

## **Indians Down Seymour**

The character of the Haskell Indians was severly tested last Friday night in Seymour and members of the Tribe were equal to the challenge.

The Tribe was behind in the contest much of the first half and went to the locker room at half-time with a 7-7 tie. The never-quit attitude of the Tribe payed off with a 31-15 win when the final gun sounded.

The Tribe took the opening kick-off and managed one first down before punting to Seymour. The Panthers moved the ball 53 yards in 12 plays for the first score of the game with 4:22 left in the first quarter.

The Tribe punted on their next possession and lost the ball on a pass interception on their next try.

The Tribe mounted their first threat early in the second quarter when the defense held Seymour on fourth and two and gave the offense the ball on their own 30 yard line. Monnie Hise picked up 16 yards in three carries and Jim Harris connected with Albert Enriquez for a 24 yard passing gain. Hise carried twice more for 10 yards and a first down 19 yards from paydirt. The drive was halted on the next play with a pass interception and Seymour took over on their own four yard line.

The Tribe defense moved them back to the one and a short punt gave the Tribe another try from the 24 yard line. Eighteen of the yards were covered when Harris connected with Joe Benavides. Three plays later, Harris carried in from the one. The PAT was good and the game was tied with 1:56 left in the half.

The defense again held the Panthers and the Tribe got a final opportunity before the half. The drive ended with a 34 yard field goal missing the mark with

12 seconds left in the half.

The Panthers received the second half kick-off and moved the ball to the 28 where a Seymour field goal failed. The Tribe took over on the 20 and moved the ball to the 16 in 11 plays. Hise and Steve Escobedo each carried the ball five times during the drive. Hise carried for 22 yards and Escobedo for 38. Harris booted the go-head field goal from the 16 and gave the Tribe a lead they would not relinquish throughout the remainder of the game.

With 9:43 left in the game Harris scored from the 6 and the PAT was good. On the second play following the score, Benavides intercepted a pass and the Tribe scored again with 8:06 left. Hise carried in from the two for the score and the PAT failed.

The Panthers scored three plays later on a 70 yard run by Willie Beamon. The PAT for two was good.

Escobedo started the next Indian drive with carries of 15 and 13 yards to start the series. 10 plays later, Hise scored from the 9 and Harris carried in from the two-point conversion completing the scoring at 31-15.

Until the fourth quarter, the game was very evenly matched. Kirk Flippin recovered a Seymour fumble on the second play of the fourth quarter and the Tribe converted the turnover into a touchdown and then Benavides intercepted the pass and the Tribe scored again. Even though the Tribe was ahead by three points prior to the two turnovers, they were apparently the key to the momentum of the game.

Offensively, Hise carried 28 times for 129 yards and Escobedo carried 19 times for 102 yards. Benavides caught one pass for 18 yards, Enriquez caught one for 24 yards and Joseph Browning

#### caught one for 8.

The Tribe will meet undefeated Stamford this Friday night at Indian Stadium in what promises to be an exciting game.

The Bulldogs have a team that passes a great deal and is better offensively than last year. They have defeated Hamlin, 22-14, and Sweetwater, 28-6. The team is small but quick and use a lot of finesse.

"Our cause is a very important one. Lung diseases kill more children in this nation than any other disease except cancer," said Marilyn Bahney, chairman of the campaign. "Cystic Fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children, and approximately 40% of the persons suffering from C/F are not yet diagnosis".

According to Mrs. Bahney, contributions to the Kiss A Baby Campaign will help support a national network of over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers, research projects around the world and various educational programs.

Cystic Fibrosis Centers, most located at teaching hospitals affiliated with leading medical schools and universities, provide diagnosis, treatment, and referral to children suffering from cystic fibrosis, asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, "childhood emphysema" and recurrent pneumonia.

Hospitals dealing with gastrointestinal disorders related to C/F are located in Dallas, Houston and San Antonio.

"Through tesearch we hope to find a cure and control for cystic fibrosis," said Mrs. Bahney. "Another goal of the research program is developing better methods of treating children with all lung-damaging diseases."

"Most of the funds that are raised in the Kiss A Baby Campaign go to these very important national programs," she said. "But, almost 50 percent of the monies stay in this Chapter area to support services for local children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases."

Cystic Fibrosis affects one out of every 1,500 infants born each year. Although incurable, cystic fibrosis can be effectively treated.

"Since the C/F Foundation was established in 1955, remarkable progress has occured in treating children with cystic fibrosis," the campaign chairman commented. "At that time, most children with this disease died early in life. Today, more than 50 percent of the children with cystic fibrosis live past their 19th birthday, and that is a beautiful 20th anniversary gift of life".
