AN OPEN LETTER

I have been with the Haskell Fire Department 36 years and I believe that the present fire hazard conditions are as bad or worse than I have ever seen. I would urge everyone to be extra cautious during this time.

Do not burn trash unless you have taken some precautions. Burn only in the early morning and only when wind velocity is below 15 miles per hour. Have a garden hose ready to use if the fire begins to burn out of control. Also have two or three pails of water ready for use.

Do not throw lighted cigarettes out of car windows.

Most of the time when a call is received from a rural area, it takes extra time to get there. Only 2 County trucks are equipped to fight grass fires. With the present hazardous conditions, there is a good chance that a truck could already be out on another call. So if you are fishing or camping, have some kind of fire fighting apparatus before starting a fire. Get a cattle sprayer, pump can, rake or etc. ready in case the fire gets out of hand. These items could help control a fire till the fire trucks arrive.

I have received around 3000 calls since I have been with the Haskell Fire Department. I believe that as many as 95% of the fires could have been avoided if people had not been careless.

If you think at anytime the Haskell Fire Department can be of help to you, do not hesitate to call us. The people of Haskell and Haskell County have been so good to our Fire Department and we'll be glad to come when our services are needed.

Acreage Reports Due By August 1

Haskell County farmers have until August 1, to file 1980 acreage reports.

According to Glenn Brzozowski, executive director of the Haskell County ASCS office, there are slightly over 1,700 farms in the county and acreage reports have been received on only about 700.

The certifications must be filed to qualify for any program including disaster benefits, deficiency payments, SBA loans and others.

The deadline includes summer seeded crops, cotton, grain sorghum, guar, etc., and a total farm certification is required.

Producers are required to make an accurate certification report, acreage reported must be within 5% of the reported acreage to avoid penalties and cannot exceed 105 to remain eligible for program benefits.

Measurement requests will be accepted until July 18.

School Board Proposes Increase

Members of the Haskell School Board hired two new principals and set the tax rate for 1980-81 school year during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Hired as principal was Frank Palattie of Cross Plains. New Junior High Principal will be

Clayton Neal of Azle.

Board members proposed an 85¢ per \$100.00 valuation tax rate for the new school year.

A public hearing on the proposed rate will be held July 17 at 7:30 p.m.

bonded indebtedness, total collection and percent collected during the past five years was presented and is printed below.

The explanation for the drastic increase in assessed value from 1978-79 (\$21,657,128) to 1979-80 (\$52,604,080) was due to the re-appraisal of all properties in the school district. However, little additional monies were raised because of the change in tax rate to sixty cents for maintenance and operation, the homestead exemptions and the ag use values on farm land.

In addition, Haskell ISD had to pay for bonded indebtedness for the first time in eleven years. The consolidation of the Haskell and Mattson school districts included enough state incentive aide money to cover this expense. However, the time limitation was for ten years on the incentive aide and the district taxpayers are again responsible for this expense which costs approximately five cents per \$100 on our present valuation; hence a rate of sixty-five cents (65¢) for 1979-80. This sixty-five cents was distributed sixty cents for local maintenance and operation and five cents for bonded indebtedness. The present bonded indebtedness will continue through the 1986-87 school year.

Council Members Discuss New Garbage Rates

Members of the Haskell City Council discussed increasing garbage rates and continued work on specifications for a new garbage truck during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Garbage commissioner Hugh Horton presented recommendations on rate increases and council members will act on the increases at the next council meeting.

Horton told council members that the increases were necessary due to increased fuel prices and salary increases.

Improvements at the city park were noted during the meeting and it was reported that the park and equipment is in good shape.

Council members discussed the pending grant application for paving in the northeast part of town.

high temperatures is now fifteen and weather forecasters are not overly optimistic that the string will be broken in the immediate future.

The high temperature for the year according to Herren is 113 and the record high for Haskell County as recorded in the Texas Almanac is 115.

While deaths have occurred in several area states as a result of the high temperatures, officials at Haskell Memorial Hospital and Haskell Clinic report no serious problems locally.

City Secretary Desmond Dulaney reported for the first time since readings had been available, local residents used over one million gallons in a twenty four hour period. The readings have been taken daily since shortly after Haskell began receiving water from Miller Creek Lake. During the past several weeks, customers have exceeded the one million gallon mark several times.

Water authority officials report no problem in supplying member towns with water and report that the lake is still virtually full.

