Response to a proposed town meeting in last week's Pipe Smoke has been super and the meeting has been scheduled for June 20 at 7:30 p.m. in the Community building of the Haskell National Bank.

A panel discussion will be held dealing with alcohol and drug abuse

and a question and answer session will follow dealing with a wide variety of topics.

During a panel discussion, four local residents will present their views on drug and alcohol abuse.

Panel members will include: Dr. Frank Cadenhead, Jerry Jennings, Bob Baker and Bill Blakley.

These four individuals will provide a broad base of local awareness of drug and alcohol abuse in addition to dealing with different aspects of the problem in our community.

The general purpose of the panel discussion is to outline the problem of drug and alcohol abuse in Haskell.

After the problem is defined, the question and answer session should provide some possible solutions.

For the meeting to be successful, a large cross-section of the community must attend and be willing to make an individual commitment to assisting in solving the problem.

## County Grant Approved

County Judge John Wayne McDermott reported to Commissioners Monday, that Haskell County had received approval of a \$8,132.00 grant to be used toward the purchase of an Experienced Citizens Center in Haskell.

The report came during the regular meeting of the Haskell County Commissioners Court meeting and court members agreed to study several options before obligating the funds.

In other court action, Commissioners agreed to amend the County budget during the June 24 court meeting. The budget amendment will deal with recreation funds for county baseball programs.

Commissioners also set a public hearing June 24 to study setting speed limits on county roads on the north side of Lake Stamford.

# DA Announces New Policies, Discusses School Vandalism

District Attorney Joseph Thigpen discussed several incidences of vandalism at Haskell Schools with the *Free Press* Monday and announced several new policies.

During the past twelve months, there have been a total of sixteen separate occurrences of vandalism. Total damage during the last five incidences amounted to over \$5,500.00.

Thigpen advised that the primary duty of the District Attorney's office is to prosecute violators of the state's criminal laws after their apprehension by law enforcement officers.

In addition, the DA's office provides law enforcement officers with legal assistance when requested and also provides a skilled investigator to assist, if requested by the law enforcement agency.

With this understanding, the DA's office is not in charge of the investigation of any incident of vandalism.

## Turnout Light In Election

The second Democratic Primary election in Haskell County last Saturday drew about 180 local voters to the polls.

In the Supreme Court Place 1 race, Jim Wallace received 101 votes and John Phillips received 75 votes.

Mike McCormick received 122 votes and W. T. Phillips received 55 in the race for place 2 on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Tom Davis received 161 votes to 20 for Edith Roberts in the Court of Criminal Appeals place 3 race.

According to Thigpen, the true facts reveal that all sixteen instances of vandalism have been reported to the Haskell County Sheriff and that he is in charge of all investigations dealing with these instances. Furthermore, the Sheriff has not presented the DA's office with any evidence upon which to proceed with prosecution in these matters.

Thigpen said, "During these sixteen separate occurrences of vandalism, the total lack of cooperation on the part of the Sheriff with this office and with other law enforcement agencies has created a severe problem in the

efficient investigation in these matters. At this time, I am personally requesting all law enforcement officers to cooperate with each other in the investigations of these incidences."

Thigpen also said, "I personally am concerned about the lack of understanding by citizens of this community concerning the criminal justice system and how it operates. In an attempt to inform the public, I am initiating a new program to be administered through this office."

"If any citizen wishes to request information which will better help him or her understand the

complexities of the criminal justice system in Texas, they may submit directly to this office, in writing, a request for information. A written response to their inquiry will be returned at the earliest possible time. All requests will be kept confidential but must be in writing and signed."

Requests should be sent to District Attorney Joseph Thigpen, P. O. Box 412, Haskell, Texas 79521.

If several requests are received concerning the same issue, they will also be discussed by the District Attorney in the *Free Press*.

## City Council Adjusts Salaries

Members of the Haskell City Council spent a major portion of their Tuesday night adjusting salaries of city employees.

Council members agreed on salary adjustments of between 5 and 10 per cent for employees.

During departmental reports Councilman Hugh Horton reported that the city had received use of a garbage truck from the City of Stamford. He expressed his thanks for the loan of their truck.

Parks Commissioner Francine Johnson reported on a newly organized summer parks program. She told council members that the program had started Monday with about 40 participants and about 60 attended Tuesday.

Airport Commissioner Joe Cortez reported that ramps were being poured for new hangars at the airport.

