Tribe had one pass intercepted and lost the ball four times on fumbles.

While none of the injuries was serious, Indians Mark Bailey and Lonnie Hise will be out of action for several weeks with pulled or bruised

Both teams had trouble finding the handle during the first period with Cisco fumbling three times and the Tribe once.

The Tribe's only scoring drive occurred during the first quarter after Bill Flanary recovered a Lobo

Indian Joe Benavides scored nine plays and thirty-two yards later on a one yard run. The PAT failed with 3:59 left in the first quarter.

HISD To Appeal State Appraisal

School Board members agreed to appeal state appraisals of taxable properties in the Haskell Independent School District during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Superintendent James Lanier voiced concern about the new appraisals which are significantly higher than those obtained by the board.

According to the Superintendent, the state figures are used to set Local Fund Assessment determining how much the school district will be paying for educational expenses. If the current evaluations stand, that could mean fewer state funds for Haskell schools.

Local Although Assessments cannot be raised more than 20% each period, the rise in property assessments could pose a substantially larger burden on the local board.

A report on HISD enrollment showed a drop of 12 students this year with secondary grades (7-12) having a consistently higher enrollment than primary grades.

This was the first outside audit of County finances in many years and was required by revenue sharing regulations.


Hammond was sentenced to five years in the Texas Department of Corrections after pleading guilty to forgery by passing.





Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutionto permit banks to estaband operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with antitrust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

USDA Soil Conservation Service

This past week brought to a smoothed out consisting of close the 1978 Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) have until February 28, 1981 and the Drought and Flood to complete their work pro-Conservation Program

The Soil Conservation Service received from the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service a total of 624 referrals for assistance. 40 of these referrals were duplica-tions leaving 584 referrals for assistance to be serviced by SCS. The first referrals were received on August 29, 1978.

All 584 referrals have been serviced, resulting in 25 referrals being cancelled as the practice requested was not recommended and 96 referrals being cancelled by the producers as not being interested in carrying out requested practices with cost-share funds. 382 requests have been completed and 90 referrals remain to be completed and checked out for certification.

The results of completed applications amount to over 4.9 million feet of standard level terraces rebuilt, over 2.5 million feet of parallel terraces rebuilt, 45 livestock water ponds repaired and restored to usable conditions, 130 plus acres of waterways re-shaped, 6 diversion terraces rebuilt, and approximately 40 areas graded, shaped, and



hand to accept the award. Kimbrough died in 1971 after a coaching career that included HSU, Baylor, Wayland College, Ranger Junior College and West Texas State University. He was a three sport star at HSU 1922-25, earning four letters each in football and baseball and three letters in basketball. As a senior he was a key as HSU recorded an 8-2 record--the most wins in a single season by a Cowboy squad until Kimbrough returned as head coach in the mid-1930's.

After graduation Kimbrough tried medical school but decided he would be happier coaching. He spent a while at Wayland College then won back-to-back state championships at Ranger Junior College in 1934 and

Meanwhile, his alma mater was suffering through three losing seasons (1932-34) with a composite record of 10-16-4. But in 1935, Kimbrough arrived for a six-year stay during which time the Cowboys would win 84 percent of their tootball games, go to two bowl games, compile two unde-

games and undefeated strings of 12 and 19 contests.

first Kimbrough took the Cowboys to a 6-3-1 record in the regular season and lined his squad up opposite New Mexico in the first annual Sun Bowl. That game wound up tied, 14-14, but the next thrashing of Texas Mines (now UT El Paso). The only losses in 1936 were to Baylor, 13-0, and Texas A&M (the Aggies kicked a field goal on the last play of the game after a penalty had stopped the clock), 3-0.

In 1937 his team was 8-0-1 (including a 7-0 upset of highly favored California Loyola); his 1938 edition was 7-3 (with verdicts over West Texas State and Arizona State) and his 1939 unit was 7-1-1 (the loss to Loyola, 6-0, and the tie to San Francisco, 6-6).

The best came last, as far as Kimbrough's relationship with HSU was concerned. In 1940 HSU posted a 9-0 mark, outscoring the opposition 229-

Kimbrough resigned his Abilene job for the head spot at Baylor (leaving the Cowboys under the guidance of Warren Woodson, a 1979 inductee into the HSU Hall of Fame) and promptly engineered a 7-7 tie against a previously undefeated, untied University of Texas powerfeated seasons, put together house. White says he will ask U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals to stay his order that illegal aliens be admitted to public schools in the state without tuition, pending an appeal to a higher court. Texas is faced with educating children of illegal aliens because the federal government has failed to enforce its own laws to keep them out, White said. "We are faced with the ridiculous result that the Justice Department has intervened on the side of the children of 'undocumented' workers," he said. "Yet the Justice Department is in charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. It is their own absolute failure to enforce the law that they are under oath to observe that has created the problem in Texas of having to educate these children." U. S. Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti placed restraints on apprehending illegal aliens at places of illegal employment or residences because of the federal census count. Robert Schultz, deputy director of the INS office in Houston, said, "It's possible people will send children from Mexico to live (here) with relatives," according to the Houston "Chronicle" (July 23).