Officials with West Texas Utilities report that the WTU system has already exceeded the peak demand expected for the year. Generally the peak demand occurs during the first part of August.

Census Totals Down For Haskell County

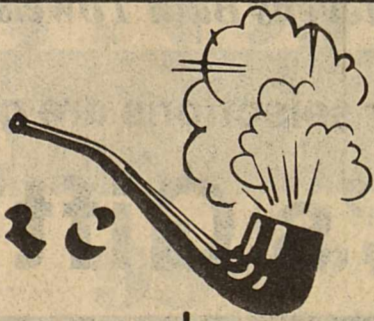
Preliminary reports on the 1980 Haskell County census indicate an 11.9% decrease in County population during the past ten years.

County population decreased from 8,512 in 1970 to 7,498 in 1980.

The City of Haskell was the only area of the county to register an increase on the preliminary report. City population in 1970 was 3,655 and increased 29 to 3,684 in 1980.

Weinert dropped from 255 to 248, a decrease of 2.7%. Rule dropped from 1,024 to 986, a drop of 3.7%. Rochester dropped from 529 to 456; O'Brien from 258 to 191 and the Sagerton division from 503 to 391.

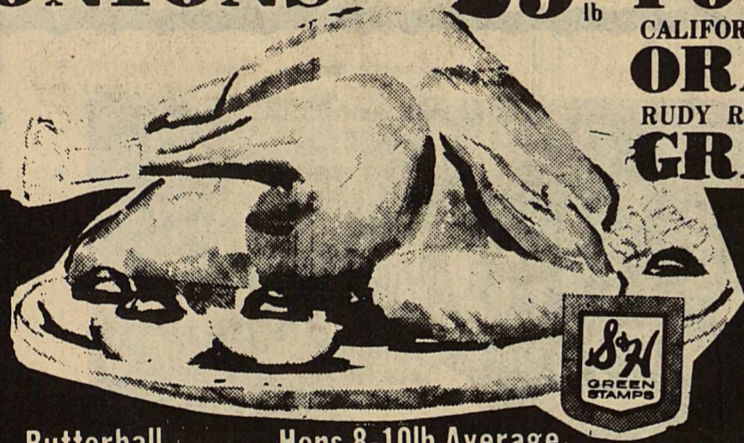

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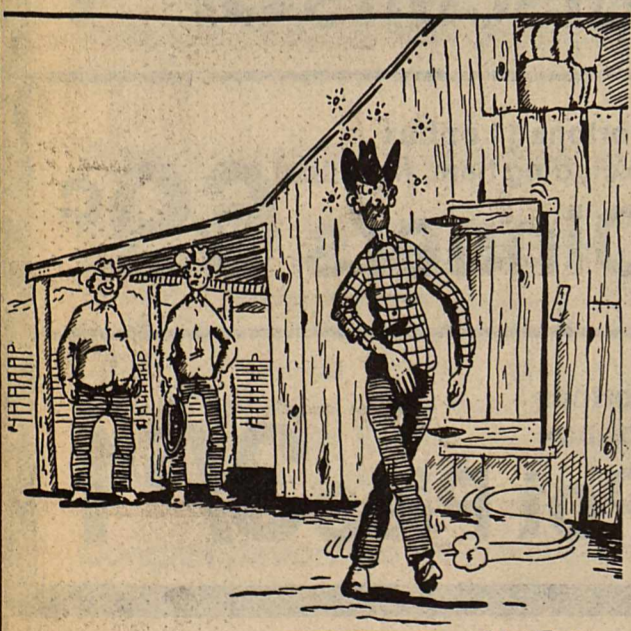

Cong. Stenholm To Attend Grain Meeting In Canada

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm will be among members of a delegation of Congressmen and Senators to travel to Canada later this month to meet with Canadian officials to work toward greater grain export cooperation between the two countries, it was announced today. Stenholm, a member of the House Subcommittee on Livestock and Grains, said the group, headed by Congressman Glenn English (D, Okla.) chairman of the House delega-

tion, and Arlan Strangeland (R, Minn.) ranking minority member, will travel to Canada for meetings with their Canadian counterparts in Ottawa on July 26th. The U.S. delegation will include Congressmen Jack Hightower (D, Tex.) Kent Hance (D, Tex.), Tom Daschle, (D, S.Dak.), Ron Marlenee (R, Mont.), and Jim Jeffries (R, Kans.). Senators to attend the meeting have not been selected. "We hope that our dis-

cussions with our Canadian colleagues will help bring about greater cooperation and coordination between the grain export policies of our two nations," Stenholm said. "Recent developments in the world market make it clear that this kind of cooperation is necessary--both to help protect North American grain producers and to help strengthen the economies of our two countries. The lawmakers are expected to discuss differences and similarities between Canadian and American agricultural policies and to explore the possibility of increased cooperation in production control and supply management.