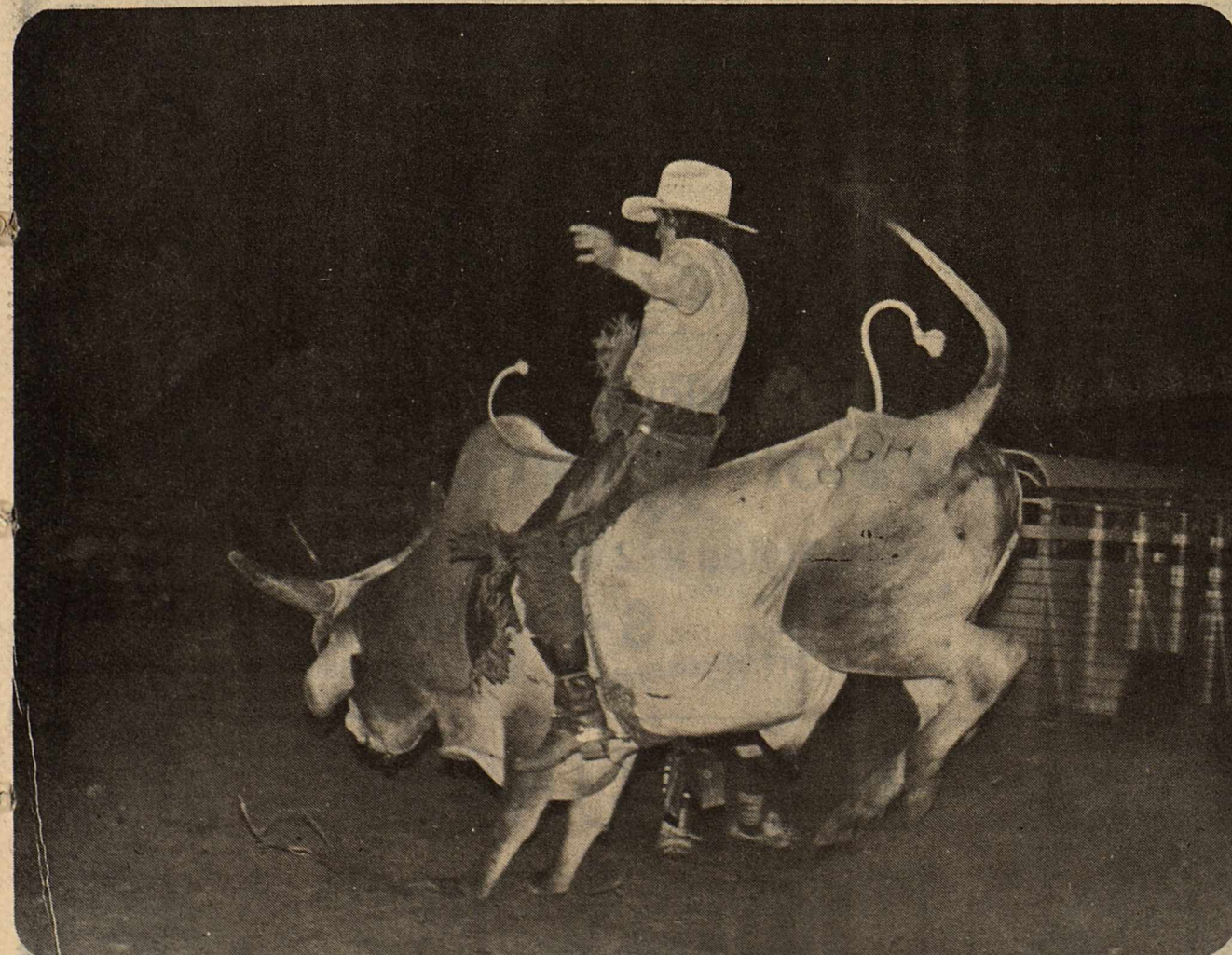

Be it so ordered, adjudged and decreed this 15th day, June 1980 A.D.

