Goal Is 100 Units

Bloodmobile To Visit Haskell November 1

The American Red Cross Blood Services, Red River Region, is working to make donating blood more pleasant and comfortable. This new equipment is a progressive step forward for this region and it has many advantages over our present equipment. The new equipment was designed as a total coordinated package by the Rhode Island School of Design. The equipment was designed to achieve three goals: first, the highest possible donor safety, second, an efficient total operation, and third, a clean, pleasant atmosphere.

On Thursday, November 1, the bloodmobile will be in Haskell to utilize the new bloodmobile equipment. The bloodmobile will be set up from 1:00 until 6:00 p.m., according to Brian Burgess, Blood Services chairman. Goal for the mobile has been set at 100 units of blood.

Ed Thomas, chairman of the Regional Blood Services Committee, has welcomed the new equipment. "We saw the tentative designs as early as three years ago and were eager to implement them. We are very happy

to provide this step forward for the region. This new system is more effective, more time productive, and we feel it will give the Red Cross donor process a more professional look."

The new equipment has many advantages. One is that the donors sit while donating. Research has indicated that most donors like sitting up so that they can talk to other people instead of staring up at the ceiling. Another advantage is the mobility of the new equipment. Chairs stack, lounges and cabinets roll which makes loading and unloading much easier. Also, since the equipment was designed specifically for blood donation as a total package, all of the equipment fits together, both in function and form.

The registered nurse sits in a chair with rollers which places her at eye level with the donor. All of the supplies she needs are kept in two "pods" or containers fastened to the sides of the chair.

These changes have been made to make the donation of blood a more pleasant and comfortable experience

and to encourage first time donors to become regular givers of the "gift of life".

The American Red Cross Blood Services, Red River Region, covers 28 counties in Southern Oklahoma and North Central Texas. Blood and Blood products are provided for patients in 41 area hospitals.

The Blood center is located at 1809 5th Street, Wichita Falls and accepts walk-in blood donors. Hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. weekdays except for Wednesday when the Center is open until 6:30 p.m.

City Council Approves Rate Change

Members of the Haskell City Council Tuesday night approved a request of Lone Star Gas Co. to change service charges to local customers.

The changes will include charges for reconnection, appliance service, air conditioner service, returned checks, and disconnecting and reconnecting yard lines for repairs. The basic charge for gas will not be altered.

In other action members of the council adopted a fair housing ordinance and discussed application for a Community Development Block Grant.

Members also set charges for camping in the city trailer park. The charges will be free for the first night, \$4.00 per night for two weeks and anyone staying longer than two weeks must have permission of the City Council.

Mayor Royce Williams reported that the City had received sales tax rebate in the amount of \$3,945.64, for the period ending September 27.

First Christmas Drawing Set Dec. 1

Haskell merchants will start giving Christmas drawing tickets with purchases on November 1st. This will give the shoppers thirty days to accumulate tickets so they may participate in the \$20,000 to be given away.

The first drawing will be held on Saturday, December 1st at 11 a.m. on the south side of the courthouse. Nine names will be drawn from the container for a total of \$500. \$100 first place and 8 \$50 awards with the unique feature that the ones present whose names are called will receive the full amount and if

not present they will receive one half. The other half will be put in the jackpot for December 22nd when a guarantee of \$500 or more will be the award for the lucky person whose name is called.

After each Saturday drawing, the tickets will be emptied from the container. If a customer cannot attend one or more of the special drawings, it is suggested that they hold their tickets until they know they will be present.

Santa Claus will also be present for each of the four special days. All you have to do is write your name and address, no tickets to hold.

The team is basically a running team, but throws some short passes and screen passes.

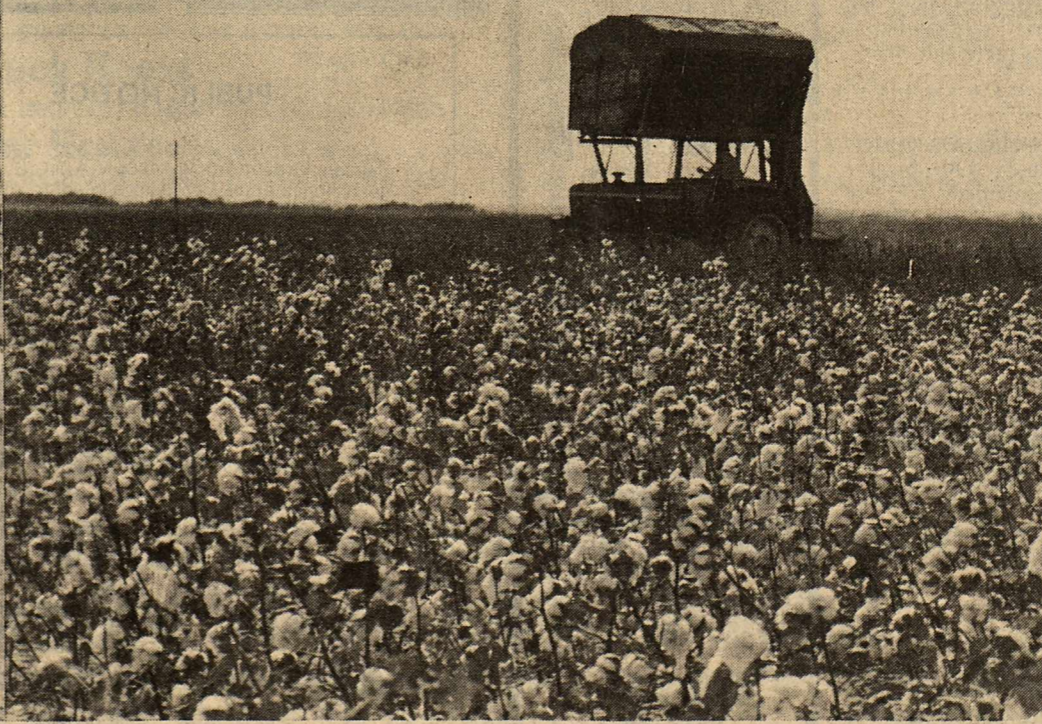
The Tribe is healthy and looking forward to this Friday's game.