Comments Sought On 1981 Wheat

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has asked for public comments on the 1981 wheat program. Comment is sought on the following: 1981 loan levels; 1981 target price; any reduction in 1981 acreage for target price protection on total 1981 acreage planted; whether to have a set-aside or not, and if so, what amount; compliance with NCA acreage to be eligible for benefits; other provisions are commodity eligibility, storage requirements, premiums and discounts and establishment of county rates. Comments should be by July 21 to: Director, Production Adjustment Division ASCS-USDA Room 3630-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Conservation Viewpoints

A workable solution to over-drawing the Nation's Resource Accounts can be found in a sound, working conservation plan.

"People in the United States today generally recognize that our nation has overdrawn its productivity accounts," quoted Anson Bertran, director of the USDA's Science and Education Administration. "Our checks are coming back stamped 'inflation,' some drawn on our agricultural account come backed stamped 'erosion.'"

Farmers and ranchers in the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District have recently developed new conservation plans for their land or revised existing old conservation plans to meet current conservation problems, their way of preventing checks coming back stamped "erosion."

Mrs. Agnes Rike of Haskell, with Milton Christian, Operator, developed a revision to her conservation plan to add a graded waterway for receiving excess water from the parallel terrace system.

Keith Fry of Rochester, revised his conservation plan to add 318 acres of new land, planning for both dryland and irrigated land activities. Major emphasis was placed on wind erosion control practices, and irrigation water conservation.

Arlos Weaver of Haskell developed a new conservation plan on the old King and Williams farms in the Brushy Community, emphasizing water erosion control.

Herman and Leland Nauert of Stamford combined three old plans into one new revised plan. Their aim is to parellel terraces all cropland for moisture conservation and energy conservation.

Nolan Lees of Haskell added 29 acres to an existing plan, and planned needed irrigation practices. Energy conservation is Lees main interest.

Don Cobb down in the Cobb Community revised his Great Plains Conservation Program contract to add 868 acres. Don is emphasizing the conversion of old cropland fields to improved pastures, and cross

fencing for better livestock grazing management.

John Ben Glover of Rochester developed a new plan on his home place with emphasis on irrigation practices and wind erosion control measures.

Elmo Stephens, Jr. "Butch" of O'Brien worked out a new conservation plan on 484 acres with emphasis on a much needed water erosion problem.

Joel Bevel of Rochester developed a new plan on 76 acres recently acquired to install a graded waterway.

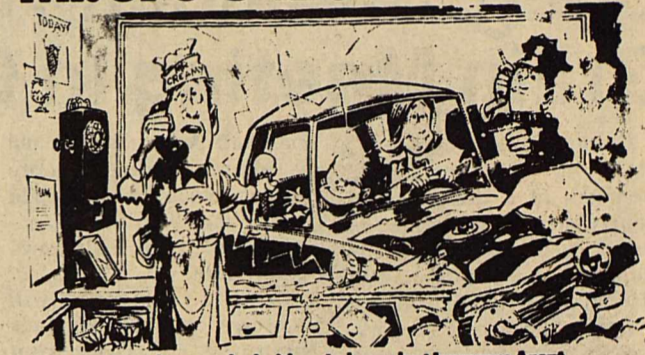
Clancy Lehman of Old Glory added 160 acres to one of his conservation plans. Henry Harris of Haskell developed a plan on 99 acres of new land.

Andy Wilfong of Haskell revised 320 acres, and Harry Haynes of Stamford revised 407 acres.

The Haskell Future Farmers of America under the able leadership of Duane Gilly, Vocational Agricultural Instructor, reported that they had leased the Haskell SWCD grass seeder to 16 producers during the past three months for use on 184 acres. The majority of the 184 acres was grassed waterways and small improved pastures. This is just another way the Haskell SWCD has of helping producers from preventing productivity account checks from being returned, stamped "erosion" or "inflation."
