



Board Trims Budget

spent about two hours last Thursday year period, special state funds received night trimming the 1979-80 budget.

During the session, a total of \$52,415.00 was cut from the proposed budget with the largest portion of this cut from a building repair fund and cutting the proposed purchase of a new bus and the proposed purchase of a new school car.

Following the budget session, board members voted to set the tax rate at .65 per \$100.00 valuation.

That rate is 5c or eight percent higher than the estimated rate which was included in a letter to all taxpayers serveral months ago.

The rate will officially be set at the regular meeting of the School Board, Sept. 11, at 7:30 p.m.


Of the .65 rate, .05 cents will be used to pay bonded indebtedness on the







Cardboard chewing cattle may become more common during the next few years. Researchers say cellulose in cardboard provides a much better diet for cattle than newsprint materials which were experimented with for several years. Giving the new product the title, "Rumose", promoters are pushing for acceptance of treated corrugated boxes as a viable feed supplement in the feedlot for commercial feeders. De-velopers advocate grinding or pelleting of the boxes, then mixing with whey (waste material from cheese making) or other materials to make the boxes more palatable. One of the key researchers for this project is Dr. John Campbell of the University of Missouri. Dr. Campbell says the process of manufacturing the boxes may increase their digestibility which "approaches or even exceeds the digestibility of common forages". For cattle, "box" lunch may take on a whole new meaning.







New Guide **Available**

The new Guide to 1979-1980 Texas Hunting & Sport Fishing Regulations is now available at license vendors and P&WD offices across the

The 24-page guide for sportsmen will contain a summary on various licenses, permits and tags, fur-bearing animals, protected and endangered species, lake regulations, general saltwater sport fishing regulations, and general hunting and freshwater sport fishing regula-

Each of the 254 counties across Texas are listed alphabetically with the various hunting dates and fishing rules affecting the sportsman in each county.

The counties are also listed

as being either regulatory (governed by P&WD regulations established by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission) or non-regulatory (governed by general law or special statute both established by legislative action).

Each county is also designated by a number and letter so it can be located on the state map in the centerfold of the guide.

P&WD regional and district law enforcement offices are listed on the back cover for sportsmen to visit or call for information or to report a game, fish, or water safety violation.

Included on the back cover is a pictoral guide showing white bass. striped bass, and the hybrid bass. These fish have become so popular and numerous in Texas that most anglers now have a chance at catching one or more of the three species.

Hunters will note that quail bag and possession limits are not included in this guide. These regulations will be set at a later date after the current population of birds are determined by the P&WD.

Undergraduate


