Haskell Girls Win First UIL District Track Title

Haskell High boosted by three gold medals by Emily Cox, swept past defending champion Munday High to claim the 7-A track title. This was the first district championship under U.I.L. competition for the girls.

Emily Cox won the high jump at 5-0, the long jump at 15-9 7/8, and the 100 meter hurdles, in a career-best clocking of 15.61, the top time in the Big Country this spring. Cox was also a member of the 400 meter relay in which they had their best performance this year, 51.0. The other members of this relay are Rinette Vincent, Alicia Walker and

April Turner. Emily also placed 4th in the triple jump, in which gave her 38 points for the day.

Georgia Billington won Haskell's other gold, in the 400 meters (61.01). Georgia placed 2nd in the 100 meter (13.26), and was a member of the 1600 meter relay in which they placed third, the other members are Shannon Lane, April Turner, and Gena Dumas.

April Turner had an outstanding day in the 400 meters placing 2nd (62.71), being a member of the 400 and 1600 meter relays, and placing 2nd in the long jump (15'7 3/4") for a total of 23 points for the day.

are other members of the track team going to Odessa for the regional meet. Cindy won her best time in her career for the mile run (6:02:81). Shannon ran her best in the 800 meter (2:31:1).