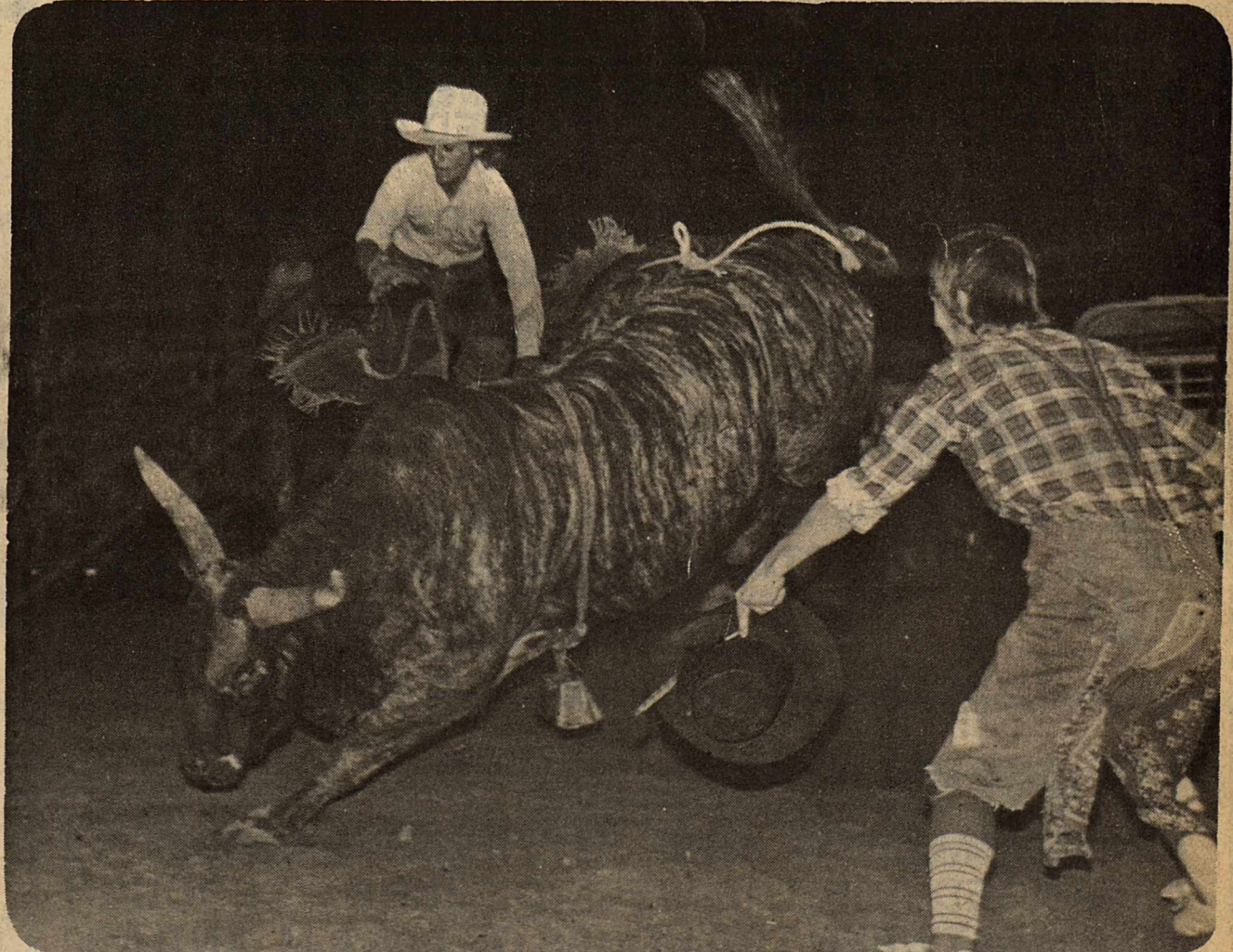

I do, however have a sense of sympathy for those who do.

These poor obedient souls live in a society where there is more leisure time than ever before yet the only thing the authorities on health will let them do is to spend it gasping frantically for breath on a jogging course or knocking their brains out on a handball

court. And, as if it wasn't bad enough that they have to nearly kill themselves to stay healthy, when they come in from a workout, hungry and thirsty, they can't even "have a Coke and a smile"—all they get is the smile.

The persuant of vitality must satisfy his hunger with edibles which are without salt, without sugar, without fat, without cholesterol and without any of the myriad carcinogens. Therefore, as the faithfully obedient soul sits down in front of the six o'clock news, chewing resignedly on a piece of boiled fish and secretly anticipating his annual visit to the doctor, it is heartbreaking when he hears that it has been canceled.

As for me, it is simply one more indication of the merciless nature of those societies who are always doing something "for our own good." Originally, I trusted these completely although after attempting to follow some of their suggestions, I became suspicious of their motives.

The District Attorney has also requested that when several requests are received concerning a particular matter that it be included in the **Free Press**.

This week's topic will be two separate occurrences of vandalism at Allsup's Convenience Stores in Haskell and Rule.