Poster Contest rules were developed and should be in the schools early in November. Due to a change in Public School Week from March to October, the Poster Contest will be conducted either in late December or early January. To be eligible for Area V Awards Program participation, conservation posters must be in the local District office no later than January 15 for District Judging. All items and dates will be included in the Rules that will be sent out to the schools. The District Board of Directors is urging each school in the Haskell SWCD to participate.

FEDERAL/STATE COST-SHARE PAYMENTS EXCLUDED FROM GROSS INCOME OCTOBER 1

Federal and State conservation cost-share payments received by farmers after September 30, 1979, may be excluded from gross income for income tax purposes. Under provisions of the Revenue Act of 1978, the Secretary of Agriculture has proposed regulations that would exclude those Federal and State cost-share payments made primarily for the purpose of conserving soil and water resources, protecting or restoring the environment, improving forests, or providing wildlife habitat. The U.S. Treasury Department has not as yet published guidelines on the details regarding tax treatment and reporting.

Programs for which cost-share payments may be excluded from gross income under the Department of Agriculture's proposed regu-

lations include: The Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), Rural Clean Water Program (RCWP), Rural Abandoned Mine Program (RAMP), Water Bank Program, Resource Conservation and Development Program (RC&D), Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP), Forestry Incentives Program (FIP), Small Watershed Programs, emergency conservation measures authorized by the Agricultural Credit Act of 1978, and State programs under which payments are made to individuals primarily for Conservation as described

by USDA above.

PUBLIC HEARING SET ON STRUCTURE OF AMERICAN AGRICULTURE

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland will preside at a public hearing December 6 in Wichita Falls, Texas to hear comments and suggestions on the economic and social issues affecting the structure of American agriculture and rural life. The meeting will be held at the Wichita Falls Activities Center located at 10th and Indiana Sts.

Any testimony that any producer would like to present at this meeting should be

routed through the local district office addressed to your District Director so that all such testimonies can be submitted at the meeting. The District Directors need to request time on the meeting schedule well in advance of the meeting for these testimonies.

If any farmer or rancher has comments to make, it is suggested that you contact your district director for the proper procedure for handling your comments, statements, etc.

STOCK MARKET

The market at Haskell Livestock Auction had a smile on its face and a song in its heart on a run of 1286 cattle, 137 hogs, and 0 sheep and goats at its sale October 20, 1979, according to Tommy Clay market reporter.

Prices were cheaper on packer cows, steady on pairs and \$2 to \$3 higher on stocker calves and yearlings, Clay reported.

Cotton Classing

The Munday Marketing Services Office opened for business October 15, 1979. This was approximately seven weeks earlier than the previous season, according to Garland Dye, in his first season as Officer-In-Charge.

The cotton harvest moved into high gear in several areas of the territory. A considerable amount of defoliation has already been accomplished. Demand for early ginnings was good and reported prices ranged from 55.25 to 56.25 cents per pound for cotton with micronaire readings in the 35 to 49 range. The Munday office classed 1,847 samples during the first week of operation and quality was high.

Grade 31 accounted for 48 percent of the total with Grade 41 comprising 26 percent. Staple lengths were mostly 31 and 32 with Staple 31 accounting for 47 percent, and Staple 32 making up 38 percent. Ninety-five percent of the samples had micronaire readings in the base range of 35 to 49. Farmers received from 110 to 115 dollars per ton for cottonseed.

Lone Star Gas Files Application

Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, Leon Ivey, today filed an application to change the service charges and revise the gas cost adjustment in Weinert.

Ivey emphasized the base rate being charged for gas consumed by residential and commercial customers will not be increased under the proposal.

The new service charges being requested by Lone Star are \$20 for a reconnection; \$18 per hour for appliance service; \$20 per hour for air conditioning service; \$5 for a returned check; and \$40 to disconnect and reconnect a customer's yard line for repair.

"These charges are designed to recover Lone Star's expenses for these services," says Ivey. "A relatively small portion of Lone Star's custom-

ers require these special services, and these charges put the cost of the work on those who use the service."

The gas cost adjustment requested in the application would allow Lone Star to recover distribution operating expenses that increase with the city gate cost of gas.

The estimated total increase in annual revenue for Lone Star's Weinert distribution system under the proposed change is \$883.00 or 1.83 percent.
