only to place the federal government in the energy business and further hinder efforts by the oil and gas industry to

adequately increase exploration and production.

In its five point position statement, the WTCC called for immediate steps to bring about full production of coal using conventional methods along with accelerated development of nuclear power, production of synthetic oil and gas from coal and the development of shale oil resources.

The WTCC called for strict cost benefit controls to be used in administering EPA regulations when these regulations are found to be stalling energy development, without commensurate benefits to the general public.

Opposition to fixed import quotas was strongly voiced by the WTCC on the basis that quotas can subject the nation to a no-growth policy with severe recessionary implications.

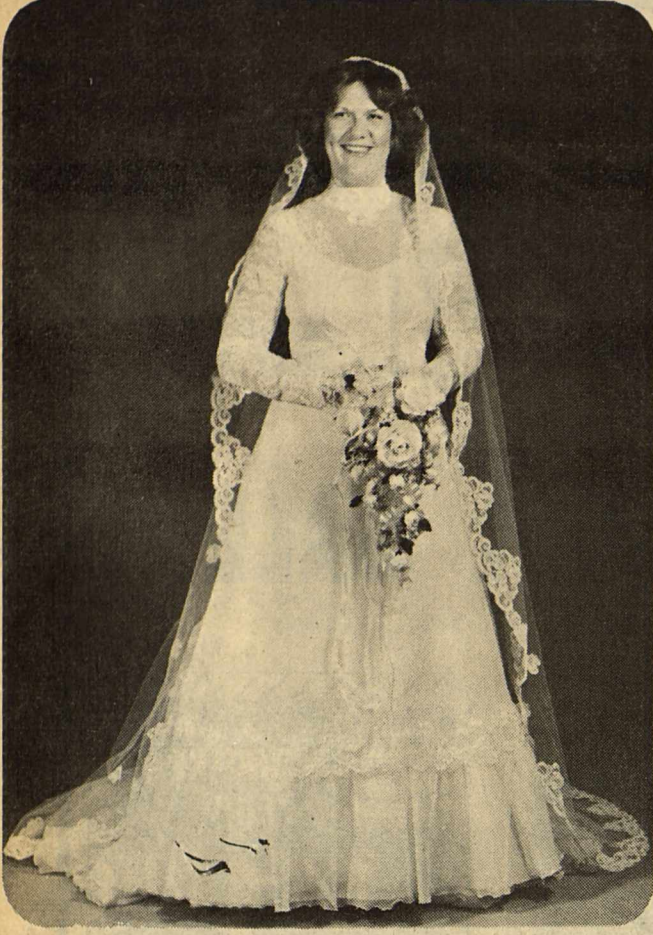

Scientists are hoping it answers the second question since, if so, planning for U.S. farmers could be greatly simplified. LACIE is the fast way of saving Large Area Crop Inventory Experiment. Purpose of the experiment is to determine better ways of obtaining information on growing crops by satellite surveillance. Specifically, the tests involve a special kind of "photography"... using instruments which measure the amounts and intensities of heat or light reflected from the land. Researchers say there is a good chance the new devices can become sophisticated enough to accurately report crop conditions not only in the United States, but from any place in the world.

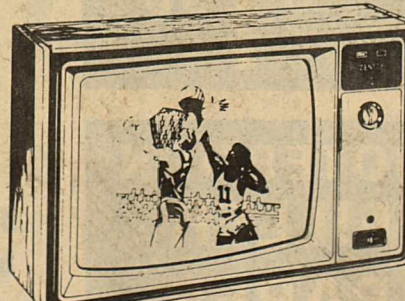

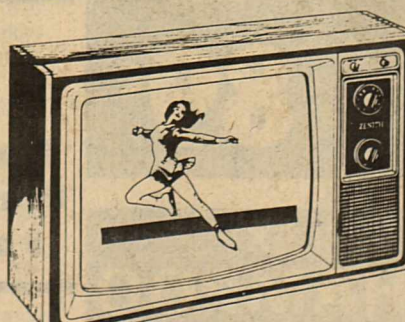

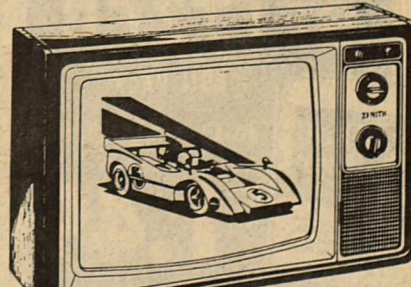