The Rule store was vandalized April 26, and the Haskell store on April 27.

According to the District Attorney, vandalism at each store exceeded \$200.00.

Thigpen also reported that no one had been arrested for either offense, but that Allsup's has accepted \$300.00, which was paid through the Haskell County Sheriff's Office, as restitution for damages to the Haskell Store and have requested that no criminal charges be filed in connection with either event.

Thigpen told the **Free Press**, "The people of Haskell County should be appalled that businessmen would hamper the judicial process by refusing to cooperate in the prosecution of criminal matters such as this. Such practices are sure to hamper both the investigation and prosecution of similar cases in the future."

**Emergency Conservation Program Action Needed**  
ASCS's County Executive Director, Glenn R. Brzozowski, has written many of you producers a personal letter concerning your applications for various conservation practices restoration under the 1978 ECP Flood program.

As previously stated in this column and in Brzozowski's letter, it appears that practices not approved by the ASCS County Committee prior to August 31, 1980 will not be approved. This means that some one from the Soil Conservation Service Haskell Field Office will need to visit your farm, make a needs and feasibility determination. All this will have to be done early enough for the ASCS County Committee to make final approval of your application before August 31.

As of last Friday, June 6 SCS records indicate that 86 applicants have not been serviced by SCS Technicians for needs and feasibility. 61 producers are listed to be in some status of completion of their work. We believe that you 61 will have past August 31 to complete your work, by the 86 producers will have to be serviced and approved

prior to August 1 through August 10 in order for SCS to get the paper work completed before the County Committee meets for the last meeting prior to August 31.

If you are waiting on wheat harvest to start your work, please do not do any tillage operations. Let us review the needs and then do your work before tillage. You will be able to save time and energy as well as wear and tear on your equipment.

Should you decide that you are not going to do your work, please let ASCS or SCS know. This will keep us from wondering about your intentions. If you cannot make the trip into Haskell, a simple telephone call to the ASCS Office, 864-2617, or the SCS Office, 864-3212, will get the job done.

It is most important that you act promptly. I would like also to write each of you a personal letter. Brzozowski has already accomplished this. Another letter would waste time and accomplish nothing. I can only urge your prompt attention in letting us know of your intentions concerning these pending applications for ECP assistance.

The bride is a graduate of Rule High School. She is a sophomore at Western Texas College where she is presently enrolled. She was a member of

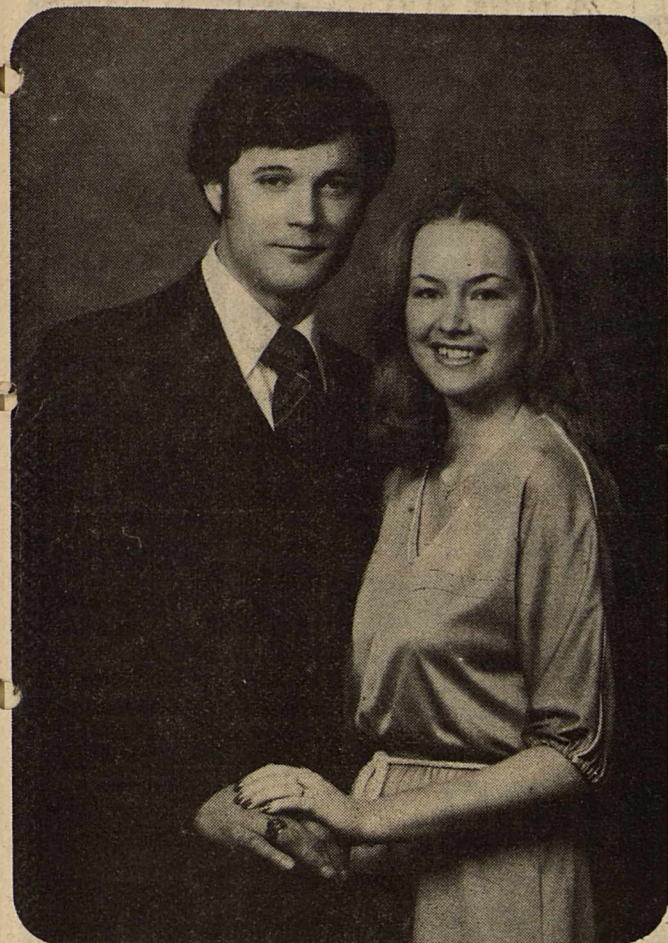
