Research has indicated that most donors like sitting up so that they can talk to other people instead of staring up at the ceiling. Another advantage is the mobility of the new equipment. Chairs stack, lounges and cabinets roll which makes loading and unloading much easier. Also, since the equipment was designed specifically for blood donation as a total package, all of the equipment fits together boths, function and form.

City Council **Approves Rate Change**

Members of the Haskell City Council Tuesday night approved a request of Lone Star Gas Co. to change service charges to local customers.

The changes will include charges for reconnection, appliance service, air conditioner service, returned checks, and disconnecting and reconnecting yard lines for repairs. The basic charge for gas will not be altered.

In other action members of the council adopted a fair housing ordinance and discussed application for a Community Development Block Grant.

Members also set charges for camping in the city trailor park. The charges will be free for the first night, \$4.00 per night for two weeks and anyone staying longer than two weeks must have permission of the City Council.

Mayor Royce Williams reported that the City had received sales tax rebate in the amount of \$3,945.64, for the period ending September 27.





lowering the costs of feeding cattle. Initial research on a new compound called monensin has had positive results at several agricultural colleges and test stations. Classified as an antibiotic, the chemical has produced an in-crease in feed efficiency as high as 13 percent. Average improvement in tests at the University of Nebraska was 11 percent. On that basis a dollars and cents evaluation means a savings of about twenty dollars a head in the average feeding cost for feed-lot beef. Food and Drug Administration officials are expected to react more favorably toward the new compound than toward the still controversial DES since monensin acts only in the rumen of the animal and reportedly leaves no residues in tissue. Researchers say the compound enhances gain efficiency when used amounts small enough to be comparable to adding one pint to 5,000 gallons of water. HALE FARM

Haskell Economy Better Than Most

by Gina Jennings

Dismal news about 'the financial state of our nation drifts in from all directions and settles in like a dense fog. Prime lending rate climbs to record heights. Chrysler Corporation pleads for mercy in Washington while Washington pleads for mercy with OPEC. Gross product declines and inflation rises daily. The national media sounds through the haze like a fog-horn advising the nation on what is ahead, but what faces our community in specific? What is happening to money in Haskell?

Abe Turner, President of the Haskell National Bank, says that locally we haven't felt the economic blows as much as the large cities have, but Haskell is being affected.

Most immediately evident here is the climbing rate of interest which is determined weekly by the federal Government. Currently, the interest paid on a deposit of \$10,000 or more in the 6 month money market is 11.716%. This amount is determined weekly and published in the Wall Street Journal. The lending rate has just gone up to 13% as a result of the higher federal lending rates.

This high lending rate is making it much tougher for borrowers to come up with the money for equity and payments which are increased after the interest is figured in. "It is hard on us too," comments Turner. "We lose our 'white hat' image but we have no choice. We are charged a higher rate so we have to charge our borrowers






