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

Director of the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office reported that 30,000 cotton samples were classed in Abilene during the week ending Friday, February the 15th. This brought the seasonal total to about 838,000 samples classed. An additional 180,000 samples were classed at Munday, bringing the combined total to 1,018,000 samples classed.

Local cotton prices advanced by one to two cents per pound early last week, and were mostly steady the rest of the week. Cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold mostly at 20 to 251/2 cents per pound over CCC loan values. Grade 32, staple 32 cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold at physical prices ranging from 671/2 to 72 cents per pound. The supply of cotton was light to moderate. Demand was mostly moderate for base mike cotton, and was light to moderate for low mike cotton. Demand for low grade cotton weakened. Trading was slow to moderate. Cottonseed

prices paid producers ranged from 95 to 120 dollars per ton.

The quality of cotton classed in Abilene was slightly lower than during the previous, week. Grades were 5% white, 64% light spotted, and 25% spotted. Grade 32 continued predominant at 36%. Grade 42 comprised 25%, grade 33 comprised 12%, and grade 43 comprised 11%. Fiber length was 57% staple 32, 32% staple 31, and 7% staple 33. Micronaire readings were 36% within the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Twenty-one percent mike from 3.3 to 3.4, 31% miked from 3.0 to 3.2, and 10% miked 2.9 or lower. About 8% of the samples classed were reduced in grade because of bark or grass con-



Part II When I was fourteen my family moved to Oklahoma Territory but stayed only a few short months. Father found out if he didn't get a dead Indian's claim he stood a chance of losing his land after he settled it, so we moved to Bowie, Texas near New Boston. In Bowie, Mother and I came down with malaria because of it being low and swampy, so fourteen months after we got to Bowie we moved to Anson. In Anson I graduated May 17, 1907.

The Superintendent expressed the desire to send us to college, but we didn't have the money. During this time I was going rather steady with a tall, well looking red-headed boy. He was very popular so we were invited to many social gatherings. One such gathering, my Beau was Master of Ceremonies, I sat across the ailse from a short blackheaded boy from Ft. Worth. While my boyfriend was up front this other boy and I were getting acquainted.

My folks were not in favor of this boy, but the more they tried to discourage us the less they succeeded. We had some neighbors who secretly helped us court.

We decided to elope on Christmas Day, his birthday, at a neighbor's. Another neighbor found out about it and told Father. Christmas morning Father was very quiet. He usually finished first and left the table but this morning he waited patiently until everyone was finished as he looked on, arms folded.

Finally he spoke... "Luumie, going down to Dean's today?"

"Yes."

"Going down to get married?" I gulped, then meekly replied, "Yes."

"Well, I suspect you might ought to get married at

home.' So on Christmas Day, 1909, I married Owen Christopher Westmoreland and was married to him sixty-three years. All my husband had was some red hogs and I had a gray pony with a sidesaddle. His father had a small house and with the help of our families we started

our new life together. Nov. 21, 1910 our first child, Jerry, was born. Our daughter was born Jan. 13, 1912. World War I hit 1918. My two younger brothers volunteered, on the command from my father. My older brother because of his family was drafted. My younger brother, Frank, received the purple heart for carrying a message above and beyond the call of duty, across enemy lines to the 9th battalion behind them in Priny, France.

We were living in Arizona

during this time. We lived in a little cabin. It was hot and full of flies. It was here my husband went to register for the draft the same day the declaration that the War was ended came. As for my brothers, the two younger ones who went overseas were never hurt, but my brother who stayed in the states had an accident and lost his eye

through it. While we were in Arizona the flu epidemic hit, we almost lost my oldest son with a combination of pnuemonia and flu. During this time they had to change the schools and churches into hospitals because it was so bad. As soon as my son recovered we moved back to Anson.

We were living in Rule during the Depression where we picked cotton for a living, a far cry from living on a Georgian plantation. My husband got a job working at a meat market as a cutter. Soon the owners and my husband formed a partnership then shortly thereafter my husband bought them all out.

Now that I'm old, I'm glad I had as many years as I did. I lived during the time where people loved everybody. When a person got sick, the neighbors gathered around and helped. My husband and I had many beautiful years together. I have three children, two sons and one daughter, six grandchildren and four great grandchildren. As I look back over the years I had a very good life.
